WHEAT PRICES ARE SOARING AGAIN

BROOKLYN DODGERS BALL PLAYER DIES IN PLANE FIGHT

Grain Market Moves Up Limit of Three Cents in 'Peg Today

Heavy Export Demand, Soaring Quotations Abroad Whips Speculative Enthusiasm to Fever Heat And Continuation of Strength For Time Anticipated

WINNIPEG, Sept. 17: (CP)—Bullish enthusiasm swept wheat quotations up the limit of three cents today, October deliveries selling at 93½c. Heavy export demand and soaring quotations at Liverpool, Chicago, Buenos Aires and Minneapolis whipped speculative enthusiasm to fever heat. The strength is expected to continue.

EXPORTS HEAVIER

Large Increase in Outward Movement of Canada's Products

OTTAWA, Sept. 17: (CP)—Canada's exports in August increased by \$15,000,000 over August 1934 and exports for the five months ended August 31 are almost \$20,000,000 greater than for the same period last year.

Commutation Of Death Sentence

Mrs. Nellie Madison of California Is Spared From Execution by gubernatorial Order

SACRAMENTO, Cal., September 17.—Governor Merriam yesterday ordered the commutation to life imprisonment of the death sentence which had been imposed upon Mrs. Nellie Madison, convicted murderess. She has been gradually falling as the prospect of death loomed but is not being informed of the commutation until it has been officially signed.

Some Ridings To Have Nominations On September 30

OTTAWA, Sept. 17: (CP)—Advance nominations will take place on September 30 in 76 constituencies including Skeena and Cariboo. In the most of constituencies the nominations will close a week later.

COMMUNIST PLOT IN BULGARIA REVEALED

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 17:—Bulgarian authorities announce the arrest and imprisonment of leaders of a Macedonian communist organization following a raid in which, it is said, documents were seized disclosing a plot to overthrow the government of Bulgaria and establish this nation as a part of Soviet Russia.

OPPOSING OF ITALY

Members of League of Nations Unanimously Against Il Duce's Campaign

Forces Massing

Naval Preparations in Mediterranean Are Continuing Apace

GENEVA, September 18 (Canadian Press)—Marked throughout by repeated expressions of fidelity to the Covenant of the League of Nations, the League Assembly's general debate concluded yesterday afternoon. Delegate after delegate declared readiness of his country to stand by obligations of the covenant but none defended Italy's political demands on Ethiopia nor supported Italy's threat to enforce these demands by military conquest.

Immediately war should break out between Italy and Ethiopia the full force of League sanctions and penalties upon the aggressor would go into force, involving probably a complete naval blockade of the Mediterranean and possibly military action. Tomorrow the five-power commission investigating the Italo-Ethiopian dispute will present its report, probably blaming Italy as the aggressor.

British Fleet Moves East

LONDON, September 17 (Canadian Press)—While government officials were marking time pending further developments in the Italo-Ethiopian dispute at Geneva, naval preparations in the Mediterranean were continuing apace. It was disclosed today that the large battle cruisers Hood and Renown of the home fleet, accompanied by three other cruisers and four destroyers, had reached Gibraltar after a fast voyage from Portland under secret orders.

Fifty thousand troops, accompanied by hundreds of tanks, cavalry and squadrons of airplanes, were manoeuvring in Hampshire and adjoining counties in the largest mobilization scheme in years. Meantime, Italy continues to pour troops into East Africa, more than fifteen thousand departing since Sunday.

Declares Memel Was Stolen From Germany and League Ratified It

'Hands Off' Policy

Hitler Declares Germany Not Interested in Italo-Ethiopian Dispute

NURNBERG, Germany, Sept. 17: (CP)—Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler speaking at a special session of the Reichstag declared that Memel had been stolen from Germany and that the League of Nations had legalized the theft. He launched a bitter attack upon the League.

The Reichsfuehrer claimed that many Germans were being unlawfully disfranchised in an election which is to be held at Memel on September 29. He issued a blunt warning that the Memel issue will cause trouble unless League powers revise their attitude and protect the rights of the minority.

