BRITISH CABINET IS REORGANIZED

Changes Are Made By Premier Baldwin In His New Government

Lord Halifax Becomes Lord Privy Seal—Alfred Duff Cooper, Secretary For War; Malcolm MacDonald, Dominion Secretary, and Thomas, Colonies

LONDON, Nov. 22: (CP)—Premier Stanley Baldwin today announced his new cabinet appointments following the general election, involving some important changes. Former Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald is not specifically mentioned and it is not yet definitely known what his political future will be. At present he holds the post of President of the Council.

In the new cabinet Lord Halifax, former Secretary of War, becomes Lord Privy Seal, replacing the Marquis of Londonderry.

The new Secretary of War is Alfred Duff Cooper. Mr. Hon. Malcolm MacDonald, who was defeated in the elections for whom a seat will be found, takes the important post of Secretary for the Dominions, replacing Mr. Hon. James H. Thomas, who becomes Secretary for Colonies, the post formerly held by Malcolm MacDonald.

BIGGEST MAN IN WORLD HAS DIED
BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 22:—Pedro Cadenoz, who claimed to be the heaviest man in the world, is dead here. He weighed 630 pounds and his height was 5 feet 9 1/2 inches. Death was due to pneumonia contracted from travelling in box cars because he could not enter ordinary railway coaches.

Reactions Differ To Trade Treaty

British Free Traders Pleased But Old Country Manufacturers Are Not So Happy

LONDON, Nov. 22:—Free traders in Britain are pleased with the reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States but many British manufacturers fear they may lose much of their trade with Canada as a result of the pact. Australian dried fruit producers are also reported to be worried.

SUGGEST OIL BAN

Canada Would Include it Under Sanctions—Italy Hits Back At Dominion

Fighting Goes On

Ethiopian Resistance is Commencing—Italo-Hungarian Trade Agreement

OTTAWA, Nov. 22: (CP)—Italy has hit back at Canada in relation to sanctions imposed against her, it was reported today by cable to Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, by prohibiting the entry of Canadian exports of flour, liquor, aluminum, nickel, agricultural implements, tires and other goods.

ADD OIL TO LIST
GENEVA, Nov. 22: (CP)—Canada's proposal that oil be added to the list of articles affected by the sanctions against Italy will be considered by the League of Nations sanctions committee on Monday. While it might be possible to exhaust Italy's steel and oil supply before the end of the year, there is some hesitation in complying with the suggestion regarding oil until it is known definitely what American oil companies intend doing. Secretary of State Cordell Hull has intimated that the administration cannot prevent oil companies from supplying oil to either Italy or Ethiopia but it is felt they should defer to the policy as enunciated by the government against the supplying of material that could be used in warfare to either of the belligerents. Russia and Roumania have not expressed their views in regard to supplying oil to Italy but the former, at least, would probably co-operate with what other nations do.

SOLDIERS GO FARMING
ROME, Nov. 22: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini's order respecting the withdrawal of men temporarily from the army to agricultural and industrial pursuits in the effort to increase production of food and industrial goods is being carried out.

TIE-UP OF ALL PORTS

General Longshoremen's Strike Throughout United States Being Planned

NEW YORK, Nov. 22:—Joseph P. Ryan, president of the International Longshoremen's Association, has advised President Franklin D. Roosevelt that a general longshore strike throughout the United States is planned in sympathy with the situation in Gulf ports.

