Can Pay in Devalued Currency in Relation to Yellow Metal-Stock Market Moves up Sharply in Response To Finding—New Legislation Needed

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 18: (CP)-The United States Supreme Court today upheld the government's right to cancel the "gold clauses" in private bonds but ruled that the government gold obligations cannot be paid off on a "dollar for dollar" basis. Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, in a summarization of the decisions, disclosed the court's ruling that government -

"gold clause" bonds must be paid off in gold or an equivalent amount of devalued currency. This, in efof devalued currency. This, in effect, means that, for every one thousand dollar gold bond, the government must pay \$1690 in cur-

Later interpretation showed that, while the court held invalid the resolution of Congress saying that obligations need not be paid in gold, the decision also, apparently, closes the doors to recovery of damages by saying that bondholders could not sue for redress since the Devaluation Act merely carried out the power of Congress to regulate cur-

The government won the solitary case involving gold certificates, the decision being that the court of Claims did not have jurisdiction to entertain suits against the federal government because of its gold bonds and gold certificates.

What the administration's attitude would be was not disclosed this morning but this afternoon, after reviewing the court's decision, it was decided by the government that no new legislation was called for as a result of the decision.

PORTO PRALA, Cape Verde Islands, Feb. 18: (CP)-Their ambition to better their present world's non-stop distance record frustrated for the time being at least, Paul Codos and Maurice Rossi, French aviators, landed here early yesterday after having turned back when about half way from here to St. Paul Islands in mid - Atlantic on account of trouble with their oil feed line. ## REPORT IS FAVORABLE

United States Senate Committee Approves \$4,800,900,000 Bill; Labor Satisfied

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 18:-The Senate appropriations committee has reported favorably on President Franklin D. Roosevelt's \$4,-800,000,000 public works scheme. A security wage of \$50 is provided for.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, and the committee came to an agreement on the question of wages to be paid under the scheme. Hours will be cut down in order to maintain a wage scale satisfactory to organized labor. Relief work will not be provided to any man who quits a job paying \$50 a month or over in order to get relief work.

## Wiley Post All Ready For Speed Flight Eastward

BURBANK, Cal., Feb. 18:-Wiley Post, famous American speed flier, gave his airplane, Winnie Moe, final tests here yesterday prior to his expected start this week on a stratosphere flight to New York. Post expects that, by flying through the stratosphere and getting away from air currents, he will be able to set up a new speed mark for the transcontinental flight, possibly eight and a half hours. Yesterday he stated that he had reached an altitude of 28,000 feet and attained a speed of 295 miles per hour. He was not satisfied with some of his instruments and this may delay his transcontinental flight start until the middle of this week.

#### THE STATUS OF CANADA

The Native Sons of Canada, with headquarters in Toronto, have just issued a booklet entitled "A Catechism on Canadian Status" which endeavors to prove that Canada is not a part of the British Empire, that there is no such thing as a Commonwealth of Nations, that Canada is Toronto wholly and completely an independent nation, that Canada Margons is not necessarily at war if Great Britain is at war, that canadiens Canada should withdraw from the League of Nations, that Americans Canada owes nothing to Great Britain but on the contrary St. Louis the debt is on the other side.

It is eurious that this little publication should be issued at a time when there seems to be in Canada a tendency for the nationalized citizens to pay particular attention to their former nationality. In Prince Rupert the Scandinavians are showing much greater national activity than ever they have shown before, not a disagreeable activity but one that recognizes the nationality of their forefathers in a marked degree. The Japanese are putting Vancouver forward their nation and showing pride in their Oriental Edmonton status. Italians are advocating the scheme of government carried out in their country and extolling the virtues of Mussolini. Germans are going Hitlerite. Czecho-Slovakians are showing pride in the land of their birth and other nationalities represented in this country are also showing similar tendencies.

In view of the tendency of the time we do not like the propagation of views which tend to break down the ties of the past. We want a real Canadianism but there is nothing to be gained by trying to read ourselves out of the British Empire. We call it "Empire" for want of a better word. The expression "Commonwealth of Nations" is cumbersome and just as incorrect. It is better to acknowledge that the word 'Empire" has taken on a new meaning and continue to use it. In any event we cannot cut away from all old associations until the nationalized citizens have passed on and given place to the new generation of Canadian born who in a few years will dominate Canadian life.


