REDS WOULD SINK INSURGENT SHIPS

Briquetting Plant To Be Brought From England And Installed at Interior Mine

SMITHERS, Dec. 21.—Word received in Smithers recently from Vancouver gives the information that a briquetting plant will be established at the anthracite coal property of the Lake Kathlyn Anthracite Co. on Hudson Bay Mountain next spring.

Mining is being carried on steadily at the property with a small crew of men. A waiting market is found locally for the full production of anthracite which is giving the greatest satisfaction.

The operators have continued to operate with very little financial support and have persisted in opening the property up with long tunnels until they have arrived at the point where there is no doubt about there being sufficient coal and in large enough seams to start production on a large scale.

When the property goes into full production it will be a great benefit to the town of Smithers and to the district at large.

NO HOPE IS HELD

Seven Persons on Airliner Now Conceded to Have Perished in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 21.—Little hope is now held out for the safety of four passengers and three members of the crew of the Western Airways Express twin-motored air liner which has been missing for over a week on a flight from Las Vegas, Nevada, to Salt Lake City.

'QUAKE WAS FELT HERE

Disturbance Plainly Perceived Late This Morning Locally And on Islands

Earthquake shocks were recorded intermittently between 11:08 and 11:30 this morning at the Digby Island meteorological station. It was a typical rumbling "roller" with the two peaks at those times and tremors off and on between.

Many Prince Rupert people perceived the disturbance with furniture and electric light fixtures swaying.

Dead Tree Point also recorded the disturbance.

No damage was reported.

TUCSON, Arizona, Dec. 21.—Not sufficient evidence forthcoming to enable an indictment, it is announced that the federal investigation in connection with the abduction of little June Robbles in 1933 will be discontinued and the case dropped.

CHINESE SITUATION IS STILL UNSETTLED

NANKING, Dec. 21.—With Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang's rebel forces at Sianfu still holding General Chiang Kai-Shek, Premier of China, and continuing their demands for war against Japan, while the Nationalist government is going ahead with its punitive expedition against Sianfu following expiry yesterday of the ultimatum for the dictator's release, the Chinese civil war situation continues critical.

DUKE VERY GRACIOUS

Incident at Enzefeld—Former King And Bride May Return to England

ENZEFELD, Austria, Dec. 21.—The Duke of Windsor, formerly King Edward VIII, displayed his old time graciousness in an incident which occurred here Saturday. Two newsreel photographers had hidden themselves away in the bush near the Rothschild estate, where Edward is staying, with the intention of stepping out and "shooting" His Royal Highness when he passed. They were discovered, however, and chased away by Austrian guards.

Mrs. Simpson Heard From CANNES, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Wallis Simpson again announced through her host, Herman Rogers, yesterday, that she would not see the Duke of Windsor again until after she has been granted her absolute decree of divorce which is expected to be about April 27. She will remain at Cannes for some months until plans have been completed for her marriage to the former King of England. She will spend Christmas quietly with a few friends at the Rogers chateau.

Return to England? LONDON, Dec. 21.—It is being said here that the former King Edward VIII, after his marriage to Mrs. Wallis Simpson, may return to England next summer. Possibly they may take up residence in this country.

Mountainside Fire False Hope

MOSCOW, Idaho, Dec. 21.—A fire which was reported to have been seen on a mountainside near here Saturday night led searchers to that point in the course of the quest for Joe Livermore and A. A. Hague, air mail fliers, who disappeared early Friday morning but it was found to be a false clue. Officials of the Northwest Air Line have about given up hope for the safety of the fliers who were bound from Chicago to Seattle. They are believed to have crashed in Northern Idaho.

CIVIL WAR IS RAGING

Capture of Village is Claimed by Spanish Insurgents—Loyalists Move Towards Burgos

More German Help

Chancellor Hitler to Send 62,000 Men to Aid of Rebel Forces

MADRID, Dec. 21.—Spanish rebels charged forward southwest of Madrid yesterday, and, after staging a fierce bombardment, claimed to have captured the village of Millanova. On the other hand, the loyalists claimed to have beaten off the attack and to have advanced further towards Burgos, the insurgent stronghold and provisional capital of General Francisco Franco.

With rebel forces receiving heavy reinforcements, it is now anticipated that General Franco's long talked of big attack on Madrid will commence immediately after the New Year.

Russian Demand

A Russian embassy spokesman said today that the Soviet is considering demanding that the international Spanish non-intervention committee declare the Spanish insurgent ships pirates which could be sunk on sight. This proposal, the spokesman said, grew out of the sinking of the Russian motorship Konsomel which the Soviet charged had been done by a Spanish insurgent vessel.

