NEW SPEED MARK MADE

Howard Hughes, Young Los Angeles Pilot, Drives Plane at 353 Miles Per Hour

LOS ANGELES, September 14.—After having set up a new airplane speed record of 352 miles per hour on Thursday, Howard Hughes, young Los Angeles pilot, topped the mark again yesterday by attaining an official speed of 365 miles per hour and then made a forced landing in a beet field when his fuel line blocked, the propeller being bent but the machine sustaining only slight damage. Hughes is confident that he will be able to drive the plane 365 miles per hour and will make further flights with that end in view.

The former official record was 304.98 miles per hour made by the late Jimmy Weddell.

With Nations Calling His "Bluff" Mussolini Expected to Back Down; Campaign Was Not Unsuccessful

NOT WEAKENING YET

ROME, Sept. 14. (CP)—The Italian cabinet, meeting with Premier Benito Mussolini, who holds eight cabinet portfolios himself, refused today to accept any compromise solution of Italy's quarrel with Ethiopia. Mussolini stated that military preparations were proceeding with even greater intensity and "we are able to answer any threat," he declared.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—With virtually the whole world lining up against him, opinion was expressed by observers of international affairs here last night that Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy might soon back down from his "huge bluff" in regard to Ethiopia. He may continue his warlike gestures until he is given the opportunity to gracefully withdraw but it is considered hardly likely now that he would actually embark upon a campaign of military aggression in the face of such united opposition as is developing and which crystallized this week in the announcement that Great Britain, France and Russia would unreservedly back up the League of Nations

sanctions in the event of a conflict in East Africa, in other words "calling Il Duce's bluff."

But to say that the "bluff" was unsuccessful would not be stating a fact, it is felt. Already Mussolini has been given assurance of getting a substantial slice of border territory from Ethiopia as well as concessions giving it virtual economic control of the whole country.

Mussolini is scheduled to meet his cabinet in Rome today and much may be decided at that time as to the future policy of Italy in regard to the crisis.

The British government protested to Italy today concerning alleged anti-British propaganda broadcast from the Italian radio station at Bari, containing the alleged statement: "All the world knows Italian colonial action is blessed by God. All the world knows the rest of Islam is suffering under British rule in Egypt and Palestine."

Canada Backs Sanctions GENEVA, Sept. 14. (CP)—Can-

ada and Soviet Russia joined the rally around the League of Nations covenant on the bitter Italo-Ethiopian quarrel today.

G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to London, told the Assembly of the League that Canada cannot agree that any member of the League is warranted in resorting to war to enforce its claims.

Maxim Litvinoff, commissar of foreign affairs, declared that Russia welcomed Sir Samuel Hoare's speech, adding that if all efforts at conciliation fail, his delegation will pass its judgment with "impartiality and also with courage."

Jubilee Ward At Hospital Ready

Fine Furnishings Installed Yesterday Afternoon at Cost Of Over \$200

Furniture was yesterday afternoon moved into the private ward in the Prince Rupert General Hospital which will be known as the "1935 King George Silver Jubilee Ward." The furniture, purchased by the Silver Jubilee celebration committee at a cost of upwards of \$225 out of the proceeds of the celebration here last June, is of the latest type and design and the room, which was inspected by the hospital board last night, presents a very attractive appearance. The furnishings include hospital bed of the latest type complete with all fittings, dresser, two chairs, over-bed table and night table. On motion of Frank Dibb, seconded by W. M. Brown, the hospital board passed a vote of thanks to the celebration committee.

Operators of Ships To Australia From Pacific Coast Seek Protection

May Have to Quit Running Vessels Unless Some Defence Is Afforded From State-Aided Foreign Competition

LONDON, Sept. 14. (CP)—Unless some defence is afforded British passenger and mail service against state-aided foreign competition, the line operated by the Union Steamship Co. of New Zealand between San Francisco and Australia may be abandoned, it is announced here. It was also reported that the same threat applied to the important British link between Vancouver and Australia.

Legality of Hotel Register Signed In Chinese Questioned

Whether or not a rooming house register recorded in Chinese can legally be considered a hotel register and the guest signing in Chinese a legally registered guest is the point that comes up in an appeal that has been taken into County Court by the city police.

Recently Charlie Ki, Chinese, was charged in city police court with having liquor in a room when he was not registered as a guest. The charge was dismissed by Magistrate McClymont on the grounds that Ki had signed a Chinese register. The crown, in appealing, contends that Ki was not a legally registered guest.

Date for the hearing of the appeal has not yet been set. T. W. Brown is acting as counsel for the crown.

Health Insurance Under Discussion

Members of Local Hospital Board Air Views on Some Aspects Of Proposed Legislation

Following the recent hearing on the subject of state health insurance conducted by E. W. Neel, the hospital board, at its meeting last night, discussed the matter, several of the members of the board airing their views.

The general opinion of the board seemed to be that the weakness of proposed state health insurance legislation rested in the suggested exemptions. It was felt that, if there was to be effective state health insurance, provision should be made to cover all salaried people and wage earners. Frank Dibb thought the three percent assessment too high. Other members of the board took the view that the people should be prepared to pay for a good thing.

