## Five Million Dollar Plant Giving Employment To Two Thousand Men Settled Upon

### New Minister To Canada Arrives

OTTAWA, July 27.—Norman Armour, new minister of the United States to Canada, arrived here yesterday to assume his office. He expressed the hope that, within a couple of months, a new trade agreement should have been negotiated between Canada and the United States.

### WHEAT JUMPS TODAY ON WINNIPEG MARKET

WINNIPEG, July 27: (CP)—Backed by unrestrained speculative buying and more than a million bushels overnight sales to Europe, wheat jumped three cents today and closed about two cents higher after profit-taking. All other grain markets were also higher on reports of rust damage in United States and Canada.

**CONSTRUCTION TO START EITHER AT DRY DOCK OR SEAL COVE AS SOON AS PRELIMINARY DETAILS CAN BE FINALLY WORKED OUT—WILL TAKE 18 MONTHS TO BUILD.**

### Arrangements For Marketing Entire Output Already Made

**PLENTY OF WATER IS AVAILABLE AT SHAWATLANS LAKE—POWER WILL BE TAKEN FROM LOCAL COMPANY WITH POSSIBLE AUGMENTATION BY CONCERN'S OWN PRODUCTION.**

Officials of the Mutual Pulp and Paper Mills of Prince Rupert Limited from Vancouver, San Francisco and Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., made announcement today that it had been definitely decided, following thorough investigation, to build a 250-ton bleached sulphite pulp mill at Prince Rupert either on the dry dock site or at Seal Cove.

As soon as the necessary details can be worked out, construction will start. The cost of the plant will be some \$5,000,000 and the permanent payroll is conservatively estimated at two thousand men including those who will be engaged in logging in the woods.

The period of construction, largely in steel and concrete, will be about eighteen months.

Logging operations will be commenced well in advance of the completion of construction. The concern controls four and a half billion feet of titled timber on the Queen Charlotte Islands and on the Skeena River.

Engineers of the company are at present here to make further investigations.

There is plenty of water available at Shawatlans Lake.

Power will be taken from the Northern B. C. Power Co. augmented by what the company may produce itself.

Arrangements have already been completed for marketing the entire output of the plant by rail and waterborne in Eastern Canada and the interior of the United States.

Announcement of these facts was authorized today by all five visiting principals of the concern—F. L. Buckley of Vancouver; E. A. Thompson, J. L. Stewart and Geoffrey Winslow of San Francisco, and L. A. DeGuere of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis. A luncheon was tendered them this afternoon by the council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and they will be leaving this evening on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 27: (CP)—Great Britain virtually smashed United States' challenge for the Davis Cup today when, in the first singles, Bunny Austin defeated Wilmer Allison in five sets 6-2, 2-6, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5 and Fred Perry then cut down Budge 6-0, 6-8, 6-3, 6-4.

The Americans are favored to win the doubles Monday but Perry is a top favorite to win his singles match Tuesday which would mean that Britain retains the cup.

