WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 16: (CP)-The Supreme Court of the United States today refused to grant Bruno Richard Hauptmann's petition for a writ of habeas corpus and a stay of execution for the kidnap-murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. after which Governor Harold Hoffman announced that he had granted a thirtyday reprieve.
