## BRITISH DIPLOMATIC DISPATCH BAG LOST

### Britain Requests O. K.

### From Japan and States For Tonnage Expansion

## Sensation Caused In London by Report Of Incident in Ethiopia

Sir Sidney Barton, Minister At Addis Ababa, is Instructed to Investigate—Also Said That British Officer Has Been Arrested.

LONDON, May 19: (CP)—The government today cabled Sir Sidney Barton, British minister to Addis Ababa, to inquire into sensational reports that a British diplomatic dispatch bag disappeared on the railway line between the Italian ruled capital of Ethiopia and the French port of Djibuti. It is also reported that Warrant Officer Bonner, attached to a British ambulance unit, was arrested while being rushed to hospital for rabies treatment.

B. C. NICHOLAS OF VICTORIA TIMES DIES SUDDENLY  
VICTORIA, May 19: (CP)—B. C. Nicholas, aged 56, editor of the Victoria Times, died suddenly in his office today of myocarditis. He had been prominently mentioned as Liberal candidate for Victoria in the forthcoming federal by-election on June 8. He was one of Victoria's best known and most highly esteemed citizens. His passing will be widely mourned.

## ANNEXING RATIFIED

Marconi Leads Italian Senate in Legalizing of Military Accomplishment

## Charge Withdrawn

Italy Takes Back Allegation Regarding Dum-Dum Bullet Supply

ROME, May 19—Signor Guglielmo Marconi, inventor of the wireless, sponsored a bill by which the Senate of Italy ratified the annexation of Ethiopia by Italy and the declaration of King Victor Emmanuel as Emperor of Ethiopia. Premier Benito Mussolini had no statement to make during the day on international affairs although he sent a message to Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg of Austria expressing friendship and offering co-operation to the Austrian dictator.

According to word from Jerusalem, where Emperor Haile Selassie is at present residing in exile, a secret Ethiopian government is being formed with a view to continuing resistance to the Italian invasion from country south of Addis Ababa which has not yet been penetrated by the Italians.

## Complaint Withdrawn

GENEVA, May 19—Italy has formally withdrawn complaints which it had previously made to the League of Nations that Great Britain had supplied dum-dum bullets to Ethiopia for use in the recent Italo-Ethiopian conflict. Return of all documents on the subject is requested by Italy, which, however, does not withdraw the charge that dum-dum bullets had been used by the Ethiopians.

## Missionaries Safe

ADDIS ABABA, May 19—Nine English missionaries, after an arduous trip through wild bandit-infested country under sweltering heat and terrific difficulties, have finally reached Addis Ababa safely. They had left their fields of activity in the wilderness two weeks ago after hearing that the Ethiopians had been defeated by the Italians and that Emperor Haile Selassie had fled. "It is a miracle that we are here," the missionaries said, "and we can only thank Our Maker that we have been delivered."

## Served 45 Years In Post Office

Charles E. Ray, Assistant Postmaster at Victoria, Retires

VICTORIA, May 19: (CP)—Charles E. Ray, assistant postmaster at Victoria since 1928, has retired after more than 45 years service in the postal department. His entire period of service was performed in Victoria.

Starting as a temporary clerk on November 10, 1890, he recalls when he first joined there were only four letter carriers. There are now 56. The post office staff consisted of 22 when he joined and has grown to 112.

On the same payroll as himself in 1910 were James Murray, now district superintendent of postal services at Vancouver, D. B. McComman, former assistant receiver-general and now retired here, and Frank Sehl, provincial collector of income tax.

## ASSIZE IS CONCLUDED

Judge Finds Insufficient Evidence To Commit Southbank Merchant For Contempt

The spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes came to a close here yesterday afternoon when Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald found that there was not sufficient evidence, pending the making of surveys to determine whether a trespass actually existed, to warrant his ordering the commitment of Fred Wiggins of Southbank, Francois Lake, for contempt in failing to comply with an eviction order. The plaintiffs in this action were Ellis Cunningham Reid, May Reid, Marjorie Blair Reid, Beryl Jourdain and Franklin Gale, owners of land abutting Francois Lake. They had secured an eviction order against Wiggins who had a lease on which was located Wiggins' general store. The defendant contended that he had moved his store a short distance as a result of which he was now actually situated below high water mark or on a road allowance. J. T. Harvey acted as counsel for the plaintiffs while R. L. McLennan appeared for the defendant.

