What is regarded as one of the most remarkable of recent developments in man's war upon ca cer has been made by this Soviet scientist, Prof. M. F. Sitovich, a graduate of the military academy of medicine and bearer of the title of "Udarnik," one of the highest honors awarded by the Soviet Union. Prof. Sitovich's test is based upon the inhaling of chlorine by the patient. He says that the blood of a healthyperson has invariably hemolized after chlorine inhalation while that of a person afflicted with cancer has not hemolized in any of the tests he has conducted using both human and animals as subjects.

The chorus proved itself to be quite as meriforious a musical organization as it had been heralded and the entertainment was one of much delight to all who heard it. Chorus work by the group of thirty-five male singers in their natty nautical uniforms was featured in a versatile and varied program in which Scandinavian music and lyrics predominated although there were also several numbers in English.

The chorus was conducted by Charles Homan whose pleasing personality and excellent control of the voices is, no doubt, in a large measure responsible for the success that has so far been attained by the organization. There were five separate groups of selections by the chorus. Among the outstanding numbers were the virile "Norge, Norge," the well-known "Winter Song" with its wing and zoom-zoom, the resonant "On the Sea," the 'melodious "Chimes" which introduced several nevelties and the always acceptable "Lost Chord." Those who understood the language perhaps more fully appreciated the several varied numbers in Scandinavian tongue, the music in a number of which was very fine.

General comment on the program would not be complete without mention specially of the Crusader's hymn "Beautiful Savior" in which Edwin Sande was the tenor soloist.