Speaking of international affairs in view of the present European situation, Hitler reiterated Germany's "unshakeable love for peace" and declared amid cheers that Germany did not intend to concern herself in matters that were none of her business. The policy of this country as far as the Italo-Ethiopian dispute was concerned would be one of hands off and he did not intend to have anything to do with this dispute. Germany had no intention of provoking a conflict with Russia.

Jews will be permitted to continue as German subjects but will not be permitted to become German citizens, intermarry with Aryans, have intimate relations with Gentiles nor even employ Aryan servant girls under forty-five years of age, the Reichstag decreed.

May Take Action

GENEVA, Sept. 17:—The powerful demand of Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler for the return to Germany of the port of Memel is taken here to indicate that an attempt may be made by Germany by forcible means if necessary to repossess itself of that port while the rest of Europe is occupied with the Italo-Ethiopian dispute.

Fine New Homes For Matanuska Valley People

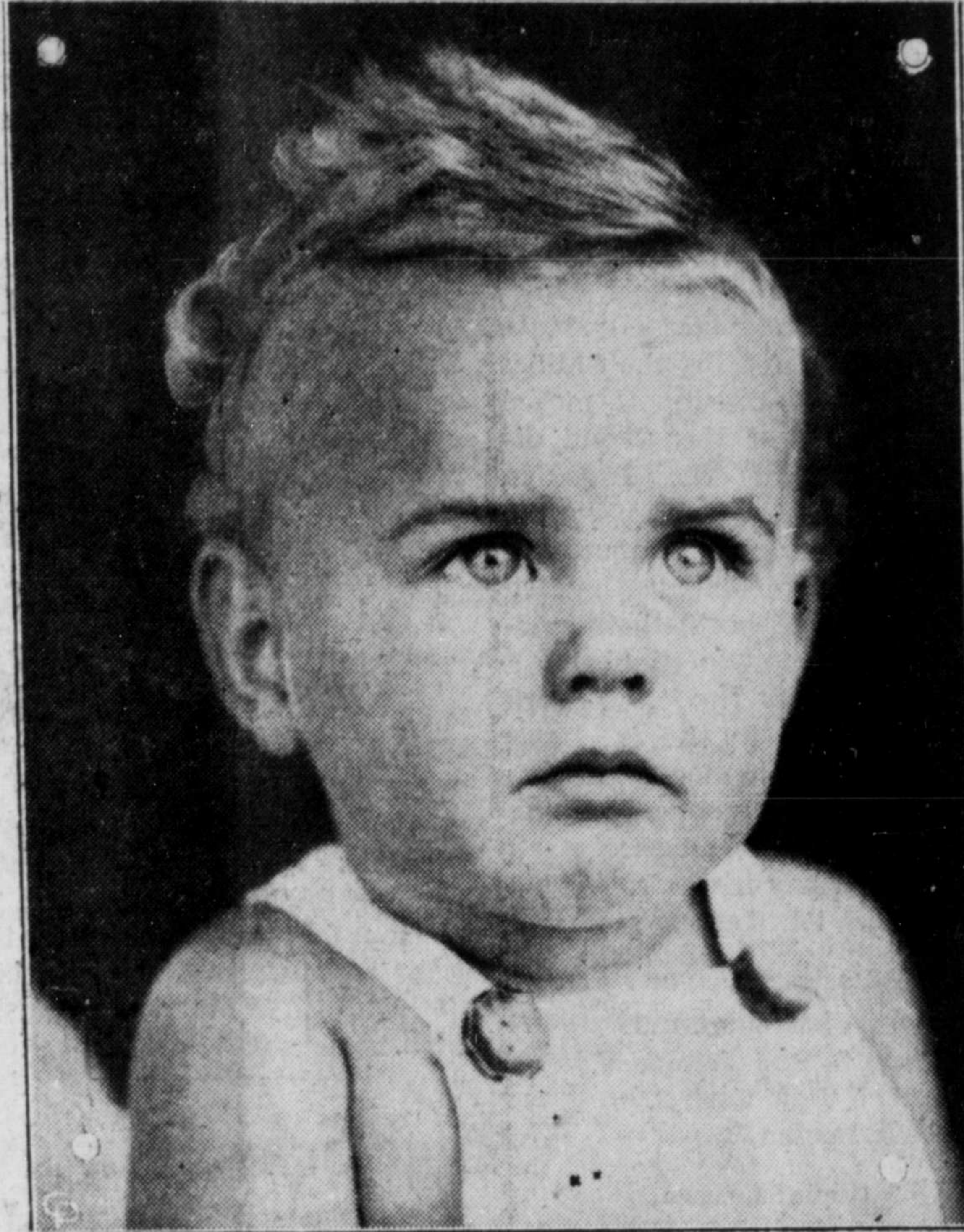

B. King of Vancouver on school finance.

BOUGHT CITY FOR \$1000; SAM BENN, CENTENARIAN OF ABERDEEN, PASSES

ABERDEEN, Wash., Sept. 17: (CP)—Samuel Benn, who celebrated his one hundredth and third birthday on July 2 last, died here last night. Coming to the coast in 1859, he purchased the site of the present city of Aberdeen for less than \$1000 and gave much of it away to attract settlers and industries. Mr. Benn's parents emigrated to New York from Ireland.

KILLED IN CAR CRASH

Two Men Lose Lives on Merritt-Spence's Bridge Road and Six Others Are Injured

MERRITT, Sept. 17: (CP)—J. McMichael, aged 56, and William Lewis, 50, died this morning as a result of injuries sustained late last night when a truck in which eight men were returning to Spence's Bridge from Merritt overturned on a sharp curve north of here. The six other men are in hospital suffering from shock and bruises.

All were residents of Spence's Bridge and had come to Merritt to attend the funeral of a friend.

Heavy Electrical Storm in Toronto

One of Worst Tempests of Year Cracked Down on Ontario Metropolis at Week-End