Earlier in the day settlement had been reached in the action of Robert Flockhart vs. James Flockhart. William Thompson, Mary Flockhart, Albert Flockhart, trustees of the Round Lake Women's Community Club and the official administrator, being a dispute over the settlement of an estate involving land in the Round Lake district near Telkwa. H. H. Griffin and L. S. Freer of Smithers acted as counsel for plaintiff while J. T. Harvey appeared for the defendants.

## DUE HERE ON FRIDAY

British Steamer Hartington, Coming to Load Timber, Making Good Time

Latest word received today is that the British steamer Hartington, coming here to load timber for the Orient, is due to arrive here on Friday on this week. The vessel has been making better time on her voyage across the Pacific than anticipated. She will take on approximately 1,200,000 feet of hemlock, cottonwood and aspen timber over the local lumber assembly wharf and will proceed to Vancouver and Vancouver Island to complete.

## TO HUNT MINERALS

JOHN'S Nfld., May 19: (CP)—Arrangements have been made for six parties of expert geologists to carry out investigations throughout Newfoundland in hopes of finding mineral deposits in commercial quantities, the Commissioner for Natural Resources has announced. Special attention will be given to reports of nickel, with traces of platinum, found at Hare Bay.

## IS KILLED IN ASYLUM

One Inmate Slays Another in Edmonton Institution — Used Metal Bed Leg for Grim Act

EDMONTON, May 19 (Canadian Press)—W. R. Stewart, aged fifty, a patient in metal hospital here, died on Saturday from blows inflicted by George Allan, another patient, who wielded a metal bed leg, government officials announce. The killing occurred while attendants were absent from the room. A coroner's jury named Allan as the slayer.

WAR BREAKS OUT IN PRINCE RUPERT

Suehiro, president of the Prince Rupert Japanese Association; C. S. Obata, secretary of the Skeena Fishermen's Association and I. Sakayama and T. Kuwahara of Port Essington. Tom Shimizu was in charge of the arrangements.

Pallbearers were Y. Imai, Y. Sato, K. Tanaka, M. Murata, G. Kitamura and K. Hayakawa. There were numerous floral offerings.

Would Increase Her Destroyer Strength in View Of Activity of Other Nations in Building of Subs.

LONDON, May 19: (CP)—Contending that lesser naval powers are constructing over two hundred submarines, Great Britain is seeking from Japan and United States permission to proceed with a program of naval expansion. Great Britain wants destroyer tonnage of 190,000 tons, 40,000 more than allowed under the naval treaty.

## Man Struck By Train May Yet Make Recovery

While injuries sustained by John D. Campbell, Haysport fisherman, when struck by a train just west of Haysport last Friday night were more extensive than at first believed, the man was said by the police today to have a fair chance of recovery. He is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. Besides a badly fractured and lacerated foot and severe contusions, he also suffered a broken rib and possible internal injuries. Campbell is fifty-two years of age, a native of Greenock, Scotland, and has been fishing on the Skeena River for three or four years.

## New Sales Tax Has Wide Scope

Little Will Escape New Levy In Province of Alberta

EDMONTON, May 19: (CP)—Alberta's new sales tax is going to catch people both coming and going. Neither baby clothes nor coffins will be exempt from the levy. A possibility that coffins could be listed for exemption as "commodities purchased by a cemetery company or society" was denied by Provincial Treasurer Charles Cockroft. These people, he said, deal only in real estate.

## SILVER ACT IS FAILURE

United States Treasury Admits Failure of Purchase Bill

WASHINGTON D.C., May 19 (Canadian Press)—Calculations of the United States Treasury reveal that, instead of making progress during the last few months, this country has lost ground in fulfilling the provisions of the Silver Purchase Act which was designed to increase the price of the white metal and stimulate production.

## Lord Mayor's Big Retinue

Sir Percy Vincent Will be Escorted to Vancouver Celebration By Many Officials

LONDON, May 19: (CP)—Two precedents will be set this year when the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Percy Vincent, embarks on the Empress of Britain August 8 for Canada to attend the Charter Jubilee celebrations of Vancouver.

Sir Percy will be the first English Lord Mayor to visit the Dominion in his official capacity and it will also be the first occasion the famous insignia of London office—the chain and mace—have left the country. Full regalia will be worn at the celebrations.

The Lord Mayor's retinue will include Sir T. Vansittart Bowater, member of the Court of Aldermen; the Chief Commoner, F. Rowland; the Sergeant at Arms; the Sword Bearer and London's new City Marshal, Lieut.-Commander John Roberts Poland.

Announcing his decision at a meeting of the City Corporation to accept Vancouver's invitation, the Lord Mayor said he had done so with the consent of the King. He will unveil a statue to Captain Vancouver, founder of that city.