### Lower California May Go It Alone

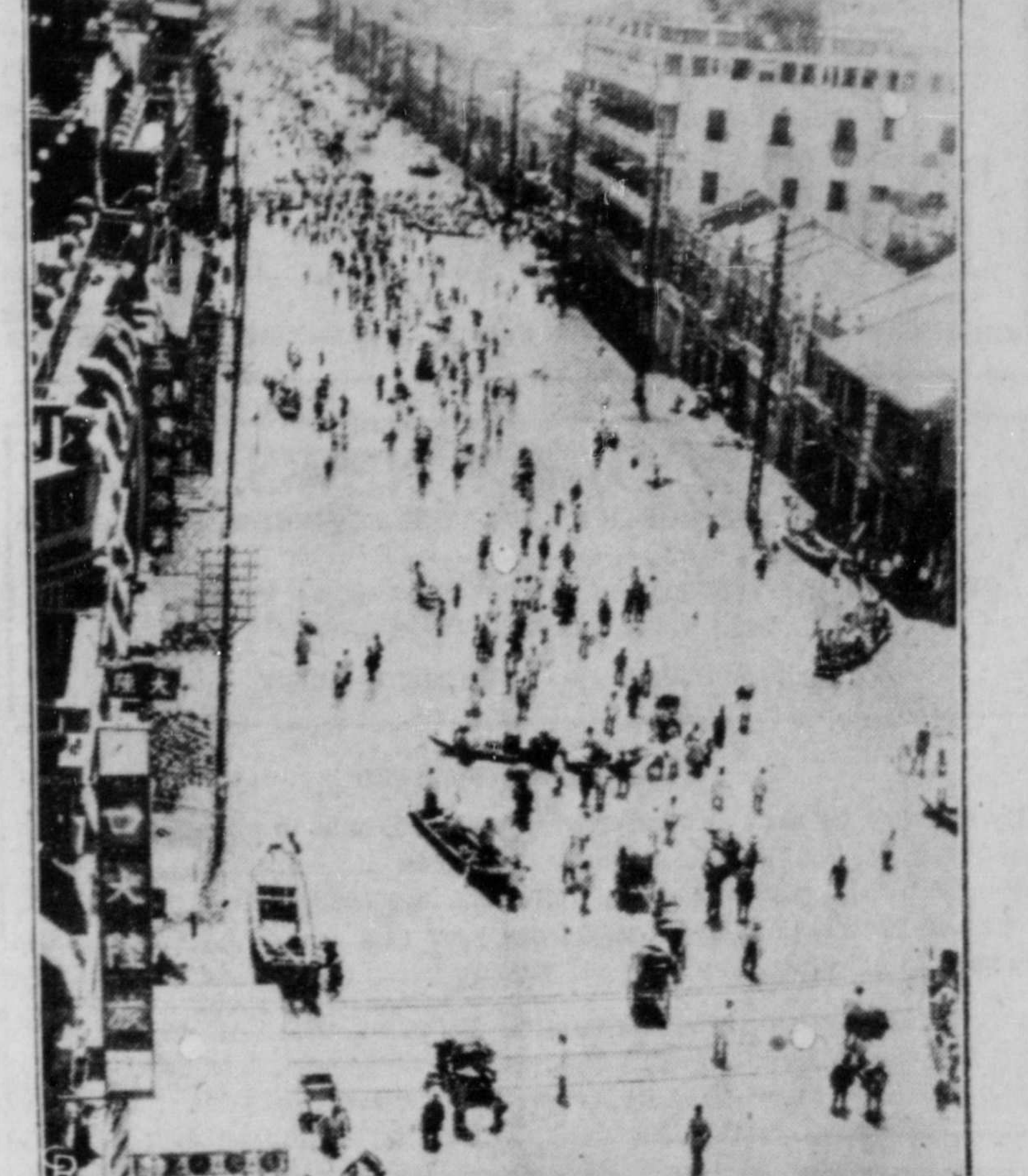
San Diego Heads Report of Separate Republic Being Established

### Thousand Perish in Floods



With ruin upstream inestimable, with bodies and wreckage already sweeping by on the swollen waters of "China's twin sorrows"—the Yangtze and Yellow rivers—Hankow, the commercial centre of central China, one of the world's wealthiest cities, prepares for the worst flood in history. Soldiers and coolies are working on the dykes, which may break at any moment, inundating the city. The crest of the flood has not reached the town yet, and heavy rains indicate a losing battle for the toilers on the levees. Literally thousands have been killed by the raging waters. This photograph, showing a large portion of the city under water, was made in the 1932 flood.

### Timely Recipes

#### GOOSEBERRY CHARM

The poor old gooseberry has started to come into its own on fruit cupboard shelves. The days when dumplings or tarts were its chief outlets are over since the new gooseberry jam has become known. There is a zestful tartness to this jam and its color suggests the coolness of the berry on the bush. Gooseberry jam will undoubtedly be popular as a breakfast sweet and it is a refreshing change with biscuits at tea time or late evening buffet.

The recipe given here has been carefully tested and makes perfect jam of the same delicate shade of the ripe gooseberry.

#### Gooseberry Jam

Four cups (2 lbs.) crushed fruit, 1/2 cup water, 7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar, 1/2 cup bottled fruit pectin. To prepare fruit, crush thoroughly or grind about two pounds fully ripe fruit; measure into large kettle; add one-half cup water; stir until mixture boils. Simmer, covered 15 minutes. Add sugar, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard one minute. Remove from fire and stir in pectin. Skim, pour quickly. Paraffin at once. Makes about 11 six-ounce jars.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

American Halibut Fleet Representatives to Confer On Marketing—Logging at Shawatlans—Salvaging Logs

Representatives of the Seattle and Alaska halibut fleets are expected to confer in Prince Rupert early in August with the Canadian halibut marketing board on the whole question of control measures such as are now being operated under the newly formed Canadian board. The American fleets are reported to be much in favor of coming under some such sort of regulation as is now being applied with constituted authority to the Canadian industry. It is possible that the proposed conferences in Prince Rupert may pave the way to a similarly constituted codification of the American fleet.

The big fish packer Zip of the Nelson Bros. Fisheries Limited was in Prince Rupert from the North Island trolling grounds on Wednesday of this week with 90,000 pounds of springs and cohoes, one of the largest single loads of troll-caught salmon to be landed in a long time by an individual boat at Prince Rupert. The load was disposed of to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at 8c for first class springs and 6c for cohoes and small springs.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1935 season up to and including yesterday totaled 6,259,650 pounds of which 2,899,150 pounds was from Canadian boats and 3,360,000 pounds from American. Landings for the week ending yesterday amounted to 344,500 pounds including 184,000 pounds from Canadian and 160,500 pounds from American vessels. Prices for Canadian fish during the week ranged from a high of 6.5c and 5c paid the Kaien for 15,500 pounds to 5c straight received by the Annabelle for 2,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the week was 7.9c and 5.5c received by the Teddy J. and Jane, 17,000 and 7,500 pounds, and the low 6.5c and 5.5c which the Explorer received for 28,000 pounds.

