DAVID LAMSON IS ACQUITTED SAN JOSE, Calif., April 3: (CP)—Wife murder charges against David Lamson, former Stanford University executive, were dismissed today and the former Red Deer, Alta., man was at once liberated. He was once convicted but was granted a new trial in which the jury disagreed. At the third trial the jury was unable to reach a verdict. The jury had been out in the fourth trial for two weeks before reaching its verdict of acquittal. Lamson was alleged to have beaten his wife to death with a piece of pipe as she bathed.

CORDELE, Ga., April 3: (CP)—Damage as a result of wind and rainstorm, which centred here on Wednesday and took a toll of at least forty lives, did damage estimated at \$1,500,000 and, together with the floods of the Tennessee and other rivers, left at least a thousand people homeless, it was estimated last night.

BRUNO HAS MAY PAY

Wendel Investigation Discontinued—Hauptmann To "Burn" Tonight

TRENTON, N.J., April 3: (CP)—Removing what should be the last obstacle to the carrying out of the execution tonight of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnap-murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr., the Mercer County grand jury last night discontinued its investigation into the circumstances of the repudiated "confession" of Paul H. Wendel, Trenton lawyer.



It was pending the conclusion of the investigation that Warden Kimberling at the last moment postponed Hauptmann's execution from Tuesday night until tonight.

### FEW MAKE BIG FUSS

A few people can make a big fuss over very little especially when they want to make or save money by doing so. That has been proven many times in the past and is still quite evident. Take as an example the mining securities legislation of the present government. The law was passed in an attempt to protect people who put their money into mining ventures. Pretty soon when some promoters found it difficult to promote mining companies without conforming to the new regulations there was a roar and a demand was made that the law should be set aside as being inimical to the best interests of the mining industry.

The mining committee went into the whole question and decided that the law should remain on the statute books as a protection for innocent investors.

### THE ABYSSINIAN WAR

While there seems no doubt that Italy has been crushing her way into Abyssinia and has taken some of the centres of population classed as towns which are really collections of mud huts, there seems to be considerable doubt if they will make sufficient headway before the rainy season sets in to enable them to force their will on the country.

Abyssinia is said to be a terrible country for white people during the rainy season, which lasts for a number of months. The country is in the summer alive with insects and reptiles and life there is not impossible but very difficult. Camps have to be constructed in such a way as to provide for all the disabilities of the season. The probability is that the Ethiopians are looking forward with great hope to the time when their enemies are handicapped by the weather and will be unable to advance any farther and may even have to retire.

If the Italians can force the fighting to such a point as to compel the Ethiopians to surrender or to sign a treaty before the rainy season comes, they will probably be glad to be rid of an unpleasant duty.