NEW YORK, May 19: (CP)—Half a game still separated the leading St. Louis Cardinals from the second place New York Giants in the race for the National League pennant as a result of yesterday's play. The Cardinals slugged out an 11 to 6 victory over the Phillies at Philadelphia while the Giants, at the Polo Grounds here, won 4 to 2 over the slipping Pittsburgh Pirates. The Chicago Cubs came to life with a 7 to 2 victory over the Bees at Boston and moved into a tie with the Pirates for third place. In the fourth National League game of the day, the Cincinnati Reds defeated the tail-end Brooklyn Dodgers to assume leadership of the second division in place of the Boston Bees.

In the American League, the second place Boston Red Sox blanked the White Sox two to nil at Chicago to creep up to within one game of the idle New York Yankees. The Detroit Tigers had an easy 7 to 1 victory over the Washington Senators at Detroit to move into the first division ahead of the Chisox.

## Hockey League Scouts Seek Young Players

CALGARY, May 19: (CP)—Young players, not men from the senior amateur ranks, are the ones that National Hockey League scouts have their eyes peeled for these days. That was the advice contained in a speech by Cecil "Tiny" Thompson, goalkeeper of the Boston Bruins and picked by sports writers in N. H. L. cities as netminder for the Canadian Press all-star team this year.

Speaking at a junior hockey club banquet here Thompson called on the boys to make their last year in that grade a good one.

Pursuing the "big time" line of thought, Rosie Helmer, bench manager of the New York Americans, told a few of the things to expect in major league games. "You will be hit hard and often—but you are going to be hit clean. There is no room for a "dirty" hockey player in the N. H. L. Though some of the players may be hot-headed, they are not dirty."