Dr. L. W. Kergin left last evening aboard his power cruiser Aledor for a week-end argling jaunt to Khtada Lake. He was accompanied by his son, Allan, Gordon Munro, and Robert Mansen. They expect to return home on Monday.

**Improving Fishermen's Floats**  
Word has been received in the city of the appropriation of funds for the carrying out of dredging work and breakwater construction in improvement of the local fishermen's floats just east of the dry dock. The projected work, mention of which has already been made on several occasions in these columns, is expected to get under way shortly.

Skipper Jack O'Donnell of Seattle, with his traveling bookstore,

being a contract to deliver half a million feet there by September 1. Fourteen men are employed in the Shawatlans Lake operation under the personal direction of Reg Green. Hemlock and spruce timber is being taken out.

The Armour Salvage Co. has now picked up a considerable quantity of some three million feet of logs which were strewn around Hecate Straits some weeks ago when two Davis rafts, destined from the J. R. Morgan Logging Co.'s camp on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the mainland, broke up while in tow of the company's tug J. R. formerly Prince Albert. One of the rafts was of cedar and the other of spruce. The salvaged timber is being delivered to the Billmor sawmill at Porpoise Harbor.

The Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess, formerly stationed here, is now at Port Alberni on the West Coast of Vancouver Island engaged in log towing. Capt. Frank Tyler, one time skipper of the Salvage Princess, is now in command of the company's boat Helac II out of Vancouver.

**Purchases Summer Cottage**  
Capt. Paul Armour has purchased the summer cottage of A. T. Parkin at the Salt Lake. It has been re-shingled and two porches added. Mrs. Armour and daughter, June, will be moving in next week for the season.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georson, arrived in port at 4:45 this morning from the south and sailed an hour or so later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The vessel had completed her calls at Skeena River cannery points last evening before coming in here.

Skipper M. M. Stephens had his power cruiser Vera S. Frye out on the cradle at the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club the latter part of this week for painting and hull repairs.

The power vessel Ketonca, belonging to the Nanaimo biological station and operated from McClintock Bay in Massett Inlet in connection with salmon propagation work, has been in port during the week having a new stern put in at the dry dock. David Crocker, engineer from McClintock Bay, has been here with the vessel. Finishing touches are now being put on the job and the vessel will be returning to the islands in a few days.

The Pair of Jacks, Relief, Sea Maid, Oslo and Noreen were local halibut boats leaving today for the fishing grounds. The Melville Domino II, North Portland, Cape Race and P. Doreen will leave tomorrow.

Returning south after a regular voyage to Alaska with a large group of round trip tourists on board, C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. W. Q. Palmer, is due in port at 3:45 this afternoon

from Skagway and other Alaska points and will sail at 5:30 p.m. for Vancouver.

**Salmon Fishing**  
An average of about forty fish per boat is reported for the Skeena River gillnet salmon fishing during the past two or three days, this being an improvement over the first of the week. Naas River boats are averaging about twenty-five fish. A good run continues at Rivers Inlet where the average is about 100 fish per boat. No date has yet been set for the closing of fishing with sockeye nets. It is a little early yet for seine fish to make an appearance.

Paying its first visit to this port, the Boeing flying boat of the Pioneer Airways of Ocean Falls, in charge of Pilot W. L. McCluskey, veteran northern commercial flier, arrived here at 10 o'clock this morning from Ocean Falls with party of passengers headed by Bert Phillips. The ship has been operating for the past few months in commercial air service along the coast. Its base having been moved recently from Ocean Falls to Powell River.

### Royalty Weary But Satisfied

Swedish House Retires For Summer With Cheers of People Ringing True

STOCKHOLM, July 27: (CP)—One of the hard-working royal families in the world has retreated to summer palace, wearied by a strenuous season of festivities and ceremonies, but not without a certain amount of mental satisfaction. For members of the Swedish royal house, from top to bottom, have had convincing proof that Socialist Sweden has no apparent desire as yet to do away with Kings and Queens.

At the wedding of Princess Ingrid and Crown Prince Frederik the largest street crowds ever to assemble in Stockholm roared their approval of a royal family. Husky Socialist workmen stood on stepladders, climbed trees and struggled for a chance to look at royalty, along with dyed-in-the-wool Royalists, Sweden, with a Socialist ticket in one hand, used the other to wave a handkerchief at a Princess who married a Prince.
