Did Jellicoe Do Right Thing At Jutland, Was He Justified In Foregoing Possible Victory?



LORD JELICOE

Admiral of the Fleet, Earl Jellicoe, who died yesterday, was the central figure of one of the greatest controversies of all time, namely, whether or not he was justified in refusing to close with the enemy under a fading sky in the Battle of Jutland, preferring the safety of his great fleet to the undetermined risk of complete victory. Naval experts are to be found on either side. But undoubtedly on May 31, 1916, a tremendous responsibility was thrust upon the Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Fleet when he went out to meet the German High Sea Fleet for the one great battle of the Great War, for Jellicoe was the only man who single-handedly could have lost the war for the Allies on that day.

Aged Woman Passes Away

Mrs. Salina Andrew, Mother of Mrs. P. T. Cousins, Borden Street, Died Today

The death occurred at 9:30 this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. P. T. Cousins, after a lingering illness, of Mrs. Salina Andrew at the age of 85 years. Mrs. Andrew, who was born in Ontario of Irish extraction, had lived in Prince Rupert for nine years, coming here from Saskatchewan. She was highly esteemed among all those with whom she came in contact and her passing will be regretted by friends who will extend sympathy to the daughter. In addition to the daughter here, there are five sons, four of whom reside in Saskatchewan.

After the war Jellicoe played an outstanding part in Imperial affairs. He spent a successful term as Governor-General of New Zealand, 1920-24, earning the sincere affection of the citizens of that southern dominion. Then he succeeded the late Earl Haig as president of the British Empire Service League, the organization of ex-servicemen built up after the war and successfully strengthened by Haig and Jellicoe. In the latter post Jellicoe added the wholesale respect and affection of the Empire's soldiers to the admiration of the Navy's men that he had held for so many years. Jellicoe was never a talker. His method was action, backed by a well-considered plan. Although he was called "Hellfire Jack" among

DAVISON IS RE-ELECTED

Social Credit Party Fails to Win Control of Calgary in Civic Election

CALGARY, Nov. 21.—(CP)—Mayor Andrew Davison was re-elected for his fourth consecutive term as chief magistrate in yesterday's civic election, polling 14,390 votes to 11,539 for W. H. Herbert, Social Credit candidate, in a four-cornered contest. The poll was the largest ever recorded in the history of the city. Mayor Davison has already been in office for six years.

Civic Government Association candidates headed the aldermanic contest with Ald. Alex Weir heading the poll by a substantial margin with others following in the order mentioned: Ald. A. J. McMillan, D. G. Sinclair, Ald. W. G. Thorpe, J. Gorman, G. P. Lancaster, J. Gourlay and A. Cecil.

Treaty Is Renewed

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.—(CP)—With an extensive revision of duties on Canadian motor-vehicles including parts, the Canada-New Zealand trade pact, expiring November 24, has been renewed to July 31, 1936. Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, announced last night.

RETURN OF MONARCHY

Royal Vice-Chancellor of Austria Swears Allegiance to Archduke Otto

VIENNA, Nov. 21.—The Austrian government was construed yesterday as having gone definitely on record as favoring a return of the Hapsburg dynasty to the throne of Austria when Prince Ernest von Stahrenberg, vice-chancellor, in the course of a public royalist demonstration, swore allegiance to Archduke Otto, whose early return to the throne is anticipated. It had been thought that Prince Ernest might have monarchial ambitions himself but this has now been set at rest.

Austria has been a republic since 1918 when Emperor Carl I abdicated.

Former Local Man Dies at Kamloops

Duncan Robertson, Who Lived For Years in Prince Rupert and Anyox, Passes

Word has been received in the city of the death at Kamloops on November 9 of Duncan Robertson, for ten years a resident of Prince Rupert and Anyox. Having contracted silicosis while working at Anyox, deceased, who was but 39 years of age, had been at Kamloops for the past year and a half. The funeral took place at Kamloops on November 12.

While in Prince Rupert, deceased lived on Sherbrooke Street and he was quite well known in the city, having been at one time in the employ of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. He was unmarried.

The late Mr. Robertson was a native of Invernesshire, Scotland, where his parents reside. There is a brother, Archie Robertson, at Wells, B.C. Inspector John Macdonald of the provincial police, formerly of Prince Rupert and now at Nelson, and Sergeant John Robertson, formerly of the Vancouver city police, are uncles of deceased.

Sea Scouts To Make Long Hop

Two Boys Will Cross Pacific On China Clipper Scheduled To Leave on Saturday

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Two Sea Scouts have been chosen to make the trans-Pacific flight aboard the great Pan-American Airways flying boat China Clipper when it leaves in a few days to inaugurate the new air service across the Pacific from here to the Orient and Manila. A dozen air line workers for Midway Island will also be taken. Departure of the China Clipper is set for Saturday.

