POPE RECORDS HIMSELF FOR PEACE

WILLIAM BAGLEY HAS SKULL FRACTURED IN JAIL BREAK

Pontiff Would Place Power and Influence of Catholic Church At Disposal of Italian Gov't.

Italy's Case To Go Before League This Week—Will Contend Ethiopia Unworthy of Membership—Concessions Protested

ROME, September 3—From his summer retreat at Castle Gandolfo on Sunday, Pope Pius issued a message making a plea for world peace in the face of the present international crisis. He said that he and his church would be failing in their duty if they did not condemn armed warfare and urged a peaceful settlement of the crisis. He offered to put the full power and influence of the Roman Catholic Church at the disposal of the Italian government in its efforts to keep the peace.

Terrace Girls Have Their Legs Broken

Misses Lorna Christy and Irene Waite Brought Here With Painful Injuries

Two young ladies from Terrace, Miss Lorna Christy, sister of Miss Ethel Christy of the Prince Rupert City Hall staff, and Miss Irene Waite arrived on the train yesterday afternoon in charge of Dr. Stanley Mills and Mrs. N. Sherwood and were taken to the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from broken thighs and other injuries as a result of an automobile accident on the Kalum road six miles from Terrace about 10 o'clock Sunday night. They were riding in a car driven by Constable Smiley and with Jack Sparkes also in the party when the car went over the side and rolled over several times. The men of the party suffered only minor injuries but the young ladies were seriously injured.

Building Coming Back in Rupert

Value So Far This Year Is \$35,774 Ahead of 1933.

So far this year building value in the city has reached a total of \$35,774 as compared with \$57,805 in the first eight months of 1934. This year's value is already ahead of all 1933 when the total was \$30,177.

Colonel Cy Peck V.C. Is Out In Support of Liberals and Is Speaking In Their Behalf

VICTORIA, September 3 — Because of the stand the Bennett Government took on returned soldiers' pensions and because of its actions in nullifying the pensions tribunals set up by the Mackenzie King Government, Col Cyrus Peck, V.C., finds himself unable to support a Conservative candidate in the present contest he told an audience at Pender Island.

The colonel appeared on the platform in support of Alan Chambers, federal Liberal candidate for the Nanaimo riding, and, in the course of an outspoken address, charged the Bennett Government with a lack of sympathy for returned men.

Tribunals

Colonel Peck went into the history of the pension question since its inception. In 1930 he recalled the Liberal government, on the report of a parliamentary committee, passed legislation calling for the establishment of pensions tribunals. These travelling tribunals personally investigated all applications of ex-service men for pensions and a new principle—"the service men

should be given the benefit of the doubt"—was enacted at that time. The pensions tribunals made a conscientious and determined effort to put that legislation into effect but their work was nullified by the Bennett government.

Colonel Peck quoted from correspondence with Premier Bennett in which Mr. Bennett was reported to have warned the tribunals that they had apparently forgotten that the pension bill of Canada was too high in comparison with the British government's expenditures on pensions.

In other words, said the colonel, Mr. Bennett considered the tribunals had been too favorable to returned men.

AUGUST WEATHER

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., September 3 (Canadian Press)—William Bagley, notorious 45-year old convict, slated to be hanged on Friday, was in the prison hospital today suffering from a fractured skull incurred when he made an unsuccessful attempt to escape from his cell in the "Siberia" section late yesterday.

Social Credit Fifty-Four Seats

Counting In Alberta Election Is Still Continuing.

EDMONTON, September 3 (Canadian Press)—Social Credit representation in the new Alberta Legislature jumped definitely to fifty-four at the week-end with the election of William Sharpe in Grand Prairie and James Popil in Sturgeon. Social Crediters are leading in two other seats with the probability that they will have fifty-six seats in the next House with the balance divided between Liberals and Conservatives, probably five and two respectively.

Bennett To Help.

OTTAWA, September 3 (Canadian Press)— Assurance that Alberta will be treated fairly by the federal government was given Premier-elect William Aberhart by Premier R. B. Bennett in a long distance telephone conversation today. Aberhart immediately set about an investigation to ascertain the exact financial requirements facing him and will advise Ottawa.

GETS FINE RECEPTION

People of Ocean Falls Go Strong For Olof Hanson—Tom Reid Heard

OCEAN FALLS, September 3 — Olof Hanson, member for Skeena in the last federal Parliament and a candidate for re-election, was a visitor here for three days at the first of last week and received a rousing reception, auguring well for the support he will receive here at the forthcoming election.

