NOVA SCOTIA COLLIERY EXPLOSION

SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE IN "SEASIDE TRIANGLE CASE"

Seven Lives Lost As Result of Fire Damp In Stellarton Mine

In Same Property in Which Eighty-Eight Lives Were Lost Seventeen Years Ago—All Other Workers Accounted For

STELLARTON, Nova Scotia, April 16: (CP)—An explosion today in the Allan shaft near here, where eighty-eight miners were killed in 1918, is feared to have taken the lives of seven miners working on the 1500-foot level. All other workers have been accounted for. The cause of the explosion is believed to have been deadly "fire damp."

WILEY POST DOWN AGAIN

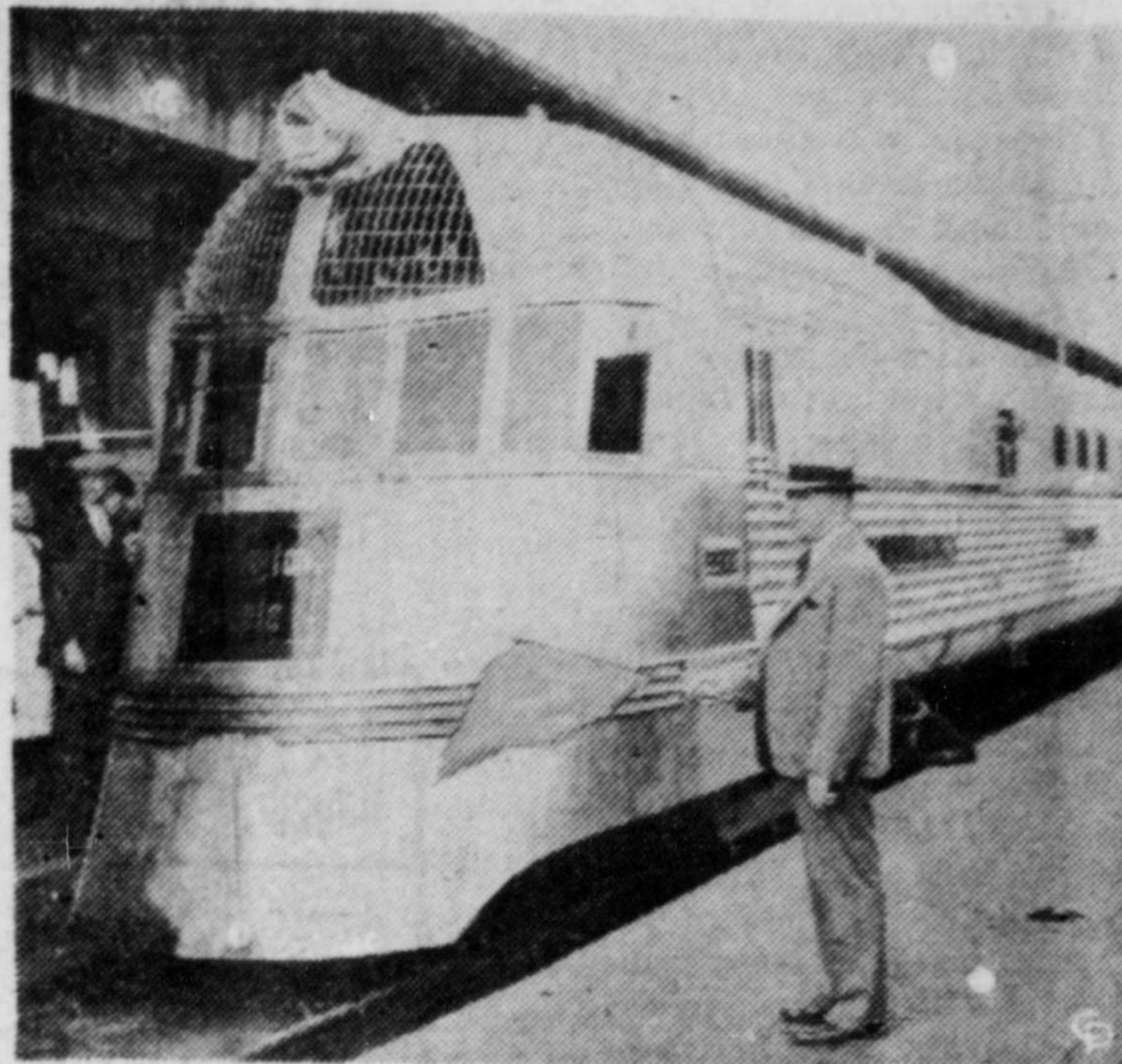
Fails For Third Time in Attempt To Set Transcontinental Stratosphere Flight Record

