# NINA SPALDING SENT UP FOR TRIAL VANCOUVER ISLAND PEOPLE FORCED TO FLY BEFORE FLOOD

## Tragic Note Written Prior to Killing in Essington Graveyard

Incidents Leading Up to Slaying of Child at Skeena River Village Last Fall Related by Relatives of Accused At Preliminary Trial

"Well, Eddie Feak, I hope you and Lucy will be satisfied after you hear my story. I wish you good luck with all the girls in town cause I will be out of your sight. I am sick and tired of this world as you me see me down in the graveyard tonight beside my poor mother, Maggie. So good bye forever."  
"NINA."

So read a letter addressed to Edward Feak, uncle of accused, allegedly written by Nina Spalding, nineteen-year old Port Essington Indian girl, before she left the home of her sister, Mrs. Lucy Bennett, with whom she stayed, for the graveyard in Port Essington where she is alleged last fall to have slain her nine-month old infant son with a butcher knife, then turning the weapon upon herself.

The letter was tendered as an exhibit at the preliminary trial yesterday at which the girl was committed by Stipendiary Magistrate Andrew Thompson to stand trial at the Supreme Court Assizes here in May on a charge of murder. She will be taken here from Okalla where she will be kept pending the Assizes.

**Relatives Testify**  
Witnesses told of Nina leaving the house of her sister, Mrs. Lucy Bennett, where she had been staying, taking the baby with her. This was about 11 a.m. Between 12 and 1 she rushed up in an excited condition to the house of Mrs. Dorcas Heavener, saying that she had "finished the baby" and asking Mrs. Heavener to get her (accused's) mother, Mrs. Sarah Spalding. On the arrival of the mother, accused said that she had killed the baby and was dying herself. Relatives then went to the graveyard and picked up the body. The butcher knife, alleged to have been used by Nina in slaying the baby and stabbing herself in the abdomen, was picked up by Johnny Spalding and given to Mrs. Rebecca Innes who turned it over to the police, Mrs. Lucy Bennett and her son, Ambrose, testified to having seen and heard accused sharpening the butcher knife. Before leaving the house that morning for the graveyard, accused left a letter addressed to her uncle, Edward Feak, in which she intimated she was going to the graveyard.

Other witnesses were Andrew Spalding, father of accused; David Spalding, uncle, Dr. C. H. Hankinson, Corp. Robert Gibson and Constable Harold Raybone.

Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill conducted the examination of witnesses. R. L. McLennan was defence counsel and W. E. Collison appeared at the trial for the Indian Department, also acting as interpreter.

The accused appears to be completely indifferent to the seriousness of her position. She laughs and talks in her cell at the city police station and at the trial displayed characteristic stolidity. She is partially crippled.

## TELLS OF VISIT TO HONOLULU

Dr. W. T. Kergin Describes Attractions of Waikiki Beach and Other Features of Pacific Islands

An account of his recent visit to Honolulu was given by Dr. W. T. Kergin at the luncheon meeting of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday afternoon. It proved extremely interesting, being quite different in many respects from the addresses of former visitors to the Islands.

Approaching the harbor, Diamond Head, the strongly fortified point which commands the entrance to Honolulu, was very conspicuous, the Doctor remarked. It was said to be more strongly fortified than the Rock of Gibraltar.

Honolulu was described as an Oriental city, half of the inhabitants being Japanese with Koreans, Filipinos and native Hawaiians also in evidence and a few European nationalities. Pure natives would be not more than thirteen or fourteen thousand with about twice as many half-breeds. The Japanese did not inter-marry.

