BRITAIN, FRANCE AND ITALY MEET

FIGHT ON FRASER RIVER BRIDGE BILL IS ON AT VICTORIA

Three Nations Will Confer in Paris Within Next Few Days On Existing Situation in Europe

Vancouver Boats Are Leaving For Banks This Week

According to advices reaching the city today halibut vessel owners of Vancouver have decided to leave port on March 23, Saturday of this week to start the 1935 season's halibut fishing operations.

French Cabinet Would Bring Question of German Conscription Before League of Nations—Russia Talking Of Increasing Army "Ten Times"

LONDON, March 20: (CP)—The British cabinet has agreed to a conference of Great Britain, France and Italy on the German situation within the next few days. The French cabinet has voted to bring the matter of German conscription before the League of Nations. France also asked that Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, visit Paris to discuss the European situation before going to Berlin to meet Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler on Monday next. Hitler has sent a message saying he would be delighted to meet Simon.

Budget Friday

OTTAWA, March 20: (CP)—Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, will present his budget to Parliament on Friday, it was announced yesterday.

DIED TODAY

Little eight-year old Gloria Leighton of Metlakatla died early this morning at the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The body is to be interred at Metlakatla. Haynor Brothers have charge of funeral arrangements.

Moscow advices state that the Russian Army may be "increased ten times" if necessary for the defence of Russia against what is termed Germany's preparation for war.

Spectacular aerial manoeuvres over Berlin last night gave substance to the Reich's claim that Germany is now a military power to be contended with.

Defence Appropriation Asked
In view of the threatening state of affairs in Europe, the war department is demanding an appropriation of \$30,000,000 from Parliament for special defence measures.

TITLE BOUT BETWEEN BAER AND SCHMELING IN LONDON IS MOOTED

LONDON, March 20:—It was reported here yesterday that German promoters were negotiating to stage a world's heavyweight championship boxing match here in July or August between Max Baer of United States, the titleholder, and Max Schmeling, the former champion.

Reindeer For Eskimos End Five Year Arctic Trek



For five years and two months a great herd of reindeer has been trekking across Arctic wastes to the Mackenzie river delta in Canada's northwest territories. The great trek will end about the middle of March. In 1929 the Canadian government purchased from the herds in Kotzebue Sound area in western Alaska, a herd of 3,000 picked deer. For four years they wandered, under guidance, across the Arctic circle until they arrived within 70 miles of their destination. But blizzards and extreme cold held them up for another year, and only now is the herd, vastly different to the original, arriving at the Mackenzie delta to feed and clothe the Eskimos of that district. Layout shows guides leading great herd and close-up picture of some of animals.

MINIMUM WAGE ACT

Legislation is Presented in House Of Commons at Ottawa But No Rates Are Set

OTTAWA, March 20: (CP)—Establishment of minimum rates of wages for employees in manufacturing and commerce applying to workers of both sexes over sixteen years of age is authorized in a government measure introduced yesterday in the House of Commons by Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of justice.

No rates are fixed in the act but power is given to name rate-fixing bodies.

Henry Smart Of Kincolith Dies

Whole Naas River Village, Joined By Representatives From Greenville, Paid Tribute

KINCOLITH, March 20:—Henry Smart, one of the best known and most highly esteemed natives of this village, passed away recently at the age of 71 years. The entire village paid tribute at his funeral which was in charge of the Church Army of which deceased was honorary captain for Kincolith. Also taking part in the rites, which were under the direction of Fred McKay, were the Greenville Church Army and Church Army Band as well as the Kincolith Church Army and Church Army Band. Matthew Stewart and Charles Lesson led the procession and members of the Senior Society, of which deceased was a member, acted as pallbearers.

Following the funeral, a supper was held in the Jubilee Hall.

TINKERING ON TARIFF

Opposed by Manager of American Vessel Owners Before Committee at Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 20: (CP)—An influx of Japanese halibut would flood the United States market if there was tariff reduction on fish in a reciprocal trade agreement with Canada, the reciprocal trade committee was told yesterday by Harold E. Lokken, manager of the Seattle Halibut Vessel Owners' Association.

Mr. Lokken said that the fishermen of Canada and the United States had formulated their own agreements and these had proven much more satisfactory than any possible action of the respective governments.

REFUNDING QUESTIONED

Victoria Member Asks if Repudiation is Not Involved In Prince Rupert Plan

VICTORIA, March 20: (CP)—Herbert Anscomb, independent member for Victoria, asked in the Legislature yesterday if the proposed Prince Rupert city refunding did not mean the repudiation of interest, adding that thirty-seven percent of the bondholders had not approved of the refunding.

Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipalities, replied that the present government and later ones might have to take even more drastic action in connection with the refunding of debts of municipalities. The measure was an honest effort, to satisfy both debtors and creditors, he said.

Sir Malcolm Gives Up Further Plans

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 20:—Sir Malcolm Campbell announced yesterday that he had decided, owing to conditions being unfavorable, not to make further attempts at this time to establish an automobile speed record of 300 miles per hour. He will return to England with his car, Blue Bird.

CONTRACT FOR LOGS

Armour Salvage Co. to Supply To Georgetown and Ocean Falls Mills

The Armour Salvage Co. has signed contracts to supply the Georgetown Lumber & Box Co. with 500,000 feet of logs from Shawatians Lake where a new logging operation is being commenced this week. A similar contract has been signed with Pacific Mills for delivery to the Ocean Falls pulp and paper mill. In addition, the Armour Salvage Co. is taking out logs at Shawatians for export to the Orient.

Automobile Goes Over Embankment Young Man Hurt

As a result of an automobile accident in the blinding snowstorm at 2:30 yesterday morning on Eleventh Avenue East, Matt Kimball is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from a broken collar bone. The car, which went off the road and down a 25-foot embankment, turning over in the fall, was badly damaged. Several other young people who were in the vehicle escaped with a shaking up. Joe Macheldon was the driver.

IT MAY NOT HAPPEN

Mostly what we fear does not happen. Today people are fearing war, but it is quite possible that the expected war will not take place. We must not take the spectacular antics of certain European countries too seriously. They are more or less political and are national rather than international.

What is more important to Canada just now is to set our own house in order and provide work for the men who have been needing it and in some cases seeking it for several years.


PRINCE RUPERT'S REFUNDING

Small municipalities always have to pay more for their money than large ones. If Vancouver's debt is refunded at three percent, that would be about the right proportion to Prince Rupert's four percent, as proposed at Victoria, following the recommendation of Commissioner Alder.

If the bill introduced at Victoria becomes law, it will mean a great saving to the City of Prince Rupert and will enable the commissioner to carry on without much difficulty. There is a good deal to be done, including the rebuilding of Westview Bridge, and all the money must come from general revenue. There can be no more borrowing for several years to come at least. It might be a good plan to eliminate borrowing by all municipalities with less than ten thousand inhabitants, letting them pay as they go instead of handing out large sums annually in interest on old debts. If this were done there would be more careful financing than has been the habit in the past.

LESS GRAIN TODAY

Despatches from Russia indicate that the amount of grain raised in that country today is less per capita than it was before the war. In spite of the mechanization of production that country is finding great difficulty in feeding its own people. The population is increasing rapidly and the amount of grain produced is greater in the aggregate but not as much per man as in the old days of peasant production.
