Satisfactory consultations have been concluded, it was learned today, between British and French general staffs involving mutual support by armies and navies of both countries in case of an attack of Italian desperation. It was impossible to learn whether French and British air forces were considered in the talks concerning mutual assistance which were iniliated some time ago.
