WELL KNOWN VESSEL IS IN MISHAP

STEAMER NORTH SEA IN STRANDING UP COAST; IS REPORTED BADLY HOLED

Was on Her Way From Western Alaska to Ketchikan When She Struck on Point Marsh in Dense Fog This Morning

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, while bound into Ketchikan from the west coast of Southeastern Alaska, went aground in a dense fog at 4 o'clock this morning at Point Marsh on the southwest tip of Prince of Wales Island but was able to refloat herself on the rising tide about a couple of hours later. Reported to be badly holed, she was proceeding this morning to Ketchikan under her own power. It was announced this afternoon that she had arrived safely at Ketchikan.

An order was sent here for tugs and salvage equipment but this was not acted upon after it was learned she was refloated. An examination at Ketchikan will determine whether she will have to be brought here for dry docking or whether she will be able to continue her voyage to Seattle. The North Sea is a well known veteran vessel of this coast, having formerly been the Admiral Line steamer Admiral Peoples. A couple of years ago she was acquired by the Northland Transportation Co. and practically rebuilt. The North Sea was to have called here after Ketchikan to discharge fish for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways.

Inaccurate Report Dispatches from Seattle today stated that the Bremerton naval station had intercepted a message from the steamship North Sea stating "we are sinking." The message, which does not appear to have been accurate, added that 180 passengers and members of the crew had taken to the lifeboats. The ship's position was given in this message as Dixon's Entrance, Alaska waters.

Eighteen Months In Endako Trial

Case of William Bennett Concluded At Assizes This Afternoon

Taking of crown evidence in the case of William R. Bennett of Endako, charged on several counts of statutory offences, was concluded yesterday afternoon at the Supreme Court Assizes here and the case adjourned until this morning for argument of counsel. The case went to the jury at noon today and this afternoon a conviction on four counts of indecent assault was returned. Sentence of eighteen months' imprisonment at Okalla was imposed by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald.

GRAND TRUNK SHAREHOLDERS WIN CASE

BECOMES DICTATOR

Powers of Chancellor von Schuschnigg Are Greatly Extended Co-Dictator Out

VIENNA, May 14: (CP) - As a result of a decree promulgated last night greatly extending his powers, Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg becomes virtual dictator of Austria.

Prince Ernst Rudiger von Starhemberg, vice-chancellor and former co-dictator, was dropped from the cabinet while Schuschnigg is made minister of defence and assumes control of foreign affairs.

Von Starhemberg's private army, the Heimwehr, refused recently to carry out the government's plan for dissolution of such organizations.

Yesterday von Schuschnigg sent a telegram to Premier Mussolini of Italy congratulating him on his victory over Ethiopia. It was "a glorious victory over barbarism," declared Schuschnigg.

Paused Briefly at Athens in Course Of Capetown-London Flight

ATHENS, May 14: (CP) - Amy Johnson Mollison stopped here today long enough to refuel and then took off toward London on a flight designed to break the Capetown to London speed record.

Khartoum to Cairo KHARTOUM, Sudan, May 14: (CP) - Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison, famous British aviatrix, left for Cairo yesterday five minutes after she landed here in the course of her projected speed record flight from Capetown to England.

WAGES TO BE PROBED

Investigation Into Scale Paid By B.C. Shingle Mills Ordered By Minister of Labor

VICTORIA, May 14: (CP) - Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor, announced yesterday that a departmental investigation into wages paid by British Columbia shingle mills would be opened today.

Mr. Pearson called for the probe following the spread of the mill workers' strike to approximately thirteen plants on the mainland and several scattered factories on Vancouver Island. The strikers are demanding higher wages and union recognition.

OKLAHOMA PEN BREAK

One Prison Official Loses His Life - Six Convicts Escape, Six Recaptured

McALESTER, Oklahoma, May 14 (Canadian Press) - Twenty-four convicts broke loose from Oklahoma State Penitentiary yesterday, used a foreman as a shield before they killed him, dumping the body from an automobile while their band were being shot down by guards. Six of the escaping prisoners were recaptured unharmed. Five others got away, taking a guard as a hostage.

Another lone convict used an ice truck to escape but his capture is believed imminent.

