HOPES NOT VERY HIGH

C.C.F. Woman Speaker Admits that Her Party Does Not Expect to Win Federal Election

Long Crusade

Hopes People of British Columbia Will Vote Intelligently and Return C.C.F. Bloc

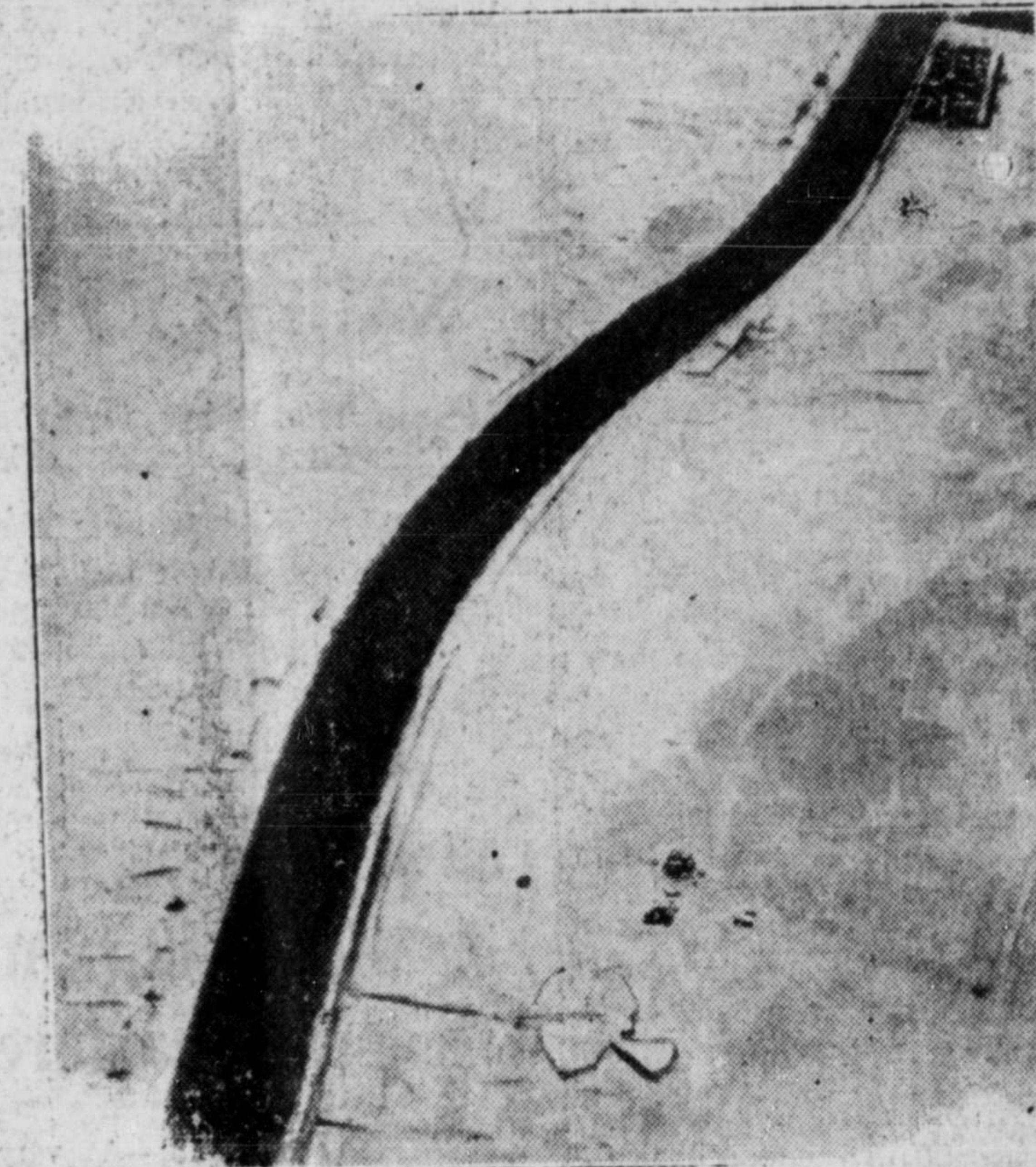
Speaking before an audience of possibly two hundred persons at a public meeting in the Moose Hall last night Miss Helen Gutteridge of Vancouver, secretary of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation planning commission and of the Vancouver unemployed conference, repeatedly admitted that the C.C.F. did not expect to win enough seats at the forthcoming federal election to be able to take over the reins of government and put its policies into operation in Canada.

