### DEMAND FOR PAPER IS GROWING

Member of Audit Bureau of Circulations

In view of Prince Rupert's industrial aspirations a few quotations from The Newsprint Bulletin, issued by the P. & G. SOAP-Midwest Newsprint Manufacturers' Association may Lux\_small prove of interest:

"The whole of North America, excluding Mexico, manufactured 4,001,000 tons of newsprint last year. This was 3.2% greater than in 1934 and it was 91% of the production or 1929, the only year in which production was sub-

stantially larger than 1935. "Further increases in advertising and circulation are AYLMER PEAS-Sieve 4 predicted for 1936. There will be a still greater demand for per tin paper. If the increased demand for newsprint should be orders \$1.00 or Over Delivered Free unusual mills might have difficulty in meeting it. If the present increases are long continued a shortage is inevit- MUSSALLEM'S

"In 1926 the newsprint mills in the United States ac- ECONOMY STORE tually produced 1,684,000 tons of paper. This figure might be construed as the practical capacity of the industry at that time. Today the potential capacity is less than 1,200,-000 tons. Even in 1929 some mills made no money in newsprint. As demand and price fell there was a constant conversion of machines. Some mills which produced print in 1929 are now completely converted or hopelessly dismantled. Still others are hopelessly insolvent. The practical newsprint capacity of the United States is probably not a quarter million tons greater than the actual production of 1935.

"This means that if publishers of the United States are to demand much more newsprint they will not get it from the mills of their own country. Canada must meet that demand.

"When the rest of the world wishes more newsprint it will turn to the great forests and mills of Canada. In the past three years the Dominion has doubled its overseas shipments."


### PULP DEMAND INCREASING

While the proposed local pulp mill is designed to manufacture only high grade pulp for the use of the rayon mills, it is possible that, with newsprint advancing in price and the market expanding, the Prince Rupert mill may expand in the direction of paper making. At any rate, the present industrial outlook is excellent for the establishment of an industry in Prince Rupert, for sulphite pulp is in great demand and the demand is increasing.




