ADDIS ABABA IS SCENE OF HORROR

GOVERNMENT SHIP GOES DOWN AFTER CRASH FIRE, MURDER, PILLAGE AND ANARCHY RAMPANT IN ETHIOPIAN CAPITAL

CANADIAN NATIONAL OCEAN FREIGHTER IS TOTAL LOSS AFTER ATLANTIC COLLISION

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., May 4: (CP)—The Canadian National freighter Canadian Planter collided with the freighter City of Auckland during a dense fog between this island and Nantucket Island early Sunday and sank. The Planter's crew of fifty took to the lifeboats and were picked up by the City of Auckland which was reported not badly damaged. One man on the Canadian boat, which was enroute from New York to Halifax after a voyage to Australia, was reported seriously burned. No lives were lost.

The Canadian Planter was one of ten vessels recently sold by the Canadian government to the newly organized Montreal-Australia-New Zealand line.

VICTORIA, May 2:—Bail of \$20,000 has been set in the case of Ralph Rogers of Vancouver, charged with theft of bonds belonging to his aunt, Mrs. Lean Rogers, widow of the famous chocolate manufacturer of Victoria. The case is adjourned until Friday of this week. Mrs. Rogers charges that her nephew removed from her safety deposit box bonds to the value of \$60,000.

BELLINGHAM, May 4:—Clarence E. Bicknell of Seattle, surrendered to the authorities yesterday on a charge of manslaughter arising out of an automobile collision on the Pacific Highway near Custer a week ago when three persons were killed. Bicknell, driver of one of the cars, has been released on \$400 bail.

Illinois Backs Roosevelt For President Again

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 4:—Illinois delegates to the forthcoming Democratic national convention in Philadelphia have been instructed to support President Franklin D. Roosevelt as the party's candidate for re-election.

International Labor Day Is Observed Here

A mass meeting was held in the Canadian Labor Defence League Hall in Prince Rupert Friday night in observance of International Labor Day. Neil Lang was chairman and speakers were Ex-Ald. Oscar Larsen, president of the unemployed; J. M. Dunn of the Canadian Labor Defence League; R. R. Webster of the Communist Party and Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church. The significance of May Day for the workers' movement was stressed by all speakers. There were about 200 persons in attendance at the meeting which lasted about an hour and a half.

NEW YORK, May 4:—The Canadian dollar was quoted at a discount of 1/4c on the New York foreign exchange market at the week-end.

VICTORY OF LEFT

"Front Populaire" Will Have Good Majority in Next French Chamber of Deputies

PARIS, May 4:—With but five precincts yet to be heard from, the Leftists, Front Populaire, were last night assured of a clear working majority of 137 in the next Chamber of Deputies as a result of yesterday's elections. Leftist strength of 375 seats, including 81 Communists, was the French voters' answer to Fascist elements in the republic.

The standing of the general groups last night was: Rightists, 101. Centre, 137. Leftists, 375. The "Front Populaire" includes Socialists, Communists and Radical Socialists. The last mentioned constituted the last administration of France. The United Socialist party, with at least 145 of the 618 seats in the Chamber, will be the strongest single party, displacing the more moderate Radical Socialists who captured only 115 seats. The Right and Centre groups have a combined strength of 238 seats.

DIES IN OTTAWA

D'Arcy Plunkett, Member for Victoria, Succumbs Following Brief Illness with Pneumonia

OTTAWA, May 4: (CP)—D'Arcy Plunkett, Conservative member of Parliament for Victoria, died yesterday in hospital here after a brief illness with pneumonia and complications. Born in Ontario, he was sixty-four years of age. He was unmarried and is survived by two brothers.

MONTREAL, May 4: (CP)—The London price of bar gold was \$34.86 on Saturday, being down one cent. The Washington price was \$35.06 in Canadian funds.

CHICAGO, May 2:—Miss Nellie Granger, air hostess for the Transcontinental Western Airways, on Saturday left here to start a leisurely cruise to the West Indies as her reward from the company for bravery in connection with the rescue of passengers following a recent crash of one of the company's air liners near Uniontown, Pennsylvania. Miss Granger is now fully recovered from her own injuries and, on her return from the cruise she will resume her duties as a plane hostess.

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 4:—John L. Smith, New Westminster stock broker, was killed when struck by an interurban car near Fraser Mills on Saturday.

