## League of Nations to be Backed To Limit and Defences Built Up, Baldwin Tells Parliament Today

REGINA, Dec. 3: (CP)—Hon. F. W. Kerr, new minister of natural resources in the Saskatchewan government, was elected to the Legislature for Regina in the by-election yesterday with a majority of more than five thousand over Dr. Denis Sweeney, Independent.

### TARIFF TO BE TESTED

Alaska Ports Feel That Prince Rupert Benefits Unduly Under Cut in Halibut Duty

UNEAU, Dec. 3:—The Juneau Chamber of Commerce will seek to test the validity of the change in the United States tariff whereby the duty on Canadian halibut entering the United States is cut from two to one cent per pound. Claim is made that the change benefits Prince Rupert unduly at the expense of Alaska ports in handling of halibut.

### McClymont Is Named Juvenile Court Judge

VICTORIA, Dec. 3: (CP)—Police Magistrate Thomas McClymont was appointed by the provincial government yesterday as a judge of the juvenile court at Prince Rupert. For some time he has been acting in the capacity of a juvenile court judge on special commissions as each individual case arose.

### KING'S SISTER DIES

LONDON, Dec. 3: (CP)—Princess Victoria, aged 67, sister of King George, died early Tuesday following a swiftly critical ailment which developed only Sunday. The funeral will be held Saturday from Windsor Castle.

### FIFTY KILLED INSTANTLY AS ECUADOR VILLAGE IS OVERWHELMED BY SLIDE

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Dec. 3: (CP)—A landslide buried the village of Merde Cocha today, killing its fifty inhabitants in an instant. A great mass of rock covered an area of two miles.

### House Opens Session Following General Election—To Fight For Peace Instead of War—Special Measures For Unemployment Planned

LONDON, Dec. 3: (CP)—Great Britain will firmly support the League of Nations and strengthen its own defence forces, Parliament was informed today in the Speech from the Throne formally opening Parliament following the recent general election. Lord Hailsham, Lord Chancellor, read the King's speech owing to the death of the King's sister, Princess Victoria.

In view of the royal bereavement, ceremonies and show in connection with the opening of the House were curtailed to a minimum.

Other policies laid down by the National government included special attention to unemployment, especially in coal mining regions, unemployment insurance for farm workers and state guarantees for railway development loans.

It was announced that about \$250,000,000 of a new loan announced today would be allotted to defence.

Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told the House: "I am going to lose no chance for this country to get peace instead of war."

### CANADA RECOMMENDS ATLANTIC AIR MAIL

OTTAWA, Dec. 3: (CP)—Canada, it has been announced, recommended to the Imperial transatlantic airway conference the establishment of an air mail service between Canada and Ireland via Newfoundland, using North Sydney, N.S., as the Canadian terminus and Harbor Grace, Nfld., as an intermediate stop.

The conference ended Monday night after approving unanimously the start of survey flights next year and an experimental air mail service soon afterwards. The conference, attended by delegates of Canada, the United Kingdom, Irish Free State and Newfoundland, decided that experimental flights should lead to the establishment of regular transatlantic air mail and passenger service calling for a minimum schedule of two flights each way every week.

An official communique did not state definitely the route chosen.

### Resolution And Letter Received

Financial Assistance For Municipalities From Governments Sought By Vancouver

A lengthy letter from Mayor G. G. McGeer of Vancouver together with a resolution of the Vancouver City Council, the general intent of both being a petition for greater aid for municipalities in a financial way from both provincial and federal governments, has been received by City Commissioner W. J. Alder of Prince Rupert.

The Vancouver mayor, in his letter, urges the advisability of an early conference of Canadian mayors and one during the next session of Parliament at Ottawa.

The Vancouver city council's resolution seeks, among other things, the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into the Peace River country as a part of the national railway system.

No action is being taken by the city commissioner.

### Constable Boys Returns to Post

Provincial Police Officer, Who Searched For Missing Couple, Back Himself

District headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the safe return to Telegraph Creek on Sunday of Constable J. V. Boys after an absence since November 17 on a trip down the Stikine River in search of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Simpson who since turned up safely at Wrangell. Constable Boys met and returned to Telegraph Creek with a search party which had left the day before to look for him. He was not aware until he met the search party for himself that Mr. and Mrs. Simpson were safe. The officer reported a rough trip, no details of which have so far been received here.

### WOULD UNSEAT GERRY

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3: (CP)—New quo warranto proceedings designed to unseat G. G. McGeer as Member of Parliament for Vancouver-Burrard have been instituted by William Simpkins who challenges the authority of Judge J. N. Ellis to declare McGeer elected after a recount.

