Emperor Flees

Iaile Selassie Leaves For Palestine As Conquest is Completed

LONDON, May 2: (CP)—Sir Sidney Barton, British minister to Ethiopia, advised his government today that Emperor Haile Selassie had left for Djibuti in French Somaliland. Sir Sidney said the Emperor had requested permission to reside in Palestine with his family. It is understood other members of the Royal Family accompanied him. Selassie's departure is interpreted as collapse of organized resistance to the Italian invasion.

A French Foreign Office message in Paris from Addis Ababa said the Imperial Palace had been pillaged.






