ADDIS ABABA IN GREAT CONFUSION

Italian Motorized Forces Are Reported Within Cannon Range Of Ethiopia's Capital Today

Foreigners Take Refuge in Legations as Downfall of City Is Expected Momentarily—Emperor Haile Selassie Returns Home But Refuses to Admit Defeat

ADDIS ABABA, April 30: (CP)—Emperor Haile Selassie returned to the capital today in the midst of general confusion precipitated by word that Italian motorized forces were a short distance from Addis Ababa and within cannon range. Until his return today, the whereabouts of the Emperor had been a mystery.

BIG NAVAL BUILDING

Large Appropriation Bill Reported To House of Representatives Today by Committee

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 30:—The House of Representatives appropriations committee today reported a bill which would provide \$549,000,000 for naval construction. The program, as requisitioned by the Navy Department, would include the construction of two new 35,000-ton battleships for replacement, twelve destroyers, half a dozen submarines and over three hundred aircraft.

Actress is Shot In Apartment Of Playwright Fiance

NEW YORK, April 30: (CP)—Doris Dudley, a well known actress, suffered a serious gunshot wound late last night in the apartment of her fiance, Sydney Kingsley, a playwright and Pulitzer prize winner. It was reported from hospital last night that the young actress was expected to recover.

Hunger Marchers Being Ejected

New Jersey State Legislature To Clear Buildings of Men Who Have Squatted There

TRENTON, N.J., April 30:—The New Jersey state legislature last night passed a resolution to clear the state legislative buildings of hunger marchers who have been encamped therein for the last few days.

DEVELOP FISH USE

Campaign to Extend Markets To Be Instituted by Ottawa—Newspaper Advertising Is Favored

OTTAWA, April 30: (CP)—Development of domestic and foreign markets for Canadian fish will be attempted through a vote of \$200,000 passed in the House of Commons yesterday, this being in addition to a vote of \$300,000 for needy fishermen.

Part of the money will be spent in newspaper advertising to educate people to the good qualities of Canadian fish. Hon. J. E. Michaud, minister of fisheries, said, "Former Premier R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, believed it would be better to devise some way of getting fresh fish from the Atlantic Coast to eastern cities and from the Pacific Coast to prairie cities."

Euler, minister of trade and commerce.

WINDSOR, Ont., April 30: (CP)—Windsor Fords defeated Victoria Dominos 47 to 36 here last night in the first game of the best three out of five series for the Canadian senior men's basketball championship and the right to represent Canada at the Olympic Games. Ex-Service Man Found Guilty of Rioting Is Proud of Taking Part

Joe Mynnies of Kimberley and Sam Coury of Vancouver Are Cleared of Charges—Jack Kyle of Winnipeg Given Seven Months

REGINA, Sask., April 30: (CP)—Joe Mynnies of Kimberley and Sam Coury of Vancouver, "On-to-Ottawa" trekkers of last summer, were found not guilty of rioting yesterday. A third man, Jack Kyle of Winnipeg, former member of the Royal Flying Corps, was convicted of rioting and was sentenced to seven months' imprisonment by Mr. Justice Macdonald. Before being sentenced, Kyle said: "I'm just as proud to have been a member of the 'On-to-Ottawa' trek as I was of being in His Majesty's forces."

ONSET INSIDIOUS

In tuberculosis of the lungs, as in all forms of the malady, the onset and early development was very insidious. In the early stages the presence of tuberculosis was at times extremely hard to detect.

The first real step forward in the treatment of tuberculosis had been the development of sanatoria under suitable climatic conditions which the speaker briefly outlined. As time went on, however, it became apparent that the cure of the disease depended not so much upon climate as upon certain other conditions, first of which was rest. It had been learned that rest in bed, a form of treatment which could be carried out any place, was most important. Even in Prince Rupert patients who had been treated in their own homes by rest and general measures, such as good food, etc., had done very well. The value of rest was in that it conserved the patient's strength, allowing nature to have free scope to employ all the energies of the body in combatting the disease.