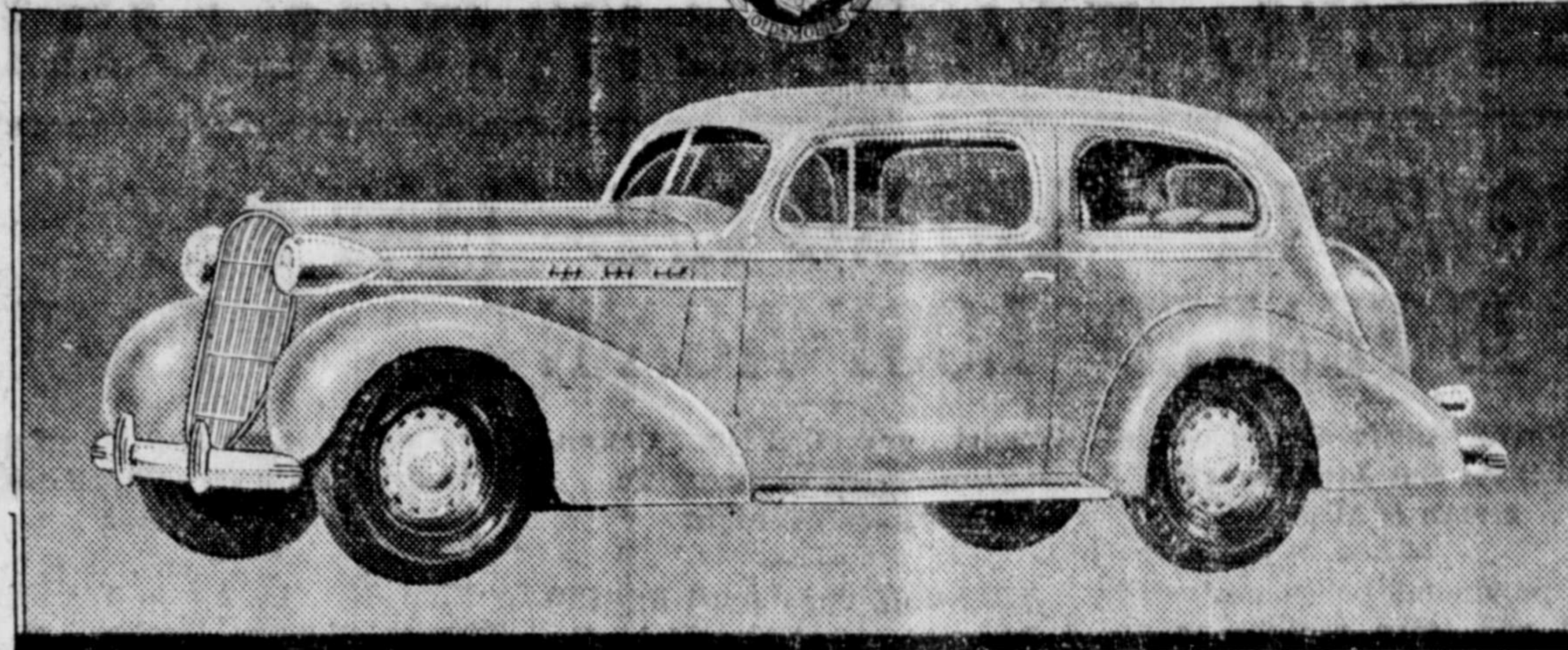
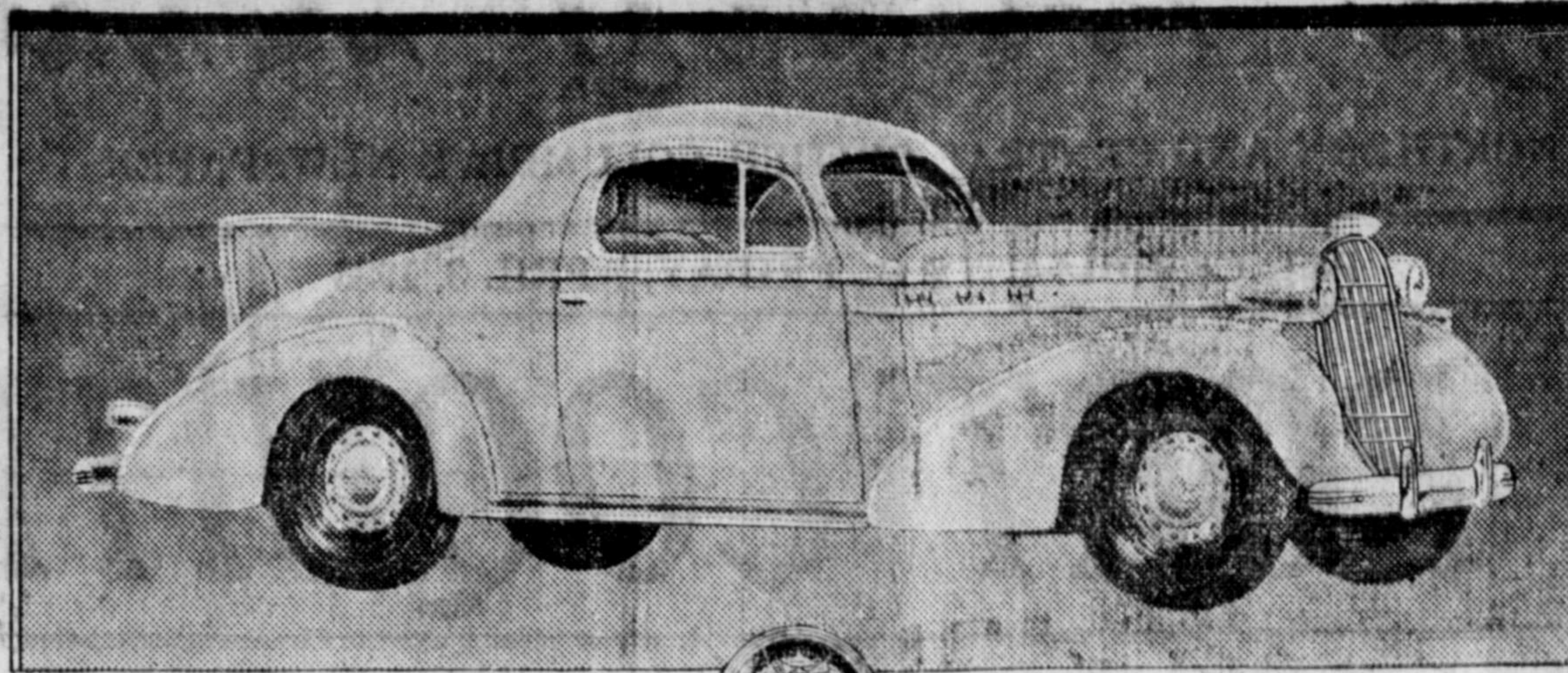

