Three Thousand Are Dead so Far and Infection Continues To Spread With Quarter of Million Affected—Women And Children Principal Victims

COLOMBO, Ceylon, Jan. 5: (CP)—Nearly three thousand deaths in a dread malaria scourge were reported today from a single district surrounding Kegalle in the southern section of Ceylon. A thousand young children are among the victims and the infection is continuing to spread. It is stated that some quarter of a million persons have been stricken with a particularly high death rate among women. The scourge has been raging since early December and has been caused by excessive drought.

More Landing Fields Under Consideration

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 5:—The Public Works Administration is considering plans for the expenditure of a million dollars in providing forty-nine new airplane landing fields at various Alaska points. The program would double the present number of landing fields in Alaska.

New Reform Policy Is Further Discussed In Second Radio Address

Contributory Unemployment Insurance, Remodelled Old Age Pensions, Health, Sickness and Accident Insurance and Income Tax Revision Included in Government Program

OTTAWA, Jan. 5: (CP)—Contributory unemployment insurance, remodelled old age pension scheme, health, sickness and accident insurance, amended income tax laws to correct inequalities in wealth distribution, minimum wage laws and maximum hours of work and further legislation in the interests of farmers were promised by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett as part of his new reform policy in an address last night. The Premier was heard for the second time this week on a nation-wide radio hook-up.

PASSES IN VANCOUVER

Julius B. Miller, Well Known Merchant, Dies—Had Interesting Career. After an illness which had extended over a period of some three years, Julius Benjamin Miller, well known Prince Rupert clothing merchant, passed away Thursday night in Vancouver where he had been receiving treatment for the past month and a half. While it was realized that his condition was not good, his death, however, comes as a shock to many local friends and acquaintances. The funeral will take place in Vancouver with cremation.

The bonus fight will, undoubtedly, be brought up on the floor of Congress at the present session. Delayed by a connection from the east, tonight's train, due at 10:15, is reported to be three hours late which will bring it in at 1:15 a.m.

Third Party Expected to Oppose Return of Olof Hanson to Parliament—Convention Soon. As far as can be learned, it is the intention of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation to have a candidate in the field for Skeena riding in the forthcoming federal election. A list of prospective candidates, it is understood, has been submitted to the provincial executive for approval and the date for the nominating convention has been tentatively set but not yet publicly announced. No move has yet been made by the Conservative party to place a candidate in the field. So far Olof Hanson M.P., Liberal, is the only candidate to be nominated.

THE WRONG POLICY

The difficulty in administering a country as large as Canada, spread out from sea to sea, is seen very largely in the conflicting interests of the various sections. Just now we see a leading Liberal in Toronto attacking Premier Bennett for proposing to control or regulate business. Western Liberals do not generally agree with this attack. They believe to a large extent in the Bennett policy but it seems that a good many do not think the present premier is the man to administer the policy. So we find the Liberal leader attacking the Marketing Act which the Liberals of British Columbia thought so well of that they adopted it immediately it became law. Everything is so confusing in politics these days.

We think the Liberals are making a great mistake in attacking policies just because they are fathered by the Conservatives. Why not admit that some of the policies at any rate have been beneficial and wise? Why not try to take up the work where the other administration leaves off, not suggesting the scrapping of everything?

Political leaders will find the people of the country are changing. The voters are taking a more moderate view of politics. There is no longer a blind adherence to party but a considered vote that will go to the most reasonable leaders. Mr. Mackenzie King cannot win the country by simply opposing what the Conservatives do and say any more than can Premier Bennett expect to win by announcing a new policy after four sessions of Parliament doing nothing but mark time. Every year the people of the country are becoming more sophisticated. They are less gullible. Politicians will have to change their methods if they expect to receive the support which they seem to expect.

HANSON SETS EXAMPLE

Olof Hanson, member for this riding, has been setting an example along the line we mention. We are not electioneering for Mr. Hanson but simply mention in passing that, while the member for Skeena is a Liberal and has for the second time received the Liberal nomination, he is willing to give the Bennett government credit for the good things it has done. He is ready to support the government and vote against his own party when the occasion requires and he often receives the confidence of the Conservative leaders. As a result, he has served his constituency better than he would have done if he had been a strong party man and an orator. He is in line with the modern trend and if he is re-elected it will be because of his reasonable attitude on all public questions.

Regarding Opening of Halibut Fishing—An Informative Letter—Springs Are Running

Word is expected very soon now as to the setting of the date for the opening of the 1935 halibut fishing season. Meantime, there is considerable speculation in regard to the matter. Cold storage stocks are said to be getting low and this may have some effect in bringing about an earlier opening of the season. Another factor may also be the outcome of present discussion with a view to control of fishing operations with a view to spreading out the season over a greater period of time. Work preparatory to the season's operations is about to get under way and will shortly be in full swing. The outlook appears to be that the 1935 fishing season may be as good if not better than 1934.

Mitchell & Currie have had their contract of rebuilding the marine department wharf at Digby Island under way for the past week, half of the old decking being now torn up. Following the tearing up of the old decking, new is to be laid.

The following gem of misinformation appears in the form of a letter to the editor of the London Morning Post over the signature of Mrs. C. R. Goss of Dunfries, Sidmouth, Devon, who would probably be better informed if she made another trip to Canada:
