TIME TO AWAKEN

It was charged at a recent meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce that the Senior Chamber was nothing like as active as it should be.

It is useless to turn back and look for the reason for the lack of interest in Chamber of Commerce proceedings.

We are not suggesting that the Chamber has not been doing good work. It has been carrying on what are known as the normal activities of such a body.

What is looked for now is a revival of interest in the affairs of the city, particularly through its leading organization. It has come to light that the Nelson Board of Trade has a paid up membership of 170 and yet the population of the city is but little larger than the population of Prince Rupert.

As we have pointed out more than once, when the government wants advice on any important business matter affecting this district, it seeks it through the Chamber of Commerce or Board of Trade, a body which is considered to be representative of the business and professional interests of the city.

Evidently Prince Rupert is now at the parting of the ways. Either the city must have a Chamber of Commerce that is a representative body or drop it altogether.

British on Top In Air Mileage

Covering Greatest Ground in Regular Routes

LONDON, Oct. 14: (CP)—For the first time the British Empire has taken world leadership in regular air route mileage.

The Air Ministry's annual report on the progress of civil aviation, just issued, reveals Empire routes in operation during 1935 aggregated in length 63,291 miles, an increase of nearly 12,000 miles over the 1934 figure. The report ranks the United States in second place with 52,461 route miles. France worked 24,451 miles of regular air routes, Germany 22,291 miles and the Netherlands 12,298 miles.

Canada returned an increase from 5,080 to 6,111 miles and Australia, including New Guinea, advanced from 12,050 to 15,524 miles.

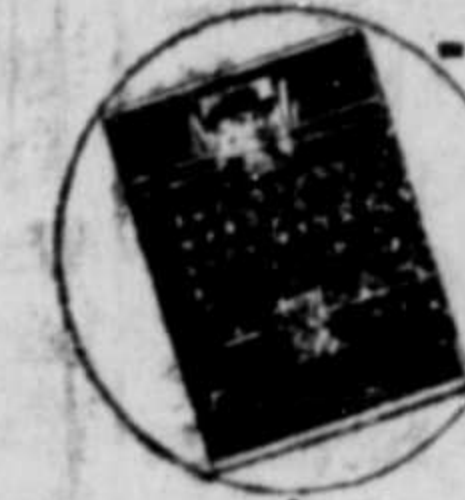