TORONTO, Sept. 17:—One of the worst thunder storms of the year cracked down on this city and vicinity at the week-end, leaving a trail of blown down trees, drenched streets and flooded cellars in its wake.

Fielder Len Koenecke Started Rough House In Air and Is Slain

Dramatic Battle as Machine Careened Wildly Over Toronto—Pilot, Struggling to Control Ship, Uses Extinguisher With Fatal Results

TORONTO, Sept. 17: (CP)—Leonard Koenecke, outfielder of the Brooklyn Dodgers, was killed early today in a mad, bloody, struggle with the two-man crew of a cabin plane that roared dizzily through the darkness high over Toronto suburbs. Hanging to the controls with one hand, Pilot William J. Mulqueeny cracked Koenecke over the head with a fire extinguisher and dazedly brought the plane to a forced landing on Long Branch race track. Police arrested Mulqueeny and his assistant, Irwin Davis, charging manslaughter. The ball player had been released for the balance of the season and was on his way from St. Louis, where his team is now playing, to New York. He had chartered Mulqueeny's machine in Detroit for a trip to Buffalo.

Mulqueeny declared that in the middle of the trip Koenecke "became restless, grabbing at the controls." He was ordered into the rear seat and immediately began a rough and tumble fight with Davis, both men rolling about and threatening the stability of the machine. Koenecke attacked Mulqueeny who struck him with the extinguisher. The pilot says he did not intend to kill the ball player but merely to stun him.

Kingsford-Smith Crosses Continent

Famous Australian Flier in New Mexico With His New Plane

ALBUQUERQUE, New Mexico, Sept. 17:—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, noted Australian flier, paused here after arriving from Burbank, Cal., on the first leg of a leisurely transcontinental flight to New York from which port Sir Charles will ship his new plane to England whence he plans on attempting a record-breaking non-stop flight to Australia.

Ketchikan Garage Worker is Injured

Bud Luth Sustains Cuts and Bruises in Explosion Friday Afternoon

KETCHIKAN, Sept. 17:—Bud Luth, an employee of the Ketchikan Garage, sustained cuts and bruises, necessitating stitches being put in, as a result of an explosion while he was working in the garage at the week-end. The blast rattled windows in that section of the town. Luth was welding an oil drum an accumulation of gas in which is believed to have become ignited.

