

Government's Action Acclaimed From All Sides of Parliament

Agricultural Credits Organization to be Overhauled With Increase in Money Available From Fifteen To Ninety Millions

OTTAWA, Feb. 2: (CP)-Acclaimed from all sides of the House as a boon to financially harassed farmers, Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, last night proposed a bill to overhaul the Canadian Farm Loan Board and increase its credit capacities. The bill would abolish the provincial loan boards and centralize authority in a federal commission, also increasing from \$15,000,000 to \$90,000,-000 the amount of money available for farm loans.



It is this strain of cruelty that SCHEDULE makes it difficult to prophesy as to the future of the race. Men and women will talk of love and practice it and then suddenly revert to their original condition.

Reading history shows us that the world is much better today than it was even a hundred years ago. People have developed. The public conscience has been cultivated un- Andrews. til today it is not difficult to arouse the mass of the people against gross injustice. CRUELTY IN NATURE

In nature cruelty is seen everywhere. In the wilds there is no such thing as dying what is known to us as a natural death. There every death is a tragedy. Even the largest and strongest animal is killed by some other animal. Once it begins to lose its strength it is attacked. The insect is killed by the frog, the frog is killed by the snake, the snake is killed by other creatures and so it goes on from top to bottom. Bird life is just as unstable as that of the animal. One preys upon the other. In the sea we know that fishes eat each other and even the whale is eventually a prey to the smaller creatures. Cruelty is in evidence everywhere.

Did you ever see the cat torturing the mouse before killing it? What could be more cruel? In the Old Country the rich people amuse themselves by setting a pack of hounds on the track of a little fox and follow, dressed in red and mounted on expensive horses, to see the sport. Even here we see men go to the woods and shoot at innocent deer and waterfowl. This is done, not for the sake of procuring food, but for sport. They like to feel that they have the skill and the power to put the lowly creatures to death. In fishing, men play a big trout with very small tackle in order that they may see how good a fight the fish will put up. In all this there is a large element of cruelty.

In a number of countries, both in Europe and Asia, children are taught that it is a glorious thing to kill others in defence of their country, or even in wars of aggression. They are following out the laws of nature. Their ancestors were cruel and the creatures that surround their home are cruel, so why should they be anything else but cruel?

Possibly we are flying in the face of nature in trying to eliminate cruelty and yet there is something in all of us that points a better way.