### DEFIED TUT CURSE-DIES

Mystery Surrounds Passing Of Dr. James H. Breasted, Noted Egyptologist

### Interesting Work

Was One Of Those Who Dug Up Site Of Ancient Armageddon

NEW YORK, Dec. 3: (CP)—Dr. James Henry Breasted, noted archaeologist and head of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago, died in New York yesterday. Authorities maintained some secrecy as to cause of death as they had concerning his strange illness.

Breasted had just recently returned from Egypt where he was one of the discoverers of the tomb of King Tutankhamen on the walls of which was engraved the words: "Death shall come on swift wings to him that toucheth the tomb of Pharaoh." Breasted frequently ridiculed this curse.

Years of research conducted and directed by Dr. Breasted made vivid personalities of monarchs, law givers and military leaders, dead for centuries.

Recognized as the leading Egyptologist of the United States and one of the foremost authorities in the world on ancient civilizations, he also was a remarkably able organizer and administrator.

It was under the guidance of Professor Breasted that the Oriental Museum and Institute of the University of Chicago was made the centre of research in America in recovering the lost chapters of the world's history represented in Egyptian, Hittite and other cultures.

His interest in the past dated to the days of his boyhood in Rockford, Ill., where he was born August 27, 1865, the son of Charles and Harriet Garrison Breasted. As a boy he eagerly read available material on Egypt and was fired with a desire to add to the record.

At Ancient Armageddon

In his "The Conquest of Civilization," he told of being present at the site of ancient Armageddon where one of the University of Chicago expeditions was excavating that famed battlefield. One of the excavators dug out a block of stone bearing Egyptian hieroglyphics, which when deciphered was found to relate to the conquests of Shishak, a Pharaoh of the tenth century before Christ.

"Instantly," said Professor Breasted, there rose before me the vision of a Sunday school in a little church on the far off prairie of Illinois, where nearly a century ago a group of village boys with heads together over the bible were struggling with the difficult proper names of an old Hebrew chronicle.

"And it came to pass in the fifth year of King Rehobeam that Shishak king of Egypt, came up against Jerusalem, and he took away the treasures of the house of Jehovah; and the treasures of the king's house; he even took away all the shields of gold that Solomon had made."

"It was with some emotion," he continued, "that one of these boys was reading the name of the old Egyptian conqueror who carried away Solomon's treasure from Jerusalem nearly 3,000 years ago."

Many Honors

Sir Charles lauded the "apparent disposition" of those in public life to direct more attention to the mining industry of Canada.

#### CANADA'S POSITION

Shortly before the election when the League of Nations was trying to show a solid front against Italy, R. B. Bennett, at that time Prime Minister of Canada, announced that on no account would Canada participate in military sanctions against Italy.

While doubtless Premier Bennett was right, yet it was an inopportune time to make the announcement except that it was to allay the fears of Quebec and possibly influence the election.

Now comes a Liberal statesman who seems to have spoken at an inopportune time. The League was again at a critical point in its history in regard to applying sanctions against Italy. Canada's representative at the League had moved the resolution providing for the extension of the sanctions to oil and other commodities. Then just as the new regulation is about to be applied and when Italy is making a last effort to prevent it, Acting Premier Lapointe announces publicly that Canada's representative did not speak for Canada when moving the resolution and that Canada would not take part in military sanctions.

We all want to keep Canada out of war but what is the use of belonging to the League of Nations if we are to make public announcements at critical times which are prejudicial to the interests of the League and of all the nations that have been trying to prevent war?

Having already announced that Canada would not take part in military sanctions and having undoubtedly instructed her delegates to that effect, there was no need for Canada to come to the aid of Italy at a critical time against all the nations that have been trying to hold her back from her policy of trying to re-establish the old Roman Empire at the expense of other countries, commencing with Abyssinia. If the Canadian delegate exceeded his authority he should be recalled at once. At any rate most Canadians will feel that Mr. Lapointe's pronouncement was ill-timed, to say the least.

Britain has been leading the way in a movement to curb the military expansion of the Italian dictatorship and then Canada, second in importance of the countries of the British Empire, is the first to throw a spoke in the wheel. It is to be hoped that Prime Minister Mackenzie King will announce on his return that Mr. Lapointe spoke without authority from him.

