SHIPPING TIE-UP IS NOW THREATENED

PREMIER PROFITS SHOW BIG INCREASE IN SPITE OF FIRE

Entire Crew of Orient Liner Goes On Strike; Stevedores Join Them

Efforts Being Made to Avert Another General Strike Like That of Last Year—Twenty-Five Tankers Along Coast Are Now Tied Up

SEATTLE, March 14: (CP)—Another shipping tie-up on the Pacific Coast of the United States this spring appears to be increasingly imminent although steps are being taken in various quarters with a view, if possible, to averting a repetition of the serious tie-up of a year ago. On this occasion, members of the crews of steamers are threatening a general strike whereas last year it was the longshoremen who caused the tie-up.

The entire crew of the American Mail Line vessel President Jefferson, numbering one hundred, went on strike today after a dispute over wages and conditions, longshoremen engaged in loading the vessel walking out in sympathy. The liner is due to sail for the Orient on Saturday. It is believed that the trouble is connected with the strike of coastal oil tanker crews. There was strike trouble at three Seattle docks yesterday.

Officers Join Seamen

SAN PEDRO, March 14:—Masters, mates, engineers and wireless operators yesterday joined sympathetically in the marine strike, refusing to work on tankers tied up through the seamen's walk-out.

Twenty-five tankers on the coast are now tied up.

Schubert the hearty thanks of the members were accorded Dr. Kergin. President Jack Preece was in the chair.

Ten Year Old Donald Roxborough In Serious Condition Following Accident Yesterday

Donald Roxborough, 10-year old Atlin boy, is in a serious condition after having been accidentally shot yesterday from a 22-rifle in the hands of Allan Morrison, aged 12, according to a telegram received today at district headquarters of the provincial police. The two lads were out rabbit hunting when the accident occurred.

WILL PROBE AUTO TRADE

Canadian Tariff Board to Investigate Industry Including Price Differential

OTTAWA, March 14: (CP)—Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of finance, announced yesterday that he had authorized the tariff board through its chairman, George Sedgewick, to undertake at its earliest convenience a full investigation into the automotive industry of Canada with a view, among other things, to ascertaining, if possible, why cars of identical make should cost so much more in Canada than they do in the United States.

A wide investigation of general character with particular reference to the bearing of customs and excise duties or taxes on the industry is asked.

Officials of the automobile industry will be given the opportunity to present their cases. They are said to favor public hearings by means of which they say they will be able to show that the price spread is justified.

A month ago motor manufacturers were advised by Mr. Rhodes that disparity between prices of cars to consumers in Canada in contrast with prices of similar cars in the United States was giving the government grave concern.

Big Cut Made In Mill Rate

Levy at Edmonton This Year on 53 Basis Instead of 64

EDMONTON, March 14:—The city council of Edmonton has reduced the mill rate for 1935 to 53 from 64 last year.

DECISION RESERVED

After hearing the evidence yesterday afternoon in a case in which Dick Johnson, Port Simpson Indian, is charged with a carnal knowledge offence against a 15-year old Indian girl, Magistrate McClymont in city police court reserved his decision until this afternoon. Sergeant G. H. Greenwood prosecuted the case and L. W. Patmore defended. Witnesses who were brought to the city for the case were taken back to Port Simpson this morning by the provincial police boat P. M. L. 8.

Britain Forsakes Disarmament



In keeping with the new British policy of heavy rearmament and the forsaking of disarmament conferences, the government launched this new 1,660-ton naval sloop at Chatham, England. The vessel is known as H.M.S. Deptford and is the latest of the "general service" class authorized under the 1933 program. She carries light armament and is an oil burner with 16-knot speed.

Lardeau-Gerrard Railway Will Be Open This Week

NELSON, March 14:—The railway from Lardeau to Gerrard, which has been blocked by snow-slides for two months, is expected to be cleared by the end of the week. Mail and supplies are already being taken in part of the way to residents by dog-team and pack-horse.

Baden-Powell To Visit B.C. Coast

Chief Scout Will be in Victoria on April 13 and in Vancouver Two Days Later

VICTORIA, March 14:—Lord Baden-Powell, head of the Boy Scout movement, will visit Victoria on April 13 in the course of a tour of Canada. The Chief Scout will be in Vancouver on April 15.

French-Canadian Deputy Speaker

Hon. Raymond Moran is Chosen Successor to Hon. Arrand Lavergne

OTTAWA, March 14:—Hon. Raymond Moran has been elected deputy speaker of the House of Commons in succession to Hon. Arrand Lavergne who died last week.

CALLANDER, Ont., March 14:—There was much excitement in the Dionne hospital Tuesday on the occasion of Annette, one of the largest of the quintuplets, cutting her first tooth in the lower gum. The quintuplets are now taking regular meals of potatoes, carrots and other vegetables.

To Have Rights

TORONTO, March 14:—Hon. David Croll, minister of welfare, stated yesterday that, under the guardianship of the quintuplets by the provincial government, every right of the parents would be observed.

PLANNING TO HAVE SENIOR MATRIC IN HIGH SCHOOL HERE

In view of the new requirement of the Department of Education that senior matriculation will have to be taken before admission for Provincial Normal School training, City Commissioner W. J. Alder today announced that, if sufficient students wish it, a senior matriculation class will be operated next school year at the King Edward High School here. The fee will be the same as formerly, \$125 per annum.