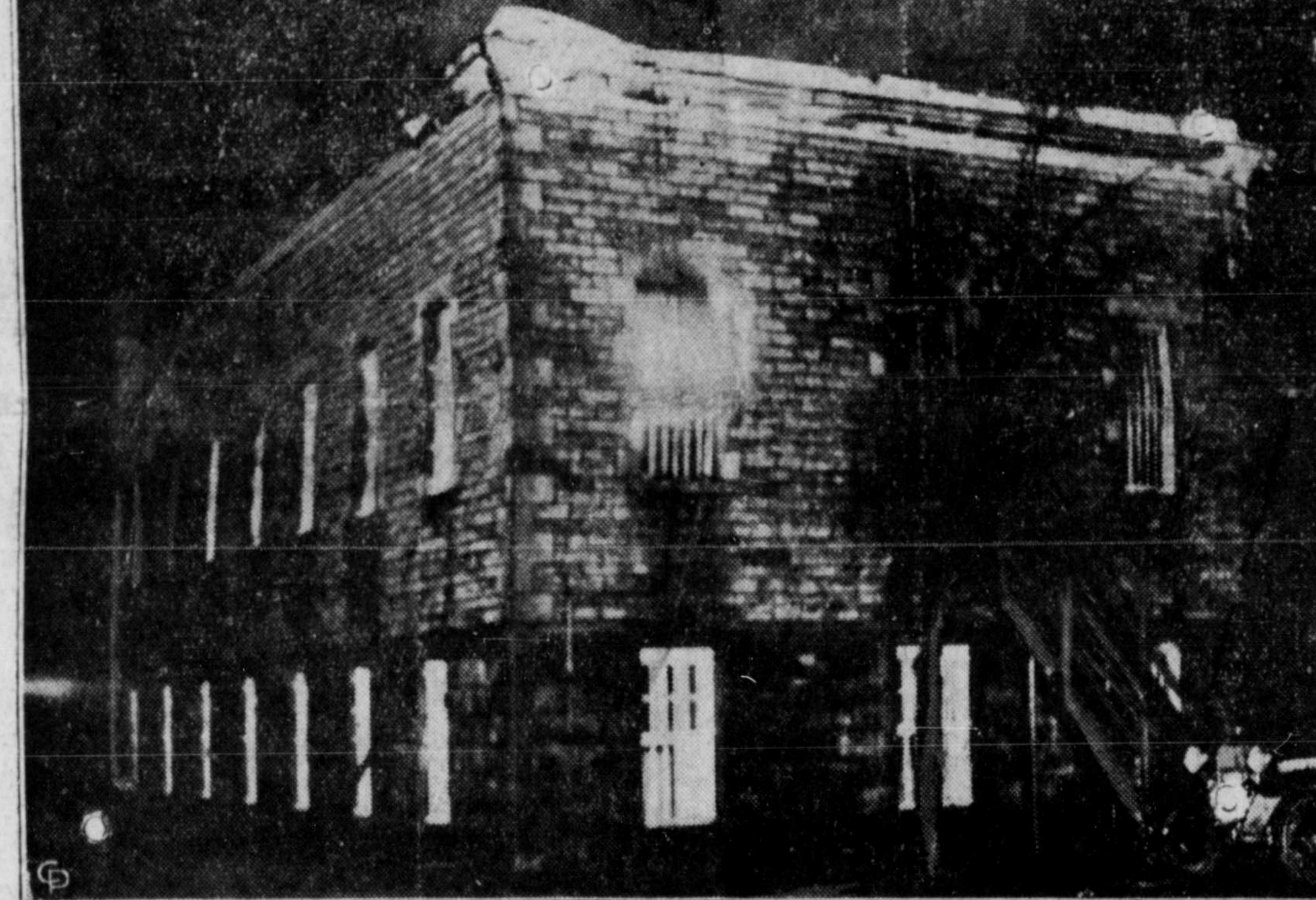

MOTHER NATURE STRIKES BLOW AT ITALY

Montreal Hospital Fire Takes Lives of Five Insane Patients



Not only did Montreal firemen have to face a stiff blaze in the Saint Jean de Dieu mental hospital, but they had to overcome the panic of violently insane patients, four of whom dashed back into the raging inferno to their deaths. A fifth died of heart failure. Over \$100,000 damage was done and 35 were injured. Many heroic acts were performed as nuns and firemen dashed into the flames to release patients locked in cells. The fire broke out in the wing of the hospital where the most violent cases are confined. Lay-out shows top, the wing at the height of the fire. SCORE DIE IN STORM

Hundreds Also Injured in Terrific Tempest Which Struck Southern Part of Country

ROME, Nov. 22: (CP)—More than a score were killed and hundreds were injured today in a terrific storm which struck southern Italy. Houses collapsed under the force of the wind and it is feared that there is a great loss of life and suffering in the fishing fleet.

