ASKS SUPPORT OF REARMAMENT PLAN

National Government Basing Its Appeal To People on This Move

Important Statement of Policy Made by Premier Baldwin—Is Meant as Safeguard to Peace Rather Than For Selfish Ends

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told Parliament today that he would appeal to the people for support of a rearmament program in the general election on November 14. The Premier added that it seemed to him the wisest thing to do was to get the election over with. The new House will meet November 26 to elect a speaker and swear in members.

The rearmament plan is a strengthening of offensive services within the framework of the League of Nations for the sale of international peace and not for selfish ends," declared Premier Baldwin.

Rice Grown On Lake Superior

First Planted by Hunters To Draw Ducks—Crop Increasing Annually

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Oct. 23: (CP)—Rice, always regarded as a staple of China and Japan, is now being successfully grown in Western Canada.

Along the shores of Lake Superior and other small lakes nearby an ever-growing harvest is being gathered annually. Originally used to draw ducks closer to hunters, a considerable part of the annual crop is now used by Indians for food and as a feed for domestic animals.

Eight years ago a half acre was planted on the shores of Cranberry Lake. Today the rice covers almost 500 acres. Other districts which have made the experiment report small but steadily increasing returns. The best example of natural growth is now at White fish Lake. It covers the lake for the most part and thousands of ducks are drawn to it during the shooting season.

HUNDREDS KILLED AS ARSENAL BLOWS UP

SHANGHAI, Oct. 23:—Hundreds of persons are believed to have been killed and many homes destroyed when a huge store of explosives and ammunition, which was stored at Lanchow, Kansu Province, blew up today. The blast rocked the city like an earthquake.

Society Aviatrix Recovering From Crash Injuries

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23:—Ruth Nicholls, society aviatrix, was believed last night to be well on the road to recovery from injuries sustained Sunday in her latest plane crash. Her pilot was killed.

TO DEFER ELECTIONS

Voting in Omineca and Vancouver-Burrard Will Not Take Place in Immediate Future

VICTORIA, Oct. 23: (CP)—By-elections in Omineca and Vancouver-Burrard will not be held in the immediate future, Premier T. D. Pattullo said in a public address here last night.

While it had been the intention to hold the by-elections in time for the newly-elected members to take their seats in the Legislature next session, Premier Pattullo explained that there were fourteen thousand more voters on the Dominion list in Vancouver-Burrard than on the provincial list and, unless a court of revision sat first, an immediate by-election would disenfranchise thousands of voters.

Kingsford-Smith On Long Flight

Famous British Airman Attempting Record Breaking Trip To Australia

LONDON, Oct. 23:—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, noted trans-Pacific flier, took off from Croydon early today on a projected record breaking flight to Australia. He arrived at Marseilles at noon and immediately started for Bagdad, where he is expected to arrive by nightfall.

CANADA IS NOW NAMED

Succeeds Germany on International Labor Body in Geneva

GENEVA, Oct. 23: (CP)—Canada was unanimously elected to the governing body of the International Labor Office today in succession to Germany. Dr. Walter Riddell of Canada may be chosen chairman of the body on Thursday.

Canada Now Has Winter Harvest

Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture Gathers Mineral Salt For Saline Properties

WATROUS, Sask., Oct. 23: (CP)—A Canadian harvest that takes place not in the fall, but in mid-December, with the thermometer sometimes hovering around 20 below, is annually conducted here by the Saskatchewan department of natural resources.

Scene of the operations is Little Manitou Lake, near here, and the crop not Canadian wheat, but mineral salts. The harvesters are employees of the department, and the harvest must be completed within ten days, following "freeze up."

The tiny crystals of mineral salt are gathered up by the operators with specially made shovels and stored in the government warehouse at Watrous. The medicinal qualities of the salts are becoming widely recognized. Every year the harvest increases, the men wearing winter clothing and rubber boots. Little Manitou Lake is rapidly becoming one of Saskatchewan's most important natural resources.

