LONDON, Jan. 18: (CP)-Rudyard Kipling, creator of "Kim," Din," "Stalky and Comthe swashbuckling "Sergeant Mulvaney" and a host of other rare beings who roved the pages of a hundred books in verse and prose, passed away at 12:10 midnight in Middlesex Hospital less than five days after he had undergone an operation for a perforated stomach ulcer. While his condition had remained extremely pectedly. 