Eric W. Hamber Will Assume State Duties in Succession to J. W. Fordham-Johnson

OTTAWA, April 30:—Appointment of Eric Werge Hamber of Vancouver as Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia, announced yesterday afternoon by Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, will date from May 1. Hon. J. W. Fordham-Johnson, Lieutenant Governor since August 1, 1931, requested to be relieved before the expiration of his five-year term because of ill health.

**MORE HEMLOCK LOGS WANTED**

In another place in this paper today is an advertisement asking for hemlock logs. Already between three and four million feet of logs for export have been secured, but twice as many are needed to fill the orders received for this timber to be shipped through the port of Prince Rupert. It will be a pity if these cannot be purchased since the vessels have already been subsidized to carry them and the local longshoremen are anxious to load them. Also woodsmen are anxious for the job of cutting the timber but they have not the money to finance it.

**TROUT FOR LAKES**

It's rather a nice luxury to have trout brought from Kamloops to Prince Rupert to restock the chain of lakes of which Prudhomme is one. The difficulty is that unless the lakes are carefully protected the fish will soon be all taken. With the highway passing close to the lake shore it will be so easy for people to fish there.

The reason Khtada Lake fishing is so well preserved is because it is difficult of access and any fish caught have to be packed out four miles and then carried by launch forty or more miles to Prince Rupert. There are also a limited number of boats on the lake.

For lakes that are easy of access the fishing season should be restricted to a few weeks each year, if the fishing is to be perpetuated.

**CHOOSING A CANDIDATE**

The United States is having a difficult time choosing a Republican candidate to oppose President Roosevelt in the presidential campaign. Former President Hoover is not very popular and seems to be out of the running. The spectacular Senator Borah is putting up a fight for it but he has strong opposition in some states. Probably Governor Alfred M. Landon of Kansas has the best chance of securing the nomination but nothing is sure at a nominating convention. There is always possibility of a "dark horse" being introduced at the last moment as a compromise between closely contending candidates.

On the Democratic side there is practically no opposition to Roosevelt and the consensus of opinion seems to be that not only will the president win the nomination but that he will be elected for another term no matter who the Republicans may choose.

**Princess Norah On Final Voyage Of Season - Seattle Halibut Landings - Melville to Butedale**

With a large list of 95 passengers including many northerners bound for Northern British Columbia and Yukon for the season, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here next Monday afternoon southbound. This is the final voyage of the season for the Princess Norah which will be replaced now by the larger Princess Louise. Half a dozen passengers disembarked from the vessel here while about fifteen boarded her here for the north.

The Western Princess was in last week from North Island with six thousand pounds of spring salmon from the North Island Troller's Co-operative Association, the fish being sold to Canadian Fishing Co. at 11c, 9c and 3c. The Pachena was in this week with a load of co-operative salmon from Banks Island which was disposed of on the consignment arrangement with Sigmund Einstoss.

There is some discussion as to the exercise of law here by which creditors can garnishee the entire share of a halibut fisherman on any trip as he ranks as a partner, and not as a wage earner. While it is admitted that fishermen should pay their debts like anyone else, the too rigid enforcement of the total garnishee provision can work a real hardship, it is pointed out.

A total of 171,000 pounds of halibut was sold by four western and four local boats at Seattle yesterday. Prices were lower than the day previous for western fish and 1/2c lower for local. The boats selling in Seattle yesterday were: Trinity, 40,000, Sebastian-Stewart, 75c and 6 1/2c, Silka, 36,000, San Juan, 7 1/2c and 6c, Neptune, 27,000, Washington, 7 1/2c and 6 3/4c; Summit, 21,000, Whiz, 7 1/2c and 6 1/4c; Coolidge, 16,000, Booth, 7 5/8c and 7 1/4c; Arne, 14,000, Booth, 7 5/8c and 7 1/4c; Harding, 10,000, Sebastian-Stewart, 7 5/8c and 7c; Faith, 7,500, Whiz, 7 3/4c and 7c. The price of cod in Seattle was 2c.