Arriving on Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. Hanson got in touch with a large number of the residents.

On Monday evening there was a special meeting of the Liberal executive and other committees, Mr. Hanson outlining the work during his term of office in an hour and a half speech.

On Tuesday afternoon the Ladies' Liberal Association held a social at the residence of the president, Mrs. Thompson, for Mrs. Hanson, about twenty-five ladies being in attendance.

A great crowd was at the boat on Tuesday night to welcome Tom Reid of New Westminster. A piper was present and a big crowd marched from the wharf to the theatre where a public meeting was held in the interests of Mr. Hanson. J. C. Latham, President of the Liberal Association, was in the chair and, after a few opening remarks, introduced Mr. and Mrs. Hanson, Mrs. Thompson and Mr. Reid. Mr. Hanson spoke briefly, announcing that the present visit was more to get in personal contact with the people and that he would be here again later to give a public address. Mr. Reid, the speaker of the evening, discoursed for over an hour. His discussion of the fourteen planks of the Liberal platform received a splendid hearing. Despite two other meetings the same night, there were 150 persons present. On the return to the boat, the party was again escorted with pipe music.

KILLER IS AT LARGE

Theory That John Lake Killed Himself After Shooting Emil Perle Now Discounted

The provincial police have now just about given up the suicide theory in regard to John Lake, farmer of Colquhoun in the Francis Lake district, who made his getaway into the bush on Monday of last week after allegedly shooting Emil Perle, a neighbor, who expired a few hours after the shooting. It is now believed that Lake made a clean getaway and possibly may have found his way northward to the Canadian National Railway line. With that possibility in view, the search has been widened from the immediate neighborhood of Colquhoun which has been extensively combated during the past week for trace of Lake but without success.

MANY IN HIGH SCHOOL

No less than 266 pupils presented themselves for High School enrolment with the reopening of the school term today, this being some 25 more than a year ago. Ten more are expected within a day or so. Although only two had given notice in advance, nine presented themselves for enrolment in Senior Matriculation. No action has yet been taken regarding this class.

RADIO SHOP BURNS

Extensive damage was done to the shop of the Superior Radio Service on Second Avenue by fire which broke out at 1:45 yesterday morning, the cause being not yet definitely ascertained. The flames had a good hold before the fire department was called by a passerby. There is some insurance. Messrs. Bartlett and Insulander, the proprietors, have opened up again for business a few doors east on the same street.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 3. (CP).—With the entire city draped and in mourning and half a million sorrowing subjects lining the streets, the funeral of Queen Astrid took place this afternoon, interment being made in the royal crypt in the church of Our Lady of Laeken.

TO ABOLISH POVERTY

All sorts of schemes and plans have been proposed to give work to the unemployed and to abolish poverty. In the East there has been formed a League to Abolish Poverty and its president, William Ward, has propounded a scheme somewhat different from all the others. The Ottawa Citizen, which has shown itself much interested in the Douglas Credit plan, is putting that new plan forward.

In brief the Ward scheme is to take off the labor market all enfranchised Canadian citizens of fifty years or over who are willing to retire and give them a retiring allowance of \$60 a month until they are seventy when they will receive the regular old age pension. This, it is thought would enable all younger people to secure employment. It is also suggested that the increase in purchasing power would cause such a pickup in business that the country would become prosperous. The money to pay the retiring allowance would be taken from the national credit account.

At the same time as the above plan is put into operation arrangements would be made with a social credit engineer to institute the price discount plan in order to prevent inflation of prices.

It is claimed by the originators of this scheme that the country budget would be balanced and the periodic business panics would be prevented. Mr. Ward, in conclusion of a full page article dealing in detail with this question, says: "If the misery and the degradation of the unemployed is to be ended and the heavy and constantly increasing load of taxation lessened and lightened, the general public and political leaders must, it would seem, be persuaded of the workability of some such plan as this and the "sound money" backers be brought to see that, in their own best interests as well as in the general interests of Canada, they should accept it as the logical solution of a hitherto insoluble problem."

COLONEL PECK'S POSITION.

It will be interesting news to Prince Rupert people that Colonel Peck is now campaigning for the Liberals in the constituency which he formerly represented as a provincial Conservative. His reason for doing this is the treatment he alleges Premier Bennett is meting out to men who fought in the Great War. The Colonel claims that Mr. Bennett has been giving little consideration to the claims of returned men and that orders were sent to the Pensions Board to keep down the amount of pensions. Under the former Liberal Government the order was to give the returned men the benefit of the doubt, when necessary.
