

Record Before War

Admiral Jellicoe already had a fine naval record to his credit when the Great War broke out. The son of Captain John Henry Jellicoe of Northfield, Isle of Wight, later Commodore of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, John Rushworth Jelliege was born December 5, 1859. He was educated at Rottingdean and entered the Royal Navy in 1872. Before he was 23 years of age he saw war service; in the Egyptian War in 1882. When he was promoted lieutenant in 1880] he took no fewer than three firstclass certificates and as a lieutenant laid the foundations for the special knowledge of gunnery which proved so useful to him at later stage.

In 1893 Jelliege was promoted Commander. He became captain in 1897 and as chief-of-staff on the flagship of Sir E. H. Seymour on the China station took part in the expedition to relieve the Peking legations during the Boxer uprising of 1900. He went to the Admiralty and for two years was naval assistant to the comptroller, later becoming director of naval ordinance. In 1907 he was promoted Rear-Admiral and hoisted his flag in the "Albemarle" of the Atlantic Fleet. He returned to the Admiralty as Third Sea Lord in 1998. In 1910 hel received the appointment of Vice-Admiral (acting), commanding the Atlantic Fleet and in 1911 was commander of the second division of the Home Fleets. 