Helena Shaken By More Earthquakes

Tremors Continue in Montana City, 364 Having Been Recorded Up to Last Night

HELENA, Mon., Oct. 23:—Two more sharp earthquake shocks felt here last evening brought the total number of tremors so far in the present series of disturbances to 364. Business is gradually returning to normal following the most severe shock last Friday night which did heavy damage in the city. Continued cold weather adds to the discomfort of the sufferers.

GESTURE OF PEACE

Italy to Withdraw Troops From Libya as Move to Piacate Great Britain

PARIS, Oct. 23:—Members of the Chamber of Deputies finance committee said today that Premier Laval had informed them that Italy intends to withdraw part of her troops from Libya as a gesture toward better understanding with Great Britain.

Hitherto Britain has insisted that recent Italian reinforcements in Libya were among reasons for necessitating the present large British fleet in the Mediterranean.

SMELTERS TO TAKE POWER FROM ANYOX TO BIG MISSOURI

On their way to Anyox where they will spend several weeks taking a complete inventory of the equipment left at the plant there following the withdrawal of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co. two engineers of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. from Trail are here today aboard the steamer Prince George bound north. While an official announcement is still lacking, events still indicate that, as reported in this paper on several occasions of late, Smelters are going ahead with their plan to take over Anyox. It is understood that the intention of the new owners is to operate a power plant to supply power to the Big Missouri mine in the Portland Canal district, running a transmission line across the mountain. A customs smelter may also be put in, it is said. A. Ewing and R. Hawkes are the two Smelters representatives here today on the way north.

BIG STORM FELT HERE

One of Most Severe and Steady Gales in Years—Children Have Narrow Escape in Collapse of Chimney

Waterfront Suffers

Several Boats Swept Across Harbor as Well as Machine Shop on Float

Collapsed chimneys, stove-in windows in downtown stores and twellings in the residential section, down-down signs, damaged fences and many casualties along the waterfront were to be observed in Prince Rupert as one of the longest and most severe gales the city has experienced in years was blowing itself out this morning. Many people turned out today after a sleepless night, relieved that the elements were at last abating.

For almost twenty-four hours there was an average wind velocity of between fifty and sixty miles per hour with numerous lengthy gusts of over seventy miles an hour. There was generous but not torrential rainfall.

A brick chimney collapsed at the residence of F. M. Davis, 239 Fourth Avenue West, during the night and went right through the roof of the next door house of J. A. Barry, two small children in their beds having narrow escapes but being unhurt. The chimney plunged through the roof into the children's room and fell between their beds. There was a large hole made in the roof and the house had to be temporarily abandoned.

A big show window in the store of the Northern B. C. Power Co. in the Besner Block was blown in, plate glass being scattered for half a block.

Damage on Waterfront

There was rather extensive damage on the waterfront. Staveley J. Mellor of the Digby Island wireless station, while taking his gasboat from the Digby Island float to Dodge Cove last evening for a safer anchorage, lost a skiff which was blown practically out of the water and capsized, later breaking adrift.

Electric power and telephone services suffered from some interference, many phones being out of commission this morning.

During the height of the gale a float at Cow Bay, occupied by the Cow Bay Machine Works owned by H. Clavring, broke away from its moorings and was swept across the harbor together with some fishing boats moored alongside. The Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly went across the harbor this morning to pick the outfit up, returning at noon with it and the Monteith and Corbett launch. Three small fishing boats are reported sunk.

The trolling boat Allons was blown across the harbor but was salvaged by the Daly with little, if any, damage.

City sidewalks suffered some damage, part of one on Fifth Avenue West near Annunciation School being lifted into the street.

For a while some fears were entertained that fire might break out around the coal and lumber yard of Albert & McCaffery and the cold storage plant of the Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage Ltd. on (Continued on page three)

It is the second New England town in which Miss Rand has been refused permission to dance, Providence, R.I., last week having been the first.

Famous American General is Dying

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23:—Lieut. General Hunter Liggett, one of the best known United States Army commanders in France during the Great War, who has been ill for several months, was removed to hospital here yesterday. He is not expected to live.

Gold Rush Relics Still in Service

Gold Scales Included in Recent Deal, Dated 1858, Used in Cariboo Rush Days

QUESNEL, Oct. 23: (CP)—Two sets of gold scales used during the Cariboo gold rush days were included in the transfer of the Veith and Borland ranch and Cariboo Lake Lodge at Keithley Creek recently.