WELL KNOWN IN RUPERT

Joseph E. Millier, Former Inspector Of Customs, Passes Away In Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22: (CP)—Joseph Elwood Millier, former district inspector of the Department of National Revenue, died here yesterday. He had been living in retirement for the past few years.

The late J. E. Millier was very well known in Prince Rupert and district, having been a frequent visitor here on official business during his years of service as inspector of customs. His many friends here will regret to learn of his passing.

King of Egypt Gets Salute As Riots Continue

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Nov. 22:—While the puppet king of Egypt, Mohamed Ali, was visiting the British fleet off Alexandria and receiving a twenty-one gun salute, violent anti-British demonstrations were continuing yesterday at Cairo and elsewhere in Egypt. The authorities are still in control of the situation but a general strike is being threatened in protest at British domination.

Taylor to Run For Alderman

Colorful Ex-Mayor Of Vancouver Be Candidate For Council In December

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22: (CP)—Former Mayor Louis D. Taylor announced last night that he will run for alderman in Ward Five in the civic election on December.

BEEF PRICES UNCHANGED
VANCOUVER, Nov. 22:—Beef prices were unchanged here yesterday at 4 1/2c to 5c for steers, 4c to 4 1/2c for heifers and calves and 3c to 3 1/2c for cows.

JAPANESE SAILORS ON STRIKE IN DEMAND FOR HIGHER SCALE OF PAY

TOKYO, Nov. 22: (CP)—Thirty-one ships, totalling 140,000 tons, are tied up in Japanese ports as a result of a seamen's strike for higher wages and better working conditions.

QUAKE AND TIDAL WAVE

Heavy Damage Done In Hawaiian Island—Port Of Hilo Is Shambles Of Wreckage

HONOLULU, Nov. 22:—Heavy damage was done in the Hawaiian Islands yesterday by a severe undersea earthquake followed by a huge tidal wave. Boats were swept ashore, houses battered to a pulp and part of a railway was carried away. The seaport of Hilo was evidently the most heavily sufferers and was a shambles of wreckage today. Early reports indicated no loss of life.

Volcano Active Again
Mauna Loa volcano, quiet for two years, was in violent eruption again today following the earthquake. A vast flow of laval thirteen miles long came down the slopes of the mountain early today with the possibility that it might be diverted towards the city of Hilo, with its population of forty thousand, which is forty miles away from the crater.

Stock Mart Sags In Selling Wave

List Shows All Around Decrease In New York With Large Turnover

NEW YORK, Nov. 22:—A wave of selling forced the stock market down when 3,852,000 shares changed hands. Closing averages were: industrials, 146.65, off 1.79; rails, 36.97, off .62; utilities, 29.48, off .24; bonds, 96.93, up .01.

Nobel Prize For Peace Withheld

No Award Will Be Made This Year As None Of Entries Are Considered Worthy

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 22:—The Nobel peace prize will not be awarded this year as the entries are not considered worthy, it is announced. The sum of this year's prize will be added to next year's.

NO COMMUNIST TEACHING FOR WASHINGTON STATE

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 22:—Every textbook in the schools of Washington is to be rigidly inspected by a special committee of three to ascertain whether they contain communistic teaching in contravention of state statutes. Already some have been found to contain communistic doctrines. All such books will be immediately banned from the schools.

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Pound Sterling And Canadian Dollar On New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 22:—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.92 1/4 and the Canadian dollar at 98 29-32c on the local foreign exchange market. The price of the pound sterling at Montreal was \$4.97 1/2.