BUDDHIST BISHOP HERE

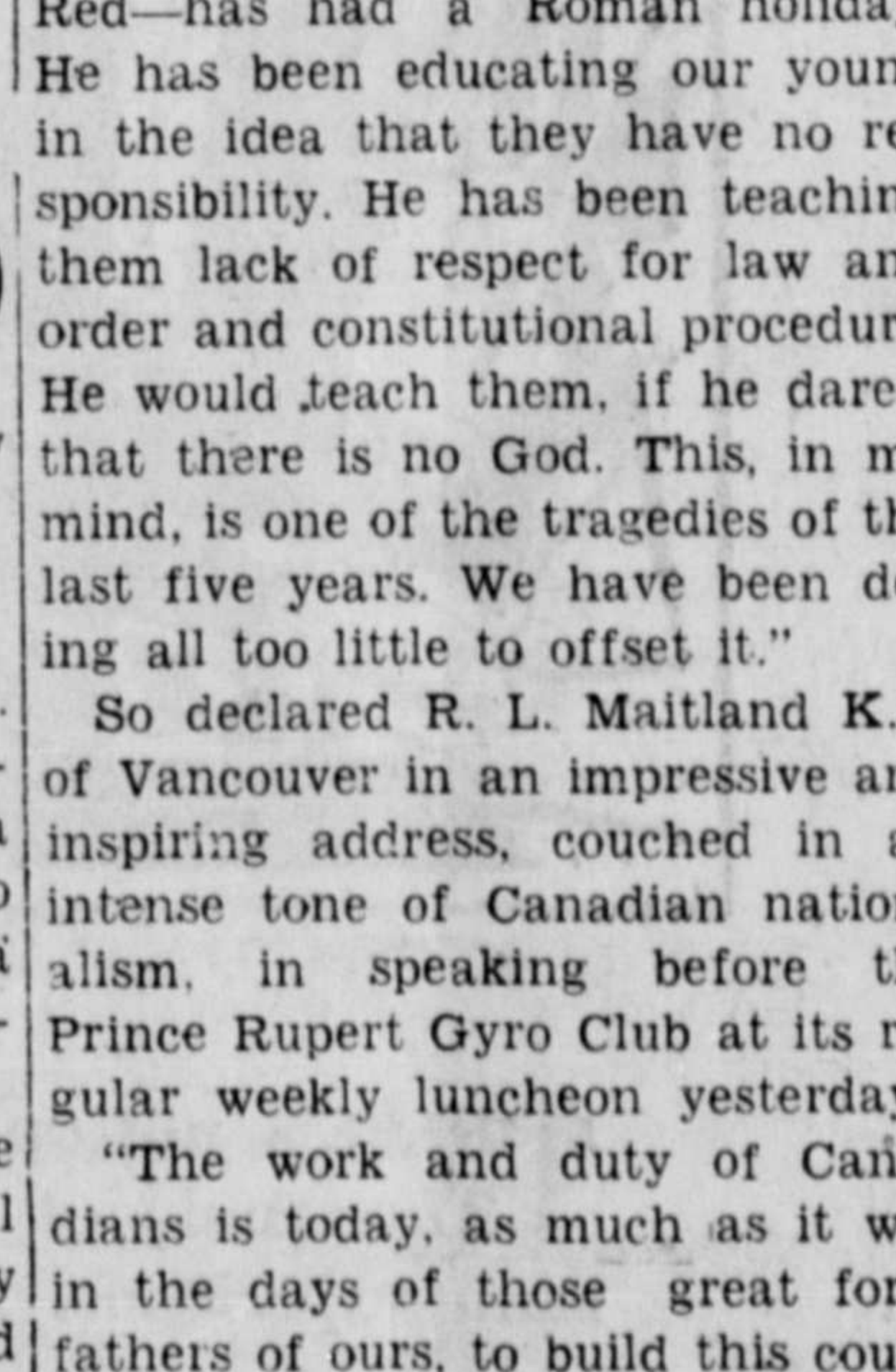

Advocated by Visiting Speaker In Inspiring Gyro Club Address

"I do not wish to be misunderstood for I am not unsympathetic with those who find themselves in need but I do say that there are too many people today who think the government owes them a living. The world—not the government—owes every man a living but it challenges him to go out and get that living. I commend to you the spirit of the old pioneers of Canada to fight our own battles. During the past five years the agitator—the Red—has had a Roman holiday. He has been educating our young in the idea that they have no responsibility. He has been teaching them lack of respect for law and order and constitutional procedure. He would teach them, if he dared, that there is no God. This, in my mind, is one of the tragedies of the past five years. We have been doing all too little to offset it."

Privy Council Finds Against Railway In Long Standing Suit

Sees No Ground Upon Which Claim For Damages, Alleging Breach of Duty in Removing Names From Register, Can be Prevented From Proceeding

LONDON, May 14: (CP) - The Privy Council today allowed the appeal of George Lovibond, acting for holders of Grand Trunk Railway stock in litigation concerning the terms on which the Grand Trunk Railway was taken over by the Canadian National Railways fifteen years ago. Lovibond originally brought action through the Ontario courts for declaration that he and other holders of Grand Trunk shares were illegally deprived of their holdings.

The Privy Council found that, if the stock still exists and the claim of Lovibond succeeds, the only person to be deprived of stock would be the crown. With respect to the claim for damages against the Grand Trunk Railway alleging breach of duty in removing plaintiff's names from the registers, the Privy Council saw no ground upon which the claim could be prevented from proceeding.

RESORT IS FIRESWEPT

Conflagration Sunday Afternoon At Frizzell's Hot Springs On Skeena River

A two-storey apartment house and a newly-erected bathhouse at Frizzell's Hot Springs on the Skeena River were destroyed with loss estimated at \$1800 by fire which broke out at 2 o'clock last Sunday afternoon. The fire was caused by a spark from a chimney falling on the dry roof and, there being a brisk westerly breeze blowing at the time, the two buildings were entirely consumed within half an hour.