MORE ARE NOMINATED

T. Todrick Conservative Choice in Vancouver East—Savage Enters Lists for Stevens

VANCOUVER, September 17 (Canadian Press)—T. Todrick was nominated at the week-end as Conservative candidate for Vancouver East in the forthcoming federal election. He opposes Dr. J. L. McDougall, Liberal; Angus MacInnis, C.C.F., and Ald. H. D. Wilson, Reconstructionist. C. M. Borton makes a fifth candidate in the field.

In North Vancouver William Savage, a member of the Tolmie provincial government in its dying days, was nominated Reconstructionist Party candidate to oppose A. E. Munn, Liberal, and C. Grant McNeill, C.C.F., no government candidate having yet been nominated in that seat.

Former Lieutenant Governor R. Randolph Bruce was formally nominated Liberal candidate for Kootenay East opposing Hon. H. H. Stevens, leader of the Reconstructionist party, and B. C. Iverson, C.C.F.

In Comox-Alberni E. R. Tarling was nominated at the week-end as Reconstructionist candidate, opposing Reece H. Hague, Conservative; Alex McNeil, Liberal; Colin Cameron, C.C.F., and A. W. Neill, Independent.

BAD FEATURE OF ELECTION

One of the bad features of the present election campaign is the tendency in some places to interrupt the speakers and not allow them to explain the policies which they are trying to place before the electors. It is usually a sign of weakness when such tactics are found necessary.

In Vancouver Premier Hepburn of Ontario came out to give his views of the federal situation. A few people who object to any policy except their own that seems likely to prove successful interrupted to such an extent that many who went to hear Mr. Hepburn were unable to do so. Happily they were able to read a good report of his speech in the newspapers next day.

Mr. Hepburn is reputed to be one of the best and most colorful political speakers in the Dominion and it is regrettable that he could not come to Prince Rupert where we feel sure he would have been given a good hearing. Prince Rupert audiences have not been guilty of the bad taste of jeering a visitor, no matter on what errand he may have come. They usually listen carefully to all speakers and express appreciation or otherwise at the close. It is a sign of intelligence.

SOCIAL CREDIT SPREADING

Social Credit seems to be spreading. British Columbia supporters of the scheme plan to put candidates in the field in this province but we do not know whether Skeena is to be included. It also seems unlikely that the Stevens party will have a candidate here so the issues will not be as much confused as otherwise might have been the case. With only a month to go there is scarcely time for a new candidate now to cover the riding, however active he may be.

So far as can be seen today it is to be a straight three-cornered contest.

CUBS BEAT NEW YORK

Giants Fall Back in Pennant Race As Chicago and St. Louis Cardinals Win

CHICAGO, Sept. 17: (CP)—With two games still dividing them, Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals drew away from the New York Giants in the National League pennant race yesterday. The Cubs easily took a series opener from the Giants here while the Cardinals were winning a pitchers' battle from the Brooklyn Dodgers at St. Louis. It was Paul Dean's nineteenth victory of the season which, with 26 for his brother Jerome, made the 46 promised by "Dizzy."

The Giants are now four and a half games behind the leading Cubs and two and a half games below the second place Cardinals. The Reds, by defeating the Phillies in 11 innings at Cincinnati, moved into leadership of the second division ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

In the American League, the Detroit Tigers defeated the Red Sox at Boston to boost their margin of leadership to nine and a half games over the New York Yankees who lost to the St. Louis Browns whose manager, Rogers Hornsby, it was announced during the day had received another year's contract with pay increase. EUCHARIST CONGRESS

Historic Chalice Will be Used At Gathering of U. C. Catholics in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 17: (AP)—Most Rev. Amleto G. Cicognani, apostolic delegate, will use an ornamented golden chalice, rich in artistry and religious import, in a midnight mass at the seventh national Eucharistic congress here September 23-26.

It is the chalice with which Francis de Sales (1567-1622), bishop of Geneva, celebrated the sacrifice of the mass. The sacred vessel is embossed with cherubic heads and ecclesiastical symbols. Mademoiselle Pance, first of the sisterhood known as the Ladies of the Sacred Heart to migrate to Cleveland from her native France, brought the chalice to America many years ago. It is the property of the order.