Mexican Unions Demand Breaking Up Gold Shirts

MEXICO, Nov. 22: (CP)—Unless the Nationalist Gold Shirts (Fascist) are disbanded, Mexican trade unionists are threatening a general strike, it became known yesterday.

Cheyenne Airman Has Been Found

Safety Reported of Frank Kurtz Who Took Off on Tuesday For West Coast

CHEYENNE, Wyoming, Nov. 22:—Frank Kurtz, Los Angeles airman, who has been missing for three days since he hopped off at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon for a flight to Oakland via Salt Lake City, was located safe yesterday in the hills west of here.

Glasgow Dock Workers Back At Work Again

GLASGOW, Nov. 22:—A wage strike having been settled, 4000 Glasgow dock workers returned to their jobs today.

WHAT NEXT FOR CHINA?

Some Think Peaceful Settlement While Others Fear Invasion By Japan

PEIPING, China, Nov. 22: (CP)—An early settlement of points of difference between Japan and China over North China is expected in some quarters while in others fear is expressed that Japan may stage an invasion with a view to coercing it into becoming an independent state under Japanese mandate.

Massing of Japanese troops seventy miles from Peiping was reported tonight while from various sources came reports that Japanese forces were continuing to gather along the Great Wall of China coincident with a sudden renewal of the agitation for autonomy of North China.

French Aircraft Concern Hard Up

Bleriot Company Unable To Meet Payroll, Thousands Of Employees Are Informed

PARIS, Nov. 22:—The famous Bleriot airplane factory informed its several thousand workers yesterday that it was unable to pay their wages. The company, it is understood, is under temporary financial embarrassment owing to huge outlay involved in the acceptance of new governmental contracts for aircraft construction.

CANNOT LAST LONG

Dictatorships such as that of Hitler in Germany, Stalin in Russia and Mussolini in Italy cannot last very long. They were born of the depression and have been kept going by means of endless crimes. In Germany where the mass of the people were opposed to the National Socialists, there is said to be a revulsion of opinion since the spectacular rise of Der Fuehrer. Usually the end of such a man as Hitler is even more sudden than his rise to power. For those of us who live here in Canada under a more stable form of government and with more liberty than in any other part of the world, it will be extremely interesting to watch the outcome of the movements in the various countries. Greece and Austria seem to be returning to constitutional monarchy as a refuge from the fierce factions of the republic. No one can say what will happen in Italy after the holiday expedition to Ethiopia. Russia is developing steadily under Stalin who seems to be a wise ruler although an autocratic one and often cruel. The whole European situation is very interesting but with Britain and France using all their influence for peace there is little danger of a general outbreak of war.

THE MIDDLE ROUTE

During the last election we often mentioned the desirability of taking the middle course which was that of Liberalism politically. Our position was challenged and a Bible quotation was flung at us which commenced "Because thou wert neither hot nor cold."

We are still convinced that in most walks of life the middle course is desirable. In schools and colleges we like the all-round student, the one who excels physically, mentally and spiritually. Too much of a swing to the physical destroys the spiritual and interferes with the mentality. Too much devotion to the mental side of education with neglect of the physical means an unbalanced person.

Take the matter of business. The man who is too keen on making money and not keen enough on giving service will very soon have no opportunity to make money or give service. If a person is so keen on giving service that he neglects to look after his own finances he goes out of business. It is the middle course that is the really successful one.

The same principle can be applied to every walk of life. The middle course is usually the most satisfactory.

PICTURE OF TEXAS STATE

Rev. L. C. Jensen Tells Rotary Club Of His Native Section of the Country With Its Varying Moods

According to Rev. L. C. Jensen, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, the state of Texas is a huge, rich state where oranges and lemons grow, where beautiful flowers bloom, and where the warm air fragrant with semi-tropical odors. It is also a state of cotton-fields supplying the country with thirty percent of their raw cotton needs. Again it is a state of rolling wheat fields where mile after mile of rolling grain waves in the summer breezes. Again Texas is a state of rich oil fields where land at one time considered useless has recently made fortunes for those who ventured to bore. In some parts, too, particularly in the central part of the country, were picturesque mixed farms where happy settlers lived. All this was told to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its luncheon in the Commodore Cafe yesterday.