Only the fact that the wind was blowing toward the mountainside saved other buildings from destruction. Four bath tanks, furnishings including beds, dishes, etc. were lost. Mrs. Frizzell's new house, cabins and another cottage are among the remaining buildings. Two bath tanks were also saved. Guests at the resort at the time were R. G. Cunningham of Port Essington, Mr. Johnson of Prince Rupert and Andrew Warnock. The last mentioned lost his clothes. Construction of a new bathhouse will start next Monday and a new apartment house will also be erected to be in readiness by the middle of June.

Ben Severson Laid at Rest

Funeral Yesterday Afternoon of Well Known Pioneer Salmon Troller

The funeral of the late Ben Severson, well known local salmon troller who had been a resident of Prince Rupert for twenty-seven years, was held yesterday afternoon from the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Rev. Lawrence C. Jensen, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, officiated and A. J. Lancaster presided at the organ for the accompaniment of the hymns which were "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Unto the Hills." Interment was later made in Fairview Cemetery. Robert Rae, Neil McDonald, Donald Brown, Jack Morrison, Matthew Murray and Robert Wagar were pallbearers. There were a number of floral tributes.

The late Mr. Severson was 69 years of age and a native of Norway. He was unmarried. There is a sister in Norway. Deceased passed away in the Prince Rupert General Hospital last Saturday evening.

Jap Fisherman Of Essington Passes

Fukutaro Nishihara Passes Away In Hospital Where He Had Been For Some Time

The death occurred yesterday afternoon in the Prince Rupert General Hospital, where he had been a patient for four months suffering from diabetes of Fukutaro Nishihara, aged 58, Japanese fisherman of B. A. Cannery, Port Essington. Deceased had been a resident of the Skeena River for years and was well known. The funeral will take place on Sunday with the B. C. Undertakers in charge of arrangements.

**NEED OF GOOD NEIGHBORS**

One of the desirable things in this life is to have good neighbors. This is true of countries as well as individuals. In order to get the best out of life it is necessary that neighboring countries trade with each other, visit back and forth and co-operate on great issues.

For years the United States tried the policy of fiscal aloofness. Finding that did not make for the best conditions for their citizens she has changed her policy and is now making trade agreements. She made one with Canada some months ago and this was followed this week by an agreement with France under which the two countries can the more easily purchase the products of the other country.

Canada made a flight into the circle of fiscal exclusiveness but the people did not like it and today we are prepared to trade on reasonable terms with any nation that will trade with us. We, as a nation, recognize that we cannot live to ourselves. We have to be neighborly with other nations or we injure ourselves. It is not neighborly to put the tariff wall so high that we cannot do business with each other.

**HOT FOR CRIMINALS**

The United States is making it hot for criminals. The authorities have been going after them of late as if they really wanted to catch them, and the result has been a general round-up of those who live by contravening the laws of the country. A few of them have been executed but most are serving long terms in penitentiaries or are awaiting trial. Such a policy will result in fewer crimes being committed.

What applies to individuals in a country may also apply to countries and in time, doubtless, we shall work out a system of international criminology under which a nation that breaks the international code will be made to suffer. In the past, while we have applied the law of punishing the evil-doers to individuals in a country, we have not attempted to apply it to nations. Of late, however, the world has been undergoing a marvellous change and international morality is becoming a factor in world politics. Precedent is no longer looked upon as an excuse for international crimes.

proven such a success—an Empire which was seven times the size of the Roman Empire at its greatest and which included one-quarter of the population of the world.

He had no criticism or unfriendliness for the United States, continued the speaker, but he did feel that there was a danger, through the radio, the newspapers, the magazines and the moving pictures, of Canadians—especially the young—learning more about the United States than they did about Canada. He pleaded for a development of a pride in Canada. The memory of Canadian builders should be kept green with the thought that there were things that might be accomplished today by Canadians. Greater attention should be paid to Canadian history and literature. There was romance, glory and beauty in Canada upon which a spirit of pride should be developed among the young Canadians.

"The spirit of the men who overcame difficulties in this country of ours in the past is what we want today," asserted Mr. Maitland "Instead of teaching our children that the government owes them a living, we should teach them that they come of a people who are able to overcome difficulties and do things for themselves. We should teach them respect for law and order, a belief in constitutional government and inspire in them the same ideals and spirit of the pioneers who have gone before and blazed the trail."

The more he travelled through British Columbia, said Mr. Maitland in the course of his address, the more was he inspired with the great potentialities of this country and the opportunities which it presented.