Monsignor Diego Venini, private secretary to Pope Pius XI, will bring another precious chalice to the congress, a personal gift from the pope, which will be used by members of the hierarchy at solemn pontifical masses during the three-day gathering.

Impressive Settings
The settings for the pageantry, mysticism and symbolism of Catholic ceremony will be the city's public hall and the adjoining underground exhibition hall, with a total seating capacity of nearly 30,000 together with the Lakeside stadium, with a capacity of approximately 100,000.

Hundreds of thousands are expected to participate: prelates, monsignori, missionaries, nuns and brothers, laity from every diocese in the nation—pilgrims all before the Eucharistic monstrosity enthroning the leaven wafer "now bread no longer."

One hundred and twenty altars—one for each of the dioceses under the United States flag—are under construction. These will tell chronologically the American story of Catholicity from the founding of the first diocese at San Juan, Puerto Rico, in 1511. Clergy from the respective dioceses will celebrate mass on each altar.

NEW YORK, September 17 — There was again accelerated trading on the New York Stock Exchange. Profit-taking, however, caused irregular prices and the trend was downward. MOONEY IS CONFIDENT

Famous Convict Leaves San Quentin For San Francisco to Appear in Appeal Proceedings

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Sept. 17:—Confident that he will shortly be released, America's most famous convict, Tom Mooney, was taken under heavy guard yesterday from San Quentin Penitentiary to San Francisco where habeas corpus proceedings on his behalf will commence today in State Supreme Court. Mooney will appear in person before the court, probably taking the stand in his own defense.

During the proceedings, which may take from two weeks to a month, Mooney will be lodged in the county jail in San Francisco within three blocks of Market and Stewart Streets, the scene of the killings in the Preparedness Day parade on July 22, 1916, as a result of which Mooney was convicted and sentenced to be hanged, the sentence being later commuted to life imprisonment. He has always protested his innocence but, despite numerous attempts through the courts, has never been able to secure his liberty.

This will be the first occasion on which a state court has considered Mooney's guilt or innocence in connection with the incident when six persons were killed and four others fatally injured as a result of the explosion of a time bomb.

Trying to Head Off Coal Strike

President Roosevelt Asks For 15-Day Extension of Present Wage Agreements

NEW YORK, Sept. 17:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt is appealing for a 15-day extension of present wage contracts to provide further time for negotiations with a view to averting a general coal mine strike affecting 460,000 miners. The deadline for the commencement of the strike is imminent. Four previous attempts of settlement have failed and negotiations are still deadlocked. The employers have agreed to the extension of the wage agreements but will not agree to grant the demands of the miners.

Big Psychiatric Hospital Planned

Institution Costing \$2,500,000 to Be Erected in Bellingham—Site And Plans Approved

BELLINGHAM, Sept. 17:—A new \$2,500,000 psychiatric hospital for Bellingham is assured. Site and plans have been approved by the federal government. It will handle patients from Alaska and the northwestern states.

GETAWAY IS CLEAN

Three Weeks Elapse Since Killing At Colleymount and Still No Trace of Slayer

Three weeks had elapsed up to last evening since John Lake, Finnish farmer of Colleymount in the Francois Lake district, fatally shot Emil Perle, a fellow countryman, and, despite intensive search of the entire neighborhood, no trace has been found of the killer. As far as the authorities can ascertain, Lake has not been seen since the shooting soon after which he made his getaway in the bush where the firing of a gun was heard about half an hour later, leading to the belief at first that he might have taken his own life. However, nothing has been seen of Lake dead or alive and the ground within a radius of two or three miles has been so thoroughly covered that it is hardly believed possible the body could have been there and escaped detection.

Those who know the country think a man would have had a rather difficult time getting to the line of the Canadian National Railways some thirty miles north if he headed direct through the bush. There is the possibility, of course, that Lake might have been able to make his getaway to the railway line over the main highway before the hue and cry over the killing was raised a day or so later in which event he might have slipped completely out of the district. He had little or no money when he left Colleymount in rough working clothes carrying his gun which, incidentally, is known to have been defective.

