SOCIAL CREDIT SWEEP IN ALBERTA

BANK BANDITS ELUDE POLICE CORDON AND CROSS FRASER

United Farmer Government and Old Line Parties Are Almost Wiped Out in Political Turnover

MRS. BLACK IS RUNNING

Will be no change in Conservative Candidature in Yukon Riding

DAWSON, Y.T., Aug. 23: (CP)—Mrs. George Black will run in Yukon riding in the federal election under the designation of "Independent Conservative" although she was the choice of an official Conservative meeting some time ago. She will be the sole representative of the Conservative interests. It is indicated.

Mrs. Black intimated recently that she would be willing, if the constituents desired to retire as a candidate in favor of her husband, Hon. George Black, former Speaker of the House of Commons, who has recovered from a recent serious illness which it was thought at first would necessitate his retiring from public life. However, the Conservatives of the riding appear to think that now Mrs. Black has been nominated, there is no reason to make a change.

Marjorie White, Popular Actress Of Screen Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 23:—Diminutive Marjorie White, popular blonde motion picture star of many years' standing, died here as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile crash on Monday. She will be remembered from pictures in which she played with Charles Farrell, Janet Gaynor and E. Brendel. She also had important parts in several of Warner Oland's Charlie Chan pictures.

Neill and Bush Visiting North

Two Well Known Mining Men On Way to Stewart and Usk

R. K. Neill of Spokane, who was prominently identified with the Premier mine in the early stages of its development, and O. B. Bush, another pioneer Portland Canal operator, are passengers aboard the Prince Rupert today bound for Stewart on business in connection with mining interests there. From Stewart they will proceed to Usk to make an inspection of the Nicholson Creek mine which is now under extensive development by Buckley Shannon of Seattle.

NEW YORK METALS

NEW YORK, Aug. 23: (CP)—Bar silver and copper were both unchanged in price on the local metal market yesterday, silver selling at 65 1/2¢ per ounce and copper at 23 1/4¢ and 8 1/2¢ for domestic and export respectively. Today silver advanced to 65 3/4¢ while the lead price was 4.35¢ per pound.

Advocates of New Economic Philosophy Win Preponderant Majority in Prairie Legislature, Others Being Given no More Than Handful of Seats

EDMONTON, Aug. 23: (CP)—Taking some sixty-five percent of the popular vote and probably 59 of 63 seats in the Legislature, Social Credit candidates, led by William Aberhart, High School principal of Calgary, swept Alberta in yesterday's provincial election in one of the most sensational political upsets in the history of Canada. The United Farmers of Alberta government was virtually wiped out with but one survivor. Liberals elected two members while the Conservatives won only a single seat. Premier Reid and all his ministers save Attorney General Lymburn in Edmonton, met defeat. Liberal Leader W. R. Howson was elected in Edmonton.

Latest returns indicate the new legislature of 63 seats will be composed as follows:
Social Credit, 59
Liberals, 2
United Farmers of Alberta, 1
Conservatives, 1

There may be some slight change in the standing with the completed count. Up to 1 o'clock this afternoon Social Credit had definitely elected 36 members and was leading in 23 seats.

Calgary elected five Social Credit candidates and one Liberal. Edmonton elected four Social Credit candidates, one Liberal, W. R. Howson, and one United Farmer, Attorney General J. F. Lymburn.

Liberals elected were W. R. Howson, leader of the party in Edmonton, and J. J. Bowlin in Calgary. Social Credit candidates swept the rural ridings and were among the leaders as proportional representation counting proceeded in the cities.

Personally defeated with Premier Reid were Mr. Hoadley, minister of trade and industry; Mr. Baker, minister of education; Mr. MacLellan, minister of public works; Mr. Grisdale, minister of agriculture; Mr. Allen, minister of municipal affairs, and Mr. Love, Provincial Secretary.

Former Premier J. E. Brownlee was defeated in Penoka. D. M. Duggan, Conservative leader, put up a good battle.

Labor, Independents and Communists failed to elect a single candidate. J. S. Cowper of Edmonton, former Prince Rupert newspaperman, running as a Liberal, was defeated in Edson by the Social Credit candidate, J. H. Unwin.