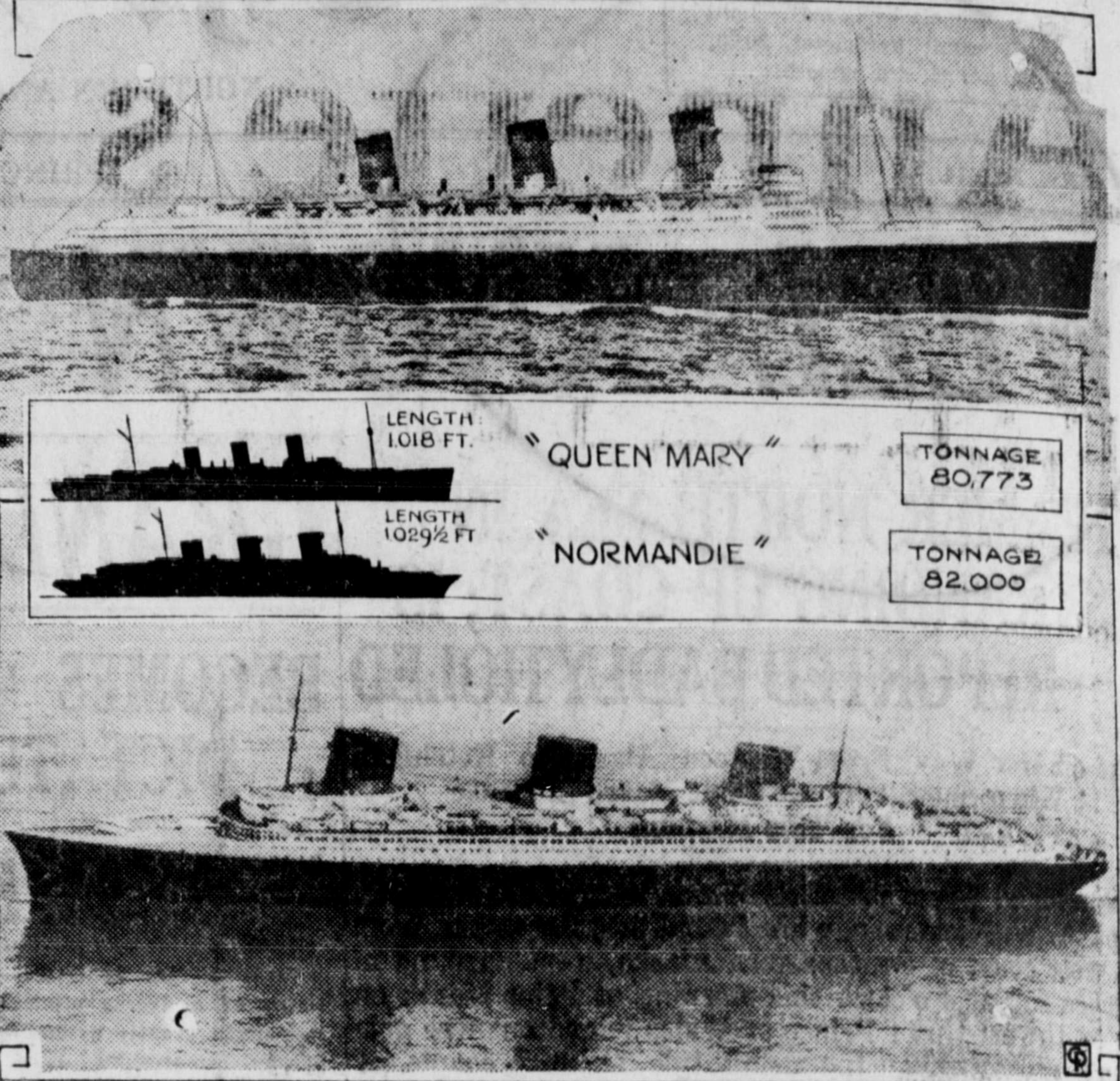

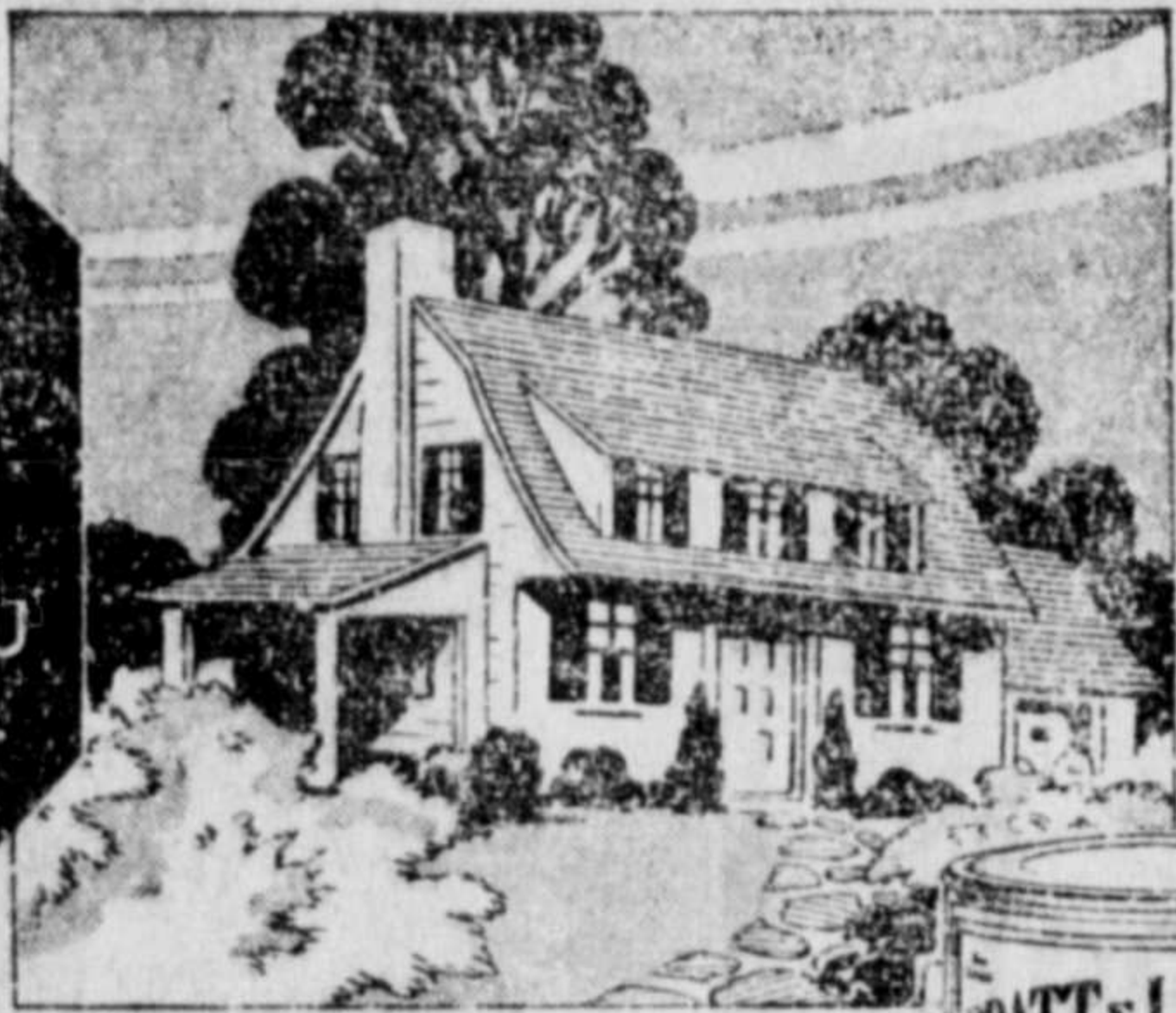

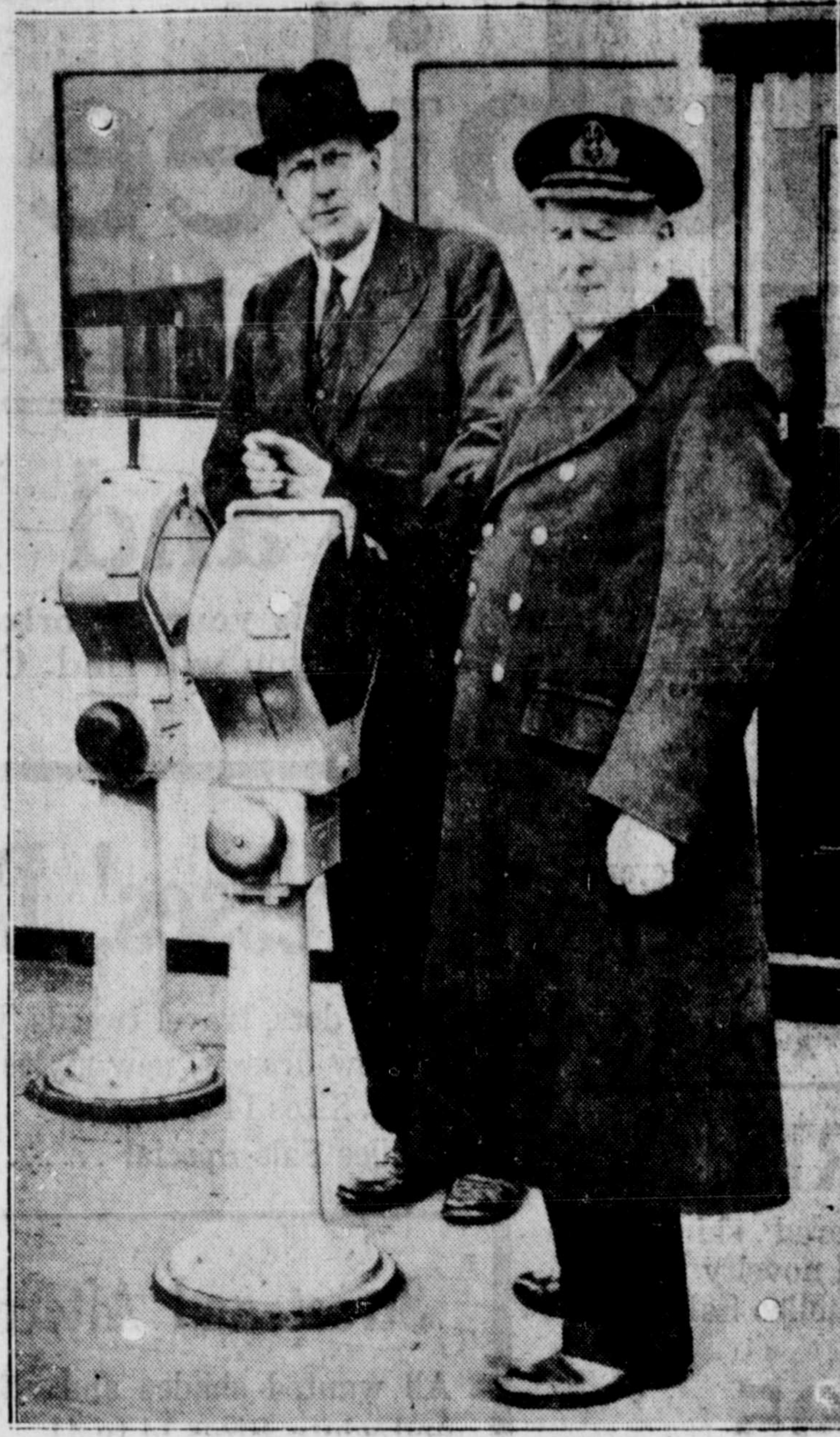

Mrs. Baldwin Joins Women of History in Declaring Helplessness of Men

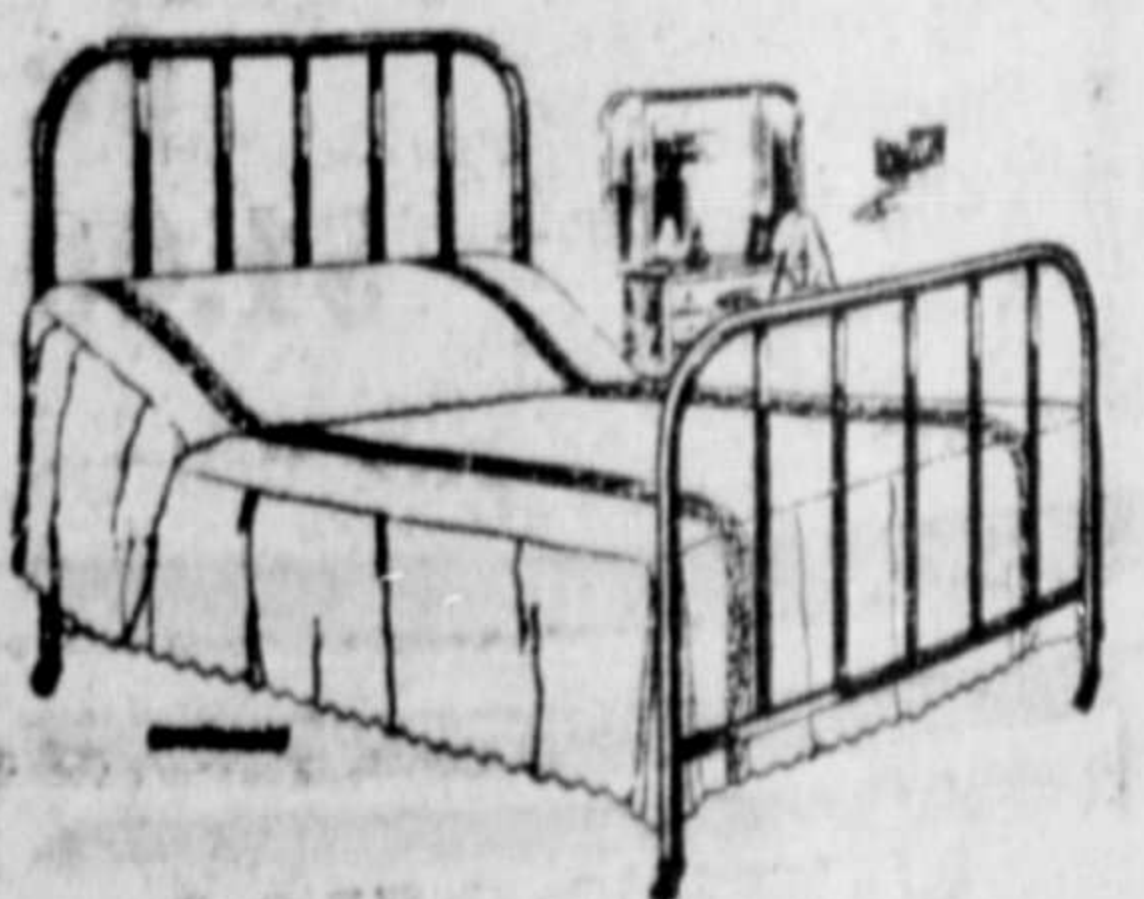

For almost 250 years it has been in service, and it appears good another 200, claims A. Wheatley, the owner.

Standing 18 inches high, in a casing of oak and ebony, it is carefully decorated with pierced brasswork. The hour figures are of the Roman numeral type, with the minute numbers to 60 on the dial.

A small cable on the side when pulled causes the clock to strike the hour and quarter hours.

A metal band protecting the mechanism reads "Luke Wyse, Reading." Records show the maker was a member of the London Clockmaker's Guild in 1694.

