Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS
VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. "How to Pre-empt Land" copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria; or any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 2,000 board feet per acre of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Revenue Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in ten-acre instalments with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 666 acres, may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in stocking privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock owners may file applications for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, trampers and travellers, up to the head.

Entire Community Honors Miss Margaret Kenney in Death

TERRACE, Oct. 5: (Will Robinson)—One of the largest gatherings of mourners in the history of Terrace met at Knox United Church on Saturday afternoon to pay final tribute to the memory of Miss Margaret Leila Kenney, daughter of E. T. Kenney, M. L. A. for Skeena, and Mrs. Kenney.

After an illness of some weeks Miss Kenney passed away at the Prince Rupert General Hospital on Thursday night. WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Southbound from Skagway to Vancouver on a regularly scheduled voyage, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 3:45 yesterday afternoon from Alaska and sailed at 5 p.m. for the south. The vessel had on board in all 127 passengers of whom 17 disembarked at this port. Sixteen took passage on her here for Vancouver.

With a fair-sized list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 7 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anxox and other northern points whence she is scheduled to call here southbound tomorrow afternoon.

Halibut landings at the port of Seattle last week totalled 514,000 pounds. On Saturday two boats sold at the Puget Sound port as follows: Venture, 32,000, Sebastian, 11 1/4 and 10c; Havana, 35,000, Washington, 11 1/4 and 10 1/4c. The Presho sold 13,000 pounds of sablefish to San Juan at 4c.

Discharging seven carloads of frozen fish from Ketchikan for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways, Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, was here all night Saturday. The vessel arrived at 8 p.m. from Alaska and sailed at 5 a.m. Sunday in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

Imperial Oil Co.'s tanker Imperial, Capt. A. S. McGaw, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning from Ioco with fuel cargo for the company's local tanks and, after discharging, will sail on her return south.

Edward Forsman Died Saturday

Former Anxox Miner Had Been Engaged in More Recent Years As Miner Here

Edward John Forsman, who worked as a miner at Anxox for 15 years and had been engaged in fishing here for some four or five years, passed away late Saturday morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for some time. He was 58 years of age and, born in Sweden, was a naturalized Canadian. He had lived in Canada for 30 years. During the Great War he served in France with the First Pioneers.