Reduce Number of Accidental Deaths

President Roosevelt Endeavoring to Find Means of Cutting Annual Toll of 100,000 Lives

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 21.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt is seeking public advice in the matter of devising means of reducing the toll of 100,000 lives a year which is claimed in the United States as a result of accidents.

TWO MEN ARRESTED

Wholesaler Move In Connection With Selling Of Arsenic Soda In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Two men, one the proprietor of the store which is alleged to have sold the poisoned goods, and the other the owner of a salvage company which is alleged to have distributed it, were arrested yesterday in connection with the recent distribution here of baking soda containing arsenic fluoride which is asserted to have caused at least three deaths.

Health authorities believe that the deadly bicarbonate was sold from only one store. They are at a loss, however, to account how it could have been mixed with the arsenic.

Sweepstakes For Hospitals Found Favor in Alberta

EDMONTON, Nov. 21.—The annual convention of the Alberta Hospitals Association yesterday approved the proposal for the holding of sweepstakes for hospital purposes.

B. C. Is Opposed

VICTORIA, Nov. 21.—The British Columbia Hospitals Association, at its annual convention here recently, refused to endorse the holding of sweepstakes for hospital purposes, holding that to do so would indicate a lack of confidence in government support and might impede the inauguration of a system of state health insurance.

MOVING TO VANCOUVER

Transfer of G. E. Gulick Announced—A. C. Small New Manager Of Swift-Canadian Co.

Announcement is made today of the transfer to district manager's office in Vancouver of Glen E. Gulick, manager for the past fourteen and a half years of the Swift-Canadian Co.'s local branch. His successor as manager here is A. C. Small of this city whose present position is, in turn, taken by Richard (Scoop) Bury. The changes become effective December 1. Departure of Mr. Gulick from Prince Rupert will be regretted in business as well as other circles. He came to Prince Rupert soon after the opening of the company's plant here but was quite well known in the city prior to that as a salesman out of Vancouver. He is a prominent member of the Elks' Lodge and the Rotary Club.

Mrs. Gulick and son and daughter, who are alike well known and popular, will be leaving for Vancouver to take up residence after school closes in December for the Christmas and New Year vacation.

Move Being Made to Increase Internal Production—Ethiopians Will Not Accept Present Conditions, Says Selassie—Italian Claim Dubbed Fabrication

ROME, Nov. 21.—(CP)—The most significant move since the commencement of the Italo-Ethiopian war occurred today when Premier Benito Mussolini cut Italy's army in half for three months by granting leave for that period to 500,000 soldiers. No official statement in this regard has yet been made but it is believed Il Duce's order assigned to increase Italy's agricultural production in order to combat the sanctions which have been imposed against the country as being the aggressor in the East African war.

Deputy Minister Delays Visit To City One Week

Word was received in the city today that Dr. W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries from Ottawa, who was to have visited Prince Rupert next week, will be a week later in arriving. Dr. Found, who is coming to the city in the course of his annual tour of the coast to discuss the various problems of the fishing industry, will, it is expected, be accompanied by members of the International Fisheries Commission. A number of meetings are expected to be held and delegations heard.

Would Aid Those Snowbound Near Fairbanks City

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Nov. 21.—(CP)—City and Chamber of Commerce officials of Fairbanks have appealed to the territorial authorities at Juneau to grant emergency funds to provide an outlet for many trappers, prospectors and settlers they say are snowbound without supplies in the Big Delta country, ninety-nine miles south of here.

SPEAKS OF NORTHLAND

Beauty And Wealth In Everyday Things Visualized By Dr. Mandy

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association took place last evening in the Borden Street School, with Mrs. D. C. Stuart presiding over a good attendance of members.

Mrs. E. B. Baker presented a very gratifying report of the telephone bridge held last month under the auspices of the Association. Substantial grants of money will be made to the schools for the purchase of library and reference books. The secretary was instructed to purchase three sets of football jerseys for the schools' football teams.

J. A. Teng, with vocal solos, accompanied by Mrs. J. S. Black, and Miss Jean McLean, with a beautifully rendered pianoforte solo, provided a most enjoyable program.

Dr. J. T. Mandy

Dr. J. T. Mandy, who took as the title of his address "The Riches of the North," impressed upon his audience the great need of each person training himself and helping to train the young to acquire such a knowledge of the real things of the universe that they will appreciate and enjoy to the full that intense observation and appreciation of the beauty and grandeur of the things and forces of nature which constitute the highest and truest wealth.