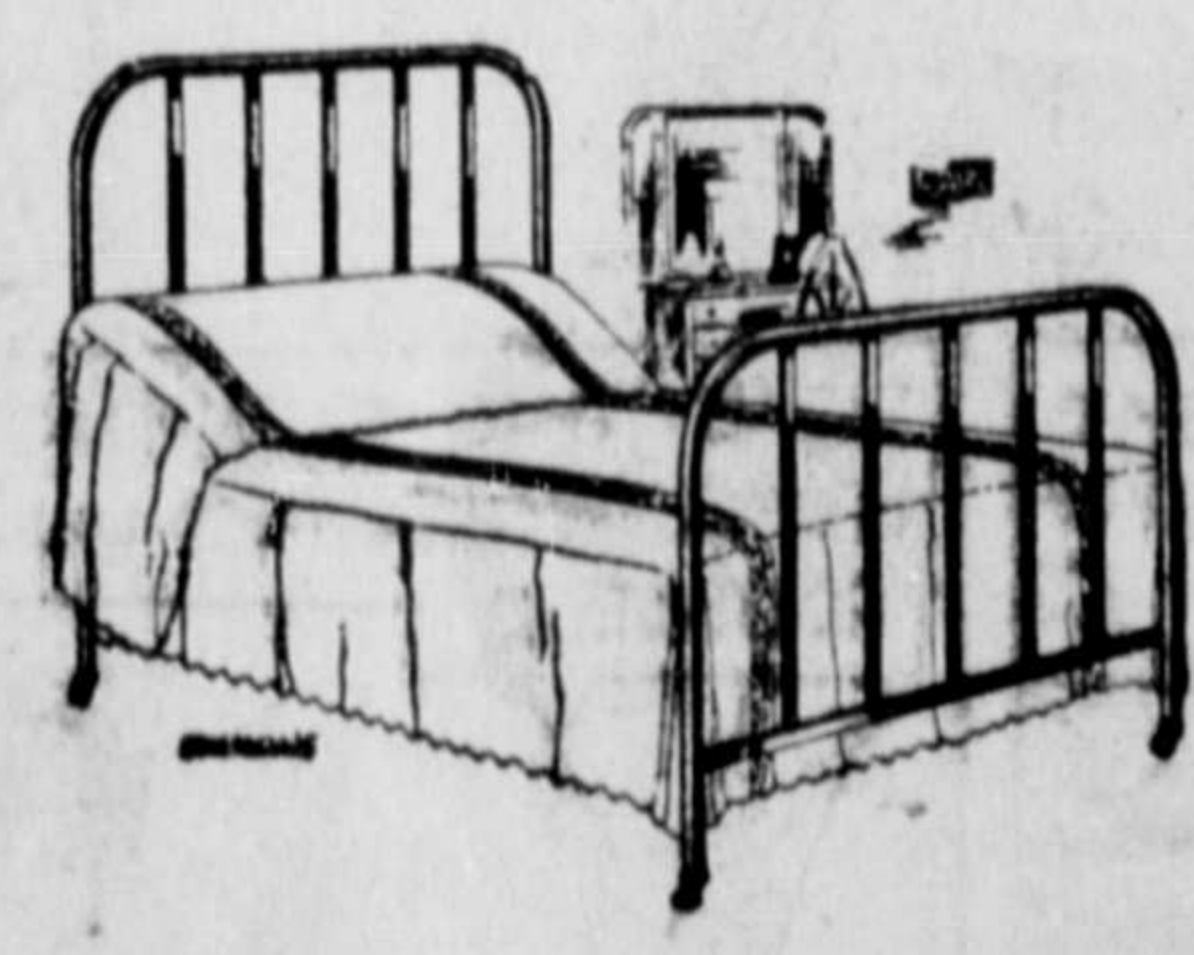

LAKES ARE CONNECTED

Interesting Information Obtained In Regard to Nearby System Of Water Bodies.

A survey made recently on behalf of the Department of Fisheries by a party headed by Dr. Neal Carter has established that trout can travel from Prudhomme Lake into Diana Lake and, further, there is a water connection between Diana and Rainbow Lakes through which fish can get through at high water. The connection from Diana to Rainbow Lake is by means of a series of small lakes formed by beaver dams. There is, apparently, also a connection between Diana and Sockeye Lakes, which, however, was not explored.

The survey of the lakes was made in connection with the projected planting of Kamloops trout eggs.

Going into Diana Lake, the party used a new and much shorter trail which was slashed only last fall. This trail starts a quarter of a mile beyond Cloyah Bay and crosses a ridge of some 600 or 700 feet elevation from the summit of which Diana Lake can be clearly seen.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Dr. Riddell Here to Join Fisheries Experimental Station Staff—Train Delayed to Take Halibut East From Here.

Dr. W. A. Riddell, late professor of chemistry on the staff of the University of Saskatchewan at Regina, who arrived in the city at the end of last week to join the staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station as research chemist, will work on the experimental verification of a new method of determining proportion of fatty acids in fish oils. Dr. Riddell will continue work along this line which was instituted by his predecessor, Frank Chamley, now with the canned salmon inspection bureau. Dr. H. N. Brocklesby will collaborate in the work. Later, also in conjunction with Dr. Brocklesby, Dr. Riddell will study the cold clearing of pilchard oils and the scientific aspects of rancidity of fish products.

Peaches \$1 Each In Dear Old London

One Strawberry May Be Had For 17 1/2c. But Season Just Starting

LONDON, May 19 (CP)—Young women who crave strawberries are expensive to court, for the berries cost 17 1/2c. each in London. But even young men who can afford strawberries blanche at peaches.

Spring prices, as displayed by London's leading fruiterer in the West End, find the fuzzy-cheeked peach at the top of the list—at four shillings, or \$1, a peach. They come from Belgian hothouses, and the purveyor keeps only a dozen on hand at a time.

"A wealthy Earl buys them," said the manager. "Sometimes an American will come in and ask how much they are. Other people just like to look at them in the window."

"Once," he said wistfully, "we had an order for two dozen. We had to cable to Belgium and have them sent by plane."

Early strawberries are one guinea, or \$5.25 a basket of 30 berries. They count them. Exactly 30 berries, no more, no less. "Expensive?" said the manager. "Oh, dear no! They're cheap now—really cheap. In February they cost three guineas a basket."

A bunch of asparagus, some 22 stalks to the bunch, weighing a little less than two pounds, sells at \$1.35 a bunch, or about six cents a stalk.

Other prices include: Grapes, \$1.50 a pound; lemons, 65 cents a dozen; small bananas, 65 cents a dozen; tomatoes, 90 cents a pound; raspberries, 75 cents a pound; grapefruit, 18 cents apiece; peas, \$1.25 a dozen; avocados, 50 cents apiece; oranges, 65 cents a dozen; plums, \$1.25 a dozen.

The tomatoes, at 90 cents a pound, are the small English type about the size of a discouraged crabapple, but the manager said they are just about the biggest seller.

HOPPERS MAKE APPEARANCE

EXCEL, Alta., May 19: (CP)—First indications of possible hopper infestation in Alberta are reported from this town. Warm weather has resulted in hatching of the first grasshoppers of 1936. One farmer reported finding the pests half an inch long on his land.