Miss Gutteridge covered a good deal of ground in her address and propounded some new ideas. The main theme of her discourse was the failure of the capitalistic system to meet the present requirements in the way of distribution to the people of the fruits of an era of abundance which had replaced the era of scarcity.

Next B. C. Government Miss Gutteridge expressed confidence that the C.C.F. would form the next government of British Columbia and that, with the province gradually falling in line, it would eventually assume the national government.

The C.C.F., the speaker asserted, did not regard this federal election, which was one of the most important in the history of Canada, constituting as it did an "intelligence test" of the people, as a political campaign but rather as a crusade.

NEW SOCIAL PLAN IS UP

Manitoba Real Estate Dealer Devises Scheme of Collective Farming

WINNIPEG, Sept. 13: (CP)—Harboring a vision of a short-cut to the millennium, Josh Hodgkinson, Kelwood, Man., real estate dealer and former police magistrate, visited this city seeking support for his "Industrial Collective Farms" project.

The scheme is to place 100 families on a huge, collective farm in some fertile and productive part of Manitoba. Besides producing all their food, the members of the group would build their own homes, make their own clothes and provide themselves with almost every necessary of life and many luxuries.

Initial cost of starting an I. C. F. Mr. Hodgkinson said, would be \$1,500 per family for 100 families. After that the whole community would become self-supporting, trading excess production for whatever goods they could not produce themselves.

BIG OUTFIT TO ISLANDS

Special Arrangements Made To Handle 20-Ton Tractor to Queen Charlotte Islands

None of the coastal steamers had booms strong enough to handle a twenty-ton tractor which is now in Prince Rupert on its way from Vancouver to the Queen Charlotte Islands to be used on the east coast of Graham Island as a power plant by the Consolidated Gold Aluvials Limited in connection with the development of black sands for extraction of their gold content so the outfit, value of which is placed at \$15,000, was brought here by rail in a box car and transferred to the car ferry at this port aboard which it will be taken to the dry dock and lifted by the big crane there on to a scow aboard which it will be delivered by the Armour Salvage Co. to Massett. The scow to be used is one being brought here by Capt. W. P. Armour who is due here today from Vancouver with the big new power tug Algie which has been acquiring for the Armour Co.'s local fleet.

NEW PLAN OF LAVAL

French Premier Suggests That Italy be Granted Protectorate Over Ethiopia

U. S. For Peace

Secretary of State Hull Calls On Kellogg-Briand Signatories To Do Duty

GENEVA, Sept. 13:—Early today Premier Pierre Laval, acting on his own initiative on the eve of his official declaration of French policy in regard to the Italo-Ethiopian crisis, put forward, in an eleventh hour attempt to preserve peace, a compromise plan whereby Italy might be offered the status of protectorship of Ethiopia.

The proposal of Premier Laval came after it became apparent that the smaller nations would be lining up almost solidly behind Great Britain on the policy of strict adherence to the League covenant and enforcement of all sanctions against the aggressor in the East African dispute.

France's Strong Stand

In his official confirmation of French adherence to the League covenant, Premier Laval, before the Assembly today, came down strongly on the side of the League of Nations. "Our obligations are written in the covenant, France will not seek to evade them," Premier Laval declared.

Bursts of applause greeted the French Premier's statement by which France aligns herself with Great Britain, Russia and smaller nations in defence of the covenant.

Laval's speech was interpreted here and in Paris as meaning that France was ready to clamp down economic and financial sanctions the moment Italy attacks Ethiopia. At Rome government officials said that Laval's expression would have no effect upon Italy's action.

