DEFENCE APPROPRIATIONS COMPLETE

NEW BRITISH COLUMBIA CIVIL SERVICE PENSIONS SCHEME

Government Employees Superannuation Plan Presented to House

Will Contribute From Two and a Half to Ten Percent of Their Salaries—Municipal Workers Not Included In Revised Arrangement

VICTORIA, March 6: (CP)—British Columbia civil servants will make pensions contributions ranging from two and a half to ten percent of their salaries under a re-adjusted Superannuation Act introduced in the Legislature by Hon. Dr. George M. Weir, Provincial Secretary.

MURDER VICTIM

VANCOUVER, March 6: (CP)—A coroner's jury investigating the death of Mrs. Rose Bova, who was shot and killed on Knight Road near her home on the night of February 22, yesterday brought in a verdict of death "by gunshot wounds not self-inflicted."

Her husband, James Bova, arrested shortly after the young woman's death, was identified as the man seen with her just prior to the slaying.

WAS ULTRA LOYALIST

Armand Lavergne Long Prominent Personality in Canadian Public Life

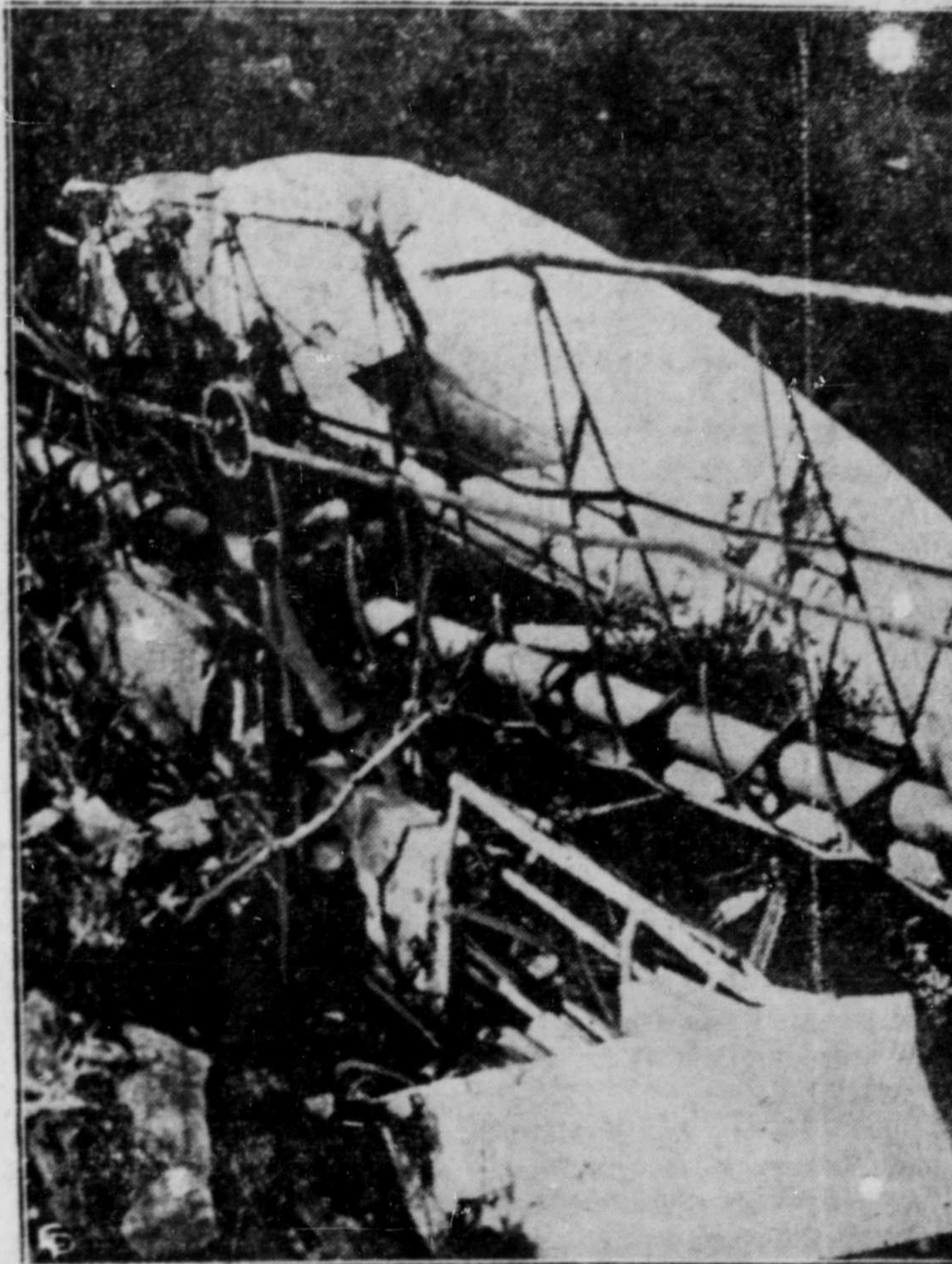
OTTAWA, March 6: (CP)—In his earlier days regarded as "L'enfant terrible" of Canadian politics, as a vigorous and uncompromising nationalist, Armand Lavergne, Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons, who died yesterday, mellowed somewhat with advancing years.

