Civil Strife is Fierce But Indecisive

GALE IN FLORIDA

Seventy-Mile Hurricane Sweeping In to Coast From Atlantic Ocean Last Night

MIAMI, Fla., July 29.—A hurricane with gusts up to 70 miles per hour was sweeping in from the Atlantic Ocean to the east coast of Florida last night with Miami and the Florida Keys evidently in its path. This city was battering down for the gale which was cutting a 30-mile swathe. The first casualty was when a man was electrocuted by a high tension wire which had been blown down.

KILLED IN BACKFIRE

Two American Sailors Lose Lives During Battery Practice Off San Diego

SAN DIEGO, July 29.—Two sailors were killed and nine injured aboard U. S. S. Marblehead when a gun backfired during long range fire practice late yesterday at sea off San Diego. The injured were landed here for hospital treatment.

David Lamson Marries Again

Screen Celebrities Attend Nuptials Of Man Whose First Wife Was Slain

HOLLYWOOD, July 29.—David Lamson, who once was in death row awaiting execution on wife murder charges, was honeymooning today with his second bride, Ruth Rankin, Hollywood magazine writer. The couple were united in a simple ceremony here, attended by friends, among whom were a few screen celebrities including Bette Davis, Glenda Farrell, Hugh Herbert and Humphrey Bogart.

Ethiopia Is Not Yet Done With Fighting

ADDIS ABABA, July 29.—Ethiopian volunteers are continuing sporadic guerrilla warfare against the Italian forces of occupation. Italian guards were reported yesterday to have repulsed an attack between Addis Ababa and Dessye. An official communique saying that one thousand Ethiopians had been killed and wounded. The natives, reported to have been led by Aberra Dedjazmach, son of Ras Kassa, military leader during the Italo-Ethiopian war, unsuccessfully attempted to cut the Addis Ababa-Dessye motor highway.

New Battleship Construction To Start Next Year

LONDON, July 29: (CP)—Sir Samuel Hoare, First Lord of the Admiralty, announced today in the House of Commons that keels of new British battleships will be laid down in January 1937.

CHICAGO, July 29: (CP)—Sixteen men were feared to have been drowned early today when the motor power ship "Material Service" capsized in rough waters of Lake Michigan four miles off Chicago's South Side.

LONG WAR IN SIGHT

Conflicting Reports Indicate Inconclusive Results of Fighting In Spain

Rebel Planes Down

Evacuation of Americans and Others From Madrid Expected Tomorrow

MADRID, July 29.—The Spanish civil war continued yesterday with conflicting reports last night indicating inconclusive results.

The government reported that two rebel seaplanes which had been bombing Malaga had been brought down, this reverse being a serious blow to General Franco. Fascist leader, whose forces thereabouts were said to be in flight with 170 supposedly having been captured.

General Molo was reported to be rushing new forces to San Sebastian, which has been the centre of bloody warfare for days, in the hope of recapturing insurrectionist prisoners who had been taken by the loyalist forces.

The siege of Madrid, it was indicated last night, would be lifted long enough on Thursday to permit of 160 American and other foreign refugees being removed safely to the Mediterranean coast by special train for evacuation. The United States cruiser Quincy will, it is expected, take them aboard. The warships Arkansas and Wyoming also are standing by to assist, if necessary, in the evacuation. Several thousand troops and People's Front Militia were reported barricaded in Estepona Tuesday after falling back in orderly fashion under a screen of fire. Estepona is forty miles from the important town of Malaga.

Fears For Americans

Aboard the U. S. S. Oklahoma, great fears are felt for the safety of twenty Americans who fled the Vigo district with the approach of sanguinary fighting and attempted to make their way southward across the Portuguese border. W. W. Corcoran, United States consul at Vigo so radioed the Oklahoma today. Corcoran added that about forty Americans, Cubans and Panamanians remain in the district. He requested that an American warship stand by, ready to take them off.

Dictatorship Planned

BURGOS, Spain, July 29.—Spanish rebel leaders contemplate a strong military dictatorship. General Emilio Mola, northern commander, said today. "We will create a huge army equivalent to any in Europe" the tall, slightly stoop-shouldered officer declared.

With the rebel forces firmly entrenched a long and bitter war appears to be in prospect.

GRANTING OF LEAVE TO APPEAL

Privy Council Agrees to Receive Dominion Reference on Bennett Legislation

LONDON, July 29: (CP)—The judicial committee of the Privy Council today granted a petition of the Canadian government for leave to appeal to that body concerning the validity of several acts dealing with labor and employment passed by the Bennett government.

Ontario and British Columbia joined in the petitioning for leave to appeal. J. W. deB. Farris K.C. of Vancouver representing the latter province.

Empire Defence



RT. HON. STANLEY BRUCE BRISTOL, Eng., July 29: (CP)

—Stanley M. Bruce, Australian High Commissioner, in a speech yesterday, urged that the British Dominions make a large contribution towards the defence of the Empire.

APPEAL ALLOWED IN PIONEER GOLD CASE

LONDON, July 29: (CP)—The appeal of Vernon Lloyd against A. E. Bull and others in connection with the formation of a new company to replace the old Pioneer Gold Mines Ltd. was allowed today by the judicial committee of the Privy Council. The decision permits the case to start all over in the British Columbia courts in the liquidator's name.

ELECTION IS CLOSE

Liberals Lead in Manitoba Will Be Very Narrow if They Have Any at All

HEAT IS RELIEVED

Widespread Showers in Midwest—Big Relief Program Planned

CHICAGO, July 29:—Scattered showers brought widespread relief to the heat-harrassed midwest today. Rain, too light to break the crop-killing drought in most areas, but substantial in others, fell in parts of the lower Missouri, Middle Mississippi and Ohio Valleys, Colorado, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Western South Dakota.

Big Relief Program

WASHINGTON, July 29:—Works Progress Administration and the Resettlement Administration today prepared for an estimated fifty million dollars emergency expenditure for drought relief in the northwestern dry bow—the Dakotas, Montana and Wyoming. The expenditures will be about equally divided, it was estimated, between jobs for farmers who have lost their crops and source of income and resettlement grants to farmers for sustenance of their families and loans for feed for the livestock.
