LONDON, Aug. 17:-Following a conference Saturday night as a result of which it was stated the two nations had drawn closer together in regard to a policy of neutrality and non-intervention in the Spanish civil war, the Foreign Office announced that Great Britain and France had reached full agreement on French proposals to prohibit the export of arms and munitions to Spain. The British government announced that it would withdraw protection from any firms supplying war materials to either of the Spanish belligerents in the civil war. Britain now takes the stand that responsibility for the future of non-intervention rests with Italy. In Paris there are said to be fears of a neutrality breakdown because of shipment of British civil air-

Fact Cramming, More Preparation For Life Aim Of Education Dep't

VICTORIA, Aug. 15: (CP)-When British Columbia boys and girls return to school in September they will find an entirely new teaching system in their classes. Under a program announced by Hon. G. M. Weir, provincial minister of edu-'cation, a fresh approach is to be made to education—the most modern approach, Dr. Weir believes, in America.

Education of the child for life rather than filling him with facts is the principle behind the new curricula education experts have been working out for a year. Dr. Weir's many committees of experts, headed by D. L. McLaurin, Dr. H. B. King, H. N. MacCorkindale, C. B. Wood and Dr. J. R. Sanderson, required a 247-page book to cover their plans for grades one to six. A second volume of the same size will be issued late in August outining the program for junior high schools. A third treatise in 1937 will cover high schools.

The provincial minister and nationally - known educational authority regards the first book the most modern treatise in elementary education in America, probably in the world.

In exhaustive detail the volume tells the British Columbia teacher how to make education a training in the use of the mind and in development of character. It covers! games, conversation and home life.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8.000 feet per acre west of that Range. Applications for pre-emptions are to b addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for live years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.