The larger of the two sets was used in the bank at Barkerville and later packed over the trail to Keithley. The date stamped on the weights of the smaller set shows they were made in 1858.

LORD CARSON

Lord Carson, better known to most people as Sir Edward Carson, goes down in history as the man who kept Ulster from becoming part of the Irish Free State. An Irishman with an Irish brogue, this great British barrister defied the British Liberals who proposed to have all Ireland governed from Dublin. He raised an Ulster army and, in January 1912, two years before the Great War, twenty thousand of his countrymen were reviewed by him as they marched past. They were an illegal organization but their presence had the effect of changing the history and geography of Ireland.

When Sir Edward was made first lord of the admiralty under Lloyd George a year before the war closed, he called the head navy officers together and addressed them, remarking: "I have one qualification for the position I have just taken. I am absolutely at sea."

But although Sir Edward for a time served under Lloyd George, he was always a Conservative and always opposed the granting of self-government to Ireland. He is known as one of the greatest barristers England or Ireland ever had and in Parliament he fought unyieldingly for what he believed was right.

BANKING IN CANADA

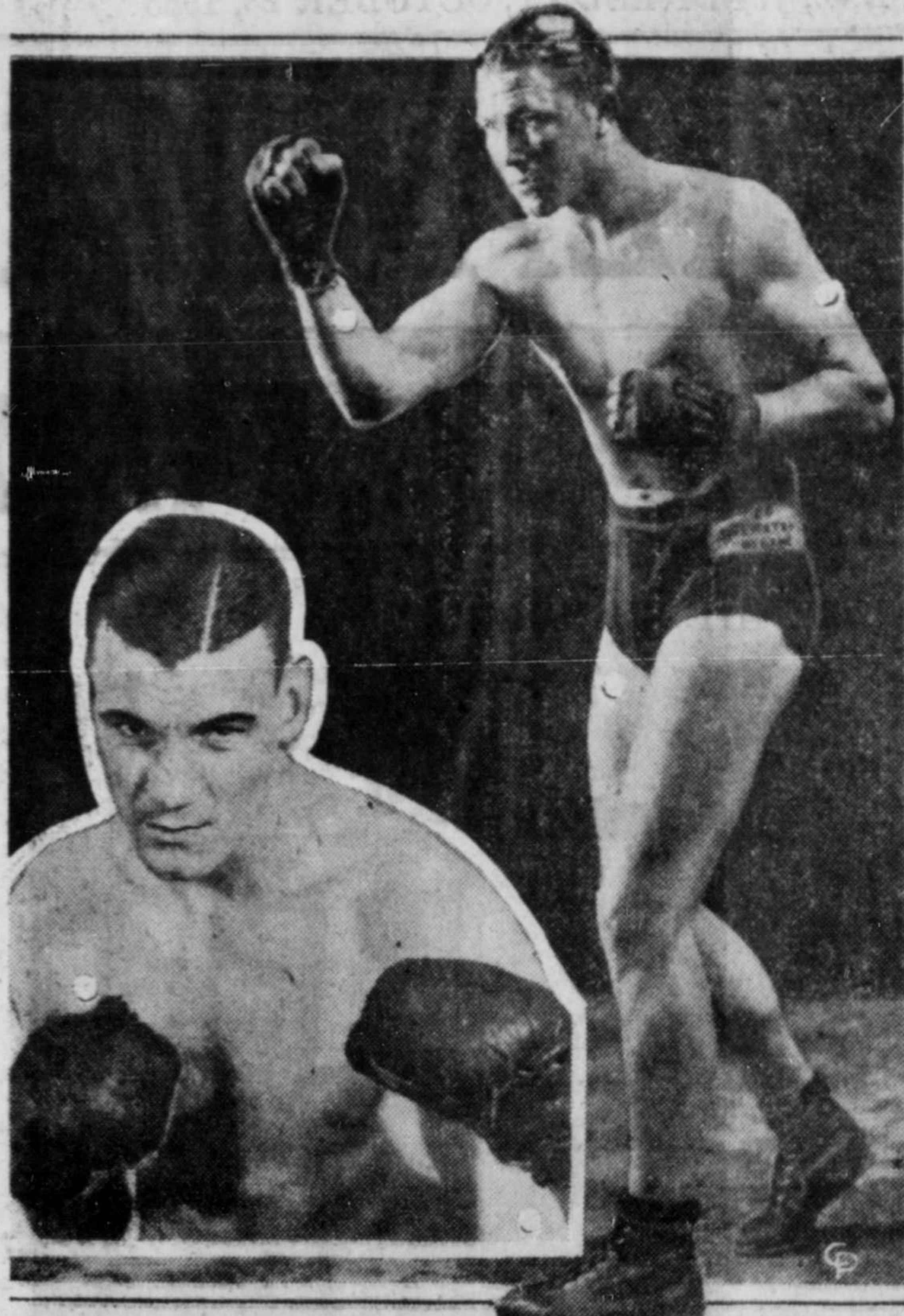
The fact that the banks have a monopoly of the banking business in Canada brings down upon them much criticism, especially by those who are unfortunate enough not to need a bank and by those of us who have been refused loans. Yet we have to acknowledge that it has been a great thing for Canada not to have had a bank failure at a time when thousands of similar institutions in the United States failed ruining hundreds of thousands of depositors.

