JAP WAR LEADER IS ASSASSINATED

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT BACKS UP "WORK-STARVE" ORDER

Major General Magata Is Slain by Political Opponent in His Office

Head of Military Affairs Bureau of Tokyo War Ministry Dies by Sword—Another Officer Dangerously Wounded in Attempting to Protect Him

TOKYO, Japan, Aug. 12: (CP)—General Tetsula Nagata, head of the military affairs bureau of the Japanese war ministry, was assassinated today by Col. Aizawa, political opponent, who slashed Nagata repeatedly with a sword. Col. Mimi was dangerously wounded while endeavoring to protect Nagata. The attack occurred in General Nagata's office. Col. Aizawa was almost immediately taken into custody. His name was at first withheld but was later made public.

POLAND TO SHIP ARMS

Agrees to Assist Ethiopia in Event of War Breaking Out With Italy

LONDON, Aug. 12:—In defiance of protest of Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy, Poland announces that it is in readiness to join other nations in shipment of war materials to Ethiopia in the event of a conflict with Italy in East Africa.

ITALY BUYS BRAZIL BEEF

Will be Shipped to Soldiers in East Africa—Argentina Lost Order

ROME, Aug. 12:—The Italian government has placed orders in Brazil for large shipments of beef for use of troops in East Africa. The order was to have gone to Argentina but an agreement could not be reached on price.

Sikhs and Moslems Clash in Lahore

Religious Disorders in Indian City Results in 17 Being Injured, Some Fatally

LAHORE, India, Aug. 12:—Seventeen, of whom three may die, were wounded on Saturday in a violent clash here between Moslems and Sikhs arising out of the alleged desecration of a sacred shrine.

ANTHONY EDEN EXPECTS PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT

LONDON, Aug. 12:—Hopeful that the conference would be successful and that there would be no war between Italy and Ethiopia, Capt. Anthony Eden left today for Paris where preliminary discussions will be held preparatory to the conference opening Wednesday between representatives of Great Britain, France and Italy on the Italo-Ethiopian crisis.