London Gratified

LONDON, Sept. 13: (CP)—While news of Premier Laval's pronouncement at Geneva was received with the greatest enthusiasm here, concentration of British troops in the vicinity of Suez continues unabated. An additional destroyer flotilla and battleships have been ordered to Alexandria.

United States Heard From

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 13:—Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the United States last night issued a call for all nations signatory to the Kellogg-Briand peace pact to maintain their obligations in respect to the preservation of world peace in the face of the Italo-Ethiopian crisis. He recommended peaceful arbitration of the dispute.

Attitude Changed

ROME, Sept. 13:—Premier Mussolini yesterday issued an order banning further anti-British editorials in the Italian press.

VISIT PAID TO ORIENT

Miss E. M. Earl Tells of Trip Through Parts of Japan and China and to Manila

QUAINT CUSTOMS OF EAST

Some of Things Seen Were Reminders of Biblical Days—Peking The Wonder City

MAKING a tour of Japan, China and part of the Philippines under most favorable auspices with Mrs. Clark of Vancouver and two other ladies, Miss E. M. Earl saw a great deal in the few weeks she was there and she told about it in a delightfully informal way yesterday at the weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in the Commodore Cafe.

One thing the visitors noted particularly was that the Japanese worshipped in the temples in hundreds and thousands while it was seldom they saw a Chinese in a temple for worship.

Miss Earl told how the ship was coaled at the port of Nagasaki by Japanese women passing the coal from one to another in small containers and doing the work as rapidly as could be done with modern machinery. They were not allowed to take pictures of this operation as Nagasaki was a fortified port and notices were posted warning against taking photos.

The speaker also told of traveling by car on a mountain road leading to one of the temples. The road was very narrow lined on each side by little shops and there was a constant stream of traffic—cars, rickshaws, bicycles. It took two people to drive a taxi, one at the wheel and the other at the horn. Sometimes little children playing at the roadside would crawl out into the road causing delay to the traffic.

Cherry trees were in bloom when they arrived and later they saw the azaleas and other flowers for which Japan is noted. Every bit of the country was cultivated. Rice fields were everywhere and little fields of corn as small sometimes as a garden patch.

That the trip was not unattended with danger was seen from the fact that 25 police joined the ship at Shanghai going as far as Hongkong, to guard against pirates. Similarly the river boats plying from Kowloon near Hongkong to Canton were guarded, the Chinese passengers being locked in their cabins and the captain and officers also locked in.

IS OPPOSING STEVENS

It is announced that the former lieutenant-governor, Hon. Randolph Bruce, will oppose Hon. H. H. Stevens in the constituency of East Kootenay. It will be an interesting fight because since the last election Mr. Stevens has changed his politics from Conservative to Reconstructionist. He is now opposed to the party which formerly elected him in that constituency and although he received the nomination it could hardly have been the unanimous wish of the Conservatives there that he should run.

Mr. Bruce held the position of lieutenant-governor at Victoria for a term of years and did it with honor. He is an outstanding person and should make a good running. The outcome will be watched with interest.

DANGER IN EXAGGERATION

Several years ago the Vancouver Sun editor thought it would be an advantage to the Liberal party if the leadership were changed. With the idea of bringing it about they made a vicious attack on Mr. King. The Conservative party is now using this diatribe as a paid advertisement, imagining that it will injure the chances of the Liberal party in the present election.

We can hardly imagine anyone being influenced in their vote by an editorial of that nature. One writer who was not an enthusiastic supporter of Mr. King but who is wholeheartedly behind the Liberals, said if Mr. King was good enough for Premier Hepburn, Ian McKenzie and Gerry McGeer, he was good enough for him.

Hopes Not High

against present intolerable conditions in this country which were but a reflection of those in the world. The object of the C.C.F. was to completely abolish the existing conditions and replace the present system with one of production for human interest and not for profit. The result of the election would be the first step in the direction of a change whereby the people would be provided with adequate food, clothing and shelter as well as access to all the social and cultural advantages to which they were entitled instead of being exploited as at present by the few who were in control.