The great northern empire of which Prince Rupert is the gateway is enormously rich in natural resources—in its vast deposits of minerals, in its great forest areas, and in its productive fisheries. Unfortunately, minds tend to dwell upon the material value of this riches and measure it by the standard of thousands or millions of dollars. There would be greater wealth if people had a knowledge of the herculean forces which shaped the mountains and made the minerals accessible. There would be wealth that could not be measured in dollars and cents if people would learn of the evolutionary processes which produced the forests, and if they would study the biological history of the fish which are caught in the water.

From Totem Pole Hill people were thrilled by the beauty and symmetry of Mount Morse and, looking across the harbor one gazed into the face of glorious sunsets which no artist could paint. The cloud-filled sky should impress us with the wonderful story of nature's perfect irrigation system, and, as the vision pierces the clouds, one is transported on and on into the infinite beyond where souls, unhindered by the limits of space and time, could contemplate and commune with God.

Riches on All Sides

"We are surrounded on all sides and live in the midst of riches," declared the speaker, "but often we are unable to appreciate this riches because our minds have not been cultivated and lack the necessary background of knowledge. In the home our children should be trained from the earliest years to appreciate the beautiful and have a sympathetic understanding of the simple things of nature. Science studies and art should be stressed in our schools, and our churches should not leave it entirely to scientists to correlate religion and science. Materialism is the enemy of true riches and happiness but a culture in which beauty of soul and mind predominate will tend to banish barbarism, greed, savagery and war, and will usher in a higher civilization and bring its citizens closer to God."

Dr. Mandy's address was illustrated at the close by beautiful lantern slides which vividly portrayed the aesthetic riches of the great northland.

JELICOE

Admiral Lord Jelicoe, who died yesterday, will always be remembered in connection with the Battle of Jutland, where some praised him for his strategy and others blamed him for his timidity. In that battle several Prince Rupert people took part.

Jelicoe preferred to take as few chances as possible when, by risking all, he might have gone down in history as a national hero or as a noheaded fool. The failure of the British gunnery could not be blamed on him and neither could the defective signalling. His death removes another of the war leaders, few of whom now remain.

AND THIS IS CIVILIZATION

In our younger days we were all thrilled with the stories of life on the frontier where men, women and children were subject to the attacks of Indians and, to guard against such, forts were built and all people, male and female, were taught to use the rifle. We had thought that these tragic events were all past and that in civilized countries people could live in perfect security.

Now it is made clear that in Europe today the whole population has to guard against attack, not from Indians but from people counted among the most civilized in the world. It is a sad reflection on our boasted civilization.

IDEAL RADIO

The Nizam of Hyderabad, one of the native princes of India, is setting the world an example in installing a radio that is to be devoted exclusively to classical music.

We have often thought that in a country like the United States a powerful station devoted wholly to high class music might prove successful. We know a good many people who search the dial every evening for good music and directly the station turns back to jazz they switch off and try some other station or shut off the radio altogether until something better is available. If a station played nothing but high class music it would be left on in those homes all evening.

RECORD OF SERVICE

Frank Burd, who has just retired from active management of the Vancouver Daily Province, has been one of the big factors in building up Vancouver's senior newspaper to the position it holds today. For many years under the general management of former Lieutenant-Governor Nichol and later in full charge for the Southam interests, Mr. Burd has steadily kept his paper to the fore as a newspaper of the highest standing.

As an active member of the Masonic craft Mr. Burd has been instrumental in doing much work, a record of which will never be known to the public. He has also for years been a prominent member of the Vancouver Rotary Club.

It is satisfactory to know that he will continue to interest himself in newspaper affairs.