## CHAPTER OF PIONEERING

Notables Were Present When Cornerstone of Fredericton Railway Bridge Was Laid

FREDERICTON, April 3: (CP)—With the destruction of the Canadian National Railways nine-span bridge across the St. John River by ice this spring, another chapter of rugged pioneering by a colorful New Brunswick figure was closed.

Had it not been for Alexander Gibson, York county's industrial pioneer, the bridge might never have been built. It was he, who with Senator Thomas Temple, built the structure to carry the trains of the Northern and Western Railway into Fredericton. Senator J. B. Snowball and Alexander Gibson were partners in the railway company and, while the road was under construction, Gibson entered into partnership with Senator Temple in building the bridge.

The cornerstone was laid June 20, 1887, in the presence of such notables as Sir John A. Macdonald, Lady Macdonald, Sir Leonard Tilley, then Lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick, Lady Tilley and others. Lady Macdonald laid the cornerstone.

In 1904 the railway from South Devon to Loggieville, 124 miles, became part of the Intercolonial system. The following year the bridge was turned over to the Canadian government.

At the laying of the cornerstone Senator Temple was called upon to make the important speech of the occasion. As the story goes, the Senator, who seemed to be able to see plainly the human side of things, faced the huge gathering for a moment, then turned to the workmen and shouted: "All right boys, let 'er plunk," and sat down.

Hurd Belyea, who is still living in Fredericton, was one of the firemen on the two locomotives and five cars of rails used as a test train when the bridge was opened.

### SYDNEY HARBOR THRIVES

SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 3: (CP)—Sydney's world-famous harbor berthed more shipping last year than at any time in its history. Official figures disclose last year's tonnage totalled 17,536,164, comprising 6,855 ships. The previous record of 1927 was exceeded by more than 1,000,000 tons. The harbor is now claimed to be the busiest in the southern hemisphere.

## Twenty-Five Years Ago

April 3, 1911

Twenty-four beds have arrived from Birmingham, England, for installation in the Prince Rupert General Hospital.

A special excursion is to be run next week-end by the steamer Prince George to Stewart, leaving Sunday morning and returning Monday.

Indicating Prince Rupert's growth, an increase in customs receipts for the Port of Prince Rupert is announced. The total revenue for this March was \$5,844.41 as compared with \$5,606.52 in the same month last year. (The revenue for this March was \$5,205.60.)

## Snakes and Cats Rout Island Rats

Sydney, Australia, Rids Itself Of Rodents—Reptiles Also Gone

SYDNEY, N.S.W., April 3: (CP)—Shipping officials, worried over the depredations of rats in the store-houses and wharves on Thursday Island, near Cape York, hit on the plan of freeing dozens of domestic cats on the island.

The cats performed yeoman service in ridding the island of the rodents but were not in sufficient numbers to combat natural increase of the pests.

Two large carpet snakes, deadly enemies of rats, were procured and placed in the rafters of the store-house. The reptiles sleep by day and work by night. After a week's trial the island manager reported the rats had entirely disappeared—but so had the snakes. Only the cats are left. Fate of the snakes is a matter of conjecture.

DELIA, Alta., April 3: (CP)—Two boys who dropped pieces of carbide in the town water-tank caused fears of ptomaine poisoning after many residents complained of stomach pains. Police investigated and the boys confessed.