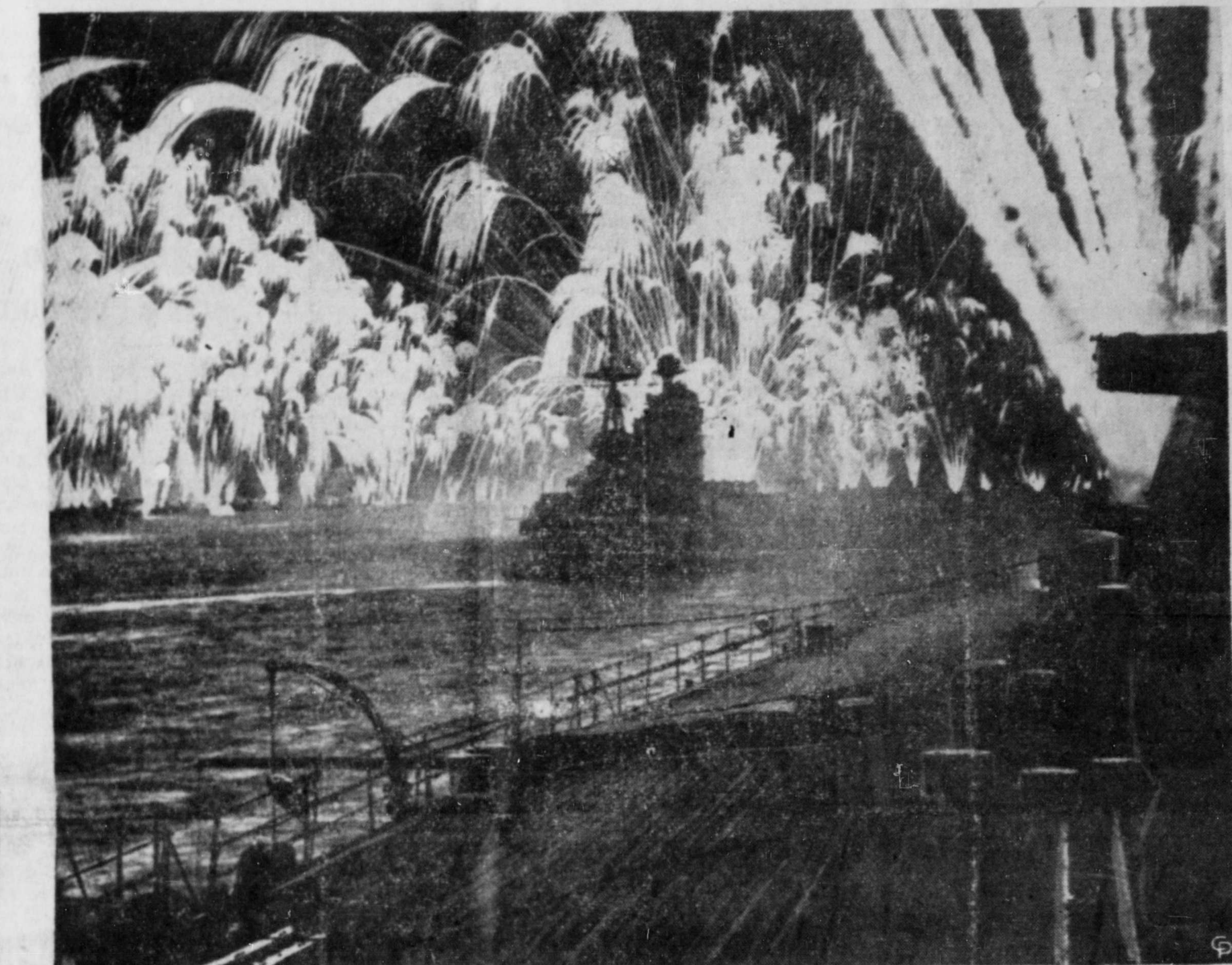
SEVEN MEMBERS OF ONE FAMILY ARE KILLED IN MONTREAL AUTO CRASH

The dead include Charles Talbot, his wife, sister, Mrs. George Genesee, and four brothers, two of them priests.

KYOTO, Japan, Aug. 12:—Twenty persons are dead and 70,000 homeless as a result of a cloudburst and floods in central Japan, extensive damage being done.

Trouble Week Looms In United States As Result of New Policy

Chief Executive Reiterates His Belief in Principle That Those Working on Relief Should Not Receive As Much as Those Employed in Private Industry

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 12:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt intends to stand by the policy which he enunciated at the end of the week that men working on relief shall not receive as high wages as those employed in private industry. This was announced last night following the President's return to the Capitol following a weekend fishing trip to Chesapeake Bay on which he was accompanied by Harry Hopkins, federal relief administrator, with whom he conferred. As those employed privately are the ones who have to be taxed to provide the funds to finance relief work, the chief executive believes that it is not fair that the relief workers should be paid as much. Meantime, a critical week is expected throughout the nation with widespread strikes looming in protest at the administration's "work or starve" decree. Some new strikes have already been called and reports of disorders and demonstrations in which blood was spilled have been received.

More Men Mobilized By Italy

ROME, August 12: (CP) — Orders distributed today indicate mobilization of Italian forces of half a million men for war manoeuvres in Northern Italy by August 24, bringing the total army strength now to a figure approaching one million men.

YOUNG MAN IS KILLED

Fatal Automobile Crash Yesterday Morning Near Burns Lake

BURNS LAKE, Aug. 12:—While returning to their homes early yesterday morning and apparently driving at a rapid speed, their car, a light roadster, turned over, killing Frank Artriss, a section hand, Decker Lake, and severely injuring Percy Wilkes, tie worker. The driver, Clifford Anderson, farmer of Palling, was unhurt but is being held for investigation. All three are under twenty-one years and single. The inquest is being held today.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 12:—Two men are being held here in connection with a reported plot to assassinate President Cardenas. Several others have been questioned.