LAFAYETTE, Indiana, April 16:—Forced down here yesterday by super-charger trouble, Wiley Post, American flying ace, had failed in his third attempt to break the transcontinental flight record through the stratosphere.

Post had left Burbank, Calif., at 5:27 yesterday morning and, on landing the Winnie Mae here eight hours later, had covered about three-quarters of the distance across the continent. He expressed disappointment at having failed again.

He had travelled via Denver and Cleveland, his objective having been New York.

Attempting New Speed Record



CHICAGO, April 16—Two Burlington Route streamline trains dashed away from here in an attempt to make a new record for the train run from Chicago to Minneapolis and St. Paul. They were to attempt to make the 431 miles in six hours flat. The picture shows one of the trains which is attempting the record. Some time ago this train established a record of 13 hours and 5 minutes for the 1015.4 mile run from Denver to Chicago, the average being 72.4 miles per hour. It once attained a speed of 112.5 miles per hour.

Bournemouth Court is Told of Money Passed Between Two Accused

Payments Made by Rattenbury to His Wife Who in Turn Made Payments to Chauffeur—Decision Reserved Until April 24

BOURNEMOUTH, England, April 16: (CP)—Preliminary hearing of murder charges against Mrs. Alma Rattenbury and her young chauffeur, George Stoner, was again adjourned today until April 24 without decision. Much detailed testimony was added in the now famous "seaside triangle case" concerning relations between the two accused of the slaying of F. M. Rattenbury, the woman's husband and former well known British Columbia architect and land speculator. Various witnesses told of payments of money by Rattenbury to the wife who, in turn, made payments to Stoner. There was also evidence of the purchase by the latter of a ring with bills cashed on a check received from Mrs. Rattenbury.

TRADE IS IMPROVED

Canadian Excise Revenue Up With Favorable Trade Balance Also

OTTAWA, April 16: (CP)—For the twelve months ending March 31 this year customs and excise collections for Canada totalled \$226,756,000, an increase of \$23,500,000 as compared with a year ago. Canadian exports for the same period amounted to \$669,000,000, imports \$552,000,000, leaving a favorable trade balance of over \$137,000,000 for the period.

Ketchikan Halibut Price Rather Low

Onah Hesitates About Accepting 7c And 5c—Salmon Price 9c and 4c

KETCHIKAN, April 14:—Capt. Harry Selig was in port yesterday with his halibut boat Onah, having a catch of 14,000 pounds. The only offer was 7c and 5c and Capt. Selig last night intimated he would probably refuse this and take the catch on to Prince Rupert. The Pauline J. sold a halibut catch of 1600 pounds here at 7c and 5c yesterday and another small boat 600 pounds at the same price. Seven trolling boats were in yesterday with salmon, receiving 9c and 4c for several thousand pounds.

Laura Ingalls' Hop Off is Set

American Aviatix to Leave Today On Transcontinental Speed Flight

BURBANK, Cal., April 16:—Laura Ingalls, noted American aviatix, was to hop off from here today on her much deferred attempt to establish a new transcontinental flight record for women. After having been held for weeks on account of duststorms in the Middle West and generally unfavorable flying conditions, it was announced last night that prospects for today were favorable.

Tennis Star's Romance Off

Marie Lawson Announces Breaking Of Her Engagement to Fred Perry

LONDON, April 16:—Marie Lawson, English actress, announced yesterday that her engagement to Fred Perry, British tennis ace, was off. Perry, Miss Lawson complained, was getting too much publicity. She also objected to his plan to go to Hollywood for a moving picture engagement.

