

### NEW SPEED MARK MADE

Howard Hughes, Young Los Angeles Pilot, Drives Plane at 353 Miles Per Hour

LOS ANGELES, September 14 -After having set up a new airplane speed record of 352 miles per hour on Thursday, Howard Hughes, young Los Angeles pilot, topped the mark again yesterday by attaining an official speed of 365 miles per hour and then made a forced land ing in a beet field when his fuel line blocked, the propeller being bent but the machine sustaining only silght damage.
