Indeed, a goodly proportion had been actually placed in jobs directly as a result of the training they had received during the summer's activities in the woods. COLLAPSE OF NON-INTERVENTION ACCORD IN SPANISH CIVIL WAR APPEARS IMMINENT-DICTATOR STALIN REPORTED READY TO SEND HUNDRED PLANES TO MADRID.

Germany Denies Having Sent **Munitions** to Aid Insurgents

PORTUGAL AND ITALY, HOWEVER, HAVE GIVEN NO ANSWER-REBEL SHIPS WOULD SINK RED ARMS CARRIERS—CAPITAL PREPARES FOR DEFENCE.

LONDON, Oct. 22: (CP)-Swift German and Italiancounter-activity in the event of Soviet Russia making good her threat to bolt the Spanish neutrality pact was forecast by informed quarters today. Collapse of the "Hands Off Spain" accord appeared imminent, probably at a meeting of the non-intervention committee expected to be called for tomorrow.

SALAMANCA, Spain, Oct. 22: (CP)-Spanish insurgents today were reported to have ordered warships to sink any Russian ships carrying arms to Spain's government troops.

GOVERNMENT RALLIES FORCES

MADRID, Oct. 22: (CP)-Government commanders today rallied their disordered forces in Madrid in the face of an expected insurgent attack on Mostoles, more than ten miles to the southwest. In the meantime, insurgent troops, which had captured the key city of Navalcernero, eighteen miles from Madrid, pushed on with relentless momentum. Women and children in Madrid joined in a huge demonstration to enlist all'able-bodied men in government forces.