The funeral of Carl Giske, formerly of the halibut boat Sunset, who died in marine hospital at Seattle last Saturday, took place in the Puget Sound city today. Giske is survived by a widow and several children in Norway but has no relatives in this country.

Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, will leave next Monday afternoon on the Princess Norah for Vancouver to attend sessions of the Pacific Coast sub-executive of the Biological Board of Canada. John Dybhavn, local member of the Biological

**FIRED ON SWANS**

After some days one returned to the lake, where she can be heard at all times of the day

apparently calling for her lost mate.

As these birds seem to be travelling and settling in pairs, it is very doubtful just how long this one will remain. And it is just as doubtful if another pair will again locate there.

It seems most regrettable that people will deliberately do such a thing. A pair of these graceful birds is quite a novelty in any location and one would have thought that they would be considered welcome and be permitted to stay, rather than being shot at. At least, that is the way I feel about.

## SEES PILGRIMAGE TO HERO SHRINES GREAT PRIVILEGE TO HONOR

### Canadian Air Ace Writes of Legion's Peacetime Trek To Vimy and Other Overseas Battlefields Next July

(Written for The Canadian Press by Air Vice-Marshal W. A. Bishop V.C.)

July, for Canadians, should be a memorable month. Memorable and sacred. For it will see a pilgrimage of Canada's war veterans to a shrine forever holy in her story—to the memorial and graves of those who, at Vimy and other battlefields, sleep their sleep of immortality. The heroes of war become the poignant memories of peace. For brief moments of hysterical exaltation the world pays with years of tears. That is history. This pilgrimage to Vimy comes as something truer and deeper; as a restoration of the original brotherhood; a return to those who, somewhere in eternity, will stand as witnesses of this testimony to their memory.

The hot breath of war blows once more in men's faces. What more fitting then, or strengthening, than that, at this hour, we should think of this pilgrimage; that, not only as a memorial for the dead, but as a goad to human conscience and a promise to the living, we, the survivors of the world's Calvary, should go to the graves of those whose sacrifice improved our lives and left many among us desolate?

This message, therefore, is but to hope that the comrades of those who sleep at Vimy, with their loved ones, will give impressive testimony against forgetfulness; will give evidence to all the world that Canada remembers.

Organization of the pilgrimage—under the auspices of the Canadian Legion—is now complete in every detail. The pilgrimage is not limited to Canadian Legion members, or to their families. There will be a place, a care and welcome for all Canadian veterans.

Everything necessary to make the pilgrimage unforgettable for those who make it, is being done. Co-operation of the governments of Canada, Britain, France and Belgium; the well-organized assistance of steamship companies, care and attention for pilgrims while in France and England; everything that makes for comfortable travel and protection against unnecessary expense—all have been attended to.

This Vimy Pilgrimage will be a model of peacetime organization. In addition to the arrangements for the solemn part of the tour of the battlefields, the steamships which will take pilgrims to England will be held at Havre to carry them back to England, where four days will be spent. There will be accommodation at first class hotels in London, sightseeing of historic spots in the Old Land; the same steamships to bring the party back to Canada less than four weeks from the time of their departure.

**Great Memorial**  
In conclusion, a world about the Canadian Memorial in France—the hallowed spot in France to be visited.

In the centre of that part of Northern France where Canadian troops were chiefly engaged in the Great War, stands the noble memorial erected to them by their countrymen. Two majestic pylons of stone, rising from a massive square base, decorated with sculpture and suitably inscribed, commemorate the deeds and sacrifices

Le-Preux, and through the Dro-court-Queant position on the Hindenburg Line, and on across the Canal du Nord by Bourlon Wood to Cambrai. Farther still, beyond the eastern horizon, are Valenciennes and Mons, on the road to the Rhine.

