BRITAIN IN FAVOR OF DEMOCRACY

FINE TALK ABOUT VIMY

Norman Watt Graphically Describes Ceremony Which He Witnessed With Others

Touching Scenes

Sun Suddenly Burst From Among Clouds as King Began to Speak to Assemblage

An intensely interesting address on the Vimy Pilgrimage was given yesterday afternoon before the Prince Rupert Rotary Club by Norman Watt, who was present in person and gave an eye-witness report of the proceedings. After mentioning in some detail the landings in France and the trip to Vimy by bus Mr. Watt continued:

"The guard of honor was drawn up at the rear of the memorial. It consisted of 200 bluejackets from H. M. S. Saguenay, 100 Canadian pilgrims, 100 French soldiers in full uniform and approximately 100 Spahis or Moroccan troopers. These troopers were mounted on grey and brown Arab horses and divided into two sections. Their long, flowing white capes, scarlet tunics, blue trousers, khaki caps and unsheathed swords lent a color to the spectacle that is difficult to describe. Present also were the Canadian pipers and a band of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. Some half dozen or more members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police occupied prominent positions on the monument itself. At the immediate front stood a number of standard bearers made up of members from the British Legion and French veterans. These representatives were present to do honor to the Canadian dead and also the large number of their compatriots who had died in the previous battles at Vimy. Along the face of the monument stood a contingent of some 200 ex-nursing sisters, each wearing a khaki beret indicative of war service. To their immediate left were 24 blind Canadian pilgrims and a colored Canadian soldier named "Curley" Christian immediately back of the Canadian nurses were the Canadian pilgrims drawn up in company formation of two ranks each numbering consecutively from one to ten. Back of the Canadian pilgrims was a contingent of some 50 blind veterans of the French Army. Next came the French Legionnaires numbering approximately 300. On the left of these groups were the relatives of French soldiers and on the right, the relatives of the Canadian soldiers. Around the whole was thrown a cordon of French infantry dressed in their great coats and steel helmets and outside of this cordon was the general public.

King's Arrival

"The King approached the memorial by one of the main roads from the rear. He was met on arrival by General Ross and Hon. Ian McKenzie. Immediately he arrived the band played "God Save the King," followed by the "Maple Leaf Forever." The King then inspected the Guard of Honor to the order named. As he passed by the Spahi Troopers they each stood erect in the saddle with sword upraised. The King then ascended the memorial by steps at the rear and after meeting certain dignitaries, descended the steps on the left to mingle with the pilgrims. He was first introduced to "Curly" Christian, a Jamaican who served with the Canadian forces and, as a consequence, suffered the amputation of both hands and both feet. It fell to Curly's honor to introduce his 24 blind Canadian

Named Judge ACCEPTS POSITION

Major W. E. Gladstone Murray Gets \$14,000 per Year as General Manager of Radio

OTTAWA, Sept. 25:—Appointment of Major William Ewart Gladstone Murray of the British Broadcasting Commission as general manager of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission and Major Murray's acceptance of the appointment are officially announced. Major Murray had been recommended by the newly created Radio Commission. Dr. Augustin Frigon, French-Canadian chairman of the Quebec Utility Commission, has accepted appointment as assistant general manager. Major Murray's salary will be \$14,000 per year and Mr. Frigon's \$12,000.

CONTROL FAVORED

United Church Commission Makes Important Recommendations To General Council

OTTAWA, Sept. 25: (CP)—A special commission of the United Church of Canada today approved principles behind birth control and sterilization of mentally unfit, recommending that the general council, now in session here, approve establishment of clinics under public control, supervised according to provincial health standards.

CALGARY, Sept. 25:—Search is being made and a reward has been offered for a quantity of radium valued at \$400 which was lost down the drain of a basin at a local clinic. The container was about the size of the top of a fountain pen.