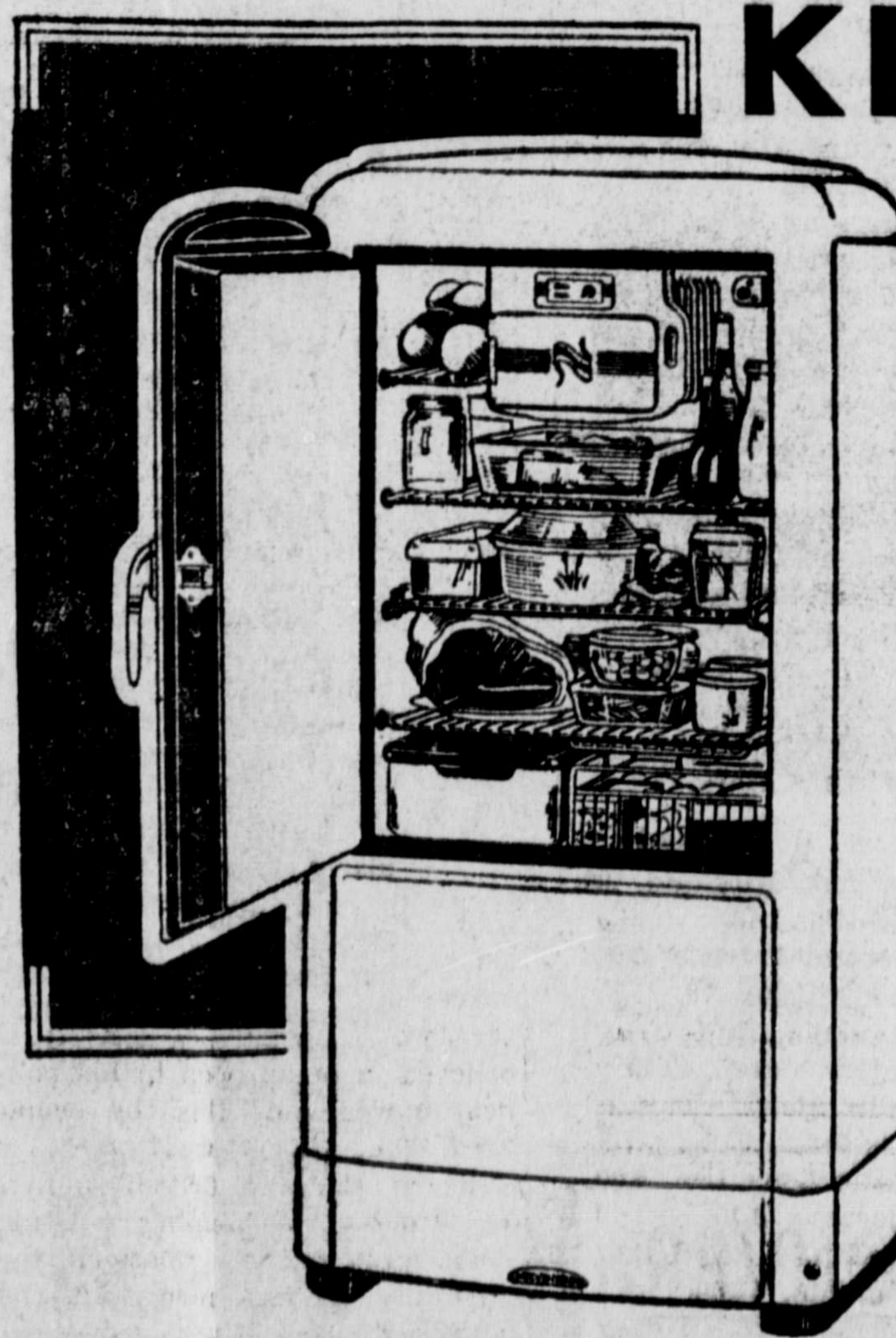

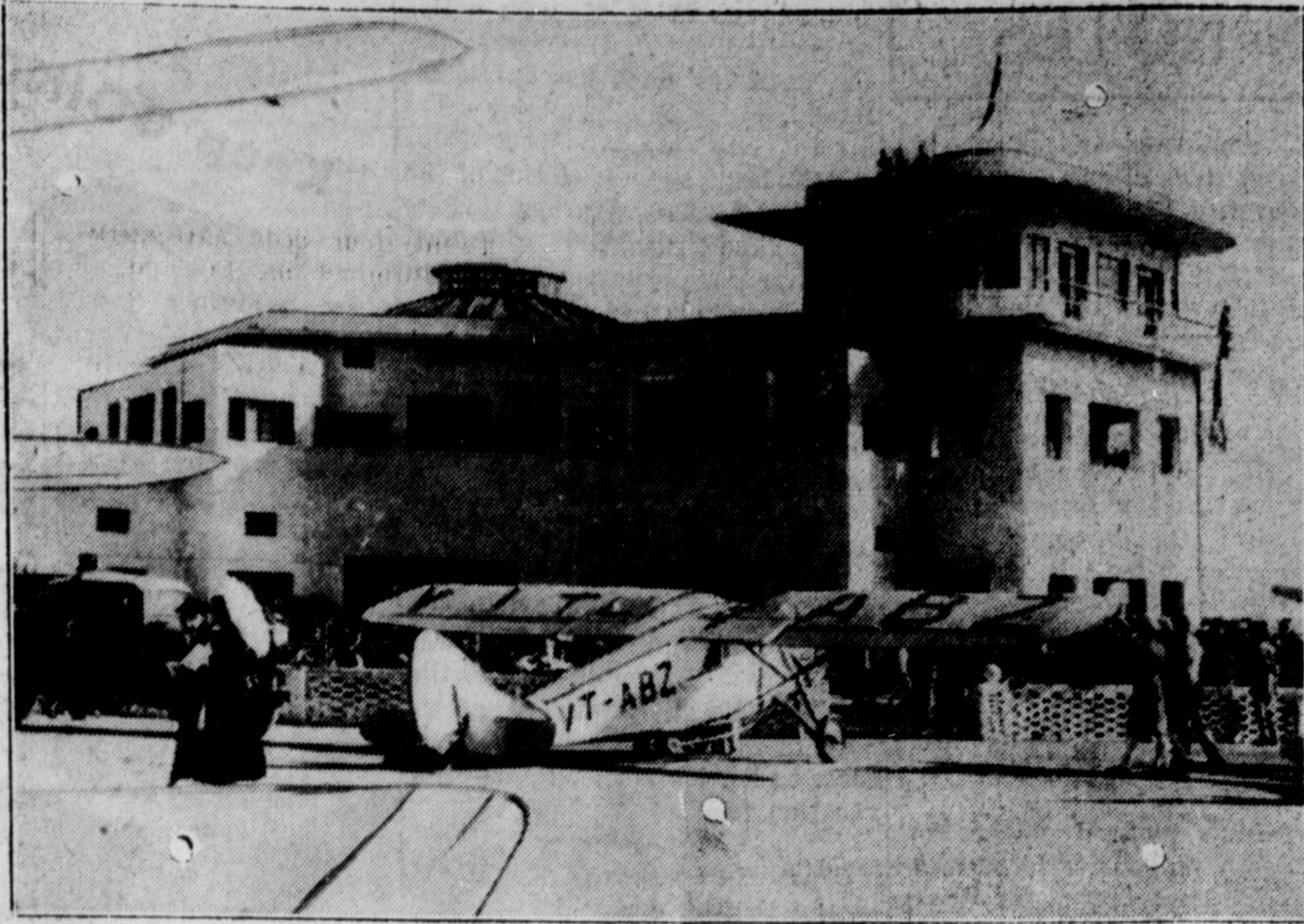

## District News

### NEW HAZELTON

### TERRACE

Mrs. E. Willie has gone to Winnipeg to spend some time with friends there.

Terrace continues to live up to its character for resourcefulness. It will be remembered that, when the bank closed the local branch office, the postmaster immediately expropriated the premises adjoining and thus extended the accommodation for his staff and for the public, while at the same time adding a savings bank department to Terrace's post office service. Now, in spite of the government's proclaimed prohibition of the roads to heavy traffic during the period of transition from winter to spring at which time the roads become soft in the strong March sunshine, the Terrace logging op-

erators are circumventing that handicap to their business by the simple expedient of doing their heavy hauling by night while Jack Frost is still supreme. Thus no harm is done to the roads and business is enabled to go on without interruption.

Terrace Public School presented a very creditable performance on Saturday last, in the Oddfellows' Hall. There was a long program of songs, recitations and dances all of which were very pleasing to the audience of parents and friends that filled the hall to the doors. An entertaining little play was performed by a cast of nine characters at the close.