Little more need be added. Only that this pilgrimage comes to us, comrades of dread yet noble years; as an opportunity—and high privilege. It is a challenge from the dead to the living; asks that, rejoicing that our faith heals the wounds and brings peace to those we have lost, we do not forget them; that across the leagues of the Atlantic our hearts are forever with those who sleep with the brave of the world in an eternal fellowship of peace and quiet; that time but brushes away from them the battle-smoke and leaves their fame immortal.

## Timely Recipes

### CINNAMON ROLLS

Cinnamon rolls are easily made in two hours and can be used to top off fruit dessert at night. Left-over rolls are delicious if split, toasted and buttered.

1 1/2 tablespoons sugar, 4 cups sifted cake flour (about), 1 1/2 tablespoons butter or other shortening, 1 cup milk scalded, 1 egg slightly beaten, 1-3 cup sugar, 1 cake compressed yeast, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup currants, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons butter.

Add sugar to milk, cool to lukewarm, add yeast, and stir until smooth. Add 1/2 of flour, then egg, salt, and butter, beating well. Add remaining flour (enough to make as soft a dough as can be handled). Knead gently until smooth. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk, press edges of dough to center, working it down slightly. Turn dough over and let rise again until double in bulk. Roll in sheet, 1/4 inch thick, sprinkle with currants, sugar, and cinnamon. Dot with butter. Roll as for jelly roll, cut in 1-inch slices. Place cut side down in pan that has been sprinkled with sugar and dotted with butter. Let rise until double in bulk. Brush with additional melted butter and sprinkle with Sugar Flake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Let stand in pan for several minutes. Invert pan to remove them. Makes 18 rolls.



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## Gardening

The recreational and physical education movement initiated by the department of education at Victoria is closed but a new recreational and physical education movement is going on throughout the city that far exceeds the other in scope and importance. I mean the gardening movement. Every evening when the weather is fine hundreds of people, mostly householders and their wives, are seen stirring the earth, planting and sowing, enjoying the oldest and finest form of recreation there is and at the same time increasing the beauty and intrinsic value of the city of Prince Rupert.

Gardening differs from the more artificial forms of recreation in that you get something in addition to health and strength for the effort expended. You have something to show for your work in addition to muscular development and athletic skill. You have a long trail of beauty and recreational interest following you that cannot easily be eradicated.

Never before was Prince Rupert so active as this spring. Never were there so many gardens being cultivated and so general an interest taken in beautification. The few who neglect their home surroundings are becoming the subject of objectionable remark. They are, to say the least, not counted among the best citizens. They are lacking in civic loyalty and public spirit. No matter how admirable they may be in other matters if they fall down in this very important phase of community life, it is a scar on their character.

### Beware The Birds

The birds are busy in the gardens and many who have sown their seeds are worrying over the possibility of the birds getting them. Some people delay their sowing because of the danger of having them all scratched out. While the birds have not yet been numerous enough to be a danger, the little scratching sparrows have been busy in my garden during the last couple of days and I am glad the carrots are not yet down. Sometimes they do a lot of damage to the green peas, following up the rows of sprouting peas and picking of the young green shoots. Robins and thrushes do a lot of scratching but they are after worms and other insects. The sparrows are after tiny insects and seeds and young green shoots. They work early and late. Personally, I like the birds and encourage them to come around, but

they often annoy me when they mess up the flower beds, destroy the seedlings and eat the seeds.

### Tulips Showing Bloom

Tulips are just commencing to show bloom in some gardens. If others they will not be out for a week or two. Polyanthus and primroses are brightening the garden, along with the daffodils and the mountain rock. Some people have grape hyacinths. I have a plant in the rockery that I view with mixed feelings. It is the old-fashioned blue periwinkle that pushes its way ruthlessly in an attempt to smother out all its neighbors. It is a selfish plant and has to be dealt with sternly. It sometimes threaten to throw it out, but just now its pretty little, innocent blue flowers are helping to make the garden beautiful. It is difficult to realize that such an innocent flower could come from a plant that is so ruthless in overrunning others and crowding them out, refusing them a place in the sun.—H. F. P.