Eskimos Faced With Starvation

Dr. Henry Geist of Point Barrow Tells How Northern Natives May Suffer from Famine

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Sept. 25:—Unless relief supplies can be taken to them from outside, hundreds of Eskimos along the Arctic Ocean coast of Alaska will face starvation through stark famine this winter, it is declared by Dr. Henry Geist, for years medical missionary of the Presbyterian Church at Point Barrow, who is here on his way to the United States. Dr. Geist, who came into prominence last year when he took in charge and embalmed the bodies of Will Rogers and Wiley Post after they were killed in a plane crash near Barrow, has been retained.

MONTREAL, Sept. 25:—Retirement of Sir George MacLaren Brown as European manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway is announced.

FEAR OF DEVALUATION OF FRANC SWEEPS OVER LONDON EXCHANGE

LONDON, Sept. 25: (CP)—Fears of week-end devaluation of the French franc swept the foreign exchange market today, rates in trading fluctuating widely. Francs for delivery in a month's time were quoted at a discount of seven francs to the pound sterling. The American dollar was in demand, gaining nearly a cent in relation to the pound.

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No Extreme Suppressing Liberty Acceptable To His Country Says Eden

Foreign Secretary Tells League of Nations Assembly What His Government Stands For in Connection With International Affairs

GENEVA, Sept. 25: (CP)—Affirming Great Britain's stand for democracy, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the League of Nations Assembly today that no other system of whatever extreme would ever be acceptable to his country "if it brought in its train suppression of our liberties and destruction of our traditions." Great Britain, Captain Eden said, stood for amendment of the Covenant of the League of Nations enabling the League to interfere in the early stages of disputes; negotiation of regional pacts; measures to restore international trade; inquiry under auspices of the League into the question of access to raw materials.

Tells Policy

In reference to the limitation of armaments, Great Britain would not agree, the Foreign Secretary said, to stabilizing armaments, giving permanent advantage to a country which has concentrated on the most extensive rearmament. Great Britain also favored publicity for armament expenditures, Captain Eden added.

THE VIMY PILGRIMAGE

The Daily News has given a great deal of space at different times to the various accounts of the pilgrimage to Vimy and the reason for this can perhaps best be explained in the words of Norman Watt in addressing the Rotary Club yesterday, when he said:

"The unveiling of this memorial can hardly be regarded in the light of the mere unveiling of a war memorial—rather must it be interpreted as a gesture of vital importance and significance to the British Empire. It was the first time in the history of England that the King had set foot in a foreign country—not as King of England but as King of one of the Dominions which make up the British Empire. Indeed, the ceremony was almost as much a consecration of the bond of unity which exists between Britain and Canada—two separate and distinct countries joined indivisibly by their devotion to one head—as it was a consecration of the war memorial."

STILL WATCHING ABERHART

People of Canada still have their eyes on Premier Aberhart, the man who is making radical changes in the social setup of the province of Alberta and are wondering what he is going to do next and how he will do it.

It is easy to scoff at Aberhart. Thousands are doing it but the people of Alberta are not scoffing. The very fact that Colonel Woods, head of the Southam newspaper chain in that province, is seriously impressed is an indication that something important is going on there. The Vancouver Province also sees visions in regard to the Alberta movement for it has sent a special writer to the province to tell of what is going on there. This same man will also probably report to the other newspapers of the chain. That means that the Province is treating the Aberhart movement seriously, which, considering the way it treated Pattullo, is saying a good deal for the Province.

We suggest to readers of this paper that they cease their jeering. At any rate Aberhart is trying to do something, while the jeerers are sitting pat and hoping that problems will solve themselves. The Alberta movement may prove a fizzle, but nearly all reformers in all lines of life have been jeered at or possibly spit upon. Aberhart may be worth watching and if he is successful he will be worth copying. If he succeeds, the jeerers will be saying they always knew there was something to the Alberta leader.

