ARGENTINE BOOSTS WHEAT PRICE

SILVER IS STILL LOW

Weakness Continues in London Market With Brokers Hesitating as to Future Course

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)—Price of spot silver was set yesterday at 26½ pence an ounce, five-eighths of a penny lower than Wednesday. The fixation was made after silver brokers had considered the situation for several hours and long after the normal hour of setting the price. Again no price was set for silver futures.

Gain at Montreal
MONTREAL, Dec. 13:—In spite of the general weakness in the world's silver markets, the Canadian price for the white metal showed a substantial gain yesterday, closing at 53c.

Another Drop Today
NEW YORK, Dec. 13: (CP)—Foreign bar silver dropped another cent to 89½c today, the lowest since March 29. The decline followed a slump in London of 7-16 of a penny an ounce to 26 7-16 pence.

Four Round Trips Weekly Proposed Across Atlantic

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 13: (CP)—Under the trans-Atlantic air mail service which it is proposed shall be established jointly next summer by British Imperial and Pan-American Airways four round trips weekly will be made between London and New York. Formal application has been made by the British company for terminals in the United States and similar landing rights in the United Kingdom will be sought by Pan-American Airways.

Provincial Bond Prices Improve

Rejection Of Hepburn Refunding Plan Brings Immediate Market Reaction

TORONTO, Dec. 13:—An improvement in prices of bonds of Canadian provinces was the immediate reaction yesterday to the shelving by the Dominion-provincial conference of the plan of Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario for a general reduction in interest rates to three percent.

IRISH FREE STATE SENATE ABOLISHED

DUBLIN, Dec. 13: (CP)—Sixty days hence, the Senate of the Irish Free State will cease to exist following the re-passage by the Dail Eireann last night of a bill calling for its abolition. The vote of Senate abolition, by a division of 76 to 57, was at the instance of President Eamonn de Valera. In May 1934 the Dail Eireann passed such a measure but the Senate rejected it. Under Free State constitution the Senate cannot block lower house legislation for more than 18 months so now it must accept its own death or knell whether it likes it or not. The new bill will be signed forthwith by President de Valera.

TERMS ARE MODERATED

Land Which Italy Would Get From Ethiopian Less Extensive And Would Be Under League

Oil Deferred
Virtual Armistice Exists Pending Outcome of Peace Negotiations

ROME, Dec. 13: (CP)—The Franco-British plan for peace in East Africa was made public today. It would give Italy sovereignty or control over approximately one-half of Ethiopia. Five points of the plan in part are:

Italy would get sovereignty over Tigre Province except for the sacred city of Aksum and a corridor connecting the city with Ethiopia.

The Danakil frontier would be "rectified" so as to give Aussa region to Ethiopia in full sovereignty.

The Italian Somaliland frontier would be "rectified" running from the Kenya-Italian Somaliland boundary intersection to Gorrheau, west of Guramdaab to the intersection of the fourth degree and the British Somaliland frontier.

Ethiopia would get a free port on the Red Sea, preferably Assab, and a corridor to it.

France and Great Britain would agree at Geneva to urge Emperor Haile Selassie to grant Italy a zone of influence running from the New Somaliland frontier established under Point Three and extending all across Ethiopia from the thirty-fifth to the forty-fifth meridian of longitude and northward to the eighth parallel of latitude.

GENEVA, Dec. 13: (CP)—Under the latest Franco-British plan for the settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian war, which the council of the League of Nations has been summoned to consider next Wednesday in special session, it is learned from authoritative sources, the main features will be less sweeping than at first forecast.

The plan, it is said, provides for the exchange of certain, not large, strips of Ethiopian territory in the north and in Ogaden Province for a port on the Red Sea with a corridor leading to it from Ethiopia.

The whole of the remainder of Ethiopia would be under League supervision.

Areas opened to Italian development and colonization would be equally under League supervision with sovereignty of Emperor Haile Selassie maintained.

Smaller member nations of the League, led by Poland and Turkey, forced the peace plan into the League council where it is assured of having a stormy time. Great Britain and France, who have referred the matter to the committee of five, acceded to the demand to send it to the council.