Aberhart Speaks
Mr. Aberhart, who did not run for any seat himself but actively directed the campaign and personally selected candidates for the various ridings from lists submitted to him, issued a statement, after the victory of the Social Credit party was conceded, in which he said that the new government had no intention of confiscation or repudiation in any way, shape or form. "We shall have the finest and most upright men at the head of affairs to guide the province of Alberta out of the depression. We give thanks to Almighty God in heaven for his guidance and aid in this great victory and submit to His divine guidance and wisdom in the great task to which we have been called. We ask the people to place their trust in Him and remember our theme song: 'O God Our Help in Ages Past.' We ask the people to have patience with us after we assume the reins of office. Fear not. Thank you."
Premier Reid, head of the United Farmer of Alberta government announced, after his defeat became apparent, that the administration would be ready to step out of office and turn over the reins of office just as soon as the election writs had been returned.

Motor Industry Shows Comeback

Rotarians Hear Company Sales Official and See Pictures

T. G. Applegath, zone manager of the General Motors Products of Canada Ltd. from Vancouver, was the speaker at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in the Commodore Cafe yesterday, subject being "The Motor Industry." He illustrated his talk with talking picture films. Past President S. D. Johnston was in the chair and there was a good attendance of members with a few guests.

In the course of his remarks, Mr. Applegath told how the motor industry was coming out of the depression, his company's sales showing an increase in 1934 of fifty percent over 1933 while in the first half of this year, there had been a thirty-three percent increase over the corresponding period last year.

Mr. Applegath said he also saw improvement everywhere, even in Prince Rupert where conditions compared very favorably with what they were on his previous visit to the city two years ago.

RUPERT WINS IN FOOTBALL

Prince Rupert defeated Massett by a score of 2 to 1 in last night's Silver Jubilee Carnival football game, a fair sized crowd of fans watching the play with considerable interest. The visitors from the Islands played a fast and tricky game and, with a little more coaching and steady down have the makings of a real good football team.

Well on in the first half, York of Massett opened the scoring, the teams crossing over with but the one point scored. Early in the second half, Armstrong equalized for Prince Rupert and three minutes before full time, McKay scored the winning goal for the locals.

Andy Horne acted as referee and S. P. Woodside and Leonard Cripps were linesmen.

The Aiyansh team arrived in the city late yesterday and will play a game against Prince Rupert tomorrow evening.

BIG CROWD AT PAGEANT

With upwards of 1900 paid admissions recorded, a great crowd attended last night's Silver Jubilee Carnival entertainment at the Exhibition Hall, the feature of the proceedings being a "Pageant of the Nations" competition, a colorful and variegated affair for two major prizes of \$50 and \$25, the winners of which will be announced tonight. The judges were S. E. Parker, T. H. Johnson, D. G. Borland, H. N. Brocklesby and C. H. Lewis. They probably had little difficulty in determining the virile and novel war and conciliation dance presented by the Kincolith Va. Dance Team and the Geisha dancing display by the Japanese Association of Prince Rupert under direction of Mrs. Sadao Suga, as being the winners.

The Pageant was opened by C. V. Ewart, president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, who took charge of the event. In his introductory remarks, Mr. Ewart expressed the appreciation of the Chamber of Commerce for the work which was being done by their junior members. For over a month the young men had worked strenuously and conscientiously in preparing for the carnival and he was glad to see that their efforts were now being crowned with success.

Trio of Robbers Give Slip to Officers On Guard at Lillooet Span

Two Were Riding Horses While Third Was on Foot—Posses Covering All Roads as Highwaymen Are Believed on Way to Lytton and Coast

LILLOOET, Aug. 23: (CP)—Three bandits, who held up the Bank of Toronto at Pioneer mine on Tuesday and escaped with \$1100, crashed through a police cordon early this morning and escaped across the Fraser River bridge here after holding up two special constables who were guarding the bridge. Two of the bandits were riding horses while a third was on foot, running and hanging onto the stirrup of one of the mounted men. It is believed they are heading for Lytton and the coast. Posses are now covering all roads.

FATALITIES REPORTED

Japanese Drowned in Skeena River And Grenville Channel—Miner Killed at Anyox

District headquarters of the provincial police here are advised today of three fatalities in different parts of the district.