At that, however, Mr. Lavergne's independence and his unorthodox political beliefs were not infrequently a source of embarrassment to his Conservative party confederates.

Descendant of an old and distinguished French-Canadian family, one whose roots had been implanted into the soil of Canada from the very earliest days of New France, he was essentially Canadian in all his viewpoints.

Entered House Early Mr. Lavergne made his first entry into the House of Commons at the age of 24. He was then in strong support of Mr. Bourassa whose nationalism had received strong sustenance from Canada's participation in the South African War.

WOMEN AS DEPUTIES

Take Their Place For First Time As Members of Parliament In Turkey

ISTANBUL, Turkey, March 6:—For the first time Turkish women have taken their places as deputies at the opening of the Turkish Parliament. The new Chamber of Deputies consists of 17 women and 382 men.

Radio Station and Employment Service Bureau Approved By Body Last Night

After hearing an outline of the project by A. G. Bartlett, one of the sponsors of the undertaking, the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its regular monthly dinner meeting in the Knox Hotel last night with President T. N. LePage in the chair, endorsed the application which has been made to the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission for a licence for a local transmitter.

The Junior Chamber approved the idea of the formation in Prince Rupert of an employment service bureau, the principal idea of which is to organize casual labor for unemployed, and Foster Willan was named delegate to represent the chamber at a meeting of representatives of various interested organizations when the proposal will be gone more fully into.

Great Britain Spends Many Millions More On Army, Navy and in Air

Capital Ships to be Repaired and Modernized With a View To Lengthening Their Life—Great Naval Base at Singapore to be Completed in 1939

LONDON, March 6: (CP)—Great Britain's defence appropriations for the new fiscal year were completed today with naval estimates totalling \$291,000,000, an increase of \$17,000,000 over 1934 estimates.

The bulk of the increase in naval estimates goes for necessary repairs and modernization of capital ships with a view to lengthening their term of effective service.

The great naval base at Singapore is expected to be completed by the end of 1939.

GREAT OLD JUDGE DIES HITLER IS FOR PEACE

Oliver Wendell Holmes Passes Away In Washington Today at Age Of Ninety-Four

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 6: (CP)—Oliver Wendell Holmes, former United States Supreme Court justice, died today. He had been ill for the past week or so with bronchial pneumonia and some day ago hope of his recovery was abandoned.

He lived long enough to have the pleasant experience of seeing views he has expressed as leader of a minority, become the guides of a majority of the high tribunal, a development which made for him a place all his own in the history of American jurisprudence.

For close to half a century he served continuously as a judge, state or federal, and only the physical burdens of 91 years finally forced him to write his resignation. Beginning December 8, 1882, he was a justice of the Massachusetts supreme judicial court for 17 years, and then chief justice for three years.

Waves Olive Branch to France In Address at Saarbrücken at Week-End

SAARBRUCKEN, March 6:—President Adolf Hitler has been visiting the Saar Valley for the first time since the recent plebiscite in which it was decided to return to Germany and was given a wildly enthusiastic reception.

In an address, Hitler appealed to Europe, and especially France, to co-operate with Germany in a program of "peace, friendship and understanding."

LEPERS ARE MASSACRED

Chinese Fishermen Killed Twenty Four Sufferers and Then Burn Lazaretto

HONG KONG, March 6:—Reports have reached here that a lazaretto on an island between here and Canton has been burned by fishermen after they had massacred 24 lepers who were isolated there.

TWO PERCENT TAX

The announcement a couple of days ago that the education, finance and administration commission had reported in favor of the collection of a two percent income tax from all people with incomes over \$50 a month came as a bolt from the blue and made many Prince Rupert people wonder whether they really could carry on if their taxes were to be again increased.

Evidently the tax is intended to replace the present one percent tax collected by employers from their employees on behalf of the government. It is recommended that until the whole system is changed an extra one percent be collected on the present basis.