Further consideration of the matter of extension of sanctions against Italy including the imposition of the oil embargo is deferred until after the council has dealt with the peace plan.

Although he has not as yet definitely committed himself, Premier Benito Mussolini is understood to be willing to accept the Franco-British peace plan as a basis for peace negotiations. In a statement yesterday at Rome, Mussolini warned his people not to be unduly optimistic at this time with respect to a final settlement.

Joe Brown Again Victimized With Big Rock Thrown Through Windshield

Another apparent case of sabotage in connection with the local taxi rate war occurred during the early morning today when the windshield of an automobile owned by Joe Brown was shattered by a rock weighing possibly ten pounds which was evidently thrown through it. The driver, Gordon Viereck, parked the car at 3 o'clock this morning in front of his home, 1855 Seventh Avenue East. At 8 a.m. he found the windshield shattered and the rock lying on the front seat. The police are investigating.

Radio Official First Name On Hotel Register

SASKATOON, Dec. 13:—"Horace Stovin, Regina Sask". This name and address will go down in local history as the first registration made when the Bessborough, Canada's newest hotel, was opened here this week. In this connection it is interesting to note that Horace Stovin is the Western Director for the Canadian Radio Commission and arrived on the scene to make advance arrangements for the opening musical broadcast. Mr. Stovin took personal charge of the announcing, rather boastfully explaining that he was the only member of his staff "who had enough change handy to get his tuxedo pressed for the occasion."

HAS HIGH AMBITION

Dictator of Austria Feels Himself Called Upon to Assume Leadership of Germanic Nations

VIENNA, Austria, Dec. 13: (CP)—Vice-Chancellor Ernst von Stahremberg said in a speech Wednesday night that he must assume leadership of the Germanic nations in Europe.

The semi-dictator said there was no obstacle to the return to the Hapsburg throne of Archduke Otto provided he accepts the program laid down by the late Chancellor Engelbert Dolfuss.

World Grain Markets In Turmoil as Price Goes Sky-Rocketing

Winnipeg Advances Limit of Three Cents Per Bushel—Buenos Aires up Nineteen Cents—Liverpool Gains Four and Three-Quarter Pence

WINNIPEG, Dec. 13: (CP)—Ten million bushels of Canadian wheat sold for export today as price futures on the Grain Exchange soared the limit of three cents a bushel, the maximum allowed in one day's trading, and remained there throughout a tumultuous session. December wheat closed at 86½c. May at 89½c and July at 90½c.

BRUNO TO DIE SOON

New Date For Execution Will Be Between Four And Eight Weeks Hence

TRENTON, New Jersey, Dec. 13:—Bruno Richard Hauptmann will probably die in the electric chair late in January or early in February for the kidnap-murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr. Following the rejection by the Supreme Court of United States of his appeal for a review of the conviction and death sentence Hauptmann comes up shortly in Flemington for a re-setting of the death sentence which must be at a date not less than four weeks and more than eight weeks removed. His only hope now is the possibility of a reprieve or commutation.

CONFERENCE ADJOURNING

Full Public Session is Being Held At Ottawa Today

Refunding Talk

Hepburn Three Percent Plan Is Shelved—Highway Considered

OTTAWA, Dec. 13: (CP)—All fixed committees of the Dominion-provincial conference reported to a full public session of the conference today after which the gathering adjourned. A number of the provincial delegations will however, it is expected, remain in Ottawa for a few days to take up individual questions in special conferences with the federal government.

Refunding of public indebtedness was one of the important matters discussed by the conference yesterday. All the provinces are, apparently, in favor of refunding but the methods of refunding are at wide variance. A proposal of Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario to convert all bonds at three percent was definitely shelved.

Constitutional matters also came up for attention yesterday, the general opinion being that Canada should have the power to amend its own constitution. A sub-committee was working on plans to complete a highway across the Dominion within two years.