Further discussion was deferred until the recommendations of the British Columbia Hospitals Association are available as a guide to the board.

R. P. Wilmot, auditor for the Liquor Control Board of British Columbia from Victoria, who is on one of his periodical tours of this district on official business, called last night on the Prince Rupert for Stewart whence he expects to return this evening on the same vessel.

The appeal of G. H. E. Fisher in County Court yesterday, order being made that the buildings should be removed within five weeks. T. W. Brown acted as counsel for the crown, witnesses for which were Fire Chief J. R. Morrison, Assistant Fire Marshal W. A. Oswald, City Engineer F. N. Good and Sergeant G. H. Greenwood, chief of police. Mr. Munro conducted his own case.

DIFFERENCES OVER PUBLIC WORKS IN STATES SETTLED

NEW YORK, September 14.—Differences between Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes and Public Works Administrator Harry Hopkins over the disposition of the balance of work relief funds, which threatened to disrupt the harmony of the cabinet, were believed to have been smoothed out yesterday as a result of a conference at the summer White House at Hyde Park between President Roosevelt and Hopkins. A compromise, was reported, had been reached regarding the allocation of the funds which will be used in January, February and March of next year.

FRANCE AND THE COVENANT

France has come out strong along with Britain for the covenant of the League of Nations along with Russia and most of the smaller nations. And in the meantime preparations for war are proceeding apace.

It will be remembered that the two nations which have been particularly friendly with Italy have been Russia and Great Britain. Doubtless they still are friendly but they object to Italy playing fast and loose with her solemn covenants just to satisfy the whim of a dictator. The League of Nations is more important than friendships.

SOCIAL CREDIT NEXT

It is announced that social credit candidates will be nominated in this province wherever the other candidates do not endorse the principle of a national dividend. As it is now only a month to election day the social credit people will have to move rapidly.

It is possible that a social credit candidate would get a good deal of support in Prince Rupert. There are still a great many who could use a national dividend, paid monthly, and who would be willing to support a candidate making promises, even if the promises could not be fulfilled. The entry of a social credit candidate might cause quite a flurry among the local political doves.

NO ADVANCEMENT

Miss E. M. Earl in an address to the Rotary Club on Thursday told of parts of the Orient where she visited people who were carrying on just as they did two thousand years ago. They have been stagnating, which is another word for retrogression.

Compare that spirit with the tendencies shown in Canada of late where the people, finding the politicians hopelessly tied and bound by ancient customs and methods, have broken away and taken up such plans as that espoused by Premier Aberhart of Alberta. Western Canada cannot at any rate be said to be in a political rut.

When the St. Lou's Cardinals go searching for a replacement for their pitching department, they may turn to Huntington, West Virginia of the Middle Atlantic League and decide upon a natural-born right-hander who has turned southpaw. He is 21-year old Mike Martynik, ace of the mound staff with the Red Birds, a Cardinal farm club. This young Ukrainian from Woonsocket, R.I., came into the world as a right-hander, but at the age of 13 he fell and broke his "money" arm. While the right was in a cast, he started throwing from the port side and now, perhaps by accident, he is a star left-hand hurler.

Brown reported to the hospital board at its meeting last night that Robert Yates, Seventh Avenue West was donating a number of rock plants for use in the hospital gardens. The plants are being delivered to the hospital today and will be immediately put in. The regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was held last night. Those present were S. D. Macdonald, chairman, Frank Dibb, G. V. Wilkinson and W. M. Brown, directors; H. W. Birch, managing secretary, and Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent. In spite of the closing down to fishing on September 6 of Area No. 2, in which the majority of the vessels of the Prince Rupert halibut fleet operate, quite a number of the boats are still out and will be throughout the month of September with the prospect of carrying on in the various activities until well on into the fall.

The vessels of the Prince Rupert fleet continuing to fish halibut in the more remote Area No. 3 are Signal, Capt. Paddy Ivarson; Prosperity A., Capt. A. C. Christiansen; Margaret I., Capt. George Fritz; Pair of Jacks, Capt. Axel Peterson; Melville, Capt. John Ivarson; Lysekil, Capt. Al Woie; Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnett; Takla, Capt. Chris Parkvold; Sea Maid, Capt. Henry Doiron; Clipper II, Capt. Alf Jacobsen, and Covenant, Capt. Hans Underdahl.

Turning to black cod fishing for either the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. or the Atlin Fisheries following the cessation of halibut fishing in Area No. 2, are the Tramp, Capt. Sam Hougan; Teeny Milly, Capt. George Cook; Relief, Capt. Merrill Sollows; Wave, Capt. Winnie Pierce; Gony, Capt. Olof Andreason; Vera Beatrice, Capt. J. D. Thurber; Edward Lipsett, Capt. Olof Skog; Atlin, Capt. William Bussey; Viking I, Capt. Harold Enockson; White Hope, Capt. Pete Thompson; Toodie, Capt. Pete Wold; J. R., Capt. J. P. Reid. The black cod fishing may last for the better part of a month, it is expected.