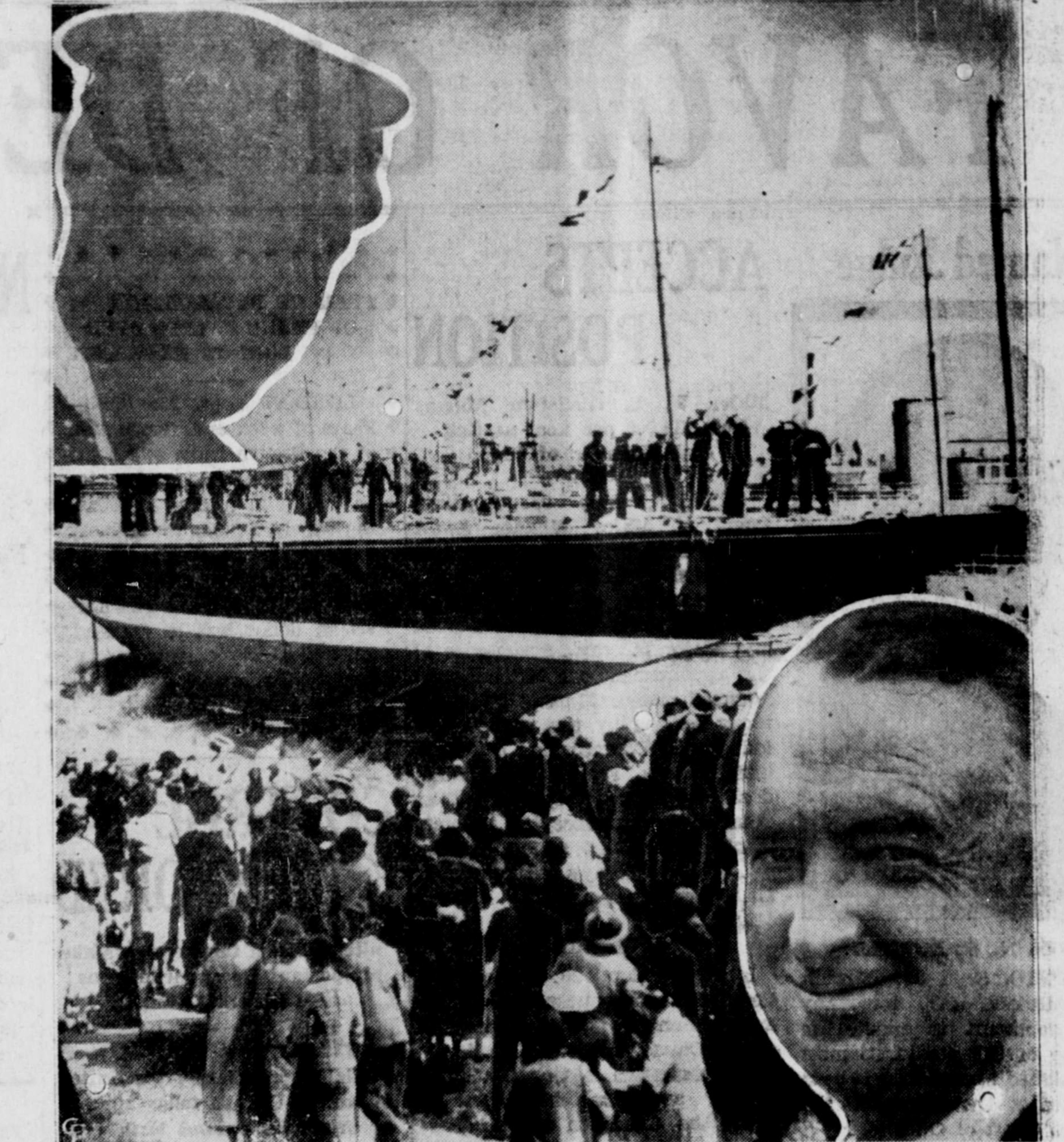

Abbey Goes Under Norfolk's Orders

Catholic Peer Takes Over Historic Church For Coronation Purposes

LONDON, Sept. 25: (CP)—The Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal and Premier Duke and Earl of England, 28-year-old Roman Catholic peer, is to have complete control of Westminster Abbey for seven months in connection with the Coronation next May. He will take over control of the Church of England's Dean of Westminster, Dr. Foxley Norris.