Inspector John A. Fraser, provincial police, who returned to the city Saturday night from Francois Lake, announces that search patrols in the immediate neighborhood of Colleymount have now been withdrawn.

She will go back on the Queen Charlotte Islands run, sailing from here a week from Saturday night.

Funeral rites were simple but impressive. Widow and three children of Long were present but none wore mourning and all were composed. Governor O. K. Allen and five other friends acted as pallbearers.

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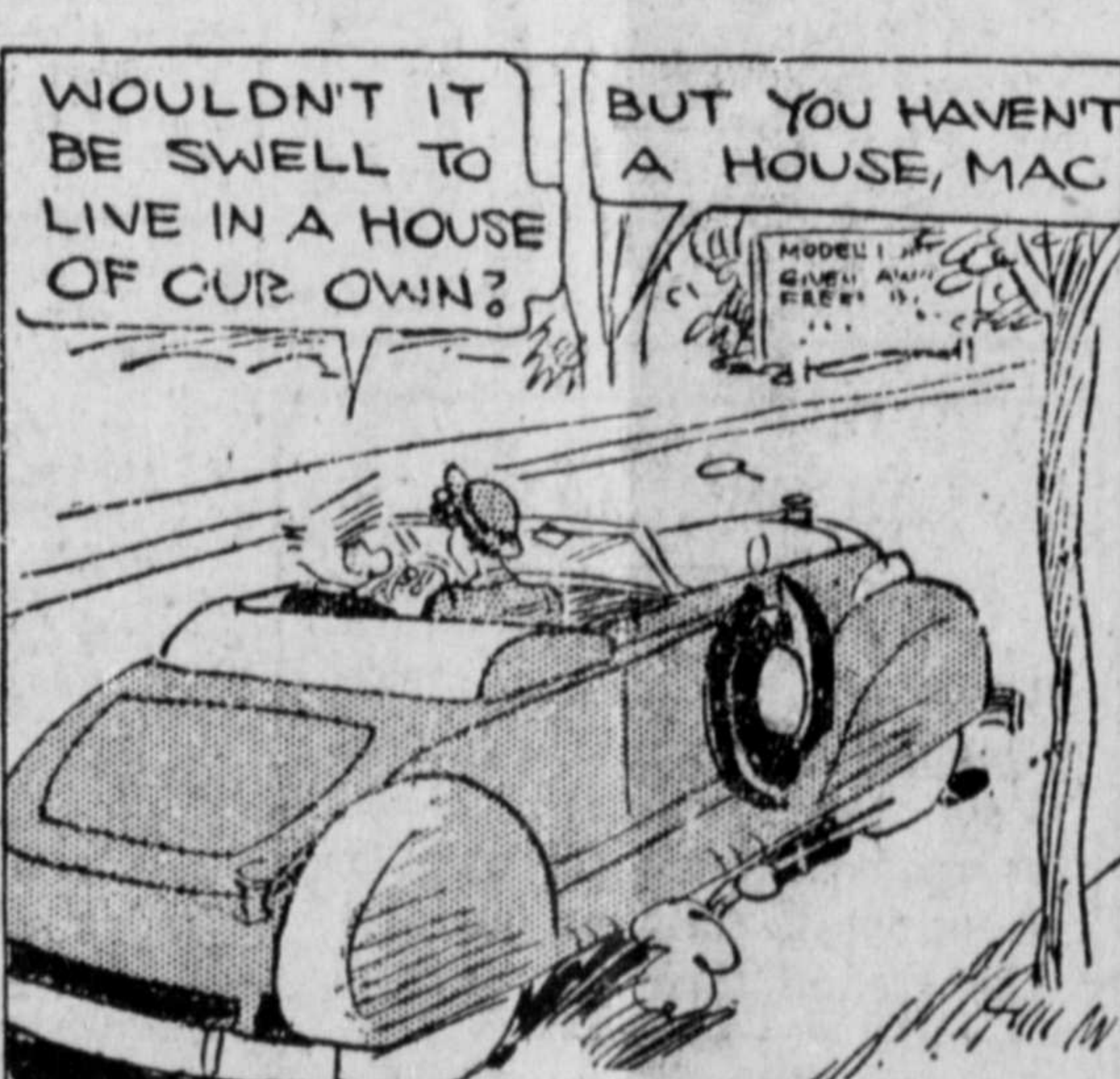
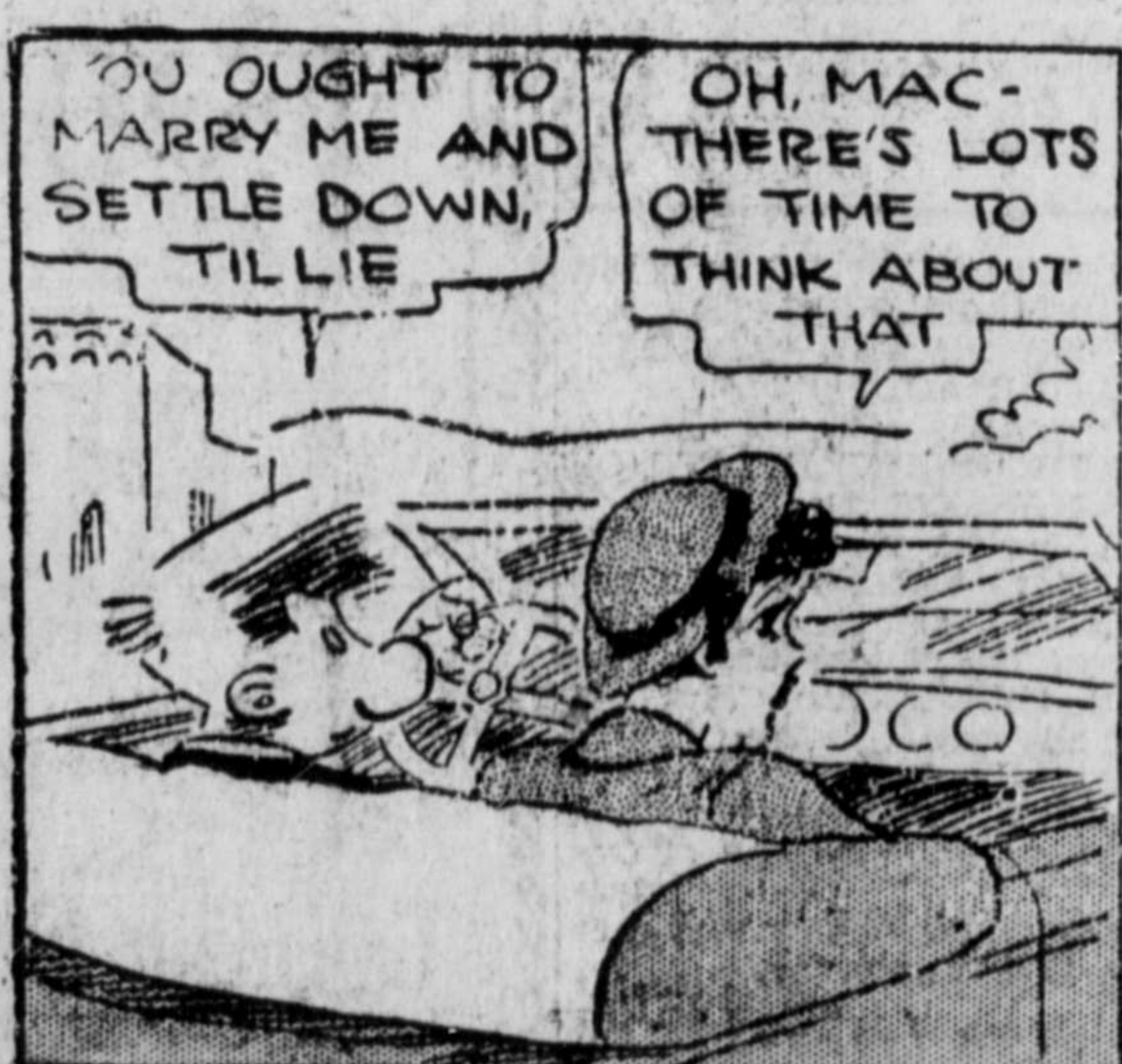
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