Help From Germany

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(CP)—The diplomatic editor of the London News-Chronicle wrote today that Chancellor Adolf Hitler plans to send five divisions of German troops, over 62,000 men, to Spain in spite of the opposition of the German general staff.

The writer, in a front page article, said that a German diplomatic mission to the Spanish rebels, inaugurated by the insurgent commander, General Francisco Franco, was too unpopular in Spain to win the civil war without heavy troop reinforcements.

LONDON TO ROOSEVELT

Defeated Republican Candidate To Interview Chief Executive

BALTIMORE, Maryland, Dec. 21.—Governor Alfred M. Landon, defeated Republican candidate for President of the United States, was a visitor in Baltimore overnight, the guest of the mayor of Baltimore and the Governor of Maryland while on his way from Kansas to Washington to confer with President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

BUSINESS SECTION OF MONTANA TOWN WIPE OUT BY FIRE YESTERDAY STEVENSVILLE, Mont., Dec. 21.—With loss estimated at \$200,000, the business section of this town was destroyed by fire yesterday.

Pound Sterling And Canadian Dollar On New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The British pound sterling was off 7-16 at \$4.91 1/2 on the New York foreign exchange market at the end of the week. The Canadian dollar was off 1-32c at \$1.00 3-32.

SALVADOR VISITED BY EARTHQUAKE AND HUNDREDS ARE DEAD

SAN SALVADOR, Dec. 21.—A severe earthquake struck central Salvador early yesterday, wrecking towns and villages. It is estimated that 220 persons are dead with hundreds injured and homeless. Damage is extensive. The quake evidently centred at San Vicente which is reported to be virtually destroyed. As officials today watched the mounting death toll in totally razed San Vicente and district, all relief available was rushed to the area but it could not be estimated definitely how high the list might mount. Refugees arriving here said the volcano Santa Rita, near San Vicente, erupted after the quake. Accurate reports are difficult to obtain owing to disrupted communications. Many were killed by crashing walls of buildings as the earth shook, eye witnesses said. The city water supply is poisoned by sulphur and danger of epidemic is seen.

POPE PIUS IS WEAKER

Pontiff Takes Turn for Worse After Restless Day—"Absolute Rest" Prescribed

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 21.—Pope Pius was much weaker last night after a restless day. Absolute rest has been ordered by his physicians and during the next few days only Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State, and a few other leading Vatican officials will be able to see him. A specialist was called in yesterday to consult with His Holiness' personal physician.

The Pontiff had a fainting spell yesterday and his heart action is irregular. He has developed a temperature and influenza is feared.

To Broadcast Message

Despite his feeble condition, Pope Pius today announced his intention of broadcasting a Christmas message to the world on Thursday to "prove we are still alive." The Pontiff will broadcast from the study adjoining the bedroom where he is confined with circulatory congestion and fever. He will be carried from his bed to an arm chair before the microphone.

NEW YORK, (CP)—Bar silver was unchanged at 45 1/2c per ounce on the New York metal market today.

Atlantic Liner Fouls Anchor On Harbor's Bottom

NEW LONDON, Connecticut, Dec. 21.—Forced into New London for shelter from a howling gale, the liner Comet, having fouled her anchor on the bottom of the harbor, was delayed for several hours in getting away after the storm abated. Finally, with the assistance of coastguard vessels, the vessel was freed.

British Columbia Sawmills Humming; Output is Showing Great Increase This Year

VANCOUVER, Dec. 21.—(CP)—British Columbia mill saws whine at higher pitch today and 4,000 extra men have been added to coast logging camps as operators try to keep pace with mounting orders for Douglas fir, cedar and hemlock. Export lumber shipments to November 30 exceeded 48,000,000 the previous 12-month record of 860,000,000 feet set in 1934 and lumbermen believe the total will reach 1,200,000,000 by December 31.

GIRL'S BODY FOUND NORTH VANCOUVER—The body of Betty Sharman, missing for a month, was found yesterday morning in Lynn Creek. Injuries to the body indicate that she had fallen into the creek and been carried downstream after drowning.

FERNIE LAWYER DIES FERNIE—Sherwood Herchmer, who practised law here for 25 years, died yesterday at the age of 55. He is survived by a widow and son. For years Mr. Herchmer served as a school trustee.

LIBERALS TO MEET EDMONTON—The executive of the Alberta Liberal Association has decided to call a convention for April 3 for the purpose of electing a new leader and drawing a new party platform.

JAPS TO FISH TOKYO—Japan intends to continue fishing in waters off Sakhalin Island despite the delay of Russia in extending treaty privileges, it is announced. If necessary, naval protection will be given the Japanese fishing vessels in their operations.