The finding of a fishing boat anchored in the Skeena River below Mowitch Point one mile below Haysport, and the subsequent recovery by dragging operations of a gum boot and sock from the water suggest that Deizo Kawase of B. A. Cannery, Port Essington, a well known Japanese fisherman, fell overboard and was drowned. The empty boat was found on Wednesday morning of this week. It is believed that Kawase, 57 years of age, had anchored his boat the night previous close to shore and, in throwing out the anchor, fell overboard. His oil tank was dry, leading to the belief that the engine had still been running and kept running until the fuel became exhausted. Dragging operations are being continued.

From Anyox comes word of Pete Pelith dying there last night in hospital as a result of injuries sustained in the plant. An inquiry is being held today.

Another Japanese, K. Foruya, missing from his boat between Lowe Inlet and Camp Point, near Butedale, since yesterday afternoon, is believed to have been drowned.

SEARCHING FOR PLANE

Still No Trace of Fairbanks Pilot And Three Passengers

FAIRBANKS, Aug. 23: (CP)—There is still no trace of the missing plane which left Dawson last Monday and has not been reported since. On board were Pilot Arthur Hines and Mr. and Mrs. John Lonz and Alton Nordale as passengers. Seven planes, flying in paths ten miles apart, have been combing the territory between here and Dawson in the vicinity of the Yukon and Tanana Rivers.

Air Inspector Murray Hall of the Department of Commerce has been placed in charge of the search and Governor John W. Troy has ordered from Juneau that all available planes be commissioned in the search at expense of the territory.

Holds Session On Health Insurance

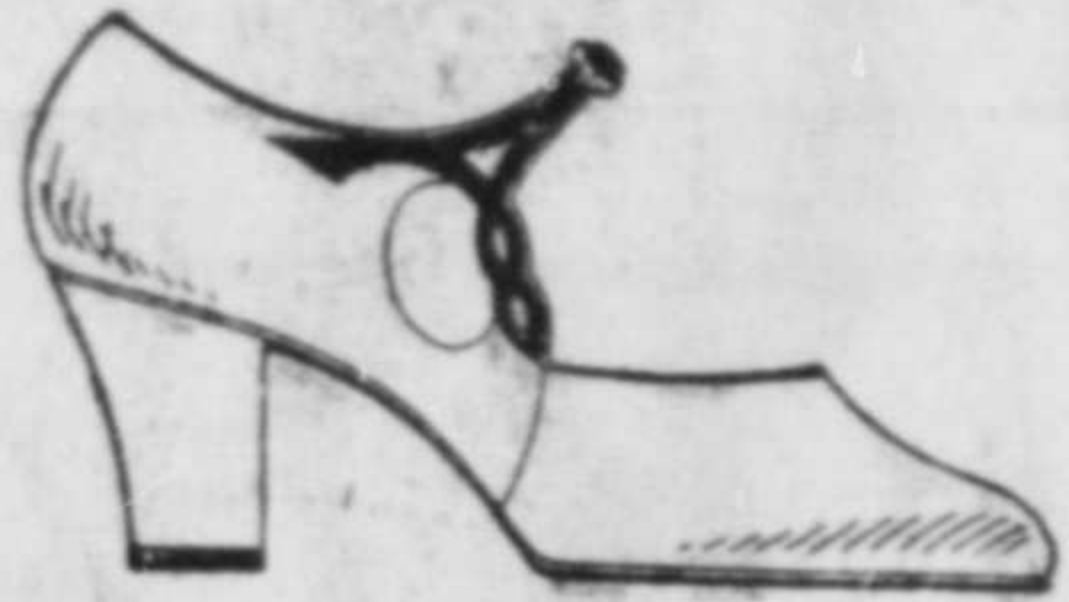
E. W. Neel, Representative of Provincial Committee, Meets Local Interests

VIEWS OF BUSINESS

The August number of "Canadian Business" publishes an interesting article entitled "Ottawa Parade" in which the writer suggests a possible majority for the Liberal party in the present election. It analyzes the political situation as it appeared just before the magazine went to press. According to the writer, the torpedoing of the Conservative party by Hon. H. H. Stevens meant the downfall of the Bennett administration but yet he did not think there would be many Stevens Conservatives elected. Their stronghold he suggested was in Ontario but even there, while they would take a good many votes, they would not be strong enough to elect their men except possibly in a very few individual cases.

Evidently the writer of the article in question would like to have seen Mr. Bennett returned to power. He speaks of the unfortunate illness of the Prime Minister and its effect on the electorate that had to some extent dispelled the spirit of defeat that seemed to have gripped the Conservative party. Thus the effect of the radio speeches early in the year was lost. He also mentioned the astonishing scramble of ministers for safe exits.

