WASHINGTON, D.C., April 30:-The House of Representatives appropriations committee today reported a bill which would provide \$549,000,000 for naval construction. The program, as requisitioned by the Navy Department, would include the construction of two new 35,000-ton battleships for replacements, twelve destroyers, half a dozen submarines and over three hundred aircraft.

CHOOSING A CANDIDATE

The United States is having a difficult time choosing a Republican candidate to oppose President Roosevelt in the presidential campaign. Former President Hoover is not very popular and seems to be out of the running. The spectacular Senator Borah is putting up a fight for it but he has strong opposition in some states. Probably Governor Alfred M. Landon of Kansas has the best chance of securing the nomination but nothing is sure at a nominating convention. There is always possibility of a "dark horse" being introduced at the last moment as a compromise between closely contending candidates.

On the Democratic side there is practically no opposition to Roosevelt and the concensus of opinion seems to be that not only will the president win the nomination but that he will be elected for another term no matter who the Republicans may choose.







Timely Recipes

CINNAMON ROLLS

Cinnamon rolls are easily made in two hours and can be used to top off fruit dessert at night. Leftover rolls are delicious if split, toasted and buttered.

11/4 tablespoons sugar, 4 cups sifted cake flour (about), 11/2 tablespoons butter or other shortening, 1 cup milk scalded, 1 egg. slightly beaten, 1-3 cup sugar, 1 cake compressed yeast, 3/4 teapoon salt, 1/2 cup currants, 1/2 cup igar, 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon, tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons

Add sugar to milk, cool to lukewarm, add yeast, and stir until smooth, Add 1/2 of flour, then egg, salt, and butter, beating well. Add remaining flour (enough to make as soft a dough as can be handled). Knead gently until smooth Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until dou in bulk, press edges of dough to center, working it down slightly.

Turn dough over and let rise again until double in bulk. Roll in sheet 1/4 inch thick, sprinkle with currants, sugar, and cinnamon. Dot with butter. Roll as for jelly roll, cut in 1-inch slices. Place cut side down in pan that has been prinkled with sugar and dotted with butter. Let rise until double in bulk. Brush with additional melted butter and sprinkle with augar Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Let stand in pan for several minutes. Invert pan to remove them. Makes 18 rolls.