Bennett's Record

Miss Gutteridge dealt at some length with the record of the Bennett government which she said had failed to implement the Premier's arrogant and bombastic promises of five years ago that he and unemployment within three months by blasting his way into the markets of the world. Finally, Mr. Bennett had come to declare that there were no world markets so he had brought forward a plan of "controlled and reformed capitalism." In his speech of a week ago he had admitted his complete helplessness to face the situation. No longer was he pompous and boastful as, in humility, he appealed to the people to vote not for party, but as a duty to themselves and their children. However it was impossible for the present capitalistic system to continue to function except in the interest of an ever-decreasing small group, imposing more widespread suffering upon an ever-increasing larger group. Even already the so-called money barons were becoming victims of their own worn-out system.

The speaker then traced her ideas in regard to the development of the age of economic and industrial development to show how the capitalistic system had now become obsolete, requiring change to a socialistic order. It was utterly absurd that people should smother in abundance and starve to death in the face of plenty. One trouble was that the human mind had not adapted itself to the rapid change in economic and scientific conditions. Unemployment could not be adequately dealt with under the capitalistic system and the speaker hoped that the people would not be deluded by any promises of employment which might be made by the old line parties.

Turns to Liberals

Miss Gutteridge, turning her attention to the Liberals, asserted that the Pattullo government had failed in the provincial field. In view of that failure, was there good reason to expect Mackenzie King to succeed in the federal sphere? After all there was little difference between Liberals and Conservatives. Why not support the party which said the situation could not be remedied under the system of capitalism and which would adopt a sane and balanced order of society designed not to benefit the few but provide for the many? Already the C. C. F. was making a thorough investigation of the economic situation and laying its plans for the day when it would take over control of the machinery of production and distribution. The C. C. F. had no idea of confiscating homes or farms but rather intended to provide more security for the people—a real security which they did not now enjoy. There was

no intention of breaking up homes or interfering with religious belief. Miss Gutteridge agreed that the people were faced with the choice between dictatorship and socialism. After the address, some questions were addressed to Miss Gutteridge apparently from persons of Communist tendencies who wondered why the C. C. F. and Communist party, if both professed to have the interests of the masses at heart, could not get together.

Other Activities

The chairman was G. V. Wilkinson who briefly reviewed the aims of the C. C. F., stating that its object was to institute a new social order based on Christian principles applied to social life. Mr. Wilkinson announced that Miss Gutteridge would speak before a gathering of women this afternoon at the C. C. F. clubrooms when tea would be served and also that there would be another meeting next Thursday evening when J. E. Panter, the C. C. F. candidate for Skeena, and E. E. Winch, M. L. A. for Burnaby, would be heard.