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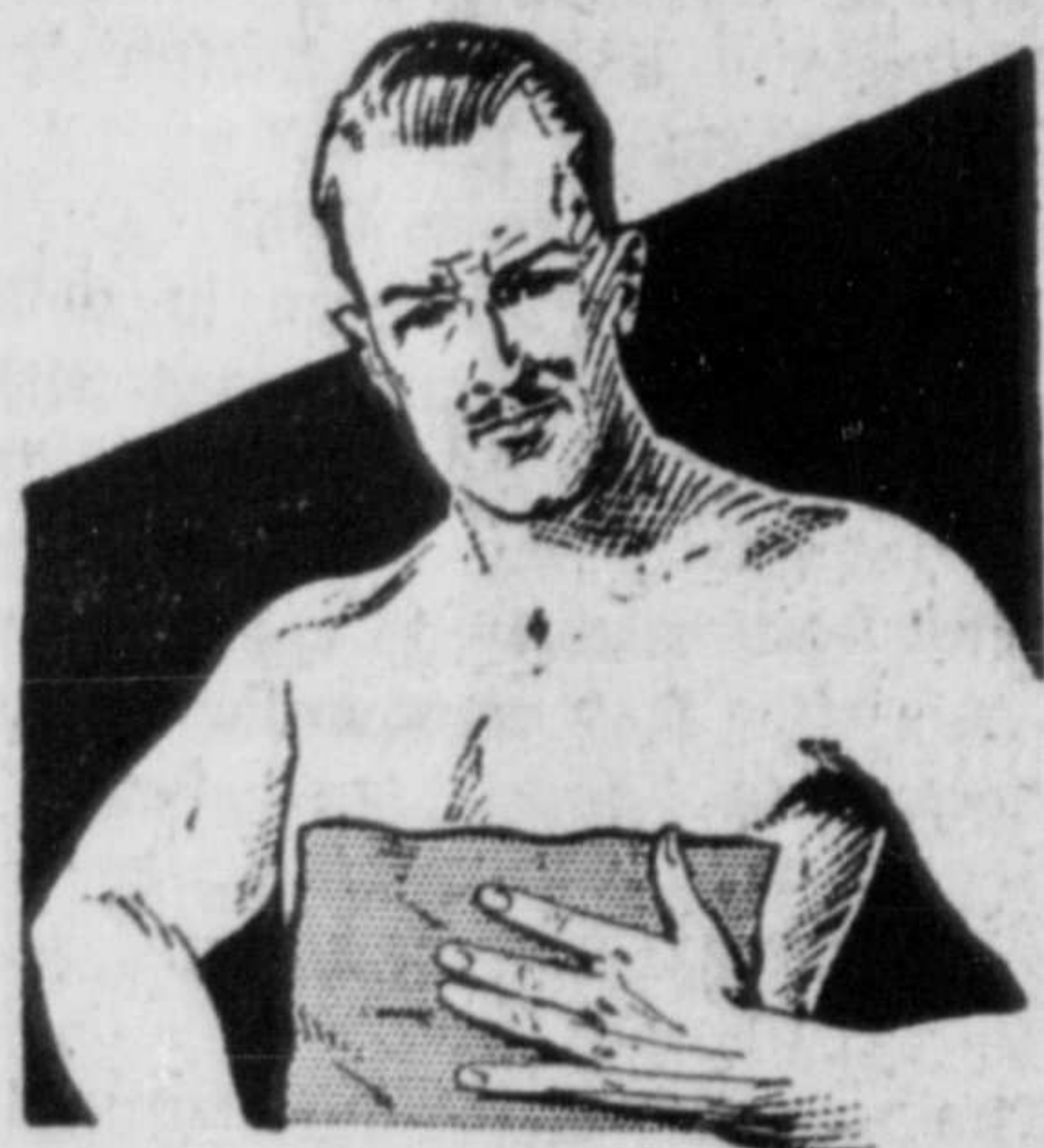

COMMUNISM AND JESUS

Rev. C. D. Clarke Makes Suggestion Before Gyro Club to Cure Economic Ills

"Take the weed of communism, eliminate some of its undesirable features and infuse it with the spirit of Jesus Christ," suggested Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church, in speaking before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday, as a means of meeting the economic ills of the world today. Mr. Clarke was speaking on the subject of "The Vacant Lot" on which he had discoursed a couple of weeks ago before the Rotary Club, which address he was asked to repeat.

It was easy, declared Mr. Clarke, to criticize those who preached communism but did those who criticize have anything to offer to meet the ills of the day? Had they any real leadership to give? Those who advocated communism were at least trying to do something to improve the "vacant lot" of the economic system. The speaker appealed to his listeners to study such alternatives as communism and socialism, between which the only difference was the method of approach.

Mr. Clarke discussed the development of machinery and its replacement of man's labor. Where ninety-nine men out of one hundred were formerly required to do the world's work, today but fifty were needed and their production was greater. The problem was ever increasing in intensity and the "vacant lot" was becoming larger. He questioned the efficacy of monetary reform or social credit under the present economic system. Reduction of the hours of work might help. Then would arise the problem of what to do with the leisure. There would have to be education for leisure instead of for work. The whole economic set-up would have to be changed. Present conditions constituted a challenge to all people—including the church and ministers.

While Mr. Clarke's listeners may not have agreed unanimously with all he had to say, he, at least, opened ground for a new and interesting line of thought and his address was listened to with keen attention. President S. J. Jabour was in the chair and thanked Mr. Clarke on behalf of the club, expressing the hope that, through intergovernmental action, some of the aims as outlined by the speaker, might soon be achieved. Dr. W. C. Aspinall was a guest and there was an almost full attendance of members.
