Nichols of the University of Alberta suggested the best chance of averting another PIONEER OF after testing temperature of the upper air in Northern Alberta.

Temperatures overhead have been moderate and even above freezing every day this winter, Mr assistant professor physics, reported after almost daily tests in the winter months during the last two years. He has discovered several facts significant in weather forecasting.

Prof. Nichols obtained tempera tures by fastening a large accurate! thermometer to the wing strut of an airplane. A second thermometer the bulb of which was encased in ice, was also used. It gave a relatively lower temperature than the first in proportion to the dryness; of the air and furnished a clue to the amount of energy availabil to produce storms or precipitation.

Warmer Air Above

"Our weather conditions are controlled by the inter relation between different air masses from different sources," Prof. Nichols said. "Usually the warm air comes from the south or west. In other parts of Canada this warm air rises up over the cold air in the form of a thin wedge formation which usually produces rain or

"In Alberta, on account of the Rockies being to the west, warm Farewell to Petty air from the Pacific doesn't often reach the plains until after crossing the mountains, but travels east at a definite level above the ground-from 800 to 5,000 feet up.

The only reason for many of the people attending the meetings is the desire to hold an official position. And when they get the official position they find there is nothing to it.

These multitudinous organizations are usually harmless except that they waste time which might possibly be better utilized. A few organizations keep up ancient enmities which should be forgotten. When an organization

loses its appeal it should be disbanded. Some organizations are said to be secret. A solemn oath is taken by the members on entering that they will not reveal any of the secrets of the order. That is a remnant of the days when the organizations had a real mission and when they were subject to persecution. Societies held their meetings in basements, in caves, in the depth of the forest and other places where they felt they would be free from disturbance. Guards were set an dentry was made by passwords which were strictly guarded.

When an organizations has no particular mission and where there is nothing to conceal, secreey is a great attraction. If meetings were open and the members knew all about them before joining, most of the people would never join. Mysticism is most attractive to the average man or woman.

In Prince Rupert most of the organizations are struggling for existence. If there were a quarter of the number it would be much better for them. Even religious organizations are very poorly attended and three well-sup-

ported churches might be better than six or eight. If there are organizations doing useful work in any community, we are always glad to hear of it. One difficulty is that so many people join organizations for the business it is supposed to bring them or for political or other prestige. Enough of these "joiners" in any organization will kill it. They join for what they can get and not for the service they can give.

Corporation, business, or professional income is required to be returned within three months after the end of the taxpayer's fiscal year.