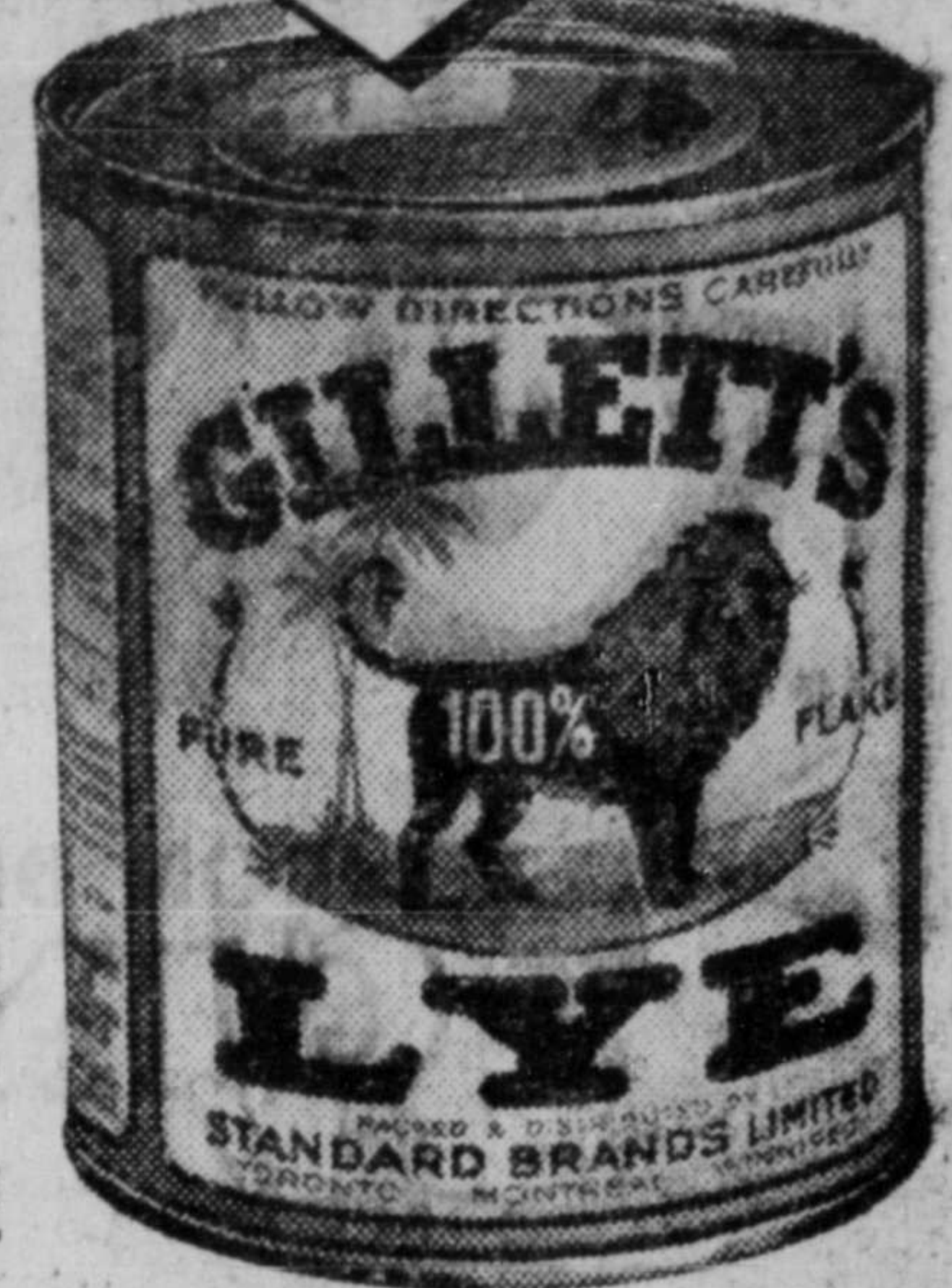

Quaint customs of the Chinese were explained, among them being the hiring of wedding presents by the family of a bride so that they might show them to the visitors, all of whom evidently understood they were hired for the occasion.

Big Water Population

At Canton there was an estimated water population of 80,000, some of whom were born on the water and had never been ashore. It was interesting to see the children, pigs and chickens all playing together on the deck of one of the boats.

At Soochow in the interior the streets were very narrow, sometimes only three feet wide, just as they were thousands of years ago and the only conveyances were rickshaws. Miss Earl saw women grinding wheat between stones just as they did in Bible days.

Peking was the wonder city of China. The visitors spent ten days there and it was all too short a time. Each day there was some new wonder to visit. One day they drove out on the great wall of China and looked down on Mongolia and Manchuria. Another day they visited the summer palace and on a third they entered the Forbidden City. In one of the temples there were as many as five hundred gods. Goods were so cheap that the speaker warned Rotarians against taking their wives there for they would want to buy everything.

Returning to Japan they were received at Tokio by Lady H. M. Marler, who was a very charming lady, and they had a fine view of Mount Fujiyama. Returning to Vancouver and seeking the wonderful scenery of Stanley Park and the mountains and gardens and then home to Prince Rupert, Miss Earl quoted the words of Pauline Johnston:

"Of one thing I can brag,
That I was born in Canada
"Beneath the British Flag."