During the whole of the seven-months period the ordinary services in the Abbey will be suspended. Daily services, which by statute must be held within the Abbey precincts, will take place in a small chapel in the south transept.

FINE TALK ABOUT VIMY

(Continued from Page 1)

comrades. He introduced them individually and as he did so he directed their right hand to the King's by use of his own two stubs. The faces of these blind comrades were wreathed in smiles and, long after they had felt the clasp of the King's hand and heard the sound of his voice, their countenances remained lighted with the pleasure and joy they felt in having met and talked to the King. The King was then introduced to Mrs. C. S. Woods of Winnipeg whose twelve sons served in the Great War, six of whom were killed in France and another of whom died from wounds at the Toronto Hospital. The King then inspected the contingent of nurses, stopping every now and again with a word of greeting to some half dozen of them. He mingled for a time among the front ranks of the pilgrims and returned to the memorial by the steps on the right.

The opening speech was made by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, followed by Hon. Ernest LaPointe, Minister of Justice, Hon. Ian MacKenzie, Minister of National Defence, and then by the King.

The King was dressed in grey morning coat, dark trousers and carried a silk hat in his left hand. His left breast was literally covered with war medals and on the right lapel of his coat he wore a gold medal, the gift of the Canadian Legion and emblematic of the Vimy Pilgrimage.

"The morning broke with a light grey mist and the sky remained overcast until the commencement of the King's speech, when the threatening clouds drifted by and the sun began to shine. Soon the entire surroundings were bathed in sunshine. It remained bright throughout the rest of the day.

"Much to the delight of the French Canadians who were present, and particularly to the citizens of France, the King spoke for a few minutes in French in the course of his speech, he made a very feeling reference to the Canadian dead.

At the conclusion of his speech he said:

"In unveiling this memorial to our fallen comrades, our thoughts turn to the splendour of their sacrifice and to the consecration of our love for them rather than to the cannonade which beat upon this ridge a score of years ago.

Statue of Canada

"The King then stepped aside from the dais from which he had spoken, touched the loose end of a small rope and the large Canadian flag lightly unfurled. It revealed the lone figure of a woman with head slightly bowed and gazing sorrowfully across the plains of Duay. This figure represents the mourning of Canada for her dead.

"At the conclusion of the King's speech, the "Last Post" was sounded and a dead silence fell over the great concourse of people. The French officers saluted, the French soldiers presented arms, while the Canadian pilgrims merely stood at attention, they having been previously instructed that the wearing of the khaki beret was considered as taking the place of a uniform. When the last strains had faded away, everybody remained silent a further few minutes. The silence ended when the "Reveille" sounded and the French President then spoke. When his speech ended, the band played "Land of Hope and Glory" followed by "La Marseillaise," at the conclusion of which the King and President walked down the marble steps to their waiting cars and drove away.

"Immediately at the conclusion of the service, widows, mothers and other relatives who had suffered bereavement made their way to the memorial where they examined the names engraved thereon, while some 200 other relatives who had brought wreaths all the way from Canada, endeavored to place these on that part of the memorial especially designated for the purpose.

"During the course of the ceremony, 12 planes of the British Air Force flew over the grounds and were followed later by 18 French aeroplanes in regular formation.

There were a number of visitors at the luncheon. They were Dr. I. W. Kergin, William Cruickshank, C. C. Mills, Walter Vance, H. A. Green, F. A. MacCallum, Hubert Ward, and Theo. Colhart. Next week the club will celebrate National Fish Week.

TOMATO COCKTAIL

Eighteen ripe tomatoes, 1 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped onions, 3 sweet green peppers, 1 red pepper, 2 tablespoons salt, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1/4 cup sugar.

Wash and cut tomatoes but do not peel. Chop the peppers finely. Mix tomatoes, celery, onions, peppers, and salt together. Boil for one-half hour. Strain through a coarse sieve. Add the vinegar and sugar. Boil three minutes. Seal in sterilized jars.