It has been proposed by one of the newer political parties that banks should be taken over and operated by the state. Knowing the red tape methods of government institutions and the hard and fast rules governing their operations we must say we would rather take our chance on being turned down by a private bank than by a government bank.

With a national instead of a private central bank having a monopoly of the right to issue currency there should be ample protection to the people of Canada.

SPORT CHAT

Early play of the New Zealand team touring the British Isles indicates the famous exponents of the rugged code will experience difficulty in measuring up to the high standard set by their predecessors in the tours of 1905-06 and 1924-25. Of the matches played in September, the All Blacks were victorious in the first four but fell before Swansea 11-3 in the fifth. Weakened by injuries and illness the men from "down under" put up a great scrap against the Welshmen but the brilliance of their three-quarters failed to compensate for the weakness of the forwards who were frequently beaten in the scrums.

The defeat was the first ever inflicted on a New Zealand side by a club team in the Old Country. In the 1905-06 tour the All Blacks demonstrated their overwhelming superiority by winning 32 out of 33 matches, piling up 868 points against 47. The one loss was suffered in an international game against Wales when their colors were lowered by a narrow margin after an exciting battle. Eleven years ago the second touring team did even better winning every match played and bagging 721 points against 112.

Four international matches are scheduled for the present tour. Scotland will oppose the New Zealanders at Edinburgh, November 23 and two weeks later the visitors will meet Ireland at Dublin. Wales and England are expected to provide the stiffest opposition. The match with the principality takes place at Cardiff, December 21 and that against England on the first Saturday in the New Year.

The All Blacks will return home by way of Canada and it is possible a few games will be played in British Columbia before the tourists embark for their journey across the Pacific Ocean. First introduced by a young Englishman, in 1868 rugby made great strides in the southern Dominion until, with the turn of the century, New Zealanders became as famous in the sport as their neighbors, the Australians, in the cricket world. Recently great celebrations were held at Nelson commemorating the birth of the game in the country.

Twenty-nine players, led by J. E. Manchester, famous forward, make up the team on tour this season. G. Gilbert is the only full-back included in the side. The other members are T. C. H. Oaughey, N. Ball, H. Brown, N. A. Mitchell, G. F. Hart, C. Oliver, three-quarter backs; J. R. Page, E. Tindill, D. Solomon, J. Griffiths, five-eighths; B. S. Sadler, M. M. N. Corner, half-backs; W. E. Hadley, J. Hore, R. King, T. Reid, J. E. Manchester, J. Best, R. McKenzie, H. F. McLean, A. Lambourne, D. Dalton, G. T. Adkins, W. Collins, J. G. Wynyard, F. Vorrath, A. Mahoney, J. Pepper, forwards.