The Balsac, Capt. John Orvik, is seining for chum salmon on the Queen Charlotte Islands while the Kalen, Capt. Olof Stegavik; Alken, Capt. Andrew Hanson, and Domino II are trolling on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The Southend, Capt. J. Ellertsen; Mother II, Capt. Hans Antonson; Morris H., Capt. Carl Giske, and Embla, Capt. Alfred Anderson, are engaged in salmon packing charters from the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Canning Chums

Inverness and Claxton salmon canneries on the Skeena River are still in full operation with the prospect of continuing until at least the end of the month providing the fish supply holds out. During the past week or so they have been engaged principally in packing chums taken by a number of seiners around Banks and other coast islands. Cohoes and pinks are reported to be on their way in goodly numbers from the Queen Charlotte Islands and are expected to reach the mainland in about a week. There is also a big run of chums on the Queen Charlotte Islands, the fish going to the Laagoon Bay cannery on the Islands, the B. C. Packers at Namu and salteries at Jeoway and Namu.

Removal is now in progress of one of the well known landmarks of the Prince Rupert waterfront in the old Cow Bay barber shop, cigar and candy store and taxi stand which for years has been operated by P. Bruno. Pete having vacated and moved to Sixth Avenue West near Fulton Street, the building is being torn down by Angus Gillis and is now pretty well razed.

Pilot Jack McConnachie was here Thursday afternoon with his Eastman flying boat to refuel while on his way from Anyox to Ocean Falls, accompanied by his wife and mechanic. He was back here again at 4:45 yesterday afternoon on his way to Anyox. With the closing down of Anyox by the Grabby Co., Pilot McConnachie, who has been carrying on a commercial air service out of there for the past few years, will be moving from there but he has not yet decided definitely as to where he will make his future base.

Some mystery attached itself to the presence here on Wednesday of this week of a party of four men from Vancouver who arrived aboard the Princess Louise from the south with a large load of supplies, leaving soon aboard a chartered boat. They are believed to be mining men and the Queen Charlotte Islands was understood to be the destination of the party, the

leader of which was A. R. Berry.

C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, is due back in port at 8 o'clock this evening from Stewart and will sail at 10:30 p.m., following the arrival of the train from the east, for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. The Prince Rupert arrived yesterday morning at 10 o'clock from the south, sailing at 10 o'clock last night for Stewart.

A notice to mariners issued by the Department of Marine announces that an uncharted rock has been found off Capt. St. James, Queen Charlotte Islands, the position being latitude N. 51 degrees, 51' 10" and longitude W. 130 degrees, 55' 36". The depth of the rock is six feet and there is a heavy rip tide, breaking in moderate swells. The same notice to mariners also announces the correct position of the Cape St. James light as N. 51 degrees, 56' 10" and longitude W. 131 degrees, 0' 52".

Canadian Landings Heavy

With many of the smaller boats ending their final catches of the season following the closing of Area No. 2 to fishing for the year, landings of Canadian halibut were heavy at Prince Rupert during the week ending yesterday at a total of 305,000 pounds, bringing the total of Canadian landings for the season to date up to 4,583,850 pounds as compared with 5,570,265 pounds at a similar date last year. American landings for the week totalled 182,000 pounds, bringing the total for the season up to 4,722,300 pounds in comparison with 5,568,600 pounds last year. The grand total of landings for this season up to yesterday was 9,305,150 pounds as against 12,138,865 pounds up to the corresponding date a year ago. Prices during the week in question remained at a fair level. The top bid of the week for Canadian fish was 6.7c and 6c received by the Clipper II for 10,000 pounds and the low 5.5c and 6c which the Cape Spear was paid for 5,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the week was 9.1c and 5.5c which the Explorer was paid for 32,000 pounds and the low 6.8c and 5.5c received by the Atlantic for 30,000 pounds.

Delayed by loading of canned salmon at points along the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 5:45 this morning from the south and sailed a couple of hours later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

No boats being in with catches, there was no sale of halibut on the local fish exchange this morning.

The Canadian National Railway's car barge, having on board a box car containing a twenty-ton tractor which is being shipped from Vancouver to Graham Island for use as a power plant in connection with the development of black sands for their gold content, was

moved by the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Pachena from the ferry slip to the dry dock this morning. The big winch at the dry dock will be used in lifting the tractor from the car barge to a scow on which it will be taken to Massett by the Armour Salvage Co.'s new towboat Algie which, with the scow, is due from Vancouver this week-end with Capt. Paul Armour in charge.

Plane From Atlin

A Stinson seaplane from Atlin, piloted by L. F. Barr and with J. W. Rice, as mechanic and E. Wheatley and son as passengers, arrived here at 6:30 last evening from the north and continued a southward flight to Vancouver, leaving at 11 o'clock this morning. During the night, the plane, which moored at a local oil company wharf, was rammed by a boat and slight damage done which required an hour or so to repair before she could take off.

Capt. Sinclair (Red) Pierce, well known local halibut boat owner, left on last evening's train for Sable River, N.S., where he will spend the winter, returning in the spring with Mrs. Pierce and family who left for the Maritimes several weeks ago.
