## New is Planned in Public Works

OTTAWA, Feb. 12: (CP)—Estimated expenditures for the fiscal year 1936-37 tabled in the House of Commons yesterday totalled \$384,427,548 as compared with \$396,-509,542 a year ago. The decrease of more than twelve million dollars is principally due to the suspension of social measures pending decision of the validity tests now before

There are a few reductions in essential and customary services and IS STILL grants to various societies and bodies of a semi-public nature are generally maintained, in some cases being increased. Restoration of statutory salary increases in the civil service accounted for \$225,000. Notable increases include \$1,400,000 additional for aviation interests. National defence is increased by \$284,317. mines by \$158,904 and pensions and health by \$95,691.

Crew of U. S. Transport Unable To Shed Any Light on Disappearance of Captain

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 12:-The fate of Capt. Edgar S. McLellan, 65-year old commander of the Public works appropriations for United States Army transport ship Republic, which arrived here Monfor the operation and maintenance day from Honolulu, is still as much of snagboats on the Fraser, Skeena a mystery as ever. ship's position. Except for rheumatism with which he had suffered somewhat for some time, Capt. McLellan appeared to be in good health and was not despondent although it had been known that he did not relish the prospect of impending automatic retirement.