## NEWS OF THE MINES

### Omineca Gold Quartz Pushing Ahead With Development Work—Much Prospecting Activity In Portland Canal

Omineca Gold Quartz Mining Co. Ltd. is steadily pushing ahead with its development program on the well known Dardanelles mining property on Copper River in the Terrace district, according to word received in the city. At present the crew is freighting in machinery and supplies over the new road for winter operations. The ultimate intention is to establish a mill on this very promising property.

Two placer miners, Chris Carlson and Karl Christensen, have returned to Burns Lake from the Cottonwood country after a fairly successful season. Locating pay on a high bench, they whip-sawed lumber for sluice boxes and diverted the water of a small creek which gave them a fair sluice-head during high water. A month's work was rewarded by a clean-up of sixteen ounces of fairly coarse gold. The water fell and the final clean-up was all flour gold which could be saved only by the use of quicksilver.

One five-mile dredging lease on the Unuk River is the result of tests made for placer gold on that river during the past season. King and McQuillan of Ketchikan having made application to the mining recorder for such a lease. The pair spent the greater part of the past season making tests of the ground and also taking in plant and equipment for the property in preparation for 1936 operations. Four other placer claims were located in the Unuk district this year, indicating a healthy interest in this class of mining. Walter Blanton of Ketchikan has secured placer claims on the Unuk and, in order that he may thoroughly test the channel and benches, will use a Keystone drill next year. In addition to the placer claims staked on the Unuk, about thirty-five lode claims were located. Larson and Biehl were among those going in from Stewart by seaplane. They staked two groups of claims and will return to the district next season. Additional claims were located by the Unuk Valley Gold Syndicate to round out their holdings.

Mining claim development in the Portland Canal area during the 1935 season is an index to the keen interest of owners in the future mining possibilities there. This represents \$55,000 worth of development work done by prospectors and mining companies in the district on assessment work alone. Prospectors staked over 150 new claims in every section of the dis-

trict including George River, Marmot River, Glacier Creek, Bitter Creek, American Creek, Bear River, Salmon River and over the divide towards Tide Lake.

Wellington Beaton, who is in charge of mining operations and mill construction at the Georgia River Gold on Portland Canal below Stewart, reports that good progress is being made at the property. Heavy rains which have caused swollen streams all through the district, raised the Georgia River to such an extent that the main bridge was damaged. This delayed freighting in building materials but, since repairs have been completed by the government bridge crew, transportation of lumber and supplies is again going forward.

H. A. Guess, president of the Premier Gold Mining Co., has intimated that rumors to the effect that a separate mill is planned for the Selakwe property following consummation of the Premier-B.C. Silver-Selakwe merger are without foundation.

### Customs Revenue For This Year Still Ahead

### DAMAGES AWARDED

Prince George Barrister Must Pay \$12,816 As Result Of Traffic Accident Last Summer

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3: (CP)—On the basis of a forty-sixty percent finding of negligence, Hylton A. Tilley of Prince George is awarded \$12,816 damages against John O. Wilson of Prince George under a written judgment handed down in Supreme Court here yesterday by Mr. Justice Harold Robertson. Tilley was run over by Wilson's car on the Vanderhoof-Prince George highway on June 11 last after Tilley's truck had developed trouble and he was trying to flag approaching cars during the making of repairs. In this case Tilley stepped off the road to avoid Wilson's car but the latter also swerved off to avoid hitting him and the accident resulted.

Judgment assessed damages at \$20,000 general and \$1,361 special, fixing responsibility for forty percent on Tilley and sixty percent on Wilson.