PAIR ARE DROWNED

Tragedy Feared at Thetis Island Near Ladysmith, Vancouver Island

THETIS ISLAND, Dec. 21.—(CP)—Residents of this island off the east coast of Vancouver Island near Ladysmith were dragging today for the bodies of Adolph Vanhinoff and 14-year old Eugene le Loup who are believed to have been drowned when a small fishing boat capsized in a gale Friday. No trace of the boat or bodies had been found up to today.

Immigration

It looks as if a determined effort would be made soon in the matter of settling up some of the vacant lands in British Columbia. For years Brigadier General Hornby has been working on a scheme for settling people from Great Britain on farms in Canada and his persistent efforts have led to the plan being very generally endorsed. The British Columbia government has been studying the scheme along with others and it seems quite likely that something will be done in the near future.

The great feature of the Hornby plan is that it provides for looking after those settlers who do not prove a success and if necessary returning them to their former homes. Another important feature is that it provides for continuous action rather than spasmodic efforts so that once the plan gets going it should work more or less automatically in the future and bring a slow stream of new settlers to the country year after year.

The Hornby plan has been endorsed by the Chamber of Commerce of Prince Rupert and by the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia as well as by individual boards of trade and other organizations in the area extending from Prince Rupert to McFride. It has also been tentatively adopted in other parts of the country and it has very strong backing in England. There seems to be a strong probability that action may be taken on it in the near future if Prime Minister Mackenzie King can be induced to make the first move.

Vacant Areas a Danger

It is very doubtful if Canada has a moral right to keep large areas of land vacant when there are people of many nations needing land on which to live. For a country almost without defences to attempt to keep vacant lands to themselves or to decide who shall use them is a condition that cannot last. Canada must either use her vacant lands or hand them over to someone who will. The dog in the manger policy cannot be allowed to continue long. As it is now, we have the right to say who shall occupy the vacant lands. While there is still time we must act. Every Canadian government, provincial or federal, should be made to realize the situation and take action. The Premier of British Columbia has always been favorable to a policy of land settlement as long as it does not keep those now resident in the province out of a job. General Hornby shows that his plan will create employment rather than interfere with it and the time now seems opportune for a forward movement that will be a real factor in land settlement.

PEACE AT SMITHERS

SMITHERS, Dec. 21.—The battle of Main Street in Smithers, which has been raging for a week, was terminated temporarily on Thursday evening when an armistice was arranged at a largely attended meeting of the retail merchants of the town and at which the Commissioners of the village were also present.

The battle started when the merchants insisted on the enforcement of the Shops Regulation Act which was being violated by several stores. Continued infractions brought legal proceedings and re-remunations which produced feelings that were not in accord with "Peace on earth, good will toward men" spirit that is supposed to prevail at this season of the year even in Smithers.

The result of the meeting was that they agreed to allow every store to remain open "ad lib" until the middle of January when some alterations may be asked for in the by-law governing the closing of shops.

It is now hoped that Santa Claus might pay his scheduled visit to Smithers without fear of being pinched for peddling without a licence.

CANADIENS ARE SOLID

Entrench Themselves Firmly In First Place—Three Way Tie For Second Position

MONTREAL, Dec. 21:—The Canadiens entrenched themselves even more solidly in first place in the International Section of the National Hockey League by virtue of a four to two overtime victory over the New York Rangers here Saturday night while the Toronto Maple Leafs scored a three to one win over the New York Americans at Toronto to move into a three-way tie for second place with the Americans and the Montreal Maroons.

It was Young Canada night at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto and a large and wildly enthusiastic crowd of between 13,000 and 14,000 fans witnessed what proved to be one of the most wide open and hardest fought puck battles which has been staged in Toronto this winter. Despite the absence from the line-up of Charlie Conacher and Buzz Boll, both of whom will be off for five weeks with injuries, the Maple Leafs seemed to have completely resumed their customary old form and it was a hectic evening for the Americans who, nevertheless, put up a great fight. The first goal for the Maple Leafs came in the first period near the end from the stick of Hap Day on a pass from Bill Thoms. Nine minutes from the end of the second period, Drillon, on a pass from Harvey Jackson, put the Maple Leafs two up. Art Chapman, on Schriener's pass, then scored what was to be the Americans' one and only goal. Near the end of the period, Bill Thoms slammed in Davidson's pass for the third Maple Leaf goal. The Americans used five forwards during a good part of the third period in a desperate effort to overcome the lead but the Maple Leafs' defence proved stout and there was no further scoring.

Fouling of a quantity of old cable lying on the bottom near the wharf by her anchor which she had dropped to aid her in making a mooring was the cause of delay of the steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. The local halibut boat Helen II, Capt. Peter Byrne, was in port this morning with one thousand pounds of flatfish for Bacon Fisheries. The vessel reported extremely rough weather outside.
