Retirement of Baldwin As Premier Forecast; Neville Chamberlain as Successor

LONDON, April 6: (CP)—The London Daily Mail today forecast the retirement of Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin in June, due to the handicap of increasing deafness, and suggested Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, as his successor. The Mail also said that Sir Samuel Hoare might take Chamberlain's place as Chancellor of the Exchequer with Capt. Anthony Eden becoming Secretary of State for India and either Viscount Halifax or Sir Robert Horne succeeding Eden.

FOUR DIE IN CRASH

United States Army Bombing Plane Meets with Disaster in Blue Mountains

FREDERICKSBURG, Pa., April 6: (CP)—In the tangled remains of an army bombing plane the bodies of four fliers were found today. Their twin motor ship had been caught in a storm last night and smashed against the Blue Mountains, killing the entire crew of army fliers.

FIRE TAKES FOUR LIVES

Mrs. Ferdinand Maltais and Three Daughters Lose Their Lives At Latouque, Quebec

LATOUCQUE, Quebec, April 6: (CP)—The death list as a result of a fire on Saturday in the home of Ferdinand Maltais here swelled to four today while seven others injured in the blaze are expected to recover. The dead are: Mrs. Maltais, aged 44. Yvette Maltais, 23. Madeleine Maltais, 14. Lise Maltais, 9. The two older girls died today. Mrs. Maltais died Saturday after attempting to rescue her two-year-old baby who was brought to safety by his brother, David.

Southern States Swept By Fierce Wind Which Takes Very Heavy Toll

Number of Those Who Have Perished Not Yet Definitely Estimated—Enormous Property Damage Done

GAINSVILLE, Ga., April 6: (CP)—Tornadoes claimed nearly one hundred lives—and possibly two hundred—and heavy property damage in the southern states today, levying the greatest toll at the cities of Tupelo, Miss., and Gainsville. Seventy-one bodies have been recovered at Tupelo and about a score are known to have been killed in other towns. The number of dead here was not immediately estimated definitely. Some reports place the toll at above the hundred mark.

NATIONAL EMPLOYMENT

The House of Commons has adopted the principle of the bill appointing a National Employment Commission which will handle all relief in co-operation with the provinces and municipalities, one of the duties of which will be to investigate and report upon proposals for the carrying out of programs of public works and other projects to aid in providing employment. Another will be to recommend to the minister comprehensive measures constituting a long range plan of national development.

The bill passed its second reading at the week-end and is now being considered in detail with the probability of its passing with few alterations. The sum of \$50,000,000 is being allocated for the purpose of enabling the commission to carry out its work unhampered by financial restrictions.

The scheme is an ambitious one and should result in giving employment to a great many people now on relief.

FEAR OF REPUDIATION

There seems to be a great fear of repudiation among financiers but they never stop to consider that Great Britain has fallen down on her debt to the United States because most of the nations of Europe have fallen down on their debts to her. They also fail to consider that President Roosevelt has repudiated a considerable part of the United States national debt by lowering the value of the dollar and that former Prime Minister Bennett and Finance Minister Dunning have been instrumental in keeping the Canadian dollar on a par with the depreciated American dollar, although it has been done quietly and gently without seeming to hurt anyone. At any rate there has been no outcry against it. Hepburn is a rascal for refusing to attempt to make payments which would have ruined the province of Ontario but there is nothing wrong with the men who abstracted the value from the dollar in order to evade their just responsibilities.

Russia seems to have been the first country to start the repudiation game but capitalistic countries have run her a close second and provinces and municipalities are doing the same. Prince Rupert lopped about two percent of her annual interest payments, not by repudiation but by gentle persuasion.

Canadian law provides for repudiation of debts by a bankrupt and allows the debtor to start up in business a few months after failing. This is a recognition that failing to meet debts is not so horrible a crime as some people would have us believe. Moses made provision for it in Jewish law. At the same time it is a great privilege to be able to pay one's debts when they become due. It gives a sense of satisfaction and superiority that can be acquired in no other way. This is written, not to justify repudiation, but to show that those who are doing it are in pretty good company and also, in bad company.

Defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 3 To 1 in Opener of Stanley Cup Finals Sunday

DETROIT, April 6: (CP)—Detroit Red Wings handed the Toronto Maple Leafs a 3 to 1 defeat on Detroit ice last night in the first game of the best three out of five series for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of world's professional hockey championship. All the scoring was done in the first period.
