There were no casualties as the totally wrecked vessel had been previously abandoned by eight officers, twenty-three members of the crew, seven passengers and four stowaways. The fire was still burning this morning while the fore-peak was high and dry on the reef. The stranding occurred as the vessel was steaming north from Seattle to Alaska about two hours after the turn of the high tide.

LAWRENCE OF ARABIA

WOOL, Dorsetshire, Eng., May 20: (CP)-Col. Thomas E. Lawrence, aged 46, famed as "Lawrence of Arabia" as a result of his activities in that country during and after the Great War, died on Sunday after 142 hours of unconsciousness following a motorcycle accident when he was injured as he swerved his vehicle to avoid striking a child in the road. He had recently completed ten years' service with the Royal Air Force with which he had started in the ranks. In view of his distinguished services for his country, there was a move yesterday to have Lawrence interred in Westminster Abbey with, the country's celebrated dead. His flag-draped remains lay last night in the village mortuary here. Lawrence's mother is at present in the upper Yangste River country in China.

### Strikers Move into City Museum; Given Reliet Until Today

Parades Through Departmental Stores and Streets For Six Hours and a Half-Thousand Men Jeer Mayor McGeer While Speaking in Church

VANCOUVER, May 20: (CP)-Relief camp strikers occupied the City Museum and paraded through department stores and downtown streets for six and a half hours Saturday and finally won from the city two days' relief allowance. Two special constables sustained minor injuries when they opposed the strikers as they entered Spencer's and Wodwards' stores. Very few police

About 250 men took possession of the museum on the top floor of the city library building at the corner of Main and Hastings Street in the afternoon and remained there until 8:30 at night when, after a long conference with a delegation, Mayor G. G. McGeer agreed to

grant them relief until today. In the main, the long demonstration was orderly although sometimes noisy. The men promised they would not damage the museum or its contents unless the police interfered but would not move until relief was granted. Food and coffee were hoisted to them from the sidewalk by sympathizers.

In a statement yesterday, Mayor McGeer said: "We are living in Vancouver from day to day, not knowing what the morrow may bring forth, but, as far as Ottawa is concerned, we seem to be a fornotten city."



The hearing lasted little more than an hour. E. T Applewhaite acted as counsel for the plaintiff while L. W. Patmore appeared for the defendant.