The tax has not yet been adopted by the legislature and until they deal with it no one can say what modifications may be made in the recommendation. It may not even be dealt with this year.

The commission which proposes this very important change in the taxation system is representative of all parties in the legislature. Of the members of the legislature on the committee Mrs. Paul Smith is a Liberal, Herbert Anson is a Conservative and Rev. Robert Connell is the leader of the C. C. F. Of the other members Professor Angus of the University of B. C. is a teacher, Mayor David Leeming of Victoria is a businessman, R. F. Blandy, city clerk of Oak Bay, is an accountant, and J. P. Carr of Matsqui, represents the provincial board of school trustees. Harry Charlesworth, the chairman, is secretary of the Teachers' Federation. The commission is a representative one although the business interest is rather overshadowed by the professional.

The public are assured by the commission that it is not the proposal to increase the taxes by two percent but to change the method of collection by making the income tax the chief basis. Other taxes would be adjusted as a result.

As the budget of the minister of finance has already been introduced and as it makes no reference to an additional income tax, it hardly seems likely that the suggested new plan will be adopted this year if ever. In fact Premier Pattullo recently assured the public that there would be no additional taxes this year.

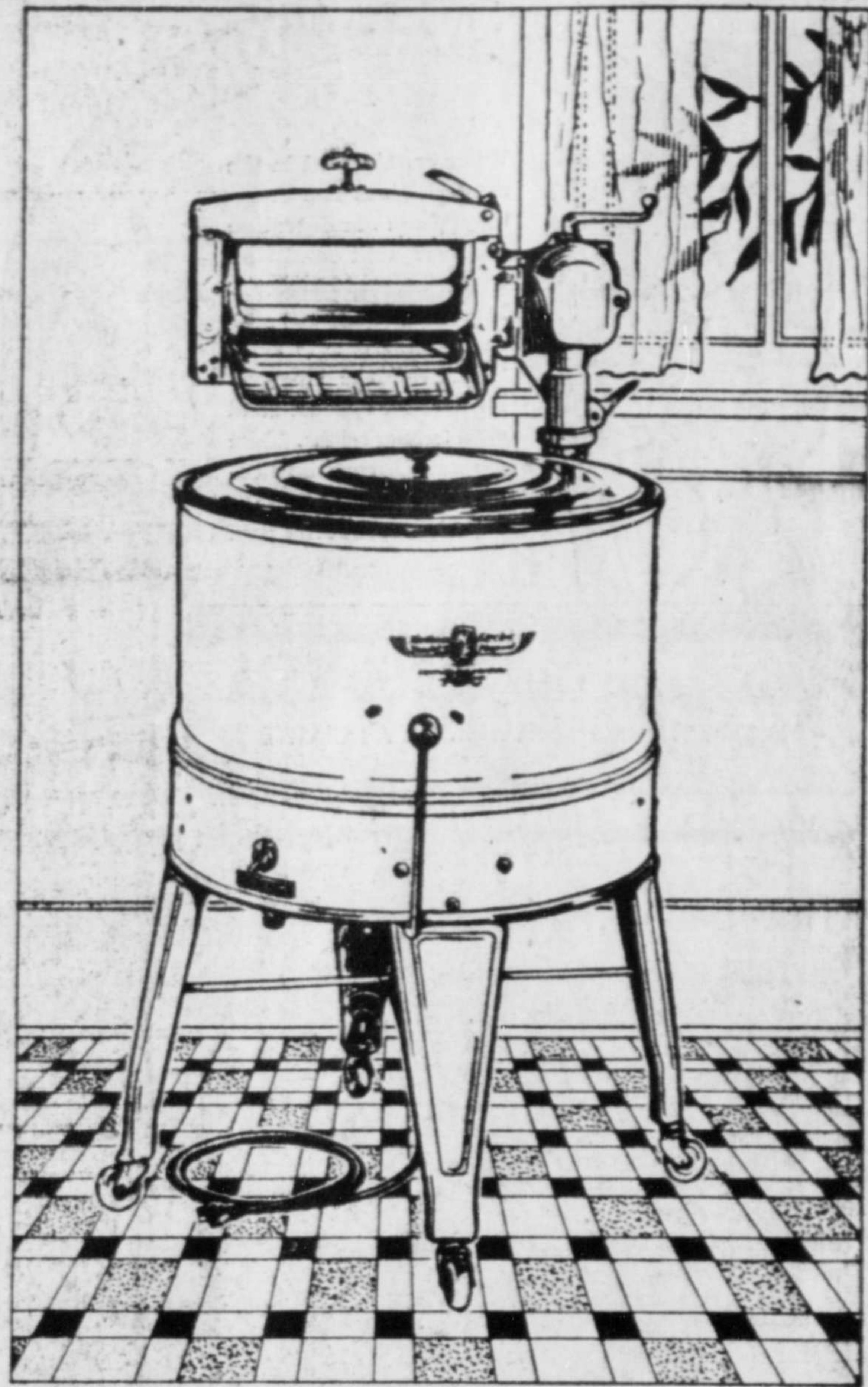

dissent was Mr. Lavergne. In 1908 Mr. Lavergne resigned and betook himself to the provincial field and for the next four years he sat in the Quebec Legislature. During the Great War he found himself farther out of sympathy with his former chief, Mr. Bourassa, by his support of Sir Robert Borden's policy in sending troops to France.

Himself a lieutenant-colonel of the Canadian Militia, Mr. Lavergne was prevented by his health from accompanying the Canadian forces.

He was a strong advocate of cadet training. The youth of Canada, he said, should be taught that this country was well worth dying for. In the "khaki election" of 1917, however, Mr. Lavergne was opposed to conscription. He made another essay to reach the House of Commons, but was defeated, a fate which overtook him again in 1921, 1925 and 1926. His perseverance was rewarded in 1930, however, when the riding of Montmagny returned him to parliament; and his party recognizing his long endeavors on its behalf by appointing him Deputy Speaker of the House. In that position Mr. Lavergne was unhappy until the definite point was settled as to his right to address the chamber on the same basis as other members. It was ruled that since the deputy speaker might, in his capacity as a member, be attacked by another member, he ought to enjoy the right to reply. This affirmative decision satisfied him. He had declared in the house that if this right was to be denied him, he would renounce the deputy-speakership.

Armand Lavergne was born at Arthabaska, Que., in 1880, the son of Hon. Joseph Lavergne and Louise Emile Barthe. He was educated at the college of the Sacred Heart, Arthabaska, at the Quebec Seminary, Ottawa College and Laval University, Quebec. In 1904 he married Georgette, daughter of the Hon. L. P. Roy, of Montreal. By profession a barrister and a journalist, he was also director of La Renaudiere de Montmagny.