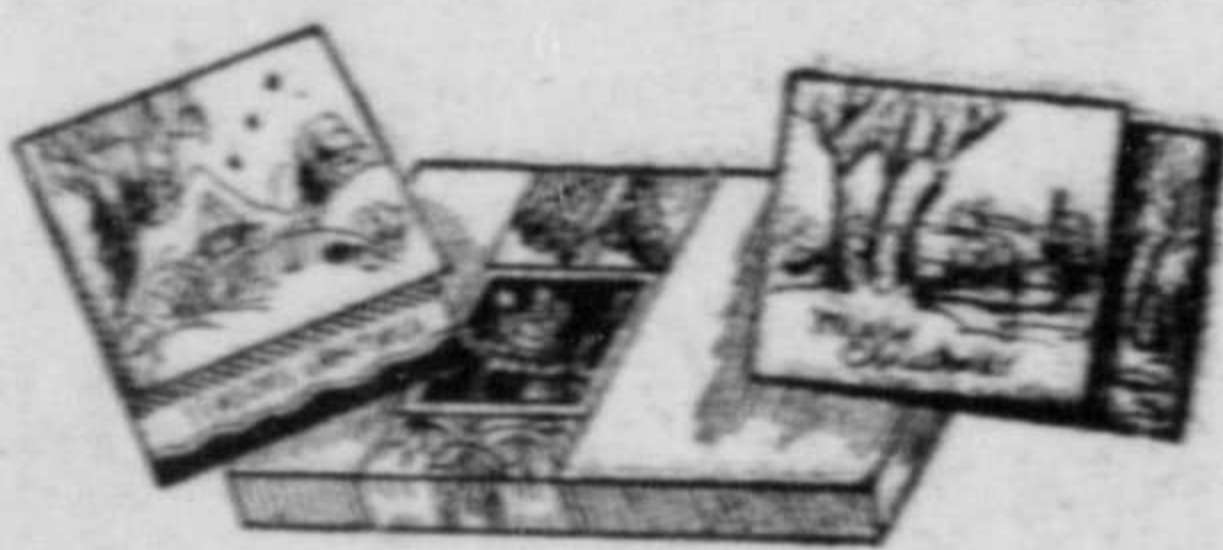

