where the export in August last year was slightly over white sox. three hundred thousand dollars and this year it was seven hundred an dsixty-one thousand dollars. The increase in exports to Japan was a million, to Belgium three-quarters Moore If. of a million. A number of other nations increased their Bartell ss. buying from this country but Argentina chopped hers in Terry 1b. half, France went down twenty-five percent and Spain Ott rf. dropped off eighty-six percent. United States purchases Mancuso c. from Canada jumped from thirty millions to forty-four millions.

The weak factor in the British Empire buying was British India which dropped thirty-six percent almost to Gabler p. nothing. Had it not been for that decrease the total would Koenig have shown an increase for all British countries.

For the past five months there has been an increase in exports to British countries of thirty-two percent and to foreign countries twenty-four percent.

While, doubtless, part of this business is the result of the natural upturn in business conditions, it is also partly due to the trade policy of the Dominion government, which is doing its best to encourage trade with all the world.

SUPPORTED DEFENCES

The British people are in favor of peace, as shown by a poll taken earlier in the year. They also are in favor of a vigorous defence policy in order to insure the country and possibly the world that peace will come.



During the time when Britain tried to lead the way in disarmament other countries were beginning to speak of Giants the Empire as being decadent and suggesting that it would fall to pieces very soon. That suggestion is no longer heard. Today Britain is arming in such a way as to gain general respect. It has been proved that weakness is a danger to peace.