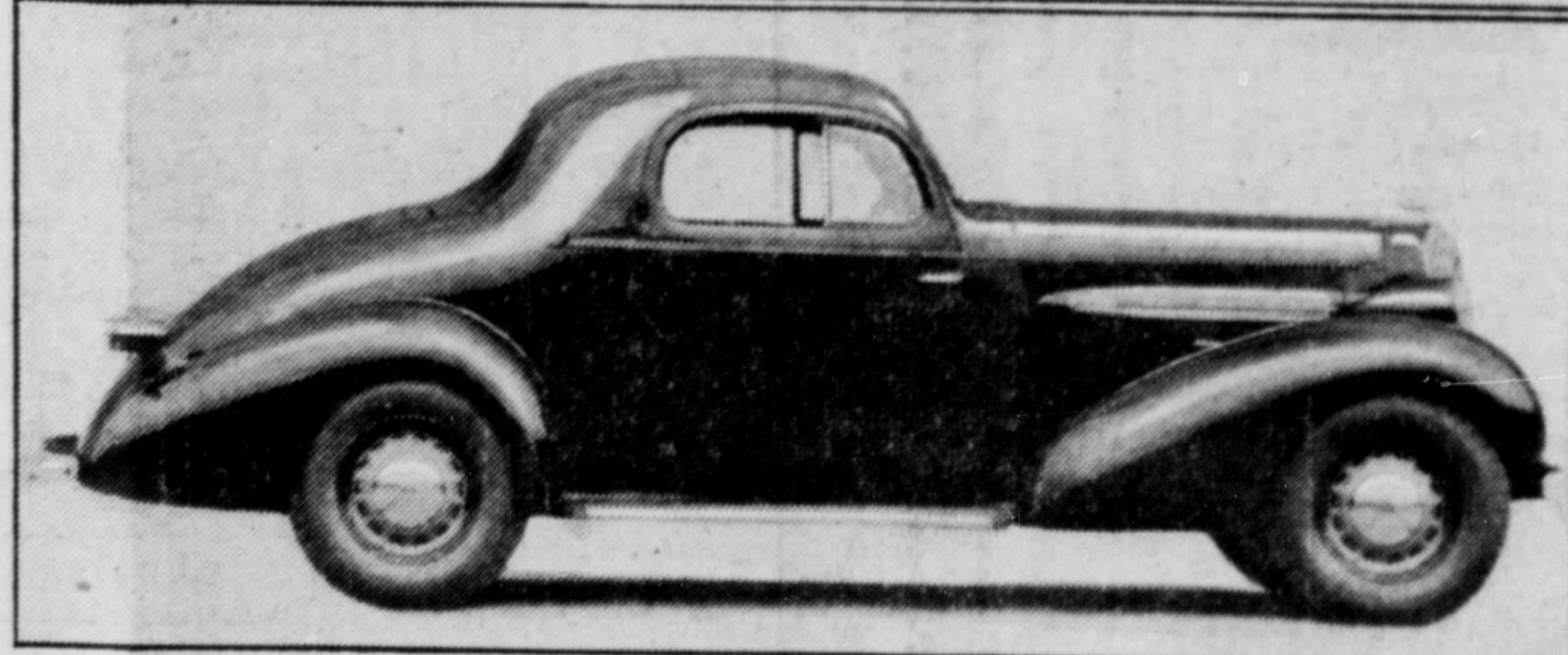