The writer prophesies that the coming election will show conclusively that the people refuse to be bothered about the C. C. F. as a federal political factor and suggests that the prospects of the Liberal party are very bright. It is assured that the Liberals will pull the country out of a hole and it intimates that business people will welcome the removal of restrictions on foreign and domestic trade. Quality rather than quantity of government is what is wanted more than anything else.

That is the business view. For the view of the average wage earner one has to turn elsewhere but nowhere is there any evidence that any other party than the Liberal is likely to secure anything like a majority in the next House.

While forecasts are not facts and nothing is so uncertain as an election, it is hardly likely that the electorate generally will change with sufficient rapidity to materially affect the outlook when the votes are counted.

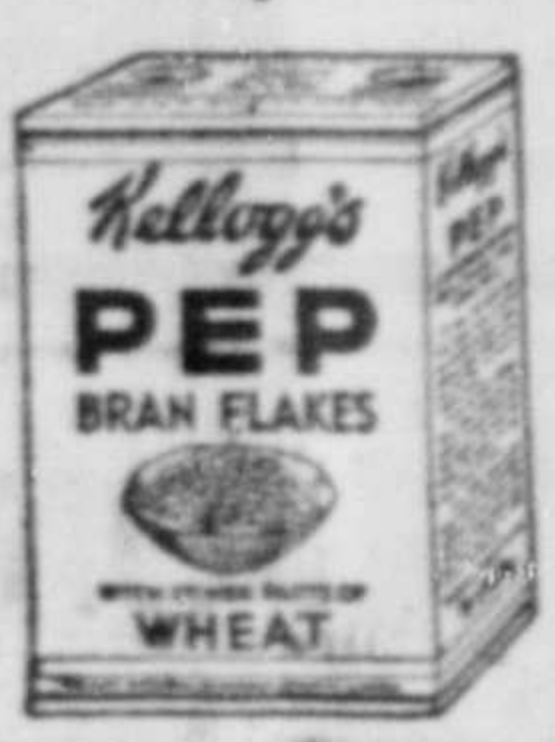

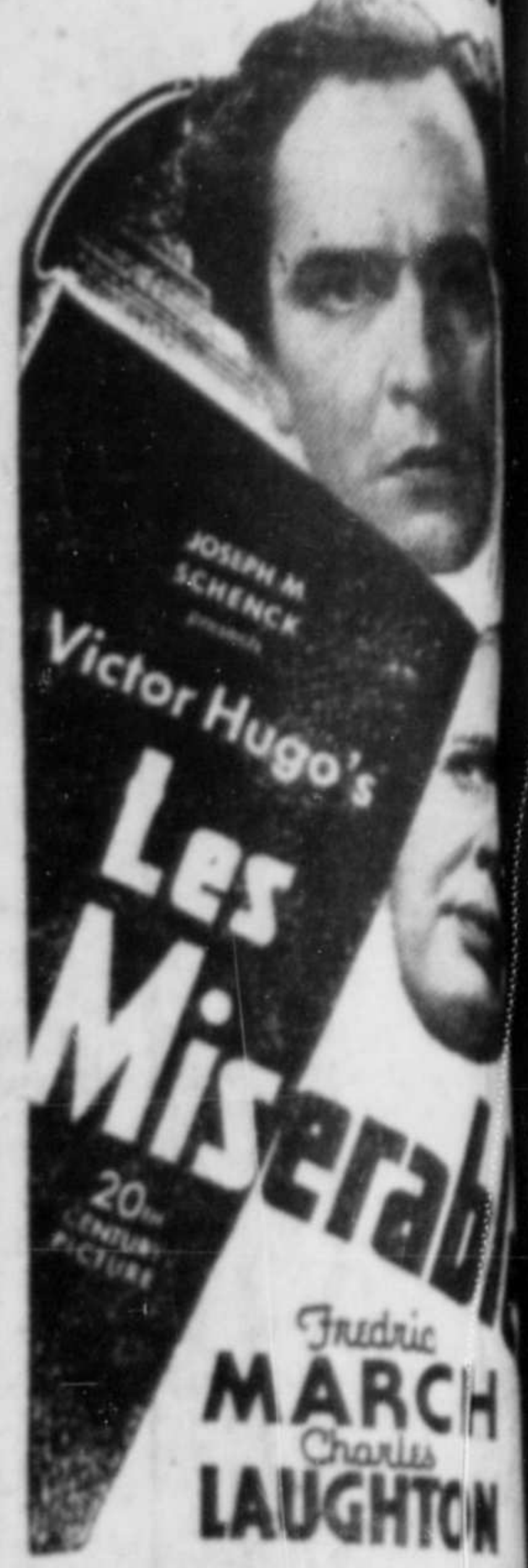

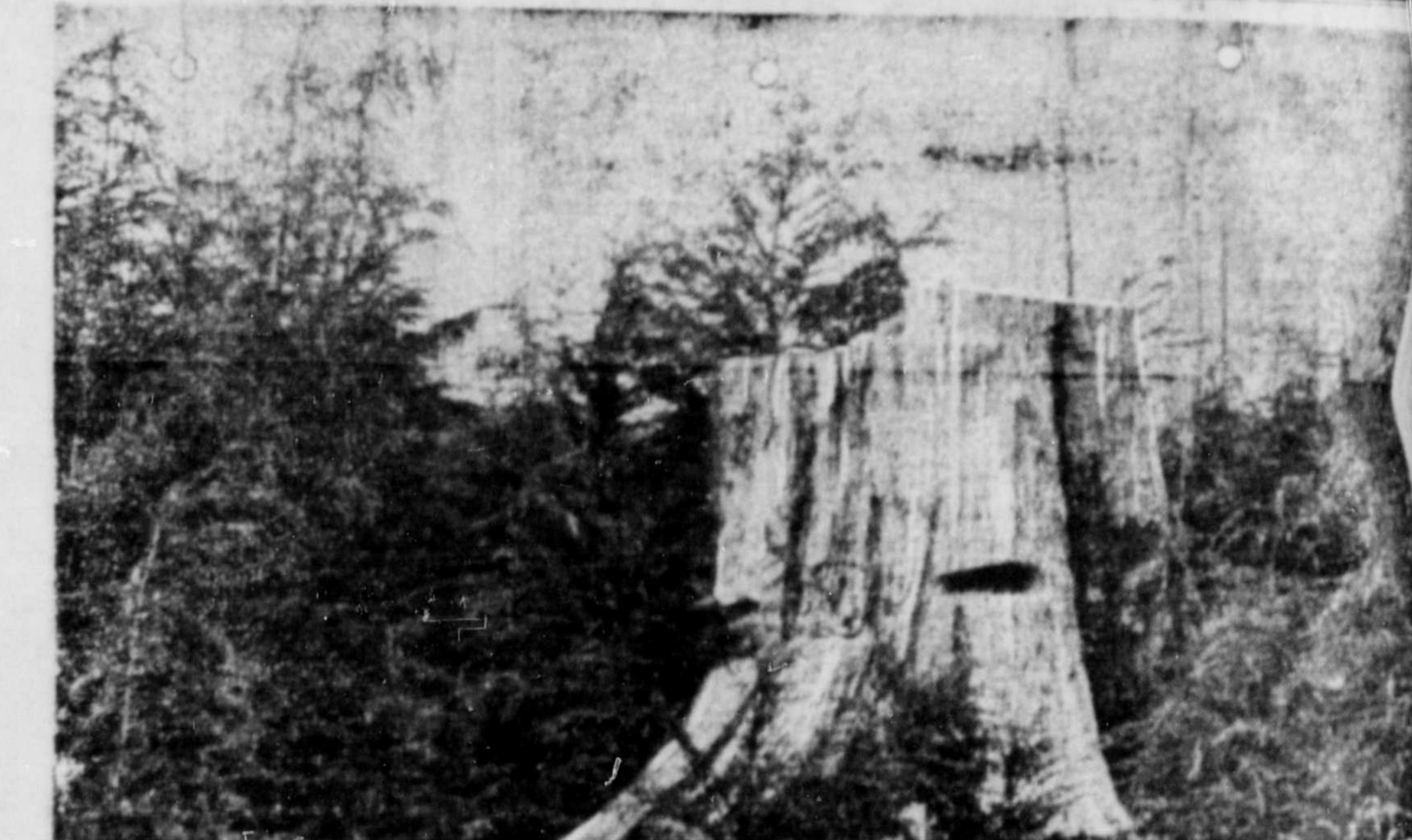