Foreigners Slain as Wild Disorder Prevails in Addis Ababa Following Flight of Emperor Who is Now At Djibuti Enroute to Exile

ADDIS ABABA, May 4:—Following the flight of Emperor Haile Selassie and the Royal Family, fire, murder, pillaging and anarchy ran rampant in Addis Ababa over the week-end. Italian forces were reported moving as rapidly as possible towards the city with the avowed intention of restoring order to the disordered city. Bodies of dead and dying were strewn in the streets and almost the entire business section had been destroyed by fire.

#### CANADA'S HUMORIST

Stephen Leacock, who is severing his connection with McGill University, where for many years he has been a member of the professorial staff, is usually looked upon as Canada's greatest humorist. He was retired against his will because he had reached the age of 65 and at that age most people are supposed to lose their virility and be ready to take things easy until they pass away at three score years and ten.

Since it was decided that he must retire he has been writing humorous articles in regard to his dismissal, his latest being an answer to England to which country he had been invited.

The curious thing about Leacock is that he was born in England, where the people are popularly supposed to have no sense of humor. He says that when he left Hampshire at the age of six he spoke English but he does it no more and does not try to do it. He talks Canadian, which is quite a different language. He says that when a Canadian means four he says four and not "faw." Also Canadians in conversation talk quite freely about money whereas to an Englishman, money talk is taboo. He says: "Then, there's the question of manners. There it would be pretty hard for me or for any of my friends here to 'get by.' You see, we are not just quite what you call gentlemen. Not quite. In the dark and if we don't talk, you could hardly tell us. But when we begin to feel easy and at home the thing comes out. I don't just know what it consists of: I think we are a little too unrestrained."

Only an Englishman would dare to write about the English the way Leacock does. He exercises the Englishman's privilege of grumbling about everything English and the best of it is he gets paid for doing it. Also he does it in such a way that Englishmen enjoy reading it more than anyone else. That shows they have at least a little sense of humor.

## TITLE HAS GONE EAST

Windsor Fords Defeat Victoria Dominoes Three Games to Nil In Hoop Finals

WINDSOR, Ont., May 4: (CP)—Windsor Fords won the senior men's Canadian basketball championship and the right to represent Canada at the Olympic Games in Germany this year with a 46 to 23 victory over the Victoria Dominoes, last year's champions, on Saturday night.

The Windsor Fords won in three straight games, having taken the first 47 to 36 and the second 33 to 32.

## CARDINALS TAKE LEAD

New York Giants Tumble From First Place in National League—American Race Close

ST. LOUIS, May 4: (CP)—As a result of week-end play, New York Giants were displaced from the leadership of the National League by the St. Louis Cardinals. The Cardinals followed up a shut-out victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers on Saturday with a 6 to 2 win over the Boston Braves in a series opener here yesterday. The Giants lost to the Cubs at Chicago Saturday but won over the Reds at Cincinnati yesterday. The Pittsburgh Pirates won over the Boston Braves Saturday and won a close victory over Brooklyn Dodgers yesterday to move into fourth place, the Cincinnati Reds, as a result of losing two week-end starts, dropping from the first division into sixth place below the Phillies who won Saturday from Cincinnati and yesterday from Chicago Cubs. The Braves are now in seventh place while the Brooklyn Dodgers remain in the cellar.

Week-end play saw a tightening up of the American League standing. The Boston Red Sox continue in the leadership, having lost to the Cleveland Indians on Saturday while they blanked the Detroit Tigers yesterday. The New York Yankees, losing to the Chicago White Sox Saturday but winning from the lowly St. Louis Browns yesterday, retain second place. The Cleveland Indians, following up the victory over the Red Sox on Saturday with a shut-out victory over the Washington Senators yesterday, advanced from fifth to third place ahead of the Detroit Tigers, who won from the Philadelphia Athletics in a close game Saturday and were blanked by the Red Sox yesterday, and the Washington Senators, whose victory over the St. Louis Browns Saturday was offset by their defeat at the hands of Cleveland yesterday. Chicago White Sox, winning over the New York Yankees Saturday and over the Philadelphia Athletics yesterday, went into sixth place ahead of the Philadelphia Athletics who lost both week-end starts—to Detroit on Saturday and to Chicago yesterday. The long-suffering St. Louis Browns are more solidly than ever ensconced in the basement.