Fifty Percent More Money For Dividends This Year Than Last

Net Amount of \$370,000 Available For Distribution Although Power House Conflagration Forced Operating Costs Away Up

TORONTO, March 14: (CP)—The Premier Gold Mining Co. Ltd. showed a net profit of \$370,000 available for dividends for the year 1934 contrasted with \$248,000 for the previous year. The fire at the property late last year which destroyed the power plant increased operating costs to \$4.47 per ton as against \$3.21 in 1933.

Former Tory Premier of New Brunswick to Investigate Allegations of Former Grit Premier

OTTAWA, March 14: (CP)—A Royal Commission headed by Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter, former Premier of New Brunswick, will investigate charges made by Former Postmaster General P. J. Veniot against the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Announcement to this effect was made yesterday by Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of justice, who described the charges as serious. Mr. Veniot, himself also a former Premier of New Brunswick, is reported to have said that he would stake his political career on his ability to prove the charges which included that third degree methods had been employed with prisoners, that school children had been permitted to take confiscated liquor and that seized food had been destroyed in the presence of high starving people.

Little Boy Is Dead in Ditch From Drowning

VANCOUVER, March 14:—William Udy, four and a half year old son of Victor Udy, lost his life by drowning in a ditch on Lulu Island. The ditch was over flooded on account of recent rains.

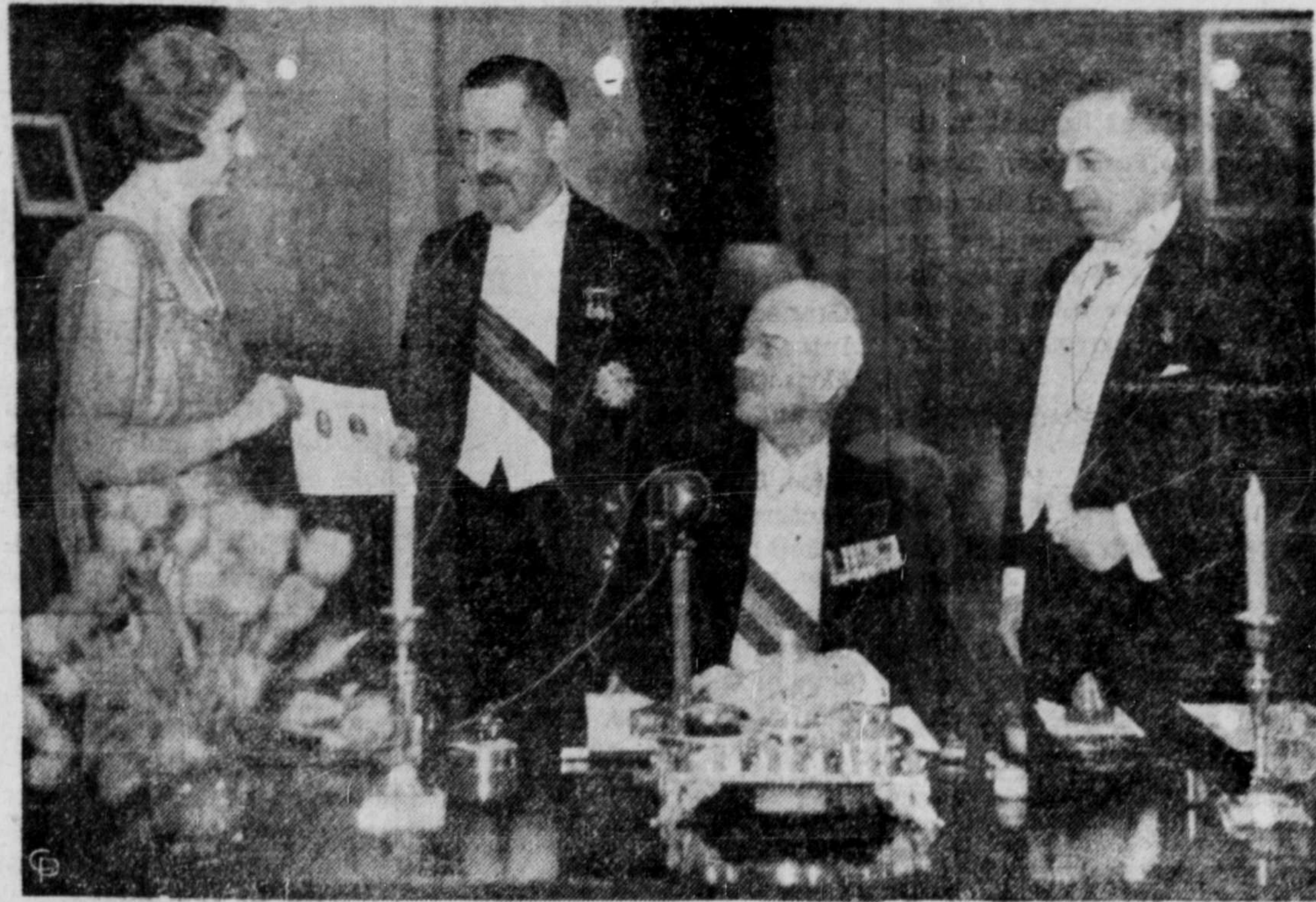
