Last week in closing the debate on the budget Premier T. D. Pattullo emphasized that there must be a new deal for the province from Ottawa and that, as soon as the policy of the federal government towards the province was changed, the provincial government would be in a position to relieve the municipalities of some of their bur-

While disclaiming that he was suggesting secession, the Premier was very emphatic in regard to the position of British Columbia. He said:

"So far as this province is concerned, it cannot continue under a policy which, through tariff and freight rates, Presbyterian lea strangles its economic welfare, nor can we permit unchallenged the invasion of provincial sources of revenue and there must be a redefinition of authority in respect to revenue resources."

Mr. Pattullo also refers to the fact that, while this province would like to do many things, the provincial government, is not a sovereign power, in that its acts are liable to be vetoed by the Dominion government. 