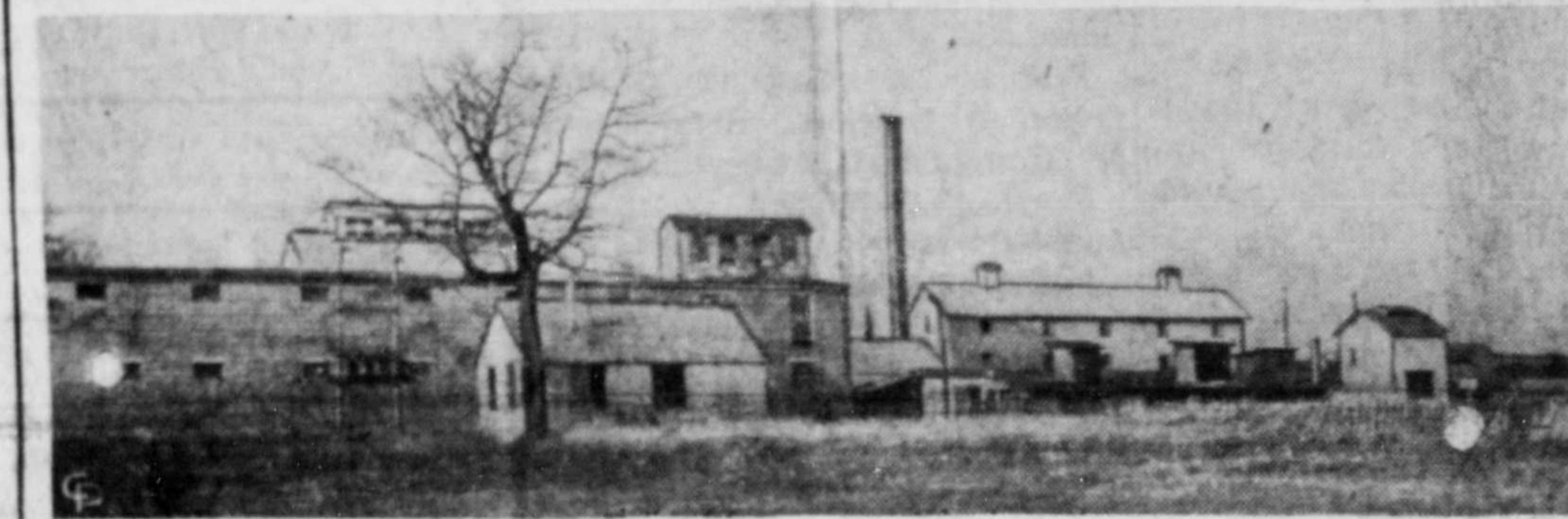
Of course the narrator could not miss Waikiki (accent on the last syllable) Beach. It was comparatively small but varied little in temperature the year round and the water was almost as warm as the air. Bathing was very enjoyable in the winter. It was protected by a barrier reef which prevented sharks coming in and also did away with the danger of the undertow which made bathing on the other beaches dangerous. Even in calm weather there was always a surf, the riding of which was the great sport of the Islands.

The Doctor told of fishing for octopus, a fish which was considered a great delicacy on the Islands, selling at as high as 40 cents a pound. Fishermen made as high as \$10 a day.

Although the Hawaiian Islands contained only 6,000 square miles they produced \$100,000,000 a year in the production of sugar, pineapples and other fruits. The almost total absence of truck gardens was noticeable. The sugar plantations were large and whole villages of several thousand people were located on some of them.

At the conclusion, President J. J. Little thanked Dr. Kergin for his address which was much appreciated.

## Canada's Radium Laboratory Now in Full Swing



First photos ever taken of work inside Canadian radium laboratory at Port Hope, Ontario, where radium is derived by chemical process in about 3 months from pitch-blende brought to the plant from Great Bear Lake, on the Arctic Circle, 3,000 miles from the laboratory. The laboratory, machinery and ware house buildings are also shown. Recently Canadian-produced radium made its first "sale" to an American hospital.

## RACE IS CLOSER

Toronto Maple Leafs Beaten and Montreal Maroons Win in Hockey Play

TORONTO, Feb. 1: (CP)—The gap between the Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Maroons for leadership of the International Division of the National Hockey League was further narrowed last night as the Leafs lost a close game here to the New York Rangers while the Maroons were blanking the Americans at New York. Five and a half games now separate the two clubs.

The victory of the Rangers landed them into exclusive possession of third place in the American Division ahead of the Detroit Red Wings who are in the cellar after playing a draw with the Canadiens at Detroit.

The Canadiens, by virtue of their win, are now in third place exclusively in the International Division, the Americans being relegated to fourth.

## CANADA PROTESTING IN STRONG TERMS AT RUSSIAN TIMBER DEAL

OTTAWA, Feb. 1: (CP)—Representations have been made to the British government in the strongest possible terms against negotiation of a contract between British timber importers and Russian producers which would be prejudicial to the terms of the Canada-United Kingdom agreement of 1932. Prime Minister R. B. Bennett stated in the House of Commons yesterday.

## GRAIN SHIP HERE

Here to load a full cargo of grain for United Kingdom or Continent, the British steamer Langleecrag Capt. Percy Carling, with Captain Gunns and Lewis aboard as pilots, arrived at 7 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and is starting to load this afternoon with the expectation of leaving Monday. The Langleecrag came up the Inside Passage as far as Pine Island and then went outside the Queen Charlotte Islands.

## GETS TWO AND HALF YEARS

Robert March was sentenced to two and a half years' imprisonment on each of four counts of burglary by Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court today. He pleaded guilty.

## MODIFYING OF PACTS

Changes to be Made in Imperial Trade Agreements if Liberals Get Into Power, Says Mackenzie King

OTTAWA, Feb. 1: (CP)—Modifications will be made in the Ottawa Imperial Conference trade agreements if the Liberals are returned to office next election, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition, said in the House of Commons last night. He denied that he had ever promised to cancel them but promised to remove certain features. Efforts would be made to delete higher tariff features and remove impediments to trade.