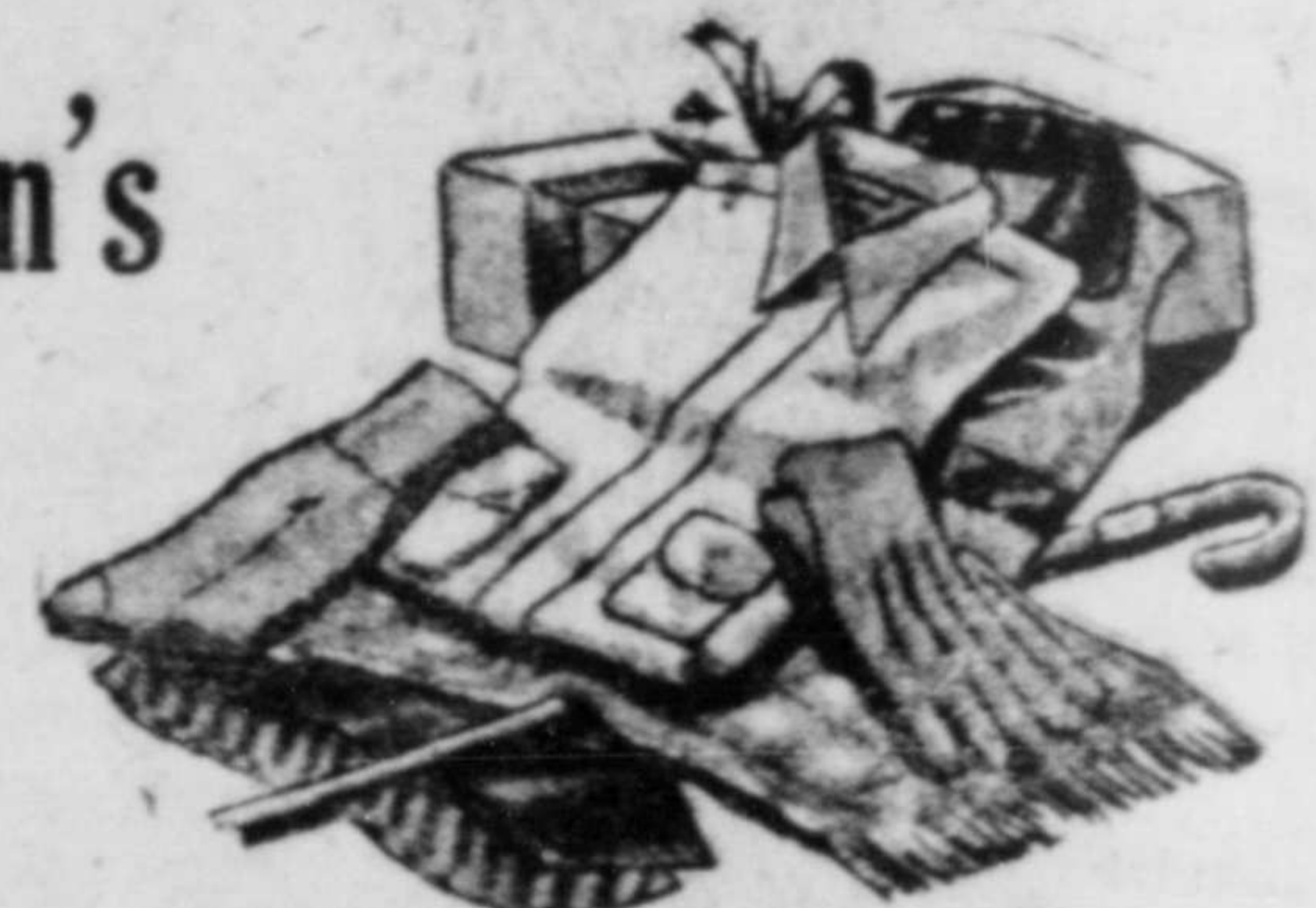

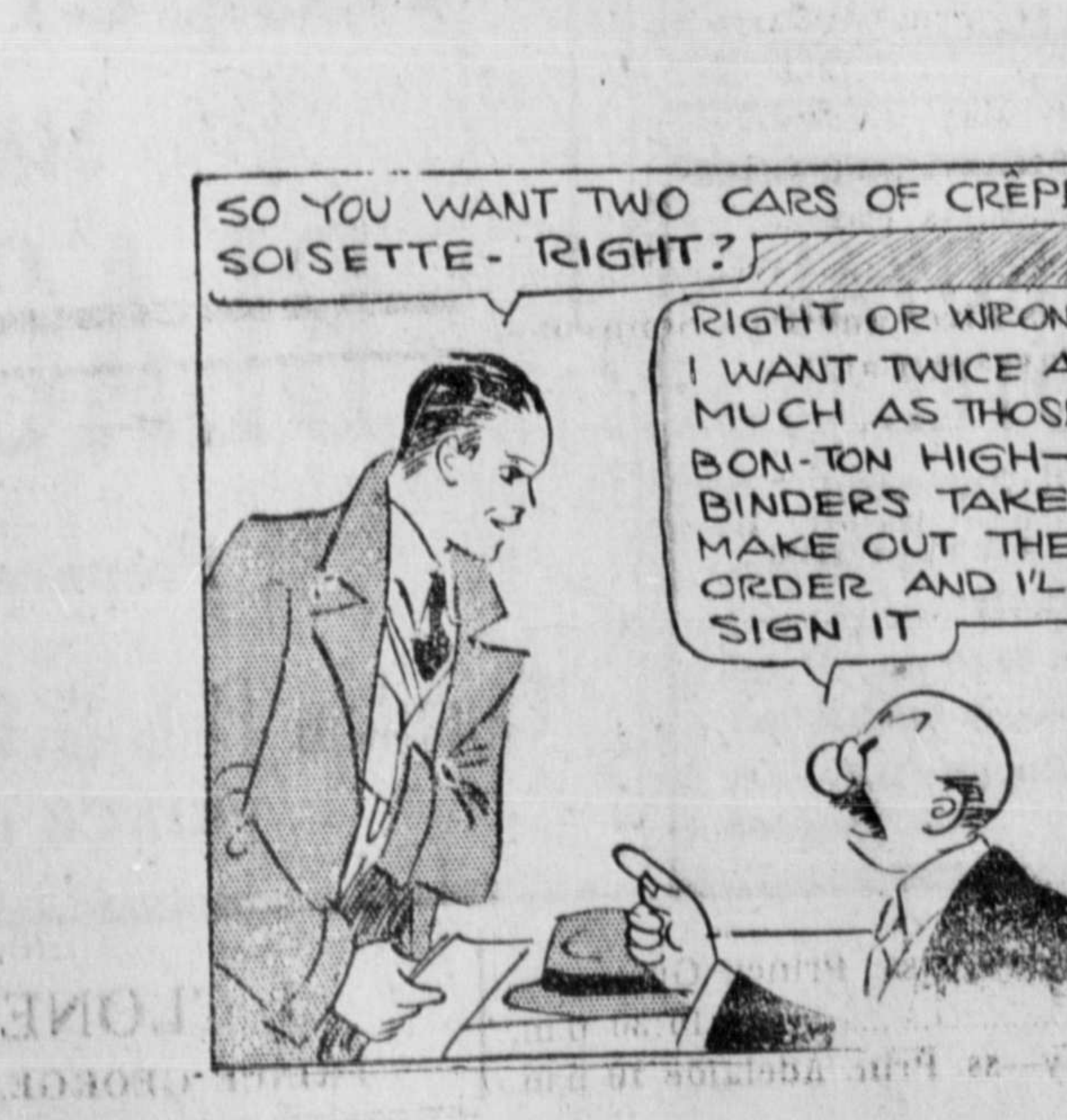