Three Indians Are Committed to Stand Trial For Burglary

Rufus White, Alfred Davidson and Henry Geddes, Indians, have been committed for trial at Massett on charges of breaking and entering in connection with the recent burglary of James Martin's general store, according to word received at district headquarters of the provincial police here. They will be brought to the city shortly to appear before Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court for election. According to word from Constable T. D. Brunton at Massett, a good deal of the stolen goods has been recovered.

Henry Smith, well known pioneer of the city, who has been a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital for the past two or three weeks, is making a good recovery and will soon be able to leave the institution.

INSULL IS NOT CLEAR

United States Government to Proceed With Outstanding Charge Against Former Magnate

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 16:—It was announced yesterday that the federal government intended to proceed with prosecution on one further remaining indictment against Samuel Insull sr., former Chicago utilities magnate, and associates who have already won federal and state acquittals on previous indictments. Up to now, it had been thought that, in view of the other acquittals, the remaining charge would be dropped. However, the Department of Justice now states that it believes it has sufficient evidence to convict Insull.

ONE DEATH IN DAWSON

Carl Marsh, Miner, Succumbs to Pneumonia Contracted In Influenza Epidemic

DAWSON, Y.T., April 16: (CP)—Carl Marsh, aged 50, a miner, is dead from pneumonia following an attack of influenza in the epidemic which has been sweeping this community. With no new cases developing, the epidemic is now believed to have reached its peak. Several cases of pneumonia have followed the influenza.

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 16:—Nine justices of the Supreme Court of the United States were in session yesterday and rendered a number of judgments, further withholding their decision, however, in connection with the railway pension law. This judgment is being awaited with interest by both the railway companies and employees to both of which it is a matter of outstanding importance.

COMPROMISE BONUS BILL

Possibility of President Roosevelt And Bonus Bloc Getting Together is Seen

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 16:—Although President Franklin D. Roosevelt has said that he will not alter his stand in opposition to the soldiers' bonus bill which he has announced he will veto if it is passed by Congress, it was believed yesterday that a compromise was possible between the president and the bonus bloc. Senator Harrison, who is known to be close to the president, announced yesterday his intention of introducing a new and modified bonus bill. This, it was thought, might be the basis of a possible compromise.

Some time ago the House, by a narrow margin, passed the bonus bill which has not yet been voted upon by the Senate.

Big Denver Party To Hunt Bear On Kodiak Island

KETCHIKAN, April 16:—The steamer Alaska, in port yesterday from Seattle, had on board a big game hunting party of fourteen from Denver, Colorado, enroute to Kodiak Island. They will hunt brown bear on Kodiak Island and expect to be here southbound on May 18.

Railway Guarantees and Public Works Program Provided For By Legislation in Ottawa House

OTTAWA, April 16: (CP)—The government will guarantee loans to the railways—\$8,000,000 to the Canadian National and \$7,000,000 to the Canadian Pacific to purchase new equipment and repair obsolete, run-down locomotives and equipment, also paying the interest for two years.

E. W. Beatty K.C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was described in the House of Commons yesterday by F. G. Sanderson, Liberal member for South Perth, as "Canada's Public Enemy No. 1" for his attacks on the Canadian National.

In addition to guarantees to the railways, a public works bill providing for expenditure of \$18,000,000 was introduced in the House yesterday.

THE BRITISH BUDGET

While critics and opponents of the National Government will undoubtedly dub it a vote-catching budget in anticipation of a general election which it is generally conceded will be held within the coming year, the annual financial statement, presented to the British House of Commons by Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, yesterday indicates another year of progress toward recovery from the world depression for Great Britain.

The fact that the government is able to reduce income taxes involving a loss in revenue of \$48,000,000 and completely restore the government salary cuts of 1931 and at the same time report a surplus of \$27,000,000 speaks for itself.

The reduction in the income tax and the restoration of the civil service pay cuts will be popular politically.

It is to be noted that, once again, no provision is made for payment of war debts.