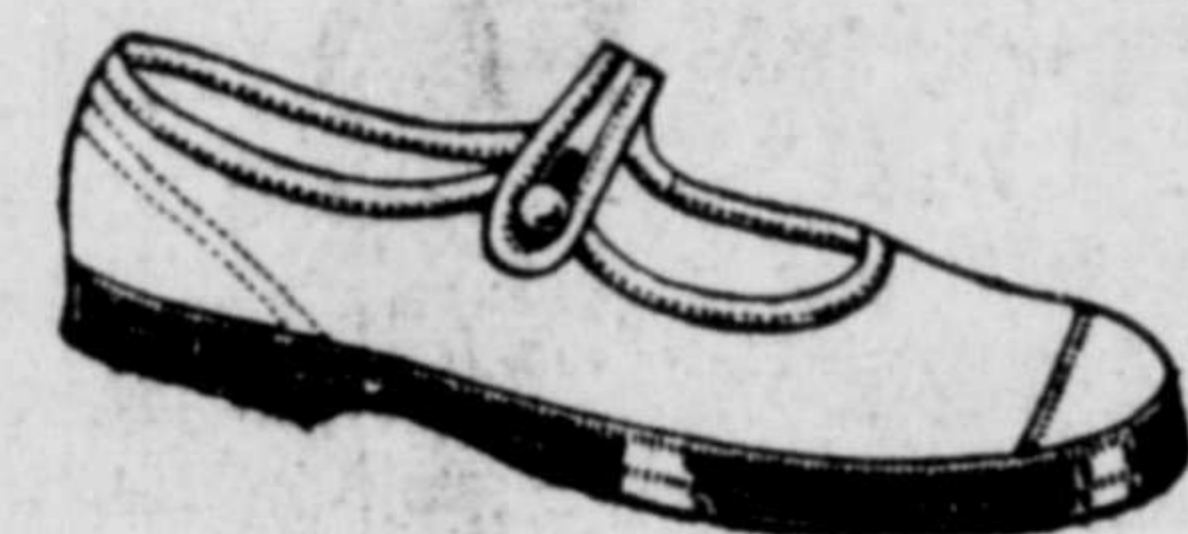

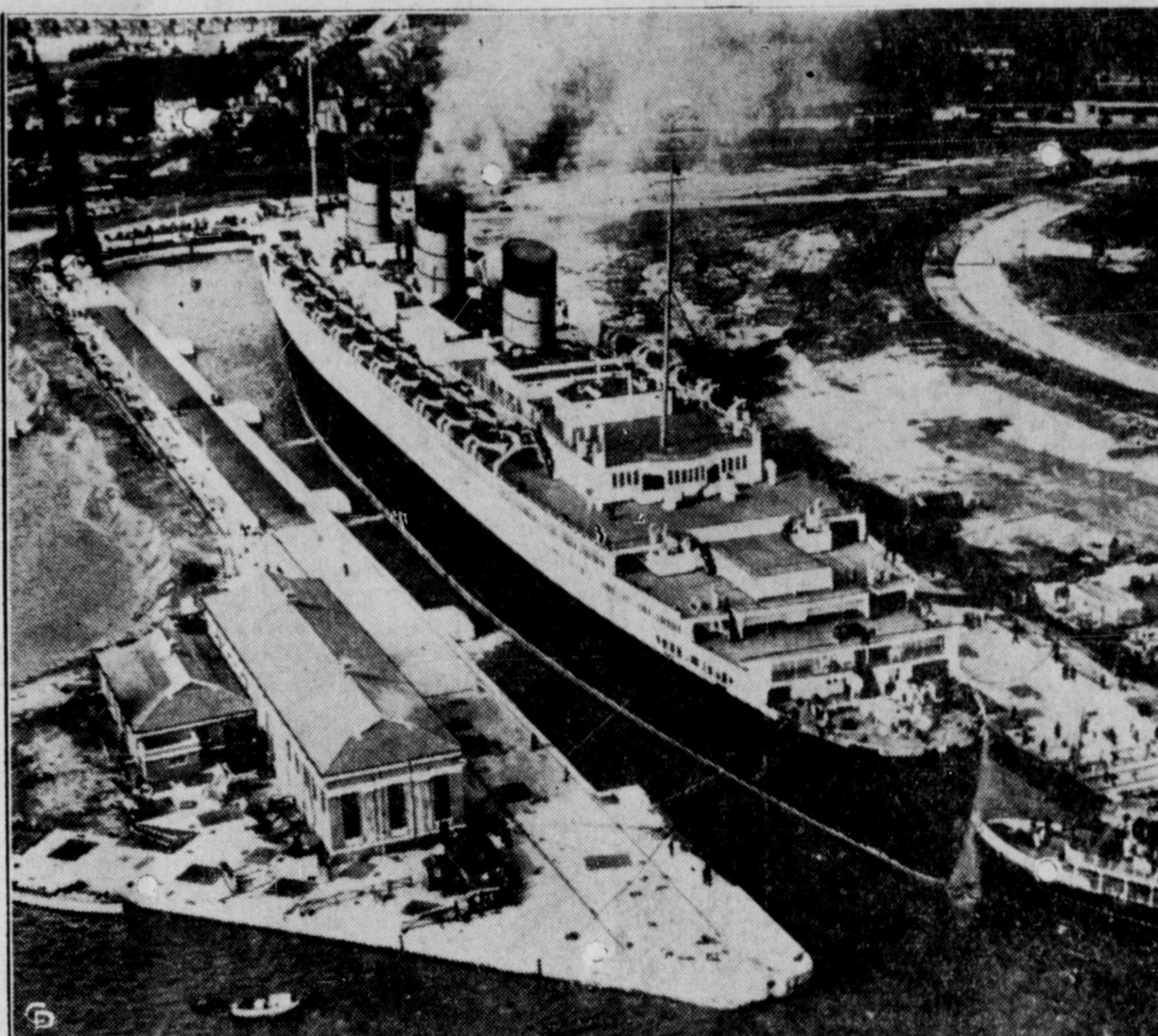

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## GANDHI IN SECLUSION

Writer Finds Indian Leader Alert And Healthy With False Teeth Laid Away as Useless

DELHI, India, May 14: (AP) — From the position of a world figure, Mahatma Gandhi, India's erstwhile champion of liberty, has declined almost into obscurity. This is not because the Mahatma has lost any of his popularity or prestige among India's teeming millions of peasants, but rather because the man who has been fighting the British Empire for 40 years, has deliberately sought seclusion, to study the causes of his failure to win independence for India, and to plan the future.

