

A thrilling rescue feat was performed by George Wright who, when his home near Terrace became inundated, placed his wife and two day old baby on the roof while he went to seek a boat to remove them. This was at 3 o'clock Tuesday morning when the flood waters were at their height. Mrs. Wright and the baby were finally rescued, being taken across the raging river which was full of trees and swirls to the home of Miss Pearson.

The home of John Loen was completely lost. It floated off and was smashed by the current. His farm land was also carried away. It is next to the Sherwood place. Under E. T. Kenney M.L.A. and Provincial Constable H. L. Mc-Kenney first aid and relief measures are being organized. A shortage of supplies appears to be likely in the whole region from Kitwanga to Kwinitsa. Yesterday an emergency nurse was sent to Usk.

Headquarters of the provincial police in Prince Rupert were advised today that Constable McKenney got through to Usk yesterday with 700 pounds of relief provisions. He was accompanied by a special constable and a nurse who will take charge of a temporary relief