While the All Blacks usually line up with a back division composed of three three-quarters, two five-eighths and one scrum-half, this formation is not always adhered to and is changed according to circumstances to the more orthodox arrangement of four three-quarters, and two halves. In their opening games the tourists won golden opinions for their work behind the scrum, with Page, Caughey and Oliver the star artists of jugglery. Forward, the New Zealanders have not shown up so well although they are a weighty lot and many stand over six feet in height. This weakness was most apparent against the Midland Counties at Coventry and against Swansea. Unlike their old country opponents who pack in the regular three-two-three style, the New Zealanders go down into the scrum in a three-four-one formation. Gilbert is a tower of strength at full-back and a great goal-kicker.

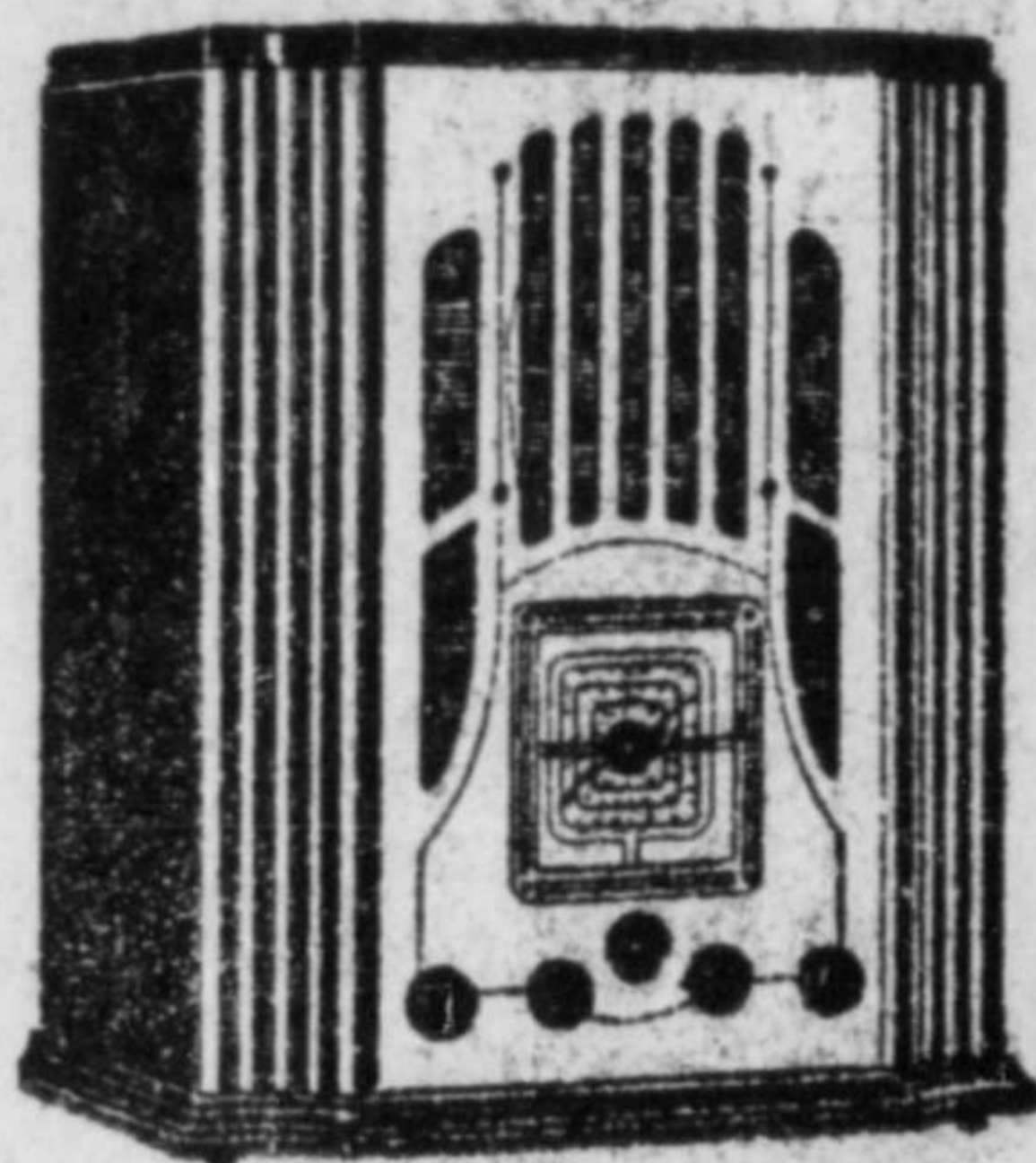

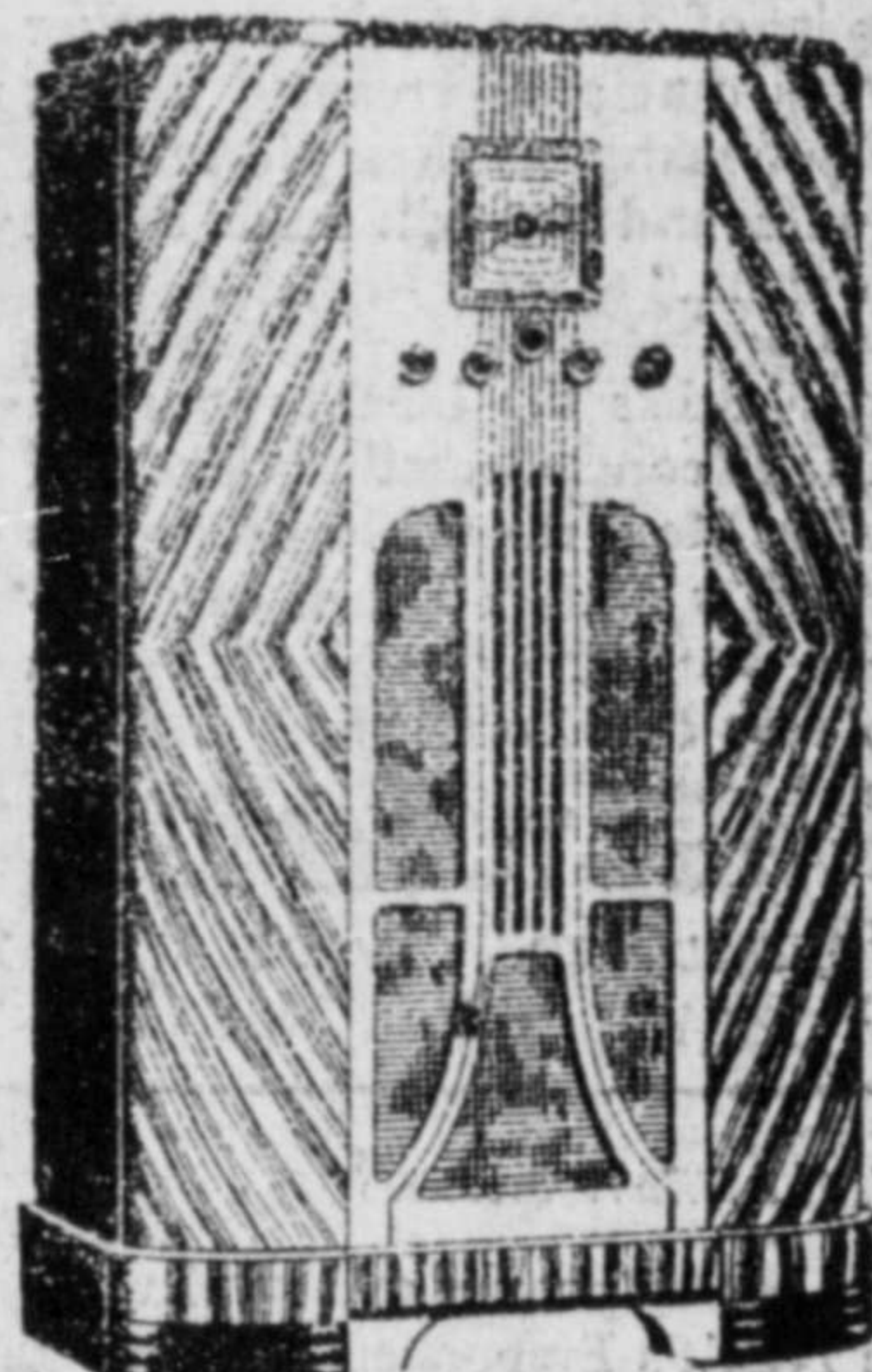

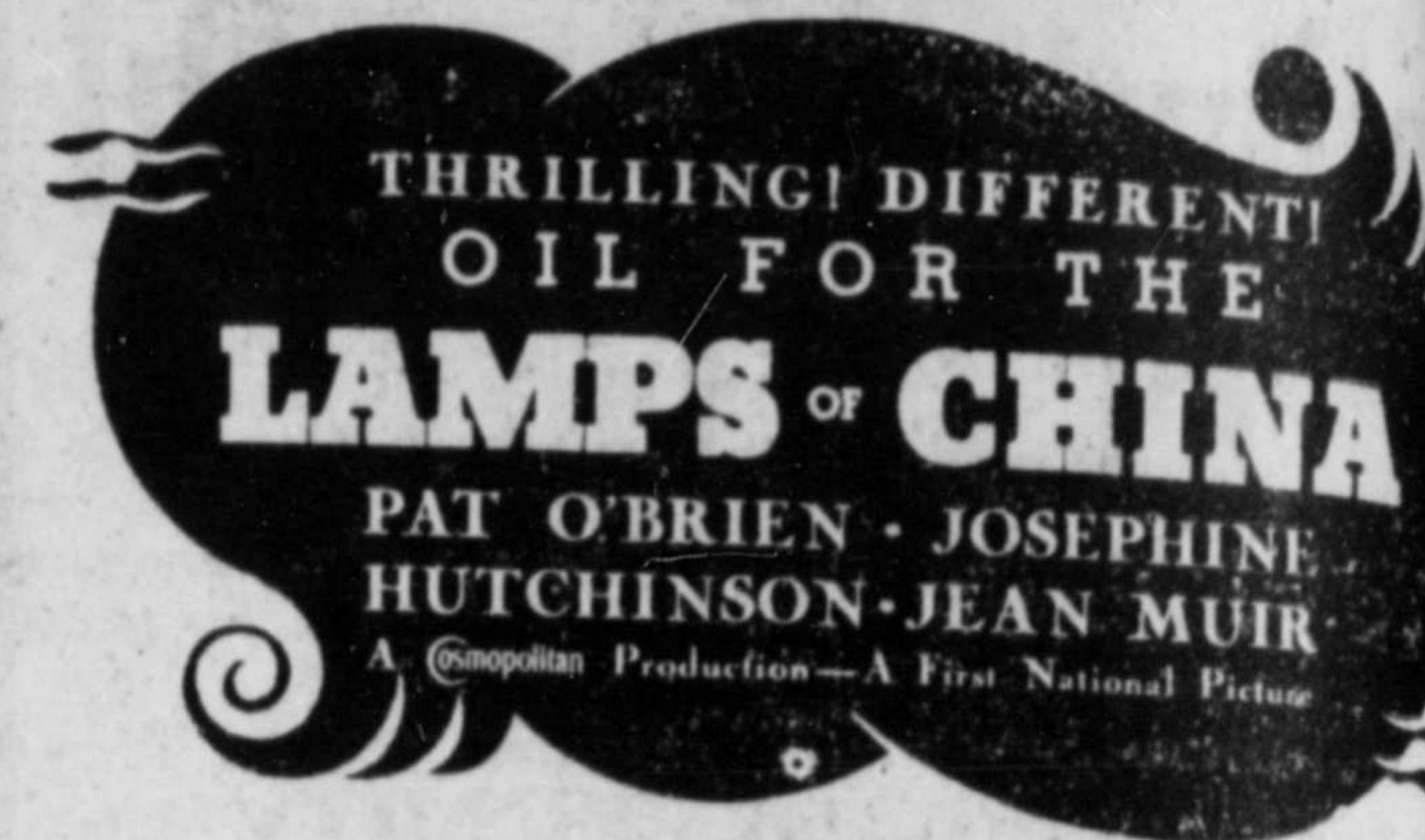