In features set out, Mr. Jensen told of the climate in the northern wheat-fields where in winter there seemed nothing between it and the North Pole but a barbed wire fence and that with the top wire down. In the winter when the north winds blew, it was intensely cold. In spring came the period of dust storms when the wind carried the fine dust across the country. It entered the houses and no place was safe from the intrusion. Mr. Jensen said his wife told him in the part of the country where she lived one Sunday last spring they saw what looked like a cloud rising. Soon that day became dark as night so that in the house they could not even see the windows. The dirt drifted along the fences like snow. Then came the downpouring rain when the rivers and creeks were swollen. These were, however, the unusual things.

On the whole, Mr. Jensen said, he preferred Prince Rupert because he preferred rain to dirt.

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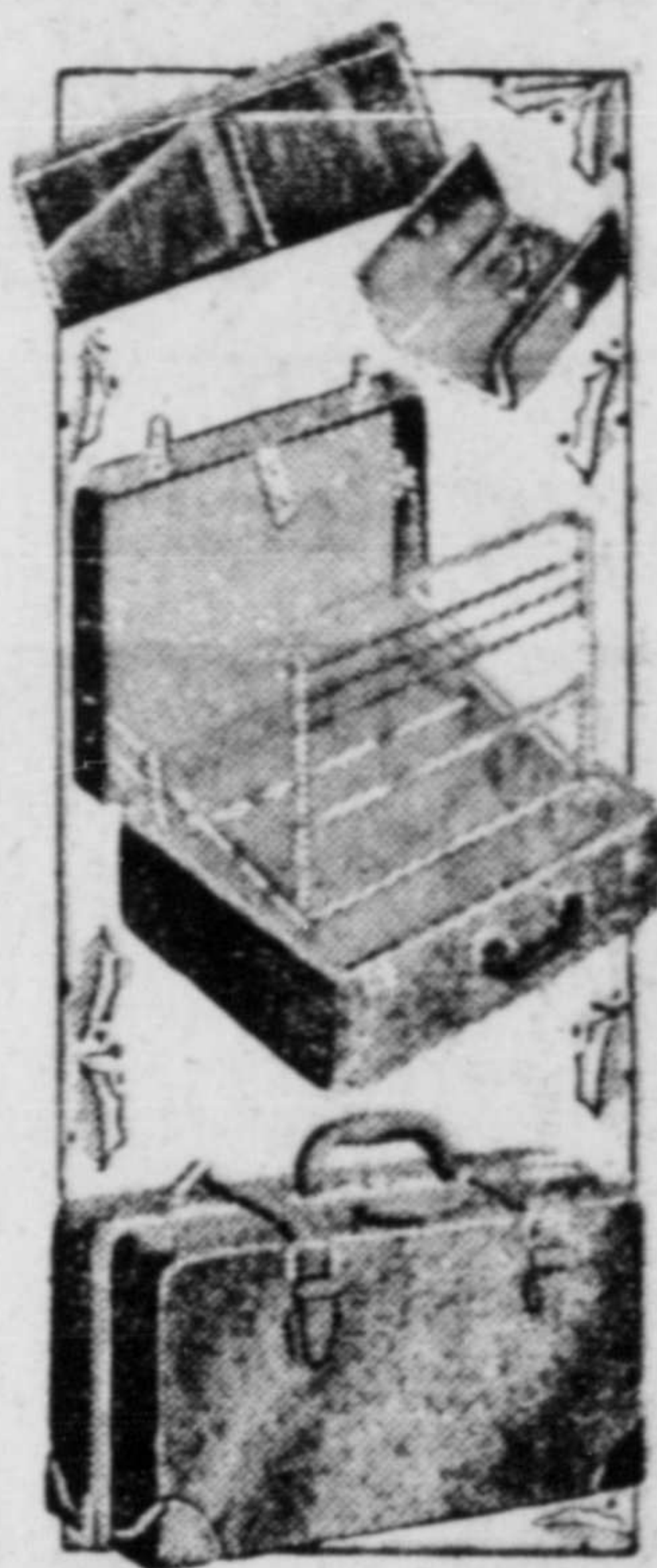