Although the Mahatma temporarily is out of the limelight, he exercises as much power and influence today among the Indian masses as he ever did. He still is venerated almost as a god. The people appear to have infinite faith in his honesty, sincerity and methods.

The Indian leader no longer makes speeches, writes articles, or does spectacular things. For that reason the outer world seldom hears about him. He appears to be doing a sort of Rip Van Winkle stunt, but his friends say his retirement will be nothing like 20 years, but more like a single year. They predict that some day he will spring a surprise on the British authorities, something spectacular that again will rivet world attention upon him.

### Is Not Telling

The Mahatma is not giving away his plans in connection with the imminent launching of the new constitution in India. When approached at his little hut in the "untouchables" colony, on the outskirts of Delhi, and asked for a statement of his program, he said: "A good general never discloses his plans until the day of action. America must wait until then. Then it will see for itself what I am doing. For the present I must detach myself from the outer world and meditate."

Despite alarming reports reports respecting Gandhi's health, he appears to be in excellent condition. If anything, he seems more alert and younger than he was in 1931. But his friends say his fluctuating blood pressure, which sometimes rises alarmingly, gives his doctors a good deal of worry. They also say that the wiry and tenacious little leader lacks the

energy and endurance he showed in bygone years. His memory, too, they declare, has become impaired, and he is not so quick of thought and speech as formerly. At times, they say, he has to grope for the right word or phrase.

But he still takes a three-mile walk each morning and evening, eats his meals of goat's milk, almond paste and tomato salad, and lives an extremely careful and well regulated life.

Although he has had all his teeth removed, Gandhi refuses to wear false teeth, and therefore lisps.

### Abandons False Teeth

"Artificial teeth," he says, "form only another form of modern torture. If people confined themselves to wholesome liquid food, like goat's milk, they wouldn't need teeth. For many years he wore an upper set of false teeth, but only at meal time. Miss Madeleine Slade, his English disciple, who was custodian of the plate, has put the false ivories away on a shelf.

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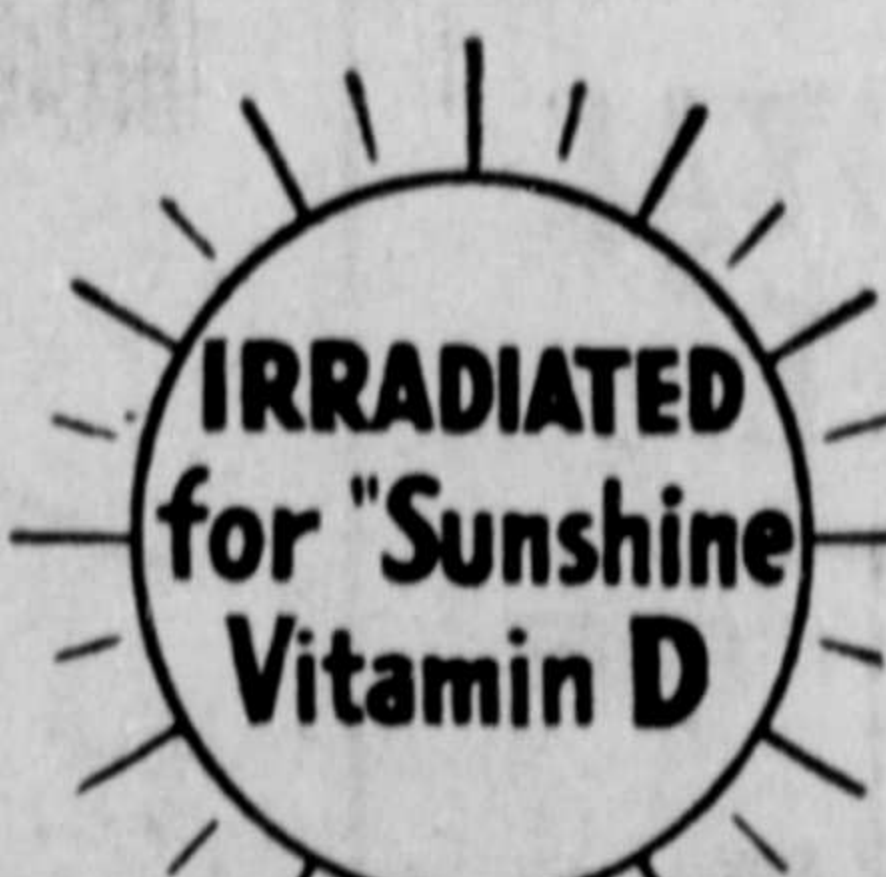
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