The Oddfellows threw their hall open to a display of amateur dramatics on Wednesday, April 1. Much credit is due Mrs. Sundal for her successful coaching of the young people who took part. The play presented a dissatisfied wife who determined to leave the drudgery of housekeeping and return to her job as a stenographer, the husband in the case calling her bluff and trying his hand at getting the meals. Results may be imagined. It all ended happily with the pair of them coming back to their proper places in the home.

### DOG 14 DAYS FOODLESS

JERRAWA, S. Aust., April 3: (CP)—After falling 50 feet down a mining shaft and lying imprisoned without food for 14 days, a sheep dog has been rescued from the shaft by its owner, John Bush. Although bruised from the fall and weakened by starvation it is making rapid recovery.

### ADDRESS ON GERMAN SITUATION GIVEN

(Continued from Page 1)

to take united action in solving any problems.

Communist ideas pervaded labor ranks and the spirit of the people became very poor. Instead of trying to help the country out of its difficulties, the Communists did everything possible to prevent the carrying on of industries and national recovery. Then came Hitler.

Herr Hitler was a soldier who fought in the trenches, was twice wounded and once poisoned with gas which temporarily blinded him. During the period he spent in hospitals recovering from his blindness, he pondered over the national difficulties and after his recovery when he went back to work and found that, because he did not belong to a labor union, it was almost impossible to get a job, he set to work to expound his ideas on government and commence the work of organizing a party. So clearly did he state his views and so reasonable did they seem that he soon attracted a large following which grew in strength. As the general condition of the country became worse as a result of Communist influence, so the strength of Hitler increased until the party became so strong that its head was offered the chancellorship. Today the whole country was behind Hitler.

### Handling Labor

In dealing with the labor question, the present German government dissolved all unions and in place of them appointed a committee of twelve men who dealt with all disputes or complaints and changed the whole complexion of German labor. Instead of having a number of different groups or parties working against each other, there was a united move to improve matters and co-operate with industry in bringing about a better condition.

Dr. Muller-Gleim explained the position of Germany in regard to the international situation. Hitler asked the countries of Europe to disarm but they refused to do so. Then he announced that, if they did not do so, he would have to enlarge his navy and he made a treaty with Great Britain which seemed satisfactory to both countries.

The Franco-Soviet pact was criticized and the speaker explained that Germany was interested in peace and not in war. Having a leader who had been in the trenches they knew what war meant and were determined to keep out of it if possible. Hitler believed in being open in his political moves and this the people liked. They did not want war.

Recent visits of British soldiers to Germany was helping to bring about more friendly relations. Incidentally he explained that the expression "Hell Hitler" so generally used and quoted was simply symbolic.

### RABBIT HARVEST SUCCESS

SASKATOON, April 3: (CP)—Saskatchewan's winter rabbit harvest is estimated by furriers here to have brought \$500,000 to farmers. More than 3,000,000 animals were reported caught. Fur is used mostly for men's winter caps, and the meat goes to fox ranches.

**New Telescope Now Predicted**

VICTORIA, B.C., April 3: (CP)—Telescopes of the future will be very different from those now in use, Ronald Hopkins, local astronomer, told members of the Victoria branch of the Royal Astronomical Society in an address here.

He predicted magnifying would be accomplished by means of electric tubes working on sensitized metals. Ponderous, big-lens contrivances will be discarded.

Research on the new-type is already under way at Camden, N.J. The speaker showed slides illustrating the principle underlying the electric tubes. An experimental telescope produced with the tubes is a small instrument compared to present telescopes, he said, but can magnify light 1,500,000 times. Still greater magnification is possible.

The limit of present telescopes using costly mirrors and mountings has been reached in the 200-inch instrument now being installed at Mount Wilson. Further advances will be through the new principle.

Describing some of the new instruments developed he said one machine was so sensitive it could register the heat of one candle placed a mile distant.

**Wider Use Urged For Silver Coin**

B.C. Chamber of Mines to Encourage Circulation of Silver Dollars

VANCOUVER, April 3: (C)—A campaign to promote circulation of new Canadian silver dollars among banks and business firms has been started by the British Columbia Chamber of Mines.

Officials say wider circulation of the silver "cartwheels" will boost production of British Columbia mines.

"The money is handy and sanitary and would be popular if people got in the habit of using it," F. E. Woodside, manager of the chamber said.

Bank superintendents and large firms are being asked to encourage circulation of the new money. The chamber suggests in making change for \$5 and \$10 bills at least two silver dollars be handed out.