DEATH OF EDUCATOR

President Of Tulane University Dies At New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 22.—Dr. Albert Bledsoe Dinwiddie, president of Tulane University and one of the best known educators of the United States, died yesterday following a heart attack. He was sixty-four years of age.

Born at Lexington, Kentucky, April 3, 1871. Dr. Dinwiddie was educated at the University of Virginia and the University of Gottingen, receiving his L. L. D. from Southwestern Presbyterian University in 1911. He started his career as an educator by becoming a teaching licentiate of the University of Virginia in 1888, later going to the University School of Charlottesville, Virginia, as an instructor. In turn he became principal of Greenwood (Virginia) Academy, first assistant of the University School, Richmond, Virginia, and professor of mathematics at Southwestern Presbyterian University. He joined the faculty of Tulane in 1906 as assistant professor of applied mathematics and astronomy, becoming an associate professor in 1908, a professor in 1910, dean of the college of arts and sciences and director of the summer school the same year and president in 1918. He was prominent in all educational affairs of this state and was past president of the Louisiana Council of Education. He is survived by a wife, the former Caroline Arthur Sumner of New Orleans, whom he married in 1897. Yachting was his principal recreation.

Aged Ashcroft Man Succumbs

Francis Webb Dies At Age Of 87 Years—Was Magistrate And Coroner For Years

ASHCROFT, Nov. 22.—Francis Webb, who for twenty years was stipendiary magistrate and coroner here and who had lived in retirement during recent years, is dead at the age of eighty-seven. Last June he and Mrs. Webb had celebrated their sixty-fifth wedding anniversary. Deceased farmed on the prairies in the eighties and came to British Columbia in 1896. He was born in England and, in his younger days, served in the Imperial Army. There are two daughters.

fort to combat League of Nations sanctions will involve 100,000 soldiers for the present and more later possibly if it is found necessary.

Further advances by Italians on both northern and southern fronts in East Africa were reported yesterday but, with Ethiopian resistance expected, major battles are anticipated momentarily with a possible slashing attack by the Abyssinians in the south and an effort to recapture the holy city of Aksum in the north.

Emperor Haile Selassie is now believed to be in active command of his forces at the front.

Italians Slain

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 22: (CP)—Three hundred Italian soldiers and three officers were slain by the Ethiopians in a battle north of Makale, an official government communique says today. Two hundred rifles and four machine guns were captured.

HONORED AT LAST RITES

Funeral of Late Henry Edenshaw Was Largest Ever Held On Queen Charlotte Islands

The funeral of the late Capt. Henry Edenshaw, which took place at Massett last Saturday, was the most largely attended that has ever been held on the Queen Charlotte Islands, according to word received in the city. In attendance were many of the Skidegate people as well as a number of Haida friends from Alaska and the majority of the white people in New Massett and around the Inlet, all of whom joined the entire population of the village of Massett for the rites and to demonstrate their respect for one who was acknowledged as an outstanding man in the community. On every side there were expressions of regret at the passing of a man who had won not only the respect but the affection of all.

The church where the funeral service was held was packed to the doors and a splendid choir assisted in the service, singing two appropriate anthems. Rev. A. Abraham, rector at Massett, had charge of the service with Rev. James Gillett, Indian Agent, assisting. Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, delivered the address and expressed the sense of loss which the whole diocese felt in the passing of one whom he considered a very personal friend.

The Massett Band proceeded the cortege to the cemetery, playing suitable funeral marches.

Last night's train, due from the east at 10:20, owing to slow track conditions in the lower Skeena Valley, was about an hour late in getting in.
