Threats of General Franco, leader of the Spanish Fascist insurgents, to blockade loyalist ports and prevent ships of any nations to trade with them has caused Great Britain to send a fleet of submarines and a destroyer flotilla to stand guard outside Spanish territorial waters to prevent interference with British shipping. The depot ship Cyclops, shown at the bottom, accompanied the submarines. The map at top shows how Britain's submarines and destroyers are converging on the Spanish ports.

Departing from customary tradition, heavy tanks and motorized warring units clattered through London as the city welcomed its new lord mayor, Sir George Broadbridge, in the usual lord mayor's procession.

London's latest development for military defence against gas attacks makes use of the ordinarily unwarlike street cleaning truck.