Although rejecting the demand of the provinces that the Dominion should take over the whole cost of unemployment relief, the federal authorities agree to increase substantially the grants to provinces for this purpose. British Columbia is now receiving \$150,000 monthly which will be increased more particularly to take care of the large number of transients in the Pacific Coast province.

Marketing Act Curb
No new schemes will be considered under the Natural Products Marketing Act and schemes already in operation will not be further expanded. Hon. James G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture, told the Dominion-provincial conference committee on agriculture.

The Act is now before the Supreme Court of Canada for a ruling as to its constitutionality.

Flying Boat At Wake Island On Pacific Flight

WAKE ISLAND, Dec. 13:—The new trans-Pacific flying boat Philippine Clipper, enroute from Alameda to Manila on its maiden flight, landed here at 6:39 (Pacific Standard Time) last evening from Midway Island and is proceeding today to Guam. It is due in Manila on Monday.

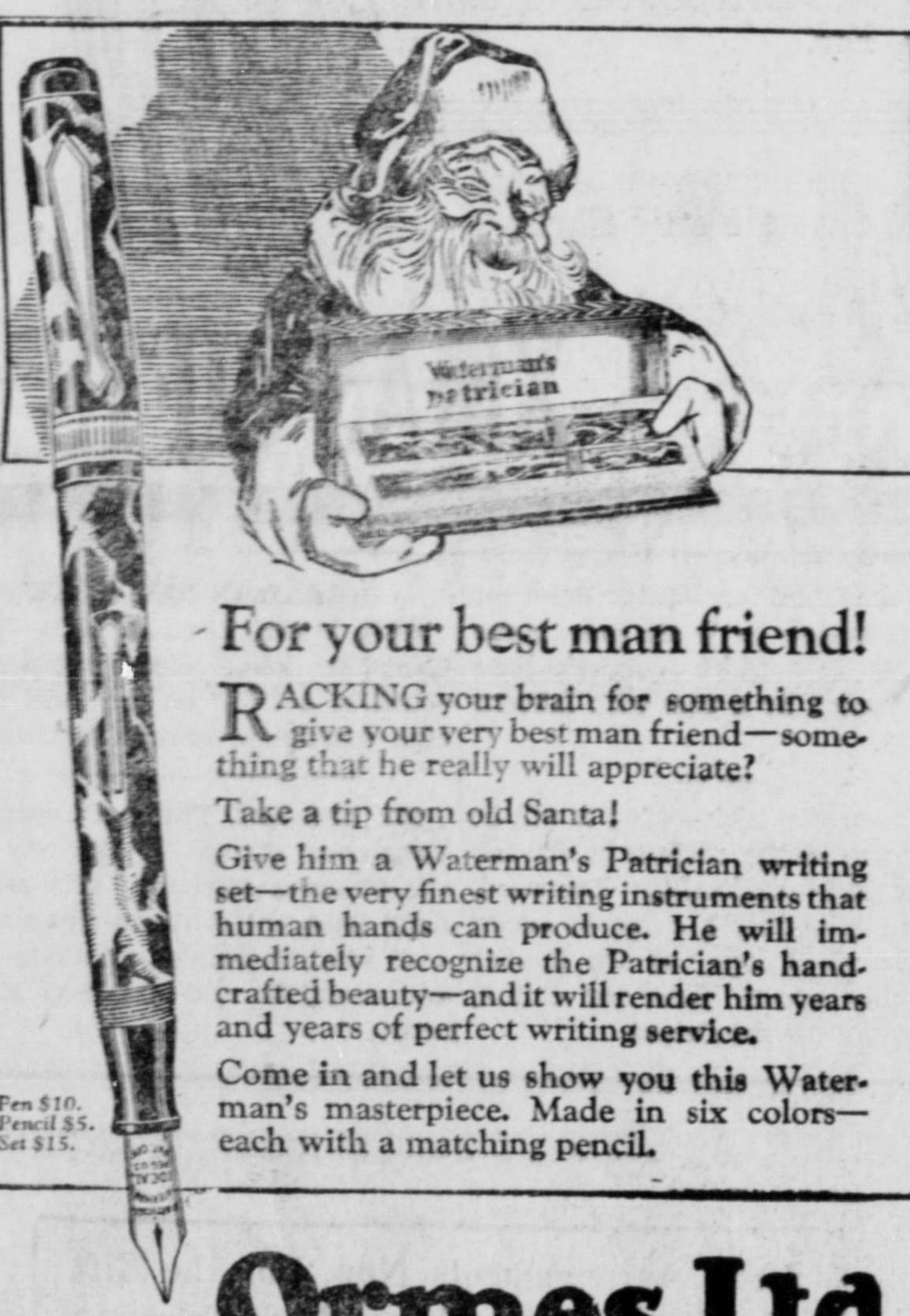

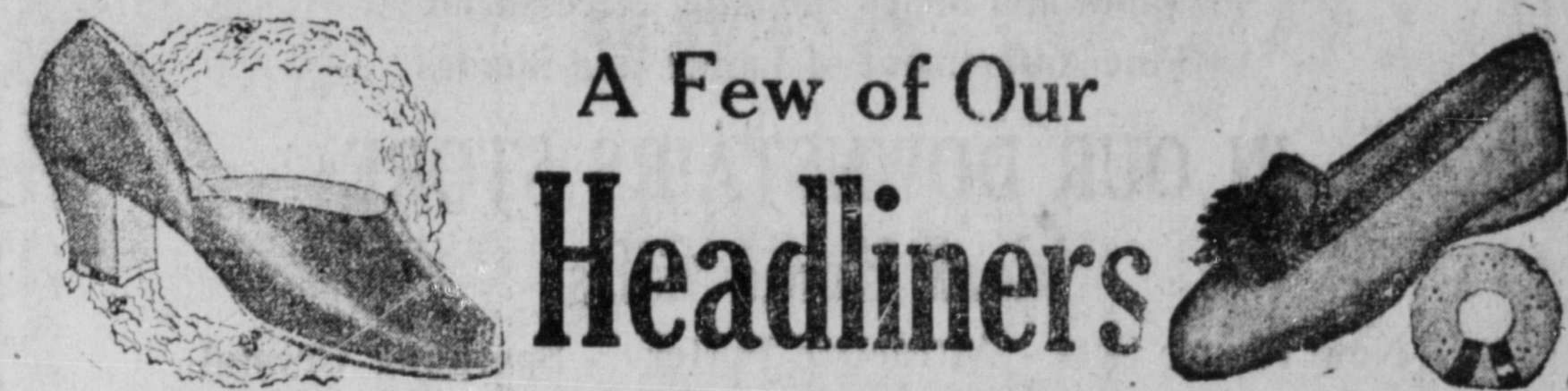

Rotary Club Is Entertained By Visit to Germany

Dr. Neal Carter Tells of Trip He
Made to Dresden in 1929, Re-
turning in 1930

The Rotary Club was entertained for three quarters of an hour yesterday afternoon by a very interesting account of a visit made to Germany in 1929 by Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Fisheries Experimental Station. He went to the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute for Leather Research as a student. He lived there at a private home spending his time at his work, seeing the sights and learning the language.

Dr. Carter found that Canada had no status in Germany. A person was either British or American. He had to appear before the police and explain why he was there and how he obtained the money to keep him there.

The speaker explained many of the customs in Dresden. He described the beautiful park and the castle where the Royal Saxon jewels were kept in a vault. He was impressed by the different styles of architecture and the peculiar conceptions which were all larger at the top than at the bottom.

One of the interesting incidents in the trip was a visit he made at Christmas with some relatives by marriage who lived at a village not far from Bingen on the Rhine in occupied territory. About half the people of the village turned out to meet him and he saw a number of rural native customs which he could not have seen if he had remained in the big cities.

On the way home Dr. Carter stopped off in Switzerland to see the mountains and do a little climbing. He failed to reach the summit of the Matterhorn owing to bad weather coming up while he was on the mountain. A week in Paris and an interesting trip home completed the trip which proved enjoyable and instructive and of real value in connection with his work.