In spite of all the improvement in general conditions in the Old Country, there are many who feel that the National government will not be able to withstand at the polls the revulsion against it that appears to be so general.

BENNETT AND STEVENS

Apparently, Hon. H. H. Stevens is resolved to stand by his guns and insist upon the full recognition of certain of his principles before conceding to the overtures of Premier Bennett and the Conservative party to return to the government. Seemingly, he does not mind where he strikes among his old colleagues several of whom it appears quite certain must be removed in any cabinet shuffle which would involve the British Columbia man's return to Premier Bennett's inner council. If Mr. Stevens does go back, he will undoubtedly be second most powerful, if not the most powerful, member of the government. He is the only member of the government who has ventured to challenge Mr. Bennett's authority and it looks like Mr. Bennett is going to have to accept him and his policies too.

Politics move fast these days and, even though the general election may be only a few months removed, there might be some important changes in Conservative leadership by the time it is held. It is even conceivable that Mr. Stevens and not Mr. Bennett may lead the party to the country. That the former has a substantial portion of the party's present members in the House behind him might be indicated from the ovation he was given by Conservative back benchers in Parliament last week when he delivered his attack upon some of his former cabinet colleagues, particularly Hon. C. H. Cahan.

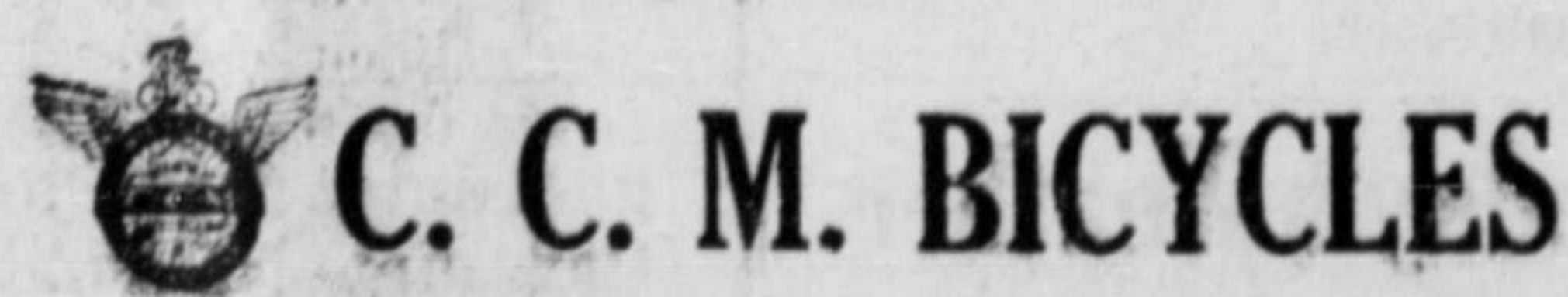

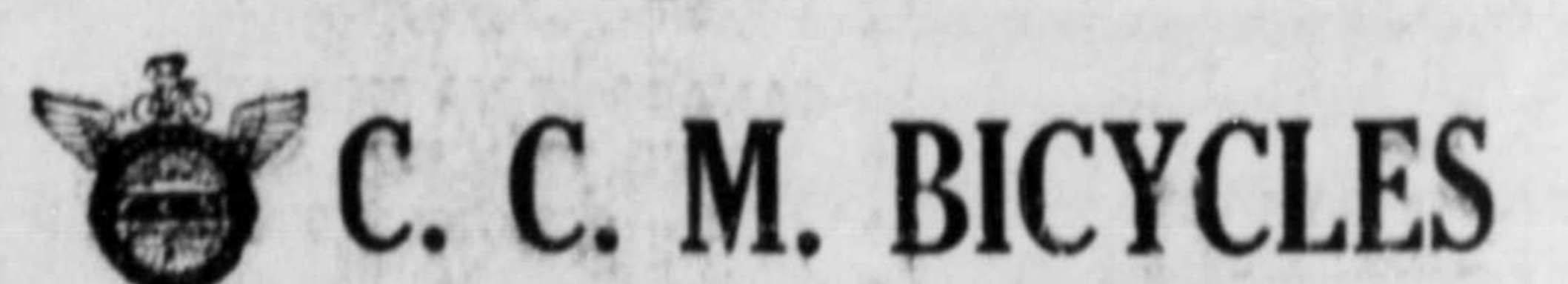

Further Planning For Celebration Of Anniversary

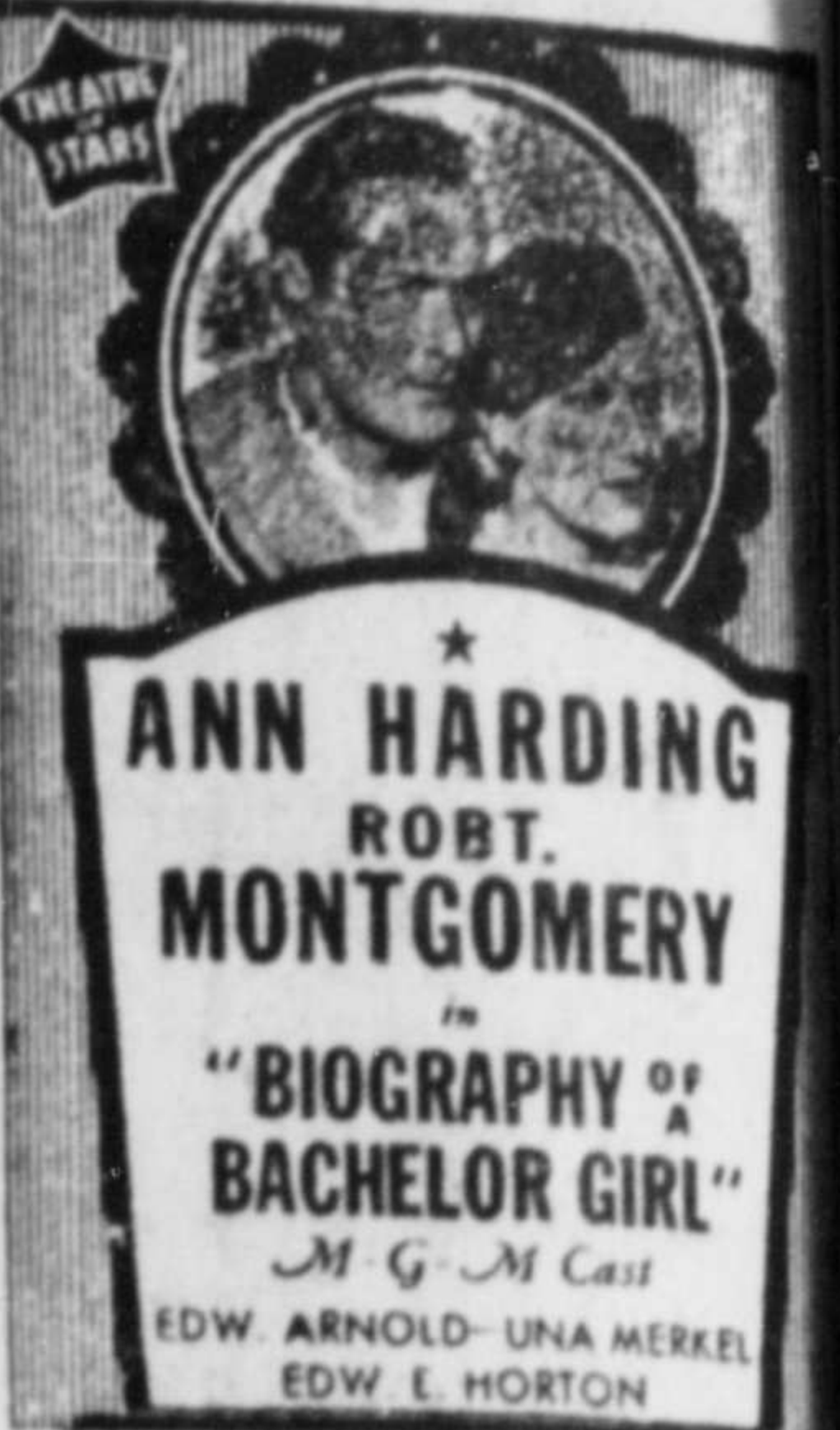

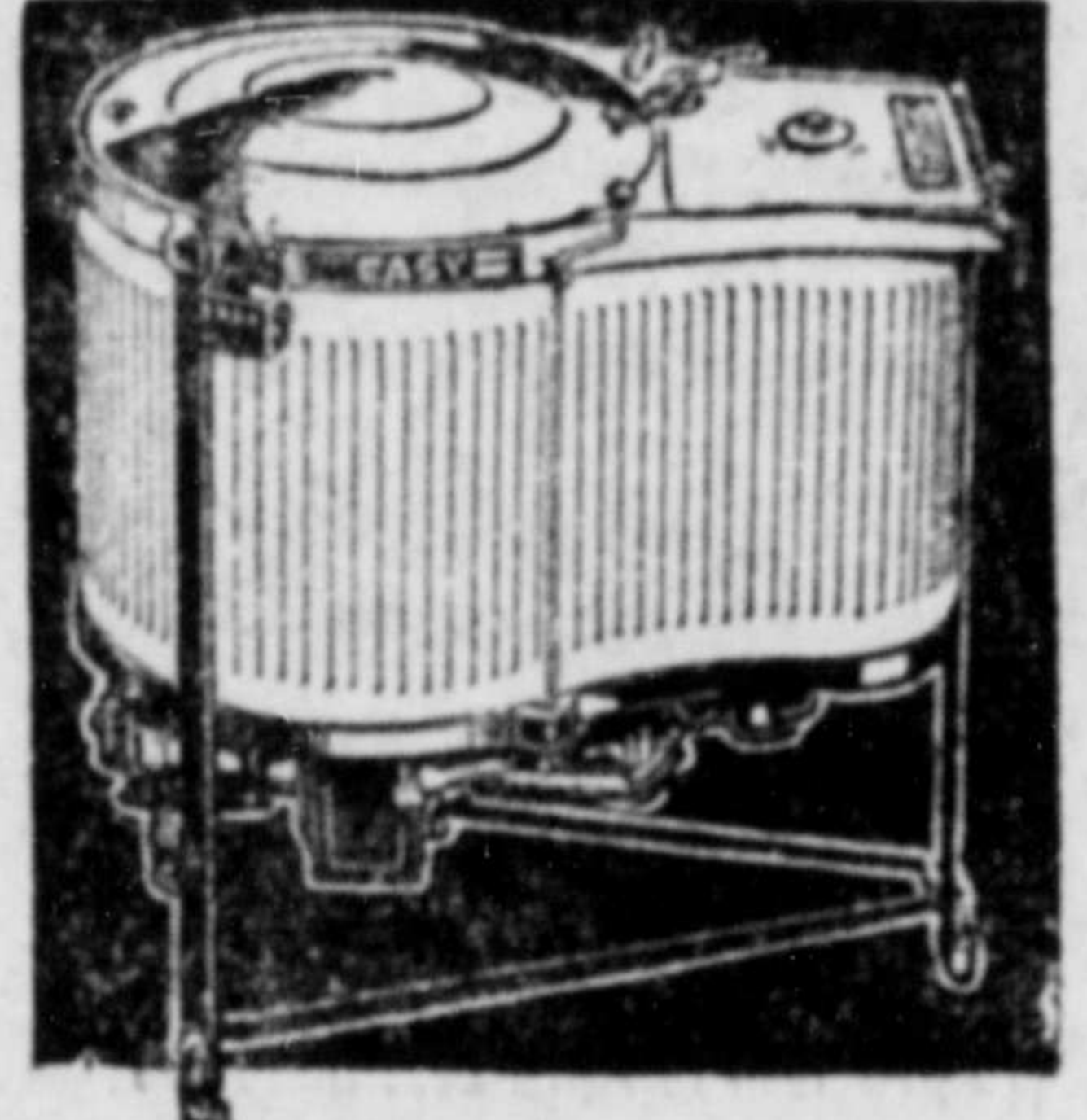