BANFF, Aug. 12—George MacDonald of Toronto, aged 39, and John Russell, 29, whose home is believed to have been in England, were killed yesterday when lightning destroyed a tree under which they had sought shelter from an electrical storm. The two young men were unemployed.

NEW MARK IS SET UP

Pan American Clipper Lowers Time For California-Hawaii Flight

HONOLULU, Aug. 12:—The giant flying boat Pan American Clipper landed here Saturday afternoon from Alameda, Cal., having set up a new record by making the 3000-mile flight in 17 hours and nine minutes, fifty minutes better than the previous record. The Pan American Clipper proceeds from here today or tomorrow to Midway Island and thence to Wake Island.

Stevens Speaks In Fernie City Saturday Night

FERNIE, Aug. 12:—Hon. H. H. Stevens, leader of the new Reconstruction party, speaking in his own riding of East Kootenay here Saturday night, declared that a board should be set up to deal with relations between the big companies, primary producers, wage earners and consumers. From here Mr. Stevens proceeded to Alberta in continuation of a Canada-wide speaking tour in support of his new party. Speaking in Corbin the same night, Mr. Stevens declared he had resigned from the government rather than apologize to Sir Joseph Flavelle in respect to the investigations of the price spreads commission. He declared he would not have given an apology to any person.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Chances of the New York Yankees to capture the American League pennant faded further yesterday when they lost a double-header to the Philadelphia Athletics while the Detroit Tigers won their ninth straight victory by beating the Chicago White Sox and increased their margin of leadership to six full games.

SPORT CHAT

Commiserating with Prince Rupert's baseball players in their failure to annex the cup that was representative of the baseball championship of Northern and Central British Columbia, we cannot but express our admiration for the excellent sportsmanship displayed by the players in their games at Smithers during the Elks' flag-day.

But all these fine qualities had a cloud that was not as creditable to the town as the players were men of pride to that community.

Here we had a fine lot of young athletes ready to do their best to play some part in establishing the supremacy of the coast city. The mere fact that fates were against them does not matter. They played the game.

But Prince Rupert sent their players out looking like bowery tramps with their uniforms decorated with cheap advertising.

Clothes may not make the man, but in such cases they establish the spirit of a community. Those boys were ball players—darned good ones, too—and it displayed a poor sense of sportsmanship on the part of the Prince Rupert people to send them out as glorified sandwich men.

The Rupert boys would have tried no harder had they been arrayed in fine uniforms. They were boys of that kind. But it would certainly have been more complimentary to the sports spirit of that city had they sent their players out as representing that city's finest sense of sportsmanship rather than have them out on the ball field to advertise the fact that a good place to get a shot in the arm was at Gyp the Blood's or that Dick Smith sold good meat.

With their Rotary Club and their Junior Chamber of Commerce and other organizations, Prince Rupert might well spend some time in outfitting their baseball team in a manner commensurate with their great ability and in keeping with the fine sportsmanship the boys displayed.

Private English Syndicate Carrying Out Work On Large Area Of Placer Leases

VICTORIA, August 12.—H. E. Hunnings, who recently retired from the brokerage business here, has returned with George Kidd from Alaska and Atlin, where they went to inspect the work they are carrying on for a private English syndicate developing a big area of placer leases.

Bruce McMicking, son of Dr. A. E. McMicking, went north with Mr. Hunnings to join the crew at the property, and will remain there for the season.

After debarking from the Alaska boat, Mr. Hunnings and party flew in from Carcross by flying boat to the placer workings. They brought out a quantity of gold on their return trip. Mr. Hunnings said the associates in England, upon the recommendation of the operating officials in the north, had decided on a considerable enlargement of the present rate of production. This will be carried out by the installation of larger equipment.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Aug. 12.—Commenting upon reports that Prince Alexis Mdivani, her former husband, killed recently in an automobile accident in Spain, had left her a large estate the former Barbara Hutton, American heiress, told newspaper reporters yesterday that since she had secured her Reno divorce a few months ago from him, she had been paying Mdivani at the rate of £70,000 annually. Seasonal fruit is still the feature of the local retail market with special interest in preserving lines. Okanagan apricots have not started to arrive in any volume as yet but preserving supplies are expected next week. This fruit is scarce this year and the season will be short. Upriver table cherries, which have been of excellent quality this year, are about finished. Sour Terrace cherries have just made their appearance and are also of good quality. Supplies are scarce and housewives desirous of putting this variety up are being advised to order without delay.