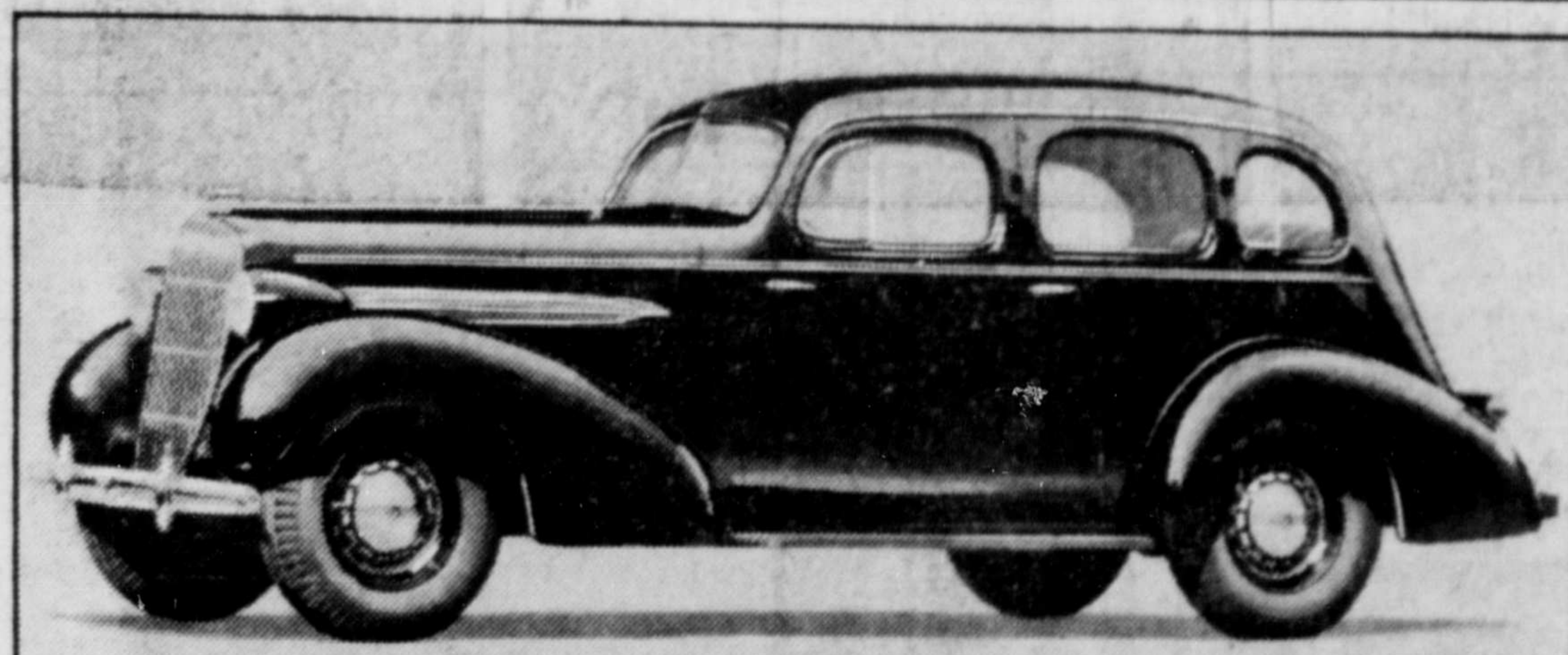
