Lord Elibank, a Scotsman who has been visiting Canada, has told the Canadians that he considers they are inadequately defended. He has a perfect right to his opinion and had a perfect right to express it anywhere in this or any other English-speaking country. The only thing that was wrong with Lord Elibank's statement was that he was too conservative. He should have said he noticed that Canada had no defences of any kind worthy of consideration. He might also have intimated, which he did not, that Canada had better go it alone if she was not going to do her share in Empire defence.

We can pretty well take it for granted that Canadians do not like war and that they dislike the idea of being implicated in any European mix-up. They do not like the idea of their sons having to be killed in any war of any kind and also they do not like what they are doing nowpaying for a war which made a great many people very Philadelphia