There has been a short crop of raspberries around Terrace this year, growers there being able to only partially fill orders. New apples are now in—California gravensteins and British Columbia transparents. Okanagan onions are making an early appearance on the local market.

Three-quarter pound, 45 marshmallows, 1/4 cup sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup pineapple juice, 30 graham crackers, 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained.

Cut marshmallows in quarters. Add sweetened condensed milk and pineapple juice, blending thoroughly. Roll graham crackers to crumbs, add with crushed pineapple to first mixture. ## CHURCHILL IS OPENED

Canada's Northern Sea Port Opens To Navigation

CHURCHILL, Man. Aug. 12: (CP)—Trade winds blow down Hudson Strait again. Machinery hums in the big power house along the huge 1,800-foot wharf as Churchill starts its fifth season as a modern ocean port.

The north's newest harbor presents a scene of activity as dredges apply the finishing touches to waterfront spring cleaning. Inside the big elevator, conveyor belts are adjusted to release 2,500,000 bushels of wheat stored for outgoing cargoes following the opening of navigation on Saturday. Work of reconditioning the harbor is complete. Loose rock deposited in front of the dock has been removed and spring diggings loaded into hopper bottoms and towed out into the bay.

**Active Season Ahead**  
Port facilities of the three-century old trade route will be put to the test this year. In addition to outgoing shipments of wheat, cattle, lumber and flour, it is planned to distribute a greater amount of incoming merchandise. Officials state all vessels chartered are offering for westbound freight.

Down at the docks workmen are busily engaged rushing to completion a 180-foot extension to the 300-foot long warehouse. When completed the wharf will have facilities for coal storage, cattle, lumber and freight shed accommodation to take off the increased volume of traffic.

During the 1934 navigation season, a total of 4,040,877 bushels of wheat was shipped overseas in fifteen vessels. Other commodities, including flour, lumber and cattle represented the largest quantity of cargo. Europe-bound, through Hudson Strait, since test shipments were made in 1931.

## Kingsford-Smith In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith, famous Australian aviator, arrived here Saturday by steamer to take over his plane Lady Southern Cross which had been stored here since a trans-Pacific flight about a year ago and the release of which he was able to secure through the sale of his first famous plane Southern Cross to the Australian government for \$2300 to be placed in museum. He will fly the Lady Southern Cross to New York where it will be shipped to England whence it will be flown to Australia in an attempt to set a new time record. A dozen airplanes flew in formation over the steamer Monterey as it arrived from Australia with Kingsford-Smith on board.

## WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Clearing of Trollers For Deep Sea—Many Tourists Here This Morning—Prince Rupert on Final Trip

In response to representations made recently to the department by C. H. Orme, the following wire was received from D. Sim, commissioner of excise at Ottawa, in respect to deep sea clearance privileges for trolling boats: "If vessel clears direct deep sea fisheries, collector advised exemption allowable. Vessels engaged in estuarial fishing not permitted exemption." The exemption refers to fuel tax which is not imposed upon vessels clearing for deep sea.

Capt. O. P. Smith was in port from the trolling grounds on Saturday with his trolling boat, being here for supplies.

With a total of 164 passengers on board, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Ocean Falls, Powell River and Vancouver. Only one person disembarked from the vessel here.

Bringing in eight carloads of fish for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways, Northland Transportation Co's motorship Norco arrived in port at 9:15 this morning from Ketchikan, sailing on her return north after completing discharging.

Having on board a large list of 208 passengers, the most of whom were round trip tourists, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here Saturday afternoon southbound. Included among the round trippers were four pulp and paper magnates from Japan who are making the round trip north after a visit at Powell River. The vessel had no passengers for here, five embarking aboard her from this port for the north.
